The following Resolution of the Government of India is published for general information:-

FORT WILLIAM, FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The 20th April 1868.
SEPARATE REVENUE.—ASSESSED TAXES.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General of India in Council, in accordance with the authority given him under Section 35 of Act IX. of 1868, is pleased to prescribe the following rules for the guidance of Officers in matters connected with the enforcement of the said Act.

- 1. Owing to the exemption of all persons whose annual profts are less than Rs. 500, the number of persons required to take out certificates under Act IX. of 1868, will be about one-fifth the number required to take out licences under Acts XXI. and XXIX. of 1867. The work performed and the experience gained under the License Tax Act will greatly diminish the labour and difficulty of carrying out the Certificate Act. The Governor General in Council therefore hopes that excepting in the Presidency towns and some few of the larger towns in India, the provisions of the Act will be carried out by the ordinary executive officers of Government and their subordinates, without extra assistance or special establishments. Where such extra assistance is necessary it will probably not be required for more than a few months.
- 2. The powers of Collector under the Act are primarily given to the Collector of Land Revenue, and the powers of a Commissioner to the Commissioner of Land Revenue.

The different powers of a Collector are as follows:-

1st.—The determination of what persons are liable to take out certificates, and under which class of Schedule A each person is to be assessed, and the preparation of a list in accordance with such determination (Secs. 12 and 13).

2nd.—The granting certificates and receiving payment for the same (Sec. 10).

3rd.—The hearing and disposing of petitions objecting to the assessment (Secs. 14 and 15).

4th.—The serving of notices on defaulters (Secs. 17 and 28).

5th .- The prosecution of persons before the Magistrate-

(a) for not taking out a certificate (Sec. 17).

(b) for refusing to produce a certificate on demand (Sec. 18).

6th. The recovery of the tax by process of the revenue law (Sec. 29).

The Collector has also certain powers with respect to the assessment of Joint Stock Companies and their servants.

The powers of a Commissioner are confined to the hearing and deciding appeals from orders passed by the Collector on petitions of objection (Section 15).

Under Section 31, the Local Governments can confer any or all of these powers on any person other than the Collector and Commissioner of Land Revenue.

In determining what persons, if any, should be entrusted with any or all of the powers of a Collector or Commissioner, Local Governments will be guided by considerations of convenience to the taxpayers and the means at the disposal of Government for utilizing its own officers, or where it may be necessary, non-official persons. It may be convenient, for instance, to confer the powers of a Collector, so far as regards the preparation of the list and the granting certificates, on one person, and to reserve the remaining powers for another. It may also sometimes be proper, while giving an officer power to determine the classes in which each person is to be assessed, to reserve to another officer the preparation of the list so far as regards some of the higher classes.

The Governor General in Council authorises Local Governments to entertain the necessary establishments in anticipation of the formal sanction, application for which should be made without delay.

3. To each person entrusted with any or all of the powers of a Collector or Commissioner there should, ordinarily, be assigned a definite portion of the district in which he may exercise such powers. So soon as the Local Governments have determined what officers shall exercise any or all of the powers of a Collector and Commissioner in each district, or portion of a district, the preparation of the lists prescribed in Section 13 should be commenced. Although these lists will have no legal force until the 1st day of May, their preparation should not be delayed. Under the terms of Sections 5 and 10, only one certificate is necessary for each person, however many professions or trades such person may exercise, and in how many soever places or districts. This certificate must be granted by the Collector of the district in which the principal place of business of such person is situate. The Collector must, therefore, before determining the class in which any person is to be assessed, be careful to ascertain whether that person exercises or intends to exercise any profession or trade in any other place or district, and if so, he must communicate with the Collector of that district in order to form a fair estimate of the annual profits of such person, and to determine which is the principal place of business of such person. Section 33 sufficiently provides for the determination of any difference of opinion as to the district in which payment is to be made and the certificate granted. The Governor General in Council is pleased to declare as a general rule that the ordinary place of residence of the person assessed and, in the case of a firm, the ordinary place of residence of the head acting partner shall be held to be the principal place of business of such person or firm.

- 4. In determining the class in which any person is to be assessed, the Collector, while abstaining from inquisitorial proceedings and interrogations of the person binaself, should avail himself of every proper means of arriving at a fair estimate of the truth. Besides his official subordinates, some of the respectable inhabitants of the town, such as the heads of trades and professions, will generally be able and willing to assist the Collector in the process of classification. If any person volunteers information to the Collector either orally or by a written statement regarding his own annual profits, such information should be received and accepted quantum valeat.
- 5. In making any assessment of annual profits under Schedule A, the following profits must be left out of the account, that is to say:—I Rents or profits from land or from houses, whether the recipients be proprietors, lessees, or cultivators. 2. Interest of money invested in the funds or any stock or otherwise, except in the case of bankers or money-dealers, or where such interest arises in the course of the regular transactions of any profession or trade.
- 6. The lists will be in the Form 1 appended, the classes being kept separate. If any person or firm intends to exercise more than one trade or profession, each such trade or profession should be entered in column 3, and each place where each such trade or profession is intended to be exercised should be entered in column 4. For Natives of India the lists will be in the Vernacular. Separate lists will be made in English for Europeans, Eurasians, &c. If any person is removed from one class to another or entirely exempted, a note to that effect will be made in the column of remarks.

The notification (Form 2) should be filed with the list, and a notification to like intent should be made public throughout the district or portion of the district to which the list refers.

- 7. Certificates will be granted in Form 3. As it is necessary that all the places, in which the certificate holder intends to exercise his profession or trade during the year of assessment, should be specified, the necessary information must be obtained at the time of application for the certificate. If it should then appear that the profits gained in any other place or district have been overlooked, the Collector will not grant the certificate intil he has, after due inquiry, amended, if necessary, the list in respect of the class in which the applicant should be charged. In case a notice has been served, it may be necessary to serve a fresh notice fifteen days after such amendment, if the new assessment has not meanwhile been paid.
- 8. A register should be kept, in Form 4, of all certificates granted, the particulars being filled up at the time of granting the certificate to which they refer. Separate registers should be kept for each class of certificate, and different sets of registers for Native and European certificate holders. If subsequently any person is removed from one class to another, or entirely exempted, the certificate should be amended or annulled, the fact being noted in the column of remarks in the register, and a new entry being made under the class to which the certificate has been removed.
- 9. Before passing orders on any petition of objection preferred under Section 15, the Collector must carefully examine the evidence presented by the petitioner, and call for such further evidence as may be necessary to arrive at a proper decision in the case. The ascertained profits of the year of account preceding the year of assessment, will be prima facie the basis of the Collector's decision. Any special circumstances tending to prove that the profits of the year of assessment will materially differ from the profits of the previous year will be allowed due weight.
- 10. Against the gross receipts no deductions should be allowed on account of disbursements or expenses not wholly and exclusively incurred on account of the profession or trade in respect of the profits of which the assessment has been made, nor on account of the maintenance of the person himself, or his family, or domestic establishment, nor on account of any public or local rates, cesses, or taxes. Deductions from the gross receipts may be allowed on account of the following items of expenditure:—

Sums expended in the repairs of implements, utensils, or articles used solely for the purpose of the profession or trade, calculated on the average expenditure for the past three years.

Sums expended for insurance of the premises, implements or stock of the profession or trade.

Rent paid for any premises used for such profession or trade, provided that if such premises shall not have been exclusively used for such profession or trade, a fair proportion only of such rent shall be deducted from the gross receipts.

Ten per cent, on the tack rent of such premises, on account of repairs, if such repairs are at the cost of the petitioner.

Sums expended in the payment of persons employed solely in such profession or trade.

The amount of any losses of the steck-in-trade.

The amount of any bad debts for the first time ascertained and written off as such during the year.

Sums paid during the year for insurance of the life of person assessed, or his wife, not exceeding one-tenth of the said profits.

Under the present Act no deductions from the Imperial Tax on account of Municipal Taxes can be authorized.

- 11. The Collector must write his final order on every petition of objection, and supply the petitioner with a capy of such order on plain paper with its date, on his application for the same. A Register (Form 5) of petitions received and disposed of should be kept by each Collector.
- 12. If it should appear in the course of the investigation that the petitioner exercises any profession or trade in any other place or district, the Collector must, previous to passing final orders, make due inquiries as to the profits gained in that other place or district,

- 13. Commissioners will be guided by the above rules, so far as they may be applicable, in determining appeals from the Collector's orders. A Register (Form 6) of all appeals will be kept by each Officer exercising the powers of a Commissioner.
- 14. In the case of persons commencing any profession or trade in the course of the year of assessment, it will be necessary for the Collector to estimate the annual profits of such persons. For this purpose the assessment should be delayed for a time in order that the Collector may be able to form a fair judgment as to the class in which such persons are to be charged. The Collector will then calculate what would be the probable profits for an entire year, and classify the person accordingly, entering his name in the list. The certificate will be granted on payment of one quarter, one half, or three quarters, on the full tax of the class in which the person is so placed, according to the date on which the business was commenced. The decision of this date rests with the Collector under Section 12. It will be entered in the remark columns of the list (Form 1) and Register of Certificates (Form 4).
- 15. It will be observed that no notice can be served on a defaulter under Section 17, until at least fifteen days after the entry of his name in the list prepared under Section 13. Under no circumstances, therefore, can such notice be served before the 16th day of May. Notices will be in Form 7. If the notice refer to the second instalment, it will be in Form 8. A Register of all such notices should be kept in Form 9. Particular endeavours should be made to cause personal service of the notice. The mode in which the notice has been served should in all cases be entered in the Register of notices. The Collector should be prepared to produce in case of necessity good evides ce of the service of the notice. The form of notice (Form 9) to be served upon defaulting Joint Stock Companies (Form 10) is appended.
- 16. After the expiry of seven days from service of the notice, the defaulter may be prosecuted before the Magistrate. It will only be necessary for the Collector to prove the legal service of the notice, and it will not be competent to the Magistrate to make any further investigation or to inquire into the propriety of the assessment. It will be his duty, on being satisfied that the notice has been legally served, and that the demand has not been paid, to award the full penalty of twice the demand. He has under the Act no power of mitigating this penalty.
- 17. The tax in this case having become a penalty, the option of paying by instalments or of objecting to the assessment will be lost. A Register of prosecutions (Form 11) before the Magistrate under Sections 17 and 18 should be kept.
- 18. The Local Governments will make rules for the recovery of the tax by revenue processes under Section 29, and prescribe the form of Register for recording particulars of such processes.
- 19. The Magistrate will at once make over to the Collector all penalties recovered under Section 17, and the Collector will thereupon grant the necessary certificate. Fines under Section 18 will be dealt with as ordinary fines by a Magistrate under the Criminal Law.
- 20. Firms are to be assessed as persons, and the partners will not be liable as such to individual assessment. The above rules will therefore apply to firms as if they were persons.
- 21. Every Joint Stock Company has an option under the Act of paying Rs. 500 on each Branch or Agency in British India, or of paying one per cent. on the dividend declared by such Company during the year ending the 31st March previous to the year of assessment. Should a Joint Stock Company elect to pay on the dividend, it must, through the proper Officer on or before the 30th April, deliver a return to the Collector, stating the amount of the said dividend. Where no such dividend was declared, the Company, by making a return to that effect, will be entitled to complete exemption from the tax. It follows that if any Joint Stock Company commences business during the year of assessment, such Company by electing to pay on its dividend of the previous year may obtain exemption from the tax. The Governor General in Council is pleased to exempt all such Companies whether they make a return or not. Although in strictness no Joint Stock Company will be legally entitled to claim taxation at one per cent. on its dividend in lieu of paying Rs. 500 on each Branch or Agency, unless the return be delivered on or before the 30th April, Collectors are authorized to accept such return and to preceed to assessment thereon if it be delivered within a reasonable time after that date, on good cause being shown for the delay. Joint Stock Companies have not the option of paying by instalments.
- 22. The mode of assessment on official salaries having been entirely changed, all orders relating to such assessments under the License Tax Act or relating to refunds of the License Tax are cancelled, as being inapplicable and unnecessary in the present state of the Law. Assessments on such salaries will be made in accordance with the provisions of Section 23 of Act IX. of 1863, and the following rules.
- 23. No servant of Government is liable to taxation in that capacity if his pay be less than Rs. 1,000 per annum. Under the term 'pay' is included all pay and allowances of appointments, whether substantive, officiating or temporary, excepting special sums allowed to meet disbursements on the public service (not being fixed monthly allowances ordinarily paid with the salary of an office or employment, whether the service for which such allowance is nominally granted be performed or not). All sums stopped under the authority of Government in the nature of payments to pension or annuity funds, to Regimental Mess or band funds, or the like, should be deducted from the pay previous to assessment. Every servant of Government therefore (with the exceptions prescribed in Section 3), whose net pay and allowances thus calculated amount to Rs. 83-5-4 per mensem, is liable to assessment on that net pay at the rate of one per cent, to be deducted at the time of payment by the Examiner of Claims, or other Officer exercising the like functions.
- 24. Every such Officer will keep a Register in Form 12 showing the deductions made on account of the tax under the Act.

- 25. Any servant of Government who is allowed to exercise any other profession or a trade on his own account, will be liable to separate assessment by the Collector under Schedule A., in respect solely of his profits from such profession or trade. In classifying such persons the Collector will entirely leave out of the account their official salaries, whether those salaries be less than Rs. 1,000 per annum, or equal or exceed that amount.
- 26. The case of persons holding employments under public institutions, such as Municipalities, the Asiatic Society and the like, has not been specially provided for in the Act. Such persons are liable to assessment by the Collector under Schedule A. Collectors are authorized, however, to give such persons the option of being assessed in the same manner as servants of Government or servants of Companies, at 1 per cent. on their salaries. In many cases this arrangement will be favourable to such persons in lessening the actual amount of tax, while in all cases there will be the advantage of the mode of payment by deductions from time to time, from their salaries, instead of payment in a lump sum or by two instalments.
- 27. If any servant of Government has insured his life or that of his wife, he may make application to the Examiner of Claims or other Officer whose duty it is to deduct the tax from his salary, and on proving to the satisfaction of that Officer the amount of any payment made on account of such insurance during the year of assessment, he will be entitled to a refund of the tax on such payment. Provided that such payment, together with the fund subscriptions which may have been deducted from his salary and therefore exempted from assessment, does not exceed ten per cent. of the full salary. If it do so exceed ten per cent., refund will be disallowed on the excess.
- 28. On or before the 30th April, each Joint Stock Company, through its proper officer, is bound to deliver to the Collector a list of persons in its employ, whose salaries on that date are at the rate of Rs. 1,000 or more per annum. This list will serve as a check on subsequent payments to be deducted from the salaries at the rate of one per cent. But it must be observed that if the rate of any such person's salary is altered during the year, the assessment will be made at one per cent. on the actual salary paid. The Collector will take steps to satisfy himself that such is the case. The Collector will make arrangements with the Companies as to the time and method of receiving the amount of deductions from the salaries of persons in their employ. The payments to the Collector should be made at least once a quarter, if monthly payments be found inconvenient.
- 29. If any person in the employ of a Joint Stock Company exercise some other profession or trade, he will be assessed by the Collector in respect solely of the profits of that profession or trade, under Schedule A, in the same manner as servants of Government exercising a profession or trade as prescribed in Rule 23.
- 30. If any person in the employ of a Joint Stock Company has insured his life or that of his wife, he may make application to the Collector of the district in which the principal place of business of the said Company is situate, and on proving to the satisfaction of the said Collector the amount of any payment made on account of such insurance during the year of assessment, he will be entitled to a refund of the amount of the amount of the arround of the said servant of a Company. Collectors will keep Registers (Form 13) of amounts received on account of assessments on servants of Companies and of refunds under this rule. In this Register may be entered the servants of public bodies, as Municipalities, who have been similarly assessed.

- 31. In every case where the assessment is made at one per cent, on salaries or dividends, pies of the tax will be neglected. The salaries to be assessed will be those on account of and not those paid during the year of assessment. The first assessment therefore on Government officials and servants of Companies will be made on the salaries for the month of May.
- 32. All taxes collected under this Act, and all penalties recovered under Section 17 will be credited to the Government of India under the Budget head "Assessed Taxes." When the 2nd instalment is paid in advance, the full tax will be credited, the discount being charged per contra.
- 33. Each local Government will submit quarterly to the Government of India in the Financial Department, returns, in the Forms 14 to 17. At the end of the year of assessment the annual return, Form 18, will be submitted. This return relates only to assessments under Schedule A. Joint Stock Companies assessed under Section 22, Government officials and servants of Companies assessed on their salaries, will not be included in it. It should be prepared in two parts, one for Natives, and the other for Europeans, Eurasians, &c. It is essential that no deviation be made in any of these forms of returns to the Government of India, as it is intended to compile from them general returns for all India. With the annual returns the Governor General in Council will be glad to receive from each local Government a general report on the administration of the Act.
- 34. The Governor General in Council is pleased to delegate to all local Governments the power of making further rules subsidiary to these rules under Section 36 of the Act. Such further rules should be reported for sanction to the Governor General in Council.

ORDERED, that the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the other Departments of the Government of India, the several local Governments and Administrations, the Controller General of Accounts, and the several Accountants General, and Deputy Accountants General in independent charge, and, with the accompanying Forms, be published in the Gazette of India.

Every person required by Act IX. of 1868 to take out a certificate, and who without reasonable excuse neglects or refuses to produce and show his certificate, when required to do so by the Collector or by an Officer generally or specially empowered by the Collector to make such requisition, is liable to prosecution before a Magistrate, and on conviction to a fine of Rs. 100.

Public Order

To REGULATE the Religious PROCESSIONS of the MOHURRUM, and for the PRESERVATION of the PUBLIC PEACE during that Festival, sanctioned by the Honourable the Governor in Council, under the provisions of Section 77 of Act No. XIII. of 1856.

1st.—Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a Taboot, Punja, or Dholeeka Punja at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a License from the Commissioner of Police. Such License will be granted to Mahomedans only, and all persons obtaining them are hereby required to produce them when demanded by any Magistrate or Officer of Police.

2nd.—Every such License-holder will be held responsible for the peaceable behaviour of the persons composing any assemblage or procession connected with his Taboot, Punja, or Dholeeka Punja, and in the event of any such persons being guilty of any riotous or disorderly conduct in any such assemblage or procession, the Commissioner of Police may, should he see fit, at once withdraw such License, disperse such assembly or procession, and positively prohibit and prevent any re-assemblage thereof, or any carrying about of the Taboot, Punja, or Dholeeka Punja, belonging thereto.

3rd.—No procession accompanied by country music will be permitted to parade the Streets or thoroughfares of Bombay until the commencement of the 6th day of the Festival.

4th.—The use of country music in the streets on the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th, of the Mohurrum will be permitted.

5th.—No Taboots will be allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock on the following morning, nor on the last day before 1 o'clock; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded by sunset.

6th.—Taboots will not be permitted to go abreast on the public road, and on meeting are to give way, each keeping to the left. On meeting carriages or horsemen, persons accompanying the Taboots are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, the Taboots keeping the left side of the road.

7th.—No Procession of the Zool-Junnah, or Horse, through the public streets or roads, will be permitted.

8th.—All dealers in Spirituous Liquor, and all vendors of Opium and Bhang, are hereby ordered to keep their shops closed; persons found selling anything of an intoxicating nature during the last two days of the festival will be taken into custody.

9th.—Water will not be allowed to be taken from the public Tanks and Wells to be thrown before the Processions.

10th.—Any person carrying a sword, dirk, bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

11th.—Any persons violating the above rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody, and dealt with according to law.

Overland Postage Rates on Army Officers' letters.—Instructions having this day been received from the London General Post Office altering from full ounces to half-ounces the scale of progression of weight for Letters between India and the United Kingdom sent to or by Officers of the Army in India, this Postal Notice will supersede that issued by this Office on the 29th ultimo, No. 5.

It will be observed that the only change now made is the imposition of four annas per half oz. in

lieu of 8 annas per oz. on Letters weighing more than one ounce.

Under the authority of the Treasury Warrant, published in page 490, Part I. of the Bombay Government Gazette, dated 26th December 1867, the correspondence of Officers of the Army in India is excluded from the operation of the increased rates of Postage on letters passing between India and the United Kingdom, intimated in this Office Postal Notice No. 4, dated 26th instant, and will be charged, the uniform rates below mentioned, in which Inland Postage has been included.

4. Letters entitled to the privileged rates laid down in the Warrant, may be classed as follows, and must be subject to the conditions enumerated. Should any of these conditions not have been regarded, the cover will

be considered an ordinary Overland letter, and treated accordingly:-

-LETTERS POSTED IN INDIA.

(a.) The Sender must be a Commissioned Officer of the Army, actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India-

The letter must be one addressed to the United Kingdom.

The letter must bear by way of superscription-

The signature of the Commissioned Officer who sends the letter.

The signature of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which the 2. sender is serving, or of the Local Head of the Department to which he belongs.

A specification by the Commanding Officer or Local Head of the name of the Regiment, Corps,

or Detachment in which the Officer is serving or of the Department to which he belongs.

I.—LETTERS DELIVERED IN INDIA

The letter must be one which has been posted in the United Kingdom.

(b). It must be addressed to a Commissioned Officer of the Army actually employed (otherwise than in Civil employ) in Her Majesty's Service in India.

(c). It must bear by way of superscription,-

The rank of the addressee; and

The Regiment, Corps, or Detachment in which he is serving, or the Department to which

he belongs.

5. As regards the term "Civil employ," it will be proper to regard all Military Officers serving under the orders of the Civil Administrations (i. e. not under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief) as being in Civil employ. For instance, Military Officers belonging to the Survey, Public Works, Education, Telegraph, Post Office, Police, Jail, and other similar Departments, as well as Secretaries to Government, Cantonment Magistrates, Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, Civil Surgeons, &c., will be regarded as being in Civil employ.

excludes Officers who may be on leave from a title to claim the privilege.

Increased Rates of Postage on Overland Letters.—Under instructions this day received from Her Majesty's Post Master General, it is hereby notified for the information of the public, that the single rate of postage on Letters sent between the United Kingdom and India, viá Southampton, has been raised from 4 Annas to 6 Annas, the rate on those forwarded viá Marseilles by British Packet, or by French Packet, being nlike manner raised from 6 Annas 8 Pie to 8 Annas 8 Pie.

Unpaid Letters, whether forwarded viá Southampton, viá Marseilles, or by French Packet, will be iable, in addition to the foregoing rates, to a fine of 6 Annas, and insufficiently paid Letters will be liable to be deficient postage, and a like fine of 6 Annas.

All Letters forwarded from India through the United Kingdom to Foreign Countries or British Colonies will in like manner be subject to an additional charge of 2 Annas per ½ oz. over and above the rates which have heretofore been chargeable in India.

It has also been decided to alter the scale of progression for charging Letters above the weight of \(\frac{1}{2} \) oz., and to adopt a scale of charge rising by half ounces.

The above changes have been ordered with effect from the 1st April next; Letters posted in India on or after that date being subject to the new rates.
