BILLS OF THE COVERNMENT OF INDIA.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

The following Bill was introduced into the Council of the Governor General of India for the purpose of making Laws and Regulations on the 21st April 1874, and was referred to a Select Committee with instructions to make their report thereon in three months:—

Bill No. 8 of 1874.

THE INDIAN PORTS BILL, 1874.

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A Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to Ports and Port-dues.

WHEREAS it is expedient to 'consolidate and amend the law relating Preamble. to Ports and Port-dues;

It is hereby enacted as follows:-

CHAPTER I.

PRELIMINARY.

- 1. This Act may be called "The Indian Ports Short title. Act, 1874."
- It shall extend-
- (a) to the ports mentioned in the first schedule hereto annexed, and to Present local extent. such parts of the navigable rivers and channels leading to such ports respectively, as have been declared to be subject to Act No. XXII. of 1855 (for the Regulation of Ports and Port-dues);
- (b) to the other ports or parts of rivers or channels to which the Power to extend this Act. Local Government, exercise of the power hereinafter conferred, applies the provisions of this Act.

But nothing herein contained shall-

- (a) apply to any vessel belonging to, or in the service of Her Majesty, or to any vessel of war belonging to any Foreign Prince or State;
- (b) apply to any gunpowder, rockets or other ammunition belonging to Government, or carried for the use of Her Majesty's troops;
- (c) deprive any person of any right of property or other private right except as hereinafter expressly provided; or
- (d) affect any law or rule relating to the Customs, or any order or direction lawfully made or given pursuant thereto.

And nothing contained in any of the following sections (namely) thirty-eight, thirty-nine, forty and forty-one, shall apply to any port, river or channel to which such section has not been specially extended by the Local Government.

The Acts mentioned in the second schedule hereto annexed shall be Repeal of Acts. repealed to the extent specified in the third column thereof.

But such repeal shall not affect any declaration, appointment or rule made under any such Act.

The references made to any Act or provision of an Act hereby repealed shall be read as if made to this Act or the corresponding provision of this Act, as the case may be.

- 4. In-this Act unless there be something repugnant in the subject or Interpretation-clause. context-
 - "Vessel" includes anything made for the conveyance by water of human beings, or of property: "Vessel."
- "Master," when used in relation to any vessel, means any person (except a Pilot or Harbour Master) "Master." having for the time being the charge or control of such vessel:
 - "Owner" includes any consignee of goods and any agent to whom a vessel is consigned; and "Gunpowder," includes "Gunpowder." rockets and other combustible ammunition.

CHAPTER II.

OF THE POWERS OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

With the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, the Local Government may Power to extend this Act. from time to time, by notification in the official Gazette, extend this Act to any port or to any part of any navigable river or channel leading thereto in which this Act is not in force, and may extend specially the provi-

sions of any of the follow-Power to extend specially sections 38, 39, 40 and 41. ing sections (namely), thirty-eight, thirty-nine, forty and forty-one, to any port or to any part of any such river or channel to which such provisions have not been so extended:

Provided that every such notification shall de-fine the limits of such port, river or channel, and that such limits shall always extend to high-water mark.

Such limits may include any piers, jetties, landing-places, wharfs, quays, docks, and other works made for convenience of traffic, for safety of vessels or for the improvement, maintenance and good government of such port, river or channel, whether within or without high-water mark, and (subject to any rights of private property therein) any portion of the shore or bank within fifty yards of such line.

EXPLANATION:—In this section 'high-water mark' means the line of the medium high tide between the springs and the neaps.

- 6. The Local Government may, from time to time, with the like sanc-Limits how to be altered. tion, alter the limits of any port, river or channel in which this Act may be in force.
- 7. The Local Government may, from time to Local Government em- time, with the like sancpowered to make Porttion, make such rules, rules as toconsistent with this Act,

as it may think necessary for any of the following purposes, namely,—

(a) For regulating the time at which, and the manner in which, vessels shall enter into or go out of any port subject to this Act.

(b) For regulating the berths and stations to be occupied by vessels in any such port.

(c) For striking the yards and top-masts, and
Striking yards, &c.

for rigging-in the jib and
driver booms, of vessels in
any such port, whenever it may be proper so
to do.

(d) For the removal or proper hanging or placing of anchors, spars, and other things, in or attached to vessels in any such port.

(e) For regulating vessels whilst taking in or Taking in or discharging ballast or ing ballast.

cargo, or any particular kind of cargo, in any such port, river or channel, and the stations to be occupied by vessels whilst so engaged.

(f) For keeping free passages of such width as Keeping free passage. within any such port, river or channel, and along or near to the piers, jetties, landing-places, wharfs, quays, docks, morings, and other works in or adjoining to the same; and for marking out the spaces so to be kept free.

(g) For regulating the anchoring, fastening, mooring and unmooring of vessels in any such port, river or channel.

(h) For regulating the moving and warping of all vessels within any such port and the use of warps therein.

(i) For regulating the use of the mooring buoys, chain and other moorings, in any such port, river or channel.

(j) For fixing from time to time the rates to be paid for the use of such moorings when belonging to Government, or of any boat, hawser, or other thing belonging to Government.

(k) For regulating cargo and other boats, and catamarans plying for hire in any such port: provided that nothing in this Act shall authorize the Local Government to fix the price to be charged for the use of any such boat or catamaran.

(1) For regulating the use of fires and lights
Fires and lights. within any such port.

(m) For enforcing and regulating the use of signal-lights by vessels at night in any such port, river or channel.

CHAPTER III.

OF PORT OFFICERS, THEIR POWERS AND DUTIES.

8. The Local Government shall appoint an Appointment of Con- officer to be Conservator servator. of every port, river or channel subject to this Act.

In ports where there is a Master Attendant, such Master Attendant shall be the Conservator.

In ports where there is no Master Attendant, but where there is a Harbour Master, such Harbour Master shall be the Conservator.

In ports where there are both a Master Attendant and a Harbour Master, the Harbour Master and his Assistants shall be sudordinate to, and subject to the control of, the Master Attendant and his Assistants.

The Conservator shall be subject to the control of the Local Government, or of any intermediate authority which that Government may appoint.

9. The Conservator of any port, river or channel subject to this Act may, in respect of any vessel within such port, river or channel, give directions for carrying into effect any port-rule in force within such port.

Whoever wilfully, and without lawful excuse, refuses or neglects to obey any lawful direction of such Conservator, after notice thereof has been given to him, shall, for every such offence, be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees, and with a further fine which may extend to one hundred rupees for every day on which he wilfully continues to disobey such direction;

and, in case of such refusal or neglect, the said Conservator may do, or to cause to be done, all acts necessary for the purpose of carrying such direction into execution, and may hire and em-

Expenses caused thereby to be paid by offender.

red in doing such acts, shall be paid by the person so offending.

Any written notice of a direction given under this Act, left for the Master of any vessel with any person employed on board thereof or affixed on a conspicuous place on board of such vessel, shall, for the purposes of this Act, be deemed to have been given to the Master thereof.

10. The Conservator of any such port may, in Power to cut warps, case of urgent necessity, ropes, &c. cut, or cause to be cut, any warp, rope, cable or hawser, endangering the safety of any vessel in such port, or at or near to the entrance thereof.

Power to remove floating timber, &c., or obstruction on shore within limits of port.

such port, which obstructs or impedes the free navigation of such port; or anything which obstructs or impedes the lawful use of any pier, jetty, landing-place, wharf, quay, dock, mooring, or other work, on any part of the shore or bank which has been declared to be within the limits of such port, and is not private property;

Expenses of removal.

Expenses of such removal:

and the owner of any such timber or raft or other thing shall be liable to pay the reasonable expenses of such removal;

and if such owner or any other person has

Penalties for causing without lawful excuse obstruction or public caused any such obstruction or impediment, or causes any public nuisance affecting or likely to affect such navigation, he shall also be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees.

And the Conservator or any Magistrate having jurisdiction over the offence may cause such nuisance to be abated.

12. If the owner of any such timber or raft,
Recovery of expenses of removal.

or the person who has caused any such obstruction, impediment, or pub-

lic nuisance as in the last preceding section mentioned, neglects to pay the expense of the removal thereof, within one week after demand, or within fourteen days after such removal has been notified in the official Gazette, or in such other manner as the Local Government by general or special order directs, such expenses may be recovered in the same manner as any fine under this Act;

and the Conservator may cause such timber, Power to sell timber, &c. raft, or other thing, or the materials of any nuisance or obstruction so removed, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to be sold by public auction;

and may retain all the expenses of such removal Proceeds how dealt with. shall pay the surplus of such proceeds or deliver so much of the said timber or other materials as may remain unsold, to the person entitled to receive the same;

and, if no such person appear, shall cause the same to be kept and deposited in such manner as the Local Government directs;

and may, if necessary, from time to time, realize the expenses of keeping the same, together with the expenses of such sale, by a further sale of so much of the said timber or other materials as may remain unsold.

13. If any obstruction or impediment to the Removal of obstructions lawfully made.

navigation of any port, river or channel subject to this Act, has been law-

fully made, or has become lawful by reason of the long continuance of such obstruction or impediment, or otherwise, the Conservator shall report the same for the information of the Local Government and shall, with the sanction of such Government, cause the same to be removed or altered, making to the person suffering damage by such removal or alteration reasonable compensation for the same.

Every dispute arising concerning such compensa-Compensation how determined.

Compensation how determined according to the law relating to like disputes in the case of land required for public purposes.

14. If any vessel hook or get foul of any of the buoys or moorings laid down by or by the authority of the Local Government in any such port, river or channel, the Master of such ves-

sel shall not, nor shall any other person, except in the case of emergency, lift such buoy or mooring for the purpose of unhooking or getting clear from the same, without the assistance of the Conservator.

and the Conservator, immediately on receiving notice of such accident, shall assist and superintend the clearing of such vessel;

and the Master of such vessel shall, upon de-Expense of clearing mand, pay such reasonable expense as may be incurred in clearing the same.

Any Master offending against the provisions of this section shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees.

15. If any vessel be wrecked, stranded or sunk, in any such port, river or Power to raise wreck, channel, so as to impede

&c., impeding navigation within the port.

in any such port, river or channel, so as to impede or be likely to impede the navigation thereof, the Conservator may cause

the same to be raised, removed, or destroyed; and, unless the expense of such work be re-paid within one month after

the completion thereof, may recover the same on behalf of the Local Government in the manner provided by section Torty-four.

Power to board vessels.

Power to board vessel

and the Collector of Customs, or other officer appointed to collect any Port-dues or other charges payable in respect of any vessel under this Act, may, whenever it is necessary so to do, for the performance of any duty hereby imposed upon such Collector or other officer,

either alone or with any other person, go on board any vessel within the limits of any port, river or channel subject to this Act.

If the Master of such vessel without lawful excuse refuse to allow any officer or other person to enter such vessel for the performance of any duty imposed upon him by this Act, he shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees.

Power to require crews to prevent or extinguish fire.

Power to require crews to prevent or extinguish fire.

The power to require crews to which this Act extends, the Conservator may require the Master of any ship of more than five hundred tons burden to always the property of the pro

den to place at his disposal such number as he requires not exceeding three-fourths of the crew then under the orders of such Master.

Any Master refusing or neglecting to comply with such requisition shall be punished with a fine which may extend to five hundred rupees, and any seamen then under his orders who after being directed by the Master to obey the Conservator's orders for the purpose aforesaid refuse to obey such orders shall be punished with fine which may extend to twenty-five rupees.

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Powers of Conservator may be exercised by Harbour Master.

Powers of Conservator given by any Conservator may, subject to his control, be done or given by any Assistant of such

Conservator or Harbour Master,

and any person hereby authorized to do any act may call to his aid such assistance as may be necessary.

19. The Government shall not be answerable for any act or default of any Master Attendant, Harbour Master, &c.

Tiver or channel subject to this Act; or of any Pilot; or of any Deputy, or Assistant of any of the officers above mentioned; or of any person acting under the authority or directions of any such Officer or Assistant, done within the limits of such port, river or channel; nor for any danage sustained by any vessel in consequence of any defect in any of the moorings, hawsers, or other things belonging to Government, within the said limits,

Provided that nothing in this section shall protect the Secretary of State for India in Council from a suit in respect of any act done by or under the express order or sanction of Government.

CHAPTER IV.

Rules for the Safety of Shipping and the Preservation of Ports,

20. No person shall without lawful excuse lift, injure, loosen, or set adrift any buoy, beacon, or mooring, fixed or laid down by or by the authority of the Local Government in any port, river or channel subject to this Act.

Whoever offends against the provisions of this section shall, for every such offence, be liable, in addition to the payment of the amount of damages done, to fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, or to imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months.

Wifully loosening sel from moorings.

Wifully loosening vessel from moorings.

vessel within any such port, river or channel, without leave or authority from the owner or Master of such vessel, shall, for every such offence, be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, or with imprisonment for a term which may extend to six months.

22. No ballast or rubbish, or any other thing Improperly discharging likely to form a bank or shoal, or to be detrimental to navigation shall, without lawful excuse, be cast or thrown into any such port, river or channel, or into or upon any

place on shore, from which the same is liable to be washed into any such port, river or channel, either by ordinary or high tides, or by storms or landfloods.

Whoever by himself or another so casts or throws the same, and the Master of any vessel from which the same is cast or thrown, shall be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees over and above any expenses which may be incurred in removing the same.

Nothing in this section applies to any case in which such ballast or other thing is east or thrown into any such port, river or channel with the consent in writing of the Conservator, or within any limits within which such act may be authorized by the Local Government.

23. If any person grave, bream, or smoke any vessel in any port, contrary to the directions of the Conservator, or at such act is prohibited by any order of the Local Government, such person, and also the Master of such vessel, shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

24. If any person boil or heat any pitch, tar, resin, dammer, turpen-bibled limits.

Boiling pitch, &c., on board vessel within prohibited limits.

any such port, at any place where such act is prohibited by the Local Government or contrary to the order or directions of the Conservator, such person, and also the Master of any vessel on board which such offence is committed, shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees.

25. If any person, by candle-light, or other Drawing spirits by candle-light, draws off spirits on board any vessel within any port, such person, and also the Master of every such vessel, shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees.

26. Every Master of a vessel in any port shall when required so to do by the Conservator, permit warps to be made fast to such vessel for the purpose of warping any other vessel in the port and shall not allow any such warp to be let go until required so to do.

Any Master offending against the provisions of this section shall be punished for every such offence with a fine which may extend to two hundred rupees.

27. No Master of any vessel shall cause or suffer any warp or hawser, &c., after sun-set. to be left out in any such port, after sun-set, in such a manner as to endanger the safety of any boat or other vessel navigating in the said port.

Any Master offending against the provisions of this section shall be punished for every such offence with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, Gunpowder.

28. The Local Government may, by order, fix

the limits within which vessels shall be prohibited from having on board, in any port, river or channel subject to this Act, any

quantity of gunpowder, exceeding altogether fifty pounds in weight, whether manifested for delivery

In such case the Local Government shall appoint a proper place of Government to appoint place of deposit for powder. deposit for such gunpowder, in excess of the quantity above allowed, and an officer to receive the same.

29. The Local Government may, in such case,

by order, fix the times at or within which, and the manner in which, such gunpowder shall be land-

ed and deposited by any vessel inward-bound, and also the times at or within which, and the manner in which, the same shall be taken on board any vessel from such place of deposit.

30. The Master of such vessel shall, upon such Master to make declara-

gunpowder being deposited, make and sign a declaration in writing that there is not then, to his knowledge or belief, on board such vessel any gunpowder exceeding the weight of fifty pounds.

31. Officer to give receipt and to account for powder deposited.

Penalty for failure.

The officer, with whom such gunpowder is deposited, shall give a receipt for the same to the Master or other person making the de-

posit, and he shall be accountable to such Master or other person for the re-delivery of the same.

32. If any vessel be prevented by stress of If by stress of weather powder is not landed, notice to be given.

weather from landing or depositing such powder in excess of the quantity allowed as afore-

said, the Master or owner of such vessel shall, so soon as the weather permits, land and deposit the same at the place so appointed as aforesaid, or shall forthwith give notice to the Conservator, or other officer named for that purpose by any order of the Local Government, of his having such gunpowder on board, and shall obey his directions relating to the same.

33. The Local Government may also, in respect to such port, by Time, &c., for vessels outward bound to take order fix the times and places at which, and the in powder. manner in which, vessels

outward bound, requiring to take in any gunpowder, exceeding the quantity abovementioned, shall take in the same, whether such gunpowder has been previously landed from such vessel or

34. The Master of any vessel having on board

36. The Master of any vessel in which fire takes place while lying or

fire, shall be punished with imprisonment which may extend to six months, or with fine which may extend to one thousand rupees, or with both.

Inflammable Oil.

- (a) the prevention of injury from fire in ports and places at which vessels entering port with inflammable oil on board are to be moored,
- (b) the mode in which such oil shall be landed from such vessels.

Explanation. — "Inflammable oil" includes petroleum, benzole, kerosine and any oil or product of oil that gives off an inflammable vapour at a temperature of less than one hundred degrees of Fahrenheit's thermometer.

Special Rules.

tons or upwards, shall be moved without having a Pilot, Harbour Master, or Assistant of the Master Attendant or Harbour Master on board; and no

vessel of any burden less than two hundred tons and exceeding one hundred tons shall be moved without having on board a Pilot, Harbour Master, or Assistant of the Master Attendant or Harbour Master, unless authority in writing so to do has been obtained from the Conservator or some officer empowered by him to give such authority.

If any vessel, except in case of urgent necessity, be moved contrary to the provisions of this section, the master of such vessel shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to two hundred rupees, unless upon application to the proper officer the master be unable to procure a Pilot, Harbour Master, or Assistant of the Master Attendant or Harbour Master to go on board the said vessel.

39. Every vessel exceeding the burden of two Vessels above 200 tons to be provided with force-pump, &c. pump, hose and appurtenances, for the purpose of extinguishing any fire that may occur on board.

The master of every such vessel who, having been required by the Conservator to comply with the provisions of this section, without lawful excuse neglects or refuses so to do for the space of seven days after such requisition, shall be punished with fine which may extend to five hundred rupees.

40. No person, unless duly authorized by the Conservator, shall creep to search for lost stores. cables or other stores lost or supposed to be lost therein.

Whoever offends against the provisions of this section shall be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees.

41. No person, without the permission of the Removing stones, &c., or injuring shores of port prohibited. Stones, shingle, gravel, or soil, or any artificial protection from any part of the bank or shore of any port, river or channel;

and no person shall sink or bury in any part of such bank or shore, whether the same be public or private property, any mooring-post, anchor, or other thing which is likely to injure, or to be used so as to injure such bank or shore, except with the permission of the said Conservator, and with the aid or under the inspection of such person (if any) as he may appoint to take part in or overlook the performance of such work.

Whoever offends against the provisions of this section shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees, and shall pay the expenses of repairing the injury (if any) done by him to such bank or shore.

Publication of Orders.

42. Every declaration, order and rule of a Publication of orders of Local Government.

Publication of orders in pursuance of this Act, shall be published in the official Gazette; and a copy thereof shall be fixed up in some conspicuous place in the office of the Conservator of every port to which such order relates and in the Custom House, if any, of every such port.

Whoever disobeys any such order or rule shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees for every such offence.

Any in the case of disobedience to any rule made under section thirty-seven the owner or master of the vessel concerned shall also be punished with a fine not exceeding two hundred rupees for each day during which such rule is disobeyed.

CHAPTER V.

OF SALVAGE IN PORTS.

43. If any anchors, wreck, stores or other proSalvage payable for perty be recovered by any
officer employed by the
Local Government for
that purpose, from the bed of any port, river or
channel subject to this Act, the Local Government
shall be entitled to receive a reasonable sum for
salvage, having regard to the place of recovery.

A registry shall be kept of all achors, wreck, or other property so recovered, in such manner and at such place as the Local Government may direct; it shall contain a description of such property, and of the times and places where the same have been recovered,

and it shall be open to public inspection at reasonable office hours, except on Sundays and such holidays as the Local Government may direct.

Property recovered may, in certain cases, be sold.

unclaimed, or if the person claiming the same refuses to pay the amount due to the Local Government in respect thereof, such property may be sold by public auction, if of a perishable nature, forthwith; and if not of a perishable nature, at any period not less than six months after the recovery thereof;

and on the realization of the proceeds, the Proceeds how applied.

Government for salvage, or for the expenses incurred under section fifteen, shall be deducted therefrom, and credited to the Local Government, and the balance shall be paid to the person entitled to the property recovered, or, if no such person appear and claim the same, shall be held in deposit for payment, without interest, to any person thereafter establishing his right to the same.

CHAPTER VI.

OF PORT-DUES.

45. In each of the ports mentioned in the first schedule hereto annexed, such port-due not exceeding the amount specified for such port in the third column of the same schedule as the Local Government from time to time directs shall be levied on vessels entering the same port and described in the second column of the same schedule, but not oftener than the time fixed for such port in the fourth column of the same schedule.

Whenever the Local Government with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council has declared or hereafter declares any port to be subject to this Act, it may, with the like sanction by the same or any subsequent declaration, further declare—

- (a) The maximum amount of dues to be levied in such port;
- (b) The conditions and modifications under which such dues shall be levied;

and may also, from time to time with the like sanction, vary such maximum amount, condition, and modifications.

No Port-dues or fees shall hereafter be levied in any port except under the authority of this Act.

46. The Local Government may, from time to time, vary the rate at which Port-dues and fees Local Government may vary Port-dues. shall be levied in any port, river or channel in such manner as, having regard to the receipts and charges on account of that port, it may deem expedient, by reducing or raising the dues and fees, or any of them;

Provided that the rates shall not in any case exceed the amount authorized to be taken by Proviso. this Act.

47. For every port at which Port-dues are levied under this Act, a Accounts of Port-dues. distinct account, to be called the Account of the Port Fund of the port to which it relates, shall be kept by such officer as the Local Government may appoint for that

This account shall show in complete detail the receipts and charges of the port; and an abstract statement of every such account shall be published annually, as soon after the first of May of each year as may be practicable, in which statement the balance at the close of the year at the credit or debit of the port shall be shown.

If, for any of the purposes of this Act, an advance of money has been or shall be made by Government on account of any port subject to this Act, simple interest upon that advance, or upon so much of it as remains or shall remain unrepaid, at such rate as the Governor General in Council may determine, shall be charged in the Port Fund Account thereof.

All expenses, including the pay and allowances of all persons upon the establishment of the port, the cost of buoys, beacons, lights, and all other works maintained chiefly for the benefit of vessels being in, or entering, or leaving the port, or passing through the rivers or channels leading thereto, but excluding receipts and expenses on account of Pilotage, incurred for the sake of every such port, shall be charged in the Port Fund Account of that port.

And all money, including salvage money, proceeds of waifs, and fines, received under this Act, at or on account of every such port, shall be credited in the Port Fund Account of that port.

The Local Government may direct that for the - purposes of this section any number of ports shall be regarded as constituting a single port; and thereupon all sums received on account of portdues at any of the same ports shall form a common fund which shall be available for the payment of all charges incurred on account of any of the same ports, and such balance as may remain after payment of such expenses may be temporarily invested in such manner as the Local Government may from time to time direct.

48. The Collector of Customs at every such port, or such other officer Collection of Port-dues. as the Local Government appoints in this behalf, shall collect the Port-dues

above-mentioned.

The officer to whom any such Port-dues are paid, shall grant to the Voucher to be given. person paying the same a proper voucher in writing under his hand, describing the name of his office, the port or place at which the same are paid, and the name, tonnage and other proper description of the vessel in respect of which such payment is made.

49. Within twenty-four hours after the arrival within the limits of any Master to report arrival. liable to the payment of port-dues under this or any subsequent Act, the master of such vessel shall report such arrival to the Conservator of such

Any master without lawful excuse failing to make such report within the time aforesaid shall for every such offence be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees.

Nothing in this section applies to tug-steamers and river-steamers belonging to the port of Calcutta, Port Canning, or the port of Kurrachee.

50. If any vessel liable to the payment of Conservator may, in Port-dues is in any such Conservator may, in port without proper marks certain cases, ascertain draught, and charge ex-pense to Master. on the stem and stern posts thereof for denoting her draught, the Conservator may cause the same to be ascertained by means of the operation of hooking, and the master of such vessel shall be liable to pay the expenses of such operation.

51. In order to ascertain the tonnage of any vessel liable to pay Port-dues the following rules Tonnage of vessel lia-e to Port-dues how shall be observed :ascertained.

Clause 1.—If such vessel be a British registered vessel, or a vessel regis-If registered. tered under Act No. X. of 1841, or Act No. XI. of 1850, or under the laws for the time being in force for the registration of vessels in India, the Conservator may require the owner or Master of such vessel, or any person having possession of her register, to produce such register for inspection. If any such owner, Master, or other person as aforesaid neglect or refuse to produce such register, or otherwise to satisfy the Conservator as to what is the true tonnage of the vessel in respect of which such Port-dues shall be payable, he shall be punished with fine which may extend to one hundred rupees, and the Con-servator may cause such vessel to be measured, and the tonnage thereof to be ascertained; and in such case the owner or Master of such vessel shall also be liable to pay the expenses of such measurement.

Clause 2.—If such vessel be not a British registered vessel, or a vessel If not registered. registered under Act No. X. of 1841, or Act No. XI. of 1850, or under the laws for the time being in force for the registration of vessels in India, and the owner or Master thereof fail to satisfy the Conservator as to what is her true tonnage according to the mode of measurement prescribed by the law in force for the time being for regulating the measurement of British registered vessels, the Conservator shall cause such vessel to be measured and the tonnage thereof, according to the mode aforesaid, to be

ascertained; and in such case, the owner or Master of such vessel shall be liable to pay the expenses of such measurement.

On refusal to pay Portdues, &c., the Collector may distrain and sell.

The Master of any vessel, in respect of which any Portdues, fees, or charges are payable under this Act refuses or neglects to pay the same

on demand, the Collector of Customs, or other person authorized to collect such Port-dues, fees, or charges, may distrain or arrest such vessel, and the tackle, apparel, and furniture belonging thereto, or any part thereof, and detain the same until the amount due is paid;

and in case any part of the said Port-dues or charges, or of the costs of the distress or arrestment, or of the keeping of the same, remains unpaid for the space of five days next after any such distress or arrestment so made, the Collector of Customs, or other such person as aforesaid, may cause the vessel or other thing so distrained or arrested to be sold, and with the proceeds of such sale may satisfy the Port-dues, charges, and costs, including the costs of sale remaining unpaid, and shall render the surplus (if any) to the Master of such vessel upon demand.

No Port-clearance to be granted until dues, &c., are paid.

So Port-clearance to be granted until dues, &c., are until her owner, or,

Master, or some other person, has paid all Port-dues, fees and charges, to which such vessel, or the owner or Master of such vessel in respect thereof, is liable under this or any subsequent Act.

54. If the Master of any vessel in respect of which any Port-dues, fees or charges are payable causes such vessel to leave any port without having

discharged such dues, fees, or charges, the Collector of Customs or other officer authorized to collect the same may require in writing the Collector of Customs or other Officer as aforesaid, in any other Port in British India to which such vessel may proceed or in which she may be, to levy such dues, fees, or charges;

Every Collector or other officer to whom such requisition shall be directed shall proceed to levy such dues, fees, or charges, in the manner prescribed in section fifty-two; and a certificate purporting to be made and signed by the Collector of Customs or other officer as aforesaid of the port where the Port-dues, fees, or charges became payable, stating the amount so payable, shall be sufficient prima facie proof of such amount in any proceeding under the said section, and also (in case the amount payable is disputed) in any subsequent proceeding under section sixty-nine.

Penalty for evading payment of Port-dues, &c. the payment of any Port-dues, &c. he shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding five times the amount so payable. In any proceeding before a Magistrate for the adjudication of the said penalty, any such certificate as is mentioned in section fifty-four stating that the

Master has evaded such payment, shall be sufficient primâ facie proof of the evasion, unless the Master shows to the satisfaction of the Magistrate that the departure of the vessel without having discharged the dues, fees, or charges payable was caused by stress of weather or that there was lawful or reasonable ground for such departure.

Any Magistrate having jurisdiction under this Act in any port, river, or channel to which the vessel may proceed or in which she may be found, shall be deemed to have jurisdiction in any proceeding under this section.

Port-dues not chargeable on vessels re-entering from stress of weather.

of any vessel which, having left any port, is compelled to re-enter it by stress of weather or in consequence of having sustained any damage.

57. Vessels entering any port in ballast shall Port-due on vessels in be charged with three-fourths of the port-due which would otherwise be chargeable.

Port-due on vessels not discharging or taking in cargo. not discharge or take in any cargo or passenger therein (with the exception of such unshipment and re-shipment as may be necessary for purposes of repair), the Port-due chargeable in respect of such vessel shall be at a rate equal to one-half the rate chargeable in respect of other vessels.

59. The Governor General in Council may Power to consolidate, order the consolidation &c., port or harbour duties. and commutation of any port or harbour duties as levied in any subordinate port in British India into a tonnage duty:

Provided that the total amount levied at such port shall not exceed one anna per ton for British and Native vessels not exceeding seven hundred tons, and upon vessels exceeding that measurement at the rate for seven hundred tons, and upon foreign European and American vessels at the rate of one anna four pie per ton. All vessels anchoring in any such subordinate port shall be charged with reduced duty in the proportion above provided they leave such port without breaking bulk before completing four entire days from the time of anchoring therein.

The said consolidated and commuted port duties shall be levied by such officer as the Local Government appoints, and the port clearance may be withheld from the vessel until the port duties incurred in respect thereof may be paid.

And all powers, penalties, and other means by which any port or harbour duty so consolidated and commuted may have been legally enforced shall be applicable to the enforcing of the consolidated and commuted duties at such port.

(b.) until all expenses, which by the Merchant Expenses of medical attendance and burial mentioned in 17 and 18 Vic., cap. 104. Shipping Act, 1854, Section 228, are to be borne by the owner thereof incurred since the arrival of such vessel in the Port from which she seeks clearance, have been duly paid.

Composition for Port-Dues.

63. The owner of any vessel may pay to the Conservator of any port three times the amount of the Port-dues or Hospital Port-dues which would be payable in respect of such vessel; and such vessel shall thereupon be discharged from all further Port-dues or Hospital Port-dues in such port for twelve months from the date of such payment.

CHAPTER VII.

OF PENALTIES.

65. All offences against this Act shall be Offences how punishpunishable in a summary able, and penalties how manner by a Magistrate. And any Magistrate may, by warrant under his hand, cause the amount of any such penalty imposed upon the owner or Master of any vessel, for any offence committed on board of such vessel, or in the management thereof, or otherwise in relation thereto, whereof such owner or Master is convicted, to be levied by distress and sale of such vessel, and the tackle, apparel and furniture thereof, or so much thereof, as is necessary.

66. In case of any conviction under this Act,

Such costs may be assessed by the Magistrate, and may be levied and recovered in the same manner as any fine under this Act.

67. Whenever any person is liable, under the Damages, &c., payable under this Act, how ascertained and recovered. ceeding one thousand rupees, the same may be recovered and levied in the same manner as any fine under this Act, and, if necessary, the amount thereof may be fixed and assessed by the Magistrate before whom the case is tried.

70. Any person offending against the pro-Jurisdiction over offen-ces beyond local limits of jurisdiction. visions of this Act, in any port, river or channel subject to this Act, shall be punishable by any Magistrate having jurisdiction over any district or place adjoining such port, river or channel, or adjoining either side of that part of the navigable river or channel in which such offence is committed.

Such Magistrate may exercise all the powers of a Magistrate under this Act, in the same manner and to the same extent as if the offence had been committed locally within the limits of nis jurisdiction, notwithstanding the offence may not have been committed locally within such limits and in case any such Magistrate exercise the jurisdiction hereby vested in him, the offence shall be deemed, for all purposes, to have been committed locally within the limits of his jurisdiction.

Conviction to be quashed on merits only. Form of conviction, &c.

71. No conviction, order, or judgment of any Justice of the Peace shall be quashed for error of form or procedure, but only on the merits ;

and it shall not be necessary to state, on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, the evidence on which it proceeds; but the depositions taken, or a copy of them, shall be returned with the conviction, order, or judgment, in obedience to any writ of certiorari;

If no jurisdiction appears on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, but the depositions taken supply that defect, the conviction, order or judgment shall be aided by what so appears in such depositions.

CHAPTER VIII,

MISCELLANEOUS.

72. If any vessel belonging to any of Her Majesty's subjects, or sail-Hoisting colours in Port. unlawful colours in Port. in the limits of any port, river or channel subject to this Act, any flag, jack, pendant, or colours, the use whereof on board such vessel has been prohibited by the Statute 17 & 18 Victoria, Chapter 104, or any other Statute now or hereafter to

be in force, or by any Proclamation made or to be made in pursuance of any such Statute, or by any of Her Majesty's Regulations in force for the time being, the Master of such vessel shall, for every such offence, be punished with fine which may extend to fifty rupees.

Such fine shall be in addition to any other penalty recoverable under the said Statute or any future Statute to be made in that behalf.

It shall be lawful for any officer of Her Majesty's Navy, within the limits of such port, river or channel, or for the Conservator of such Port, to enter on board any such vessel, and to seize and take away any flag, jack, pendant, or colour so unlawfully hoisted, carried, or worn on board the

73. Any Magistrate, upon an application being made to him by the Foreign Deserters. Consul of any Foreign power to which the Foreign Deserters Act (1852) has by an order of Her Majesty in Council been, or shall hereafter be, declared to be applicable, and upon complaint on oath of the desertion of any seaman, not being a slave, from any ship of such Foreign power, may until a revocation of such order in Council has been publicly notified, issue his warrant for the apprehension of any such deserter, and, upon due proof of the desertion, may order him to be conveyed on board the vessel to which he belongs, or, at the instance of the Consul, to be detained in custody till the vessel is ready to sail, on deposit being first made of such sum as the Magistrate deems necessary for the subsistence of the deserter during such detention; provided that the detention of such deserter shall not be continued beyond twelve weeks.

74. The provisions contained in sections eleven and twenty-two shall be Application of Sections 11 and 22. applicable to all ports heretofore or hereafter declared by the Local Government to be ports for the shipment and landing of goods, and may be enforced by any Magistrate to whose ordinary jurisdiction any such port is subject. Any penalties imposed by him, and any expenses incurred by his order under the said provisions, shall be recoverable respectively in the manner provided in sections sixty-five and sixty-seven.

In any of the said ports the consent referred to in section twenty-two may be given by the principal officer of customs at such port or by any other officer in that behalf appointed by the Local Government,

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The primary objects of this Bill are three: one to empower the Local Governments in all the principal ports of British India to levy a moderate duty for the support of local hospitals to which seamen resort for medical aid. The duty will in no case exceed one anna per ton, and will be leviable in respect of all merchant-ships lying in such ports. Under Bengal Act III. of 1867, the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal has already this power as regards vessels lying in the port of Calcutta.

In ports to which the present Port Act extends, ships of over 200 tons burden cannot be moved without having a pilot, &c., on board, and smaller vessels cannot be moved without the authority of the Conservator. The second object of the Bill is to extend this rule to the navigable channels leading to

those ports.

Its third object is to provide for the arrest of foreign deserters in any port of British India on the application of the Consul of any foreign power to which the Foreign Deserters Act, 1852, has been declared applicable. Similar provisions are in force in the ports of Bombay (Act XIII. of 1856, Section 117), Calcutta (Bengal Act IV. of 1866, Section 103) and Madras (Madras Act VIII. of 1867, Section 80).

As the law relating to ports and port-dues is now contained in no less than twenty-two Acts, it has been thought more desirable to consolidate these laws with the additions above specified than to add a

twenty-third to their number.

The Bill is divided into eight chapters:

Chapter I. contains the usual preliminary matter.

Chapter II. empowers the Local Governments to extend the proposed Act to any port to which it will not in the first instance apply, to alter the limits of any ports in which the proposed Act may be in force, and to make port-rules for the purposes mentioned in Act XXII. of 1855, Section 7. The opportunity has been taken to define 'high-water mark' as the medium high tide between the springs and the neaps (Atty. Gen. v. Chambers, 4 DeG. Mac. & G. 206, 218).

Chapter III. deals with the Conservator and other Port-officers and describes their powers and duties. A clause (17) taken from the Bengal Act III. of 1865 empowers any Conservator, for the purpose of extinguishing fires in his port, to require the master of any ship of more than 500 tons burden to place at his disposal three-fourths of the crew then under such master's orders. In other respects this chapter makes

no substantial change in the law.

Chapter IV. contains sundry rules for the safety of shipping and the preservation of ports. There is nothing substantially new, except a clause (copied from Bengal Act III. of 1867) imposing a penalty on any master who wilfully omits to take order to extinguish fire on board his ship; and another clause (taken from Bengal Act III. of 1865) empowering the Local Government to make rules for the prevention of fire from petroleum and other inflammable oils.

Chapter V. relates to the subject of salvage in ports and is equivalent to Sections 38 and 39 of Act XXII. of 1855.

Chapter VI. relates to Port-dues. The provisions of Act VII. of 1873, under which the Local Government extending the proposed Act to any port may declare the maximum amount of dues to be levied therein, (but within the limits of a statutory maximum), and the conditions and modifications under which such dues shall be levied, have been made applicable to all ports of British India not now subject to Act XXII. of 1855.

Power has been given to the Local Governments to direct that for the purposes of port-fund accounts any number of ports shall be regarded as constituting a single port. Similar provisions are contained in Madras Act VII. of 1867 and Bombay Act XI. of 1866.

The rules relating to port-dues chargeable on vessels re-entering ports from stress of weather, entering in ballast, or not discharging or taking in cargo or passengers, which are now repeated in many local Acts, have been made of general application. A general power also has been given to compound for port-dues.

A general clause has been introduced fixing the maximum fees for certain services, such as hauling, removing, removing from one part of the port to another, hooking and measuring. Similar clauses are to be founds in Act XXX. of 1857, Bengal Act I. of 1863, and Madras Act VII. of 1867.

A provision taken from Bengal Act III. of 1867 has been introduced to authorise the refusal of portclearances until the payment of the expenses attendant on the illness or death of masters, seamen and apprentices, which, under the Merchant Shipping Act (17 & 18 Vic., Chapter 104) Section 228, are to be defrayed by the ship-owner.

Chapter VII. contains the general provisions as to penalties found in Act XXII. of 1855, Sections 55 to 59, 63 and 64. And Chapter VIII. provides for the arrest of foreign deserters and contains a few other miscellaneous provisions.

The Bill is followed by two Schedules: The first shows in a tabular from—(a) all the ports in which Act XXII. of 1855 is now in force, and to which the present measure will apply in the first instance; (b) the ships on which dues will be levied; (c) the maximum rate per ton; and (d) how often the rate will be leviable. The second schedule specifies the enactments which the Bill if it become law will remove from the Statute-book.
