Commissioned, warrant, and native commissioned officers travelling 'on duty,' but without a Government passage warrant, or proceeding on or returning from leave on medical certificate and paying their own fares (whether entitled to mileage allowance or not), are to be allowed to travel in the next higher class of carriage than that for which they purchased tickets, on their producing a certificate, Form E (Appendix No. 1), signed by a staff officer directing them to travel on duty.

"1.—This, however, is subject to the limitation that commissioned and first class warrant officers only are to travel first class with second class tickets, and second class warrant and native commissioned officers second class with third class tickets."

"III.—This order does not apply to any class of Government servants other than those specified above, nor is it applicable to the wives and families of commissioned or warrant officers; and the certificate is not to be granted to commissioned and warrant officers travelling by the Oudh and Rohilkund Railway, so long as the fares are not in excess of nine pies and two pies per mile, respectively, for upper and lower classes."

The Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that a military commissioned, warrant, or native commissioned officer in civil or military employ travelling on duty by rail without a Government passage warrant, shall, unless he is entitled to travel free of charge, invariably make use of the Form E 'on duty' certificate (copy annexed) as provided in paragraph 164* of the Transport Regulations, Part II; the authorised scale of travelling allowance being reduced by the amount by which the first class fare exceeds the second class, or the second class fare the third class, as the case may be.

2. Commissioned officers will themselves sign the Form E certificate, that for warrant officers and native commissioned officers being signed by a staff officer, or the officer under whom they are serving.

I am directed to forward, for the information of the Government of India, the accompanying most valuable and exhaustive report by Brigadier-General Wilkinson on the route marched by the force under his command from Quetta to Dera Ghazi Khan in November 1881.

2. This march has been a very interesting and a very valuable one; it sets at rest, as His Excellency thought it would, the question as to the best road from the Indus to Kandahar; it proves that detachments of British troops can march through the country of wild, untamed tribes without any collision arising; it establishes the fact that with due care long marches can be made through the roughest country without any material loss of transport, and it is an honourable evidence of the hardships which British and Native soldiers can endure, and of what the skill and intelligence of British officers rightly directed can accomplish.

3. These results, His Excellency considers, could not have been attained had the Commander not possessed, in a high degree, intelligence, energy, tact and power of organization; and Sir Donald Stewart therefore submits that Brigadier-General Wilkinson and the officers brought to notice by him have fairly earned the high approval of Government.

4. I am to request the early return of all the enclosures of this report in order that the valuable information recorded therein may without delay be transferred to the Intelligence Branch of this Department.

(1) All officers who now hold substantive regimental commands will be granted an extension of command without any conditions (except promotion to the rank of General Officer, or the attainment of the Colonel's allowance) to the 1st April 1883.

(2) Subject to the above conditions, present incumbents will be eligible to retain their commands until they attain the age of 55 years, or complete a tenure of 7 years' command, whichever may happen first.

(3) Any present incumbent, who on or after the 1st of April 1883 may not have completed 5 years' tenure of command before reaching the age of 55 years, will be eligible to complete his 5 years' tenure of command.

(4) The immediate successors of present incumbents will be eligible to hold the command of a regiment until the attainment of 55 years of age, or the completion of 7 years' tenure of command, whichever may happen first.

(5) Hereafter, the limits for regimental command will be the attainment of 52 years of age, or a tenure of 7 years, whichever may happen first.

(6) In any case of the Commandant of a regiment, other than present incumbents (paragraph 4), who is required to vacate his command under these rules before he has served for the pension granted for 32 years' service, such officer, on the recommendation of the Commander-in-Chief in India, Madras or Bombay, and with the approval of the Government of India, Madras, or Bombay, as the case may be, may be permitted an extension of command, not exceeding 2 years, towards his 32 years' pension service, or such less period as may be required for its completion. But no portion of such special extension of regimental

service, or tenure of command, will be permitted to be passed on any leave or furlough except privilege leave.

(7) Officers of the Staff Corps or Indian Army who entered the service before 1st July 1881, who may elect, on vacating regimental commands, to remain in the service for the attainment of the highest retirement person, or the Colonel's allowance, will be permitted the option of completing their service at home on the furlough pay of their rank, or of remaining in India on the unemployed Indian pay and allowances of their rank if unemployed.

(8) All regimental commands will continue to be vacated as at present, on promotion to Major-General or succession to the Colonel's allowance.

(9) These rules will take effect from this date, so far that any commandants of regiments hereafter appointed will be the next in succession to present incumbents referred to in paragraph 4.

(10) These rules are applicable also to the Punjab Frontier Force and the Hyderabad Contingent, and so far as regards the limit of age prescribed by them, to other regiments under the direct orders of the Government of India."
