##### REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

No. 2036.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following amended clauses be substituted for Clause 3 Rule 36, and Clause 7 Rule 37, of the Rules for the examination of Junior Civil Servants, Political Officers, &c., published at pages 750—755 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 13th July 1871, Part I.:

##### LOWER STANDARD.

*Rule 36, Clause 3.—(a).* The candidate is to be required to answer ordinary questions showing a general acquaintance with the principles and system of Huzúr, Táluka and Village Accounts as given in Hope's Manual, and of Treasury and Local Fund Accounts as given in the Civil Account Code, Vol. I., and the Pay and Acting Allowance Code.

*(b).* The candidate shall produce a certificate from the Collector of the District that he has duly attended to and satisfactorily discharged

the duties of Treasury Officer for a period not less than six weeks in each year. No candidate shall be declared as passed without such certificate.

##### HIGHER STANDARD.

*Rule 37, Clause 7.—(a).* The candidate is to be required to show his knowledge of the accounts of a Collectorate whether Village, Táluka or Huzúr, and to have a satisfactory general acquaintance with the subjects treated of in Hope's Manual, and with the whole system of Treasury and Local Funds Accounts prevailing in the Presidency as given in the Civil Account Code, Vol. I., and the Pay and Acting Allowance Code.

*(b).* The candidate shall produce a certificate from the Collector of the District that he has duly attended to and satisfactorily discharged the duties of Treasury Officer for a period not less than six weeks in each year. No candidate shall be declared as passed without such certificate.

**RESOLUTION.**—The question of the further extension of the system of local self-government in the Bombay Presidency is one of considerable difficulty. District and Taluka Local Fund Committees and Municipalities in this Presidency have already large funds at their disposal over the expenditure of which they possess discretionary power and it is doubtful whether those bodies as at present constituted can advantageously be charged with the administration of other heads of expenditure.

2. An examination *seriatim* of the various heads of Provincial expenditure and revenue shows how difficult it would be to entrust to local bodies the administration of the majority of the funds of which the management is now controlled by Government and its officers. Of the various items comprised under the general heading 'Minor Departments' the Accountant General can only suggest that the grants under two heads should be administered by local bodies. Of these one is Provincial Museums for which the grant is but Rs. 3,300. This is now under the control of the Director of Public Instruction and it seems questionable whether it is expedient to create a special committee to superintend the outlay of this petty grant. The other item is 'Bull and Stallion Charges.' Government however is of opinion that for the present at least it is desirable that the funds provided from Provincial revenues for this purpose should continue to be managed by the new Department specially established to superintend horse-breeding operations, rather than that they should be divided between that department and a number of Local Fund Committees. Uniformity of system and control vested in a single authority are essential to the success of the undertaking, and this it would be difficult to attain if the administration of the grant was placed in the hands of local committees, possibly holding widely varying views on the subject of the utility of expenditure for such purposes.

3. Under the head 'Education' the expenditure from Provincial Funds is very large and in respect of it an extension of the principle of local self-government in certain places and with certain modifications of the existing constitution of local committees may probably be found to be both politic and advantageous in its results. Local Fund Committees already enjoy large powers in administering the portion of the proceeds of the local cess which is devoted to educational purposes, but it is for consideration in the Educational Department whether the creation of special school boards and committees to regulate the management financial and otherwise of schools which are now not under the control of Local Fund Committees might not prove of benefit in meeting local wants and encouraging local efforts in respect of education. The Commissioner, Northern Division, and others of the officers consulted are of opinion that too large a share of the Government educational grant is expended on higher education, that 'the recipients of higher education might be made to contribute more towards the expenditure,' and that a larger proportion of the sum given from Provincial revenues for educational purposes should be devoted to the establishment and maintenance of village schools. Mr. Sheppard also advocates increased grants for agricultural and technical classes, and considers that if more

village schools as compared with higher class schools were maintained, and if the special classes he recommends were more liberally supported 'efficient local committees may perhaps be found to control the management.' These points and suggestions can most appropriately be considered by Government in the Educational Department. Government in the Financial Department will be happy to sanction any proposals tending to give effect to the wishes of the Government of India and to promote a healthy interest in local education on the part of local bodies, and would only request that it should be borne in mind that Provincial Funds are not yet in a position to admit of larger aggregate grants for educational objects than those which they at present provide.

4. Under the head 'Medical' the only portion of the grant now contributed and administered by Government which can in the opinion of His Excellency the Governor in Council be with advantage entrusted to the control of local bodies is that assigned for the maintenance of Dispensaries. On this subject separate orders will hereafter be issued. The grants for Civil Hospitals should, Government considers, remain as now under the management of the Medical Department. As regards Vaccination and Sanitation the expediency of any change in the existing system appears also questionable. The Provincial grant for Vaccination and Sanitation is chiefly devoted to inspection. It amounts in the current year to Rs. 1,48,000, and of this sum Rs. 1,39,800 represent the salaries of the Commissioner, his Deputies, the Superintendents of Vaccination, the Inspectors and Assistant Superintendents and their office establishments whilst the balance is the amount of their travelling expenses and other contingent charges. It is clearly not desirable that Government should resign the duty of supervising and enforcing the measures adopted for the preservation of health and His Excellency in Council considers that the Sanitary Commissioner is justified in deprecating such a change. With his report on this subject the Sanitary Commissioner has submitted at considerable length proposals for an increase of the number and the pay of the subordinates of the Department, involving an additional annual cost to Provincial revenues of Rs. 46,000. The objects which Mr. Lumsdaine desires to attain are doubtless desirable but His Excellency in Council regrets that it is not possible at present to sanction a scheme necessitating so considerable an increase of expenditure. Such an increase moreover would be a step rather of a retrograde character, inasmuch as while Government should retain the task of inspection the practical work should to a great extent be carried on by local governing bodies.

5. Government in the Financial Department concurs with the Secretary in the Public Works Department in the opinion that for the reasons stated in the memorandum in the latter Department No. A—13, dated January 5th 1882, it is not desirable and would not be an economical policy to entrust to local bodies a larger discretion in the outlay of Provincial funds on Public Works than that which they at present possess.

6. Under the head 'Miscellaneous' the Accountant General suggests that the control and expenditure of the following grants might be made over to local bodies :—

- (1).—Petty Provincial Establishments,
- (2).—Miscellaneous and unforeseen charges,
- (3).—Donations for charitable purposes,
- (4).—Cost of books and publications,
- (5).—Rewards for destruction of wild animals.

Government is unable to concur in this proposal. As regards No. 1 the grant is Rs. 20,000. Of this sum Rs. 1,200 represent the pay of the Superintendent of Pánchgani, a gazetted officer appointed by Government, and Rs. 18,400 or  $\frac{2}{3}$  of the total amount represent the cost of the establishments of Travellers' Bungalows in Native States. The Accountant General has not explained to what local bodies he would recommend that the control of this

particular grant should be assigned, and the proposal appears to His Excellency the Governor in Council hardly feasible. As regards No. 2 for which the grant is Rs. 24,000 it may be observed that the charges have to be borne by Government for Government objects and small items for which no specific provision has been made in the Budget. With reference to No. 3, to meet which a sum of Rs. 21,000 is inserted in the Budget, it would seem injudicious to confer on local committees authority to spend Provincial funds on any object they may deem deserving of compassion. Government is alone able to consider the relative urgency, and to weigh the comparative claims, of applications from all parts of the Presidency, and to decide in what cases pecuniary aid is most needed and would be most serviceable. As regards No. 4, for which a grant of Rs. 6,000 is provided, it would be inconsistent with sound policy to provide local committees with public money for such a purpose, unless by way of contribution or supplement to a fund locally raised. Until therefore such funds and agencies are established it would seem preferable to adhere to the system now in force under which Government determines what books and publications should be bought, is able by purchasing them in considerable numbers to obtain them at reduced rates, and arranges for the distribution of the copies procured. With respect to No. 5, for which the grant amounts to Rs. 10,000, the reward given for the destruction of the various descriptions of noxious beasts and reptiles is fixed by Government and is paid by Government officers. No advantage is in the opinion of His Excellency the Governor in Council to be derived from entrusting local committees with the management of this grant.

7. It may be the case that under the present constitution of local committees, whether Municipal or Local Funds, as much local control over Provincial contributions to local expenditure exists as is practicable or consistent with economy in the administration of public funds, but His Excellency the Governor in Council is of opinion that the time has now arrived when it may properly be considered whether some change in the constitution of those committees may not with advantage be introduced and whether extended powers in respect of the expenditure of public money derived from local taxation and provincial subsidies may not with benefit to all concerned be conferred upon local governing bodies formed under a new system. It appears to Government that the present is a fitting opportunity to decide whether in the case of the largest and most important Municipalities an extension of the principle of representative self-government cannot advantageously be effected, and whether when the representative element has thus been introduced augmented powers of local expenditure aided from Provincial funds may not be granted to the municipal governing bodies to the benefit alike of Government and of the people.

8. His Excellency the Governor in Council proposes at present only to avail himself of the powers conferred on Government under the Bombay District Municipal Act. Special difficulties exist in the way of the election by the inhabitants of country districts of members of the Local Fund Committees for such districts. The Bombay District Municipal Act however contains a provision authorising the election of non-official Commissioners of City Municipalities. In their case no practical difficulties are to be found. The question is one merely of expediency, and His Excellency the Governor in Council perceives no reason why the intelligent population of the chief towns in the Presidency should not be allowed to have a direct voice in their local self-government. The measure must necessarily be to some extent of the nature of an experiment but it has been tried with success in the City of Bombay, and Government would express its decided opinion that the character and capacity of the elected members of the Bombay Corporation, and the tone of their discussions contrast favourably with those of elected municipal bodies in the United Kingdom. His Excellency the Governor in Council trusts that it will be found that the inhabitants of the large towns in the Mofussil will display the same amount of public spirit and intelligence as has been shown by the citizens of Bombay. He further hopes that the success of the experiment may ere long justify the passing of a legislative enactment to

amend the existing law by introducing also into Town Municipalities the election of a portion of the Municipal Commissioners.

9. Under Clause 2 of Section 7 of Bombay Act VI. of 1873 the Governor in Council may, if he think fit, direct that in any City Municipality the whole or any portion of the non-official Commissioners (whose number shall always be not less than double that of the ex-officio Commissioners) shall be appointed by election and may fix the time and manner of the election and the qualification of the electors. City Municipalities have been established at Poona, Sholapur, Ahmednagar, Ahmedabad, Broach, Surat, Karáchi, Hyderabad, Shikárpur and Sukkur. In these ten cities the principle of representative municipal government may in the opinion of Government be with advantage introduced. His Excellency the Governor in Council would propose that in each of these City Municipalities one-half of the total number of Commissioners should be elected, each town being divided into wards each of which should return one member. The qualification for a vote for the election of the representative Commissioners should be the payment of any direct tax, whether Government, Local Fund or Municipal. All persons accordingly resident within the municipal limits and paying Government land assessment, license tax, local fund cess or any direct municipal tax would be entitled to a vote.

10. His Excellency the Governor in Council is not in possession of any data to enable him to form an opinion as to the number of persons who under this scheme would be qualified as voters. In some Municipalities, notably in Hyderabad, Shikárpur and Sukkur, where there is apparently little, if any, direct municipal taxation, the number of persons entitled to vote under the pecuniary qualification would presumably be but small. It is not, however, essential that the franchise should be strictly limited to those persons who pay direct rates or taxes, Government or municipal. The desire of Government is that as far as possible all persons of respectability, character and means should possess a voice in the election of representative Commissioners. The franchise might therefore be not only pecuniary but also educational and professional, and the privilege of a vote might be granted as well to graduates of any university or medical college and to vakils and pleaders, as to persons contributing directly to Government or municipal revenues.

11. The Commissioners, N. D., C. D. and in Sind should be requested to report at their early convenience the approximate number of persons who would be entitled to a vote in each of the City Municipalities situated within their respective Divisions, if the franchise is made pecuniary only, and if it is educational and professional as well as pecuniary. They should also be asked to state the total number at present of Commissioners, ex-officio and non-official, in each City Municipality, and when the period in each instance for which the non-official Commissioners now serving have been appointed will expire. His Excellency the Governor in Council will be obliged if the Commissioners when submitting the reports now called for will favour Government with any further suggestions or remarks they may desire to offer.

12. On the receipt and consideration of the reports from the Commissioners detailed orders and instructions in view to the carrying into execution of the scheme now set forth will be issued, and the requisite rules will have to be prepared under Clause 2 of Section 7 of Bombay Act VI. of 1873.

13. The creation of representative bodies on the principle now proposed will enable Government to obtain more accurate knowledge than it at present possesses of the wishes of the people, especially in regard to education, medical expenditure and local taxation and will tend to facilitate the final consideration of the question as to the increased powers in respect of control over the outlay of public money which may most beneficially be conferred upon local bodies.

14. This Resolution should be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* and a copy of it placed on the Editors' Table. It should also be communicated to the Government of India."

A person licensed to possess arms, ammunition, or military stores, or who is exempted from the liability to take out such a license, is entitled to transport to his residence, from the premises of a licensed dealer, arms, ammunition, or military stores without a separate transport license, so long as the articles purchased are in reasonable quantity and for his own use. A licensed dealer in arms, ammunition, and military stores may supply the order of any such person, and may without a separate transport license send or despatch, in any way desired, to the residence of the purchaser the articles ordered by any such person, so long as they fulfil the requirements of Rule 3, and are legibly addressed to the person for whom they are intended.
