No. 1582.—In exercise of the power conferred on him by Section 1 of Bombay Act II. of 1878 (amending Bombay Ferries Act, 1868), the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that the persons, vehicles, animals, &c., mentioned in the following list are exempt from payment of ferry tolls otherwise demandable under Bombay Act II. of 1868 in addition to the persons exempted by Section 3 of Bombay Act II. of 1868; provided that exemptions heretofore allowed since the passing of Bombay Act II. of 1878 in conformity with a Notification of the Governor in Council published at page 890 of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 11th August 1870, shall be deemed to have been lawfully allowed as if this Notification had been in force during such period:—

1. All officers and soldiers of Her Majesty's regular forces on duty or on the march, and their horses and baggage; and all prisoners under military escort; and all carriages and horses belonging to Her Majesty or employed in Her military service, when conveying any such persons or baggage or stores, or returning from conveying the same.
2. All camp followers, carts, cattle, &c., when moving under the orders of competent military authority. Animals belonging to the Government Cattle Farm.
3. His Excellency the Governor General and His Excellency the Governor with their camps.
4. Foreign rulers or native chiefs and their followers or retainers; also other natives of distinction whom Government, the Commissioner or the Collector, may see fit for special reasons to exempt.
5. Grass-cutters attached to Cavalry or Artillery Regiments.
6. Cultivators, wood-cutters, grass-cutters, and the like, who have daily or constantly to cross the ferry on their way to their daily occupation (*the precise terms of this exemption will be left to the decision of the Collector*).
7. Carts containing public treasure, with their escorts and baggage.
8. Carts actually employed in the conveyance of material for the construction or repair of public works, constructed or maintained by Imperial, Provincial, or Local Funds.

In other cases when a ferry is crossed by carts, &c., hired for, or in use on, the public service, the toll is to be paid and the sum recovered by a contingent bill.

For instance, a Collector will pay toll for the whole of the carts containing his own baggage and the Government records and tents, recovering the toll on account of the latter by a contingent bill.

9. Peons of all departments wearing their belts.
10. Mail carts, tongas, horses, vans actually carrying Her Majesty's mails; led ponies employed in the mail service, and empty mail tongas (*i. e.*, red mail carts) on all mail tonga lines.
11. All military and public stores, and goods belonging to the Public Works and Local Funds Department, Treasure and Official Records.
12. All village and district officers, and all officers belonging to any of the departments under Government when actually travelling on duty, and who have been exempted under Section 5 of the Tolls Act, 1875; and all Public Works and Local Fund maistries, mustering karkuns, post-runners, mukdams, and peons, when provided with a pass showing that they are *bonâ fide* employed in these departments.
13. All young children in arms.

Provided that in the case of any of the officers above mentioned whose exemptions have been granted after the existing ferry contracts have been sold and accepted by contractors, the exemptions shall be deemed to come in force on the expiry of the present contracts:

Provided also that the exemption from payment of ferry tolls in the case of Government officers is limited to the officials above mentioned and their actual conveyance, and does not extend to their camp equipage and personal baggage. The exemption is only to extend to the one horse on which the officer may happen to be riding.

No. 112.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 46 of the Native Passenger Ships Act, No. VIII. of 1876, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rules, to be substituted for those bearing the same numbers which were published in the Notification of the Department of Revenue, Agriculture and Commerce No. 298 (Commerce and Trade), dated 8th August 1877:—

IV.—Every such ship shall be fitted with not less than two privies, sufficiently screened

from public view and readily accessible, and with one additional such privy for every 100 passengers, or part of that number, carried in excess of 100, but no privies shall be allowed in the between-decks.

A.—A proportion of such privies, in any case not less than one if there be any females among the passengers, shall be set apart for the exclusive use of females, such proportion corresponding, as nearly as may be, to the proportion of female to male passengers.

V.—Every such ship shall be provided with not less than two places for washing, sufficiently screened from public view, whereof a full proportion, as prescribed in the case of privies in Rule IV., shall be set apart exclusively for females. A sufficient number of hand-pumps shall also be provided for supplying sea water for purposes of ablution.

VII.—Every such ship shall be provided with not less than two cabooses, or cooking ranges, on deck, properly housed and covered, to which passengers can have ready access. The ranges shall be made of substantial plate iron lined inside with bricks, and raised at least four inches from the deck, with an outlet or chimney at top for the escape of smoke. Each range shall contain five or six cooking places, and an additional range shall be provided for every two hundred passengers carried in excess of one hundred. Cooking on board in the passengers' own stoves is prohibited.

The crew of the vessel shall not be allowed to use the cooking ranges set apart for passengers during the period passengers are on board, but shall be provided with a separate cooking range.

No. 18.—Under the authority conferred on the Right Honourable the Governor in Council by Section 8 of Bombay Act II. of 1864 (an Act to provide for the periodical Survey of Steam-vessels in the Ports, Harbours, Rivers, or Waters of the Presidency of Bombay), the following Rule is added to those notified on the 8th of December 1871, published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 21st December 1871, Part I., page 1353, and is hereby promulgated for general information :—

Rule 22A.—It shall be the duty of the Surveyors to ascertain that all steam-vessels carrying passengers on deck between the 15th of May and the 1st of September have either planked or plated closed bulwarks of sufficient strength and of such a height as are in the Surveyors' judgment necessary for the proper shelter and protection of the passengers, and of such a height as is necessary for their safety, and with a weather cloth in addition to give the required protection. When the height of bulwarks in steamers carrying deck-passengers is 4 feet, or on raised quarter decks, 3 feet, no question need be raised. The Surveyors should specify on the certificates of passenger-steamers not provided with proper fixed bulwarks that they should not be allowed to carry any deck-passengers during the period abovenamed for the guidance of the Custom House Officers on the vessels applying for Port clearance.

" ORGANIZATION.

INDIAN ARMY.

No. 210.—The Most Hon'ble the Governor General in Council hereby announces certain of the measures which have been determined upon, with the approval of Her Majesty's Government, in regard to the regimental organisation of the Indian Army.

2. Under the organisation now to be adopted, every Native cavalry regiment (except the four regiments of Madras Native cavalry, whose establishment will remain unaltered) will consist, as at present, of six troops organised in three squadrons, each regiment having the following establishment:—

- 3 Risáldárs,
- 3 Ressaídárs,
- 1 Woordie-Major,
- 6 Jamádárs,
- 6 Kote-Dafedárs,
- 48 Dafedárs (including 1 Farrier-Major and 1 Salootrie),
- 6 Trumpeters,
- 477 Privates (including 1 Assistant Salootrie and 6 Farriers).

In the Bombay cavalry the present establishment of commissioned and non-commissioned ranks will remain unaltered at 80, the privates being raised to 470 in number instead of to 477, the total strength in Bengal and Bombay being thus 550 of all ranks.

The establishment of the Cavalry of the Corps of Guides (Queen's Own) will remain unaltered.

3. Every Native infantry regiment will consist, as at present, of eight companies, each company having the following establishment:—

- 1 Subhedár,
- 1 Jamadár,
- 5 Haváldárs,
- 5 Náíks,
- 2 Drummers,
- 90 Privates,

104

making a total per regiment of 832 Natives of all ranks.

The Madras regiments will retain their extra Haváldár-Major as at present.

4. The three regiments of Assam Light Infantry will retain their present strength of 912 of all ranks. The five Goorkha regiments will also retain that strength for the present.

5 The establishment of regiments being fixed as above stated, and as the total strength of the army is to remain substantially unchanged, this measure of reorganisation involves the reduction of four regiments of cavalry and eighteen of infantry.

6. The Governor General in Council has determined that of the four cavalry regiments to be reduced, three shall be reduced in the Bengal Army, including the Punjab Frontier Force, and one in the Bombay Army. Of the eighteen regiments of infantry to be reduced, six shall be reduced in the Bengal Army, including the Punjab Frontier Force, four in the Bombay Army, and eight in the Madras Army. The present and future establishments of the Indian Army will therefore be as follows :—

8. This reduction will be carried out under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief and the Punjab Government, in the following way :—

9. All Native officers, non-commissioned officers, and men who wish to remain in the service and are physically fit and otherwise well suited for it will be transferred to other regiments by troops and companies, as far as practicable, under subsidiary orders which will be issued by the Commaner-in-Chief and the Punjab Govern-ment.

10. All Native officers, non-commissioned officers, and men who wish to take their discharge, or who from physical or other causes are not well suited for the service, will be discharged on the following rates of pensions and gratuities :—

I.—The superior rates of pensions specified in paragraph 611 of the Pay Code, volume II, to officers, non-commissioned officers, and men who have completed 25 years of service and upwards.

II.—The ordinary rates of pensions to all officers, non-commissioned officers, and men who have completed 14 years' service, and have less than 25 years' service, with a bonus of one month's pay (including good-conduct pay) for every two years' service.

III.—To officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of more than 10 and less than 14 years' service, two-thirds of the ordinary rate of pension and a bonus of three months' pay (including good-conduct pay).

IV.—To non-commissioned officers and men of 5 and less than 10 years' service, a gratuity of one month's pay for each year of service, together with an additional bonus of three months' pay as above.

V.—To non-commissioned officers and men of less than 5 years' service, a gratuity of six months' pay.

11. In the case of the cavalry, the gratuities will be calculated on the rates of ordinary and not net pay.

12. In those regiments in which, in consequence of the transfers made from the regiments reduced, the strength of Native officers or non-commissioned officers may become in excess of the regular authorised establishment, pensions and gratuities under the above scale may be offered to deserving Native officers and non-commissioned officers of such regiments to the extent of the numbers in excess in these ranks, so that the strength of Native officers and non-commissioned officers may thus be at once brought down to the fixed authorised establishment. Should this reduction however not be completely effected, and any supernumeraries be still left, they will be absorbed by making only two promotions for every three vacancies, every third vacancy being absorbed.

13. Native commissioned officers of cavalry regiments of 25 years' service and upwards, pensioned under the terms of paragraph 13, will receive a gratuity of 12 months' pay, in addition to the higher rate of pension.

14. Free passes by rail to their homes will be given to all officers, non-commissioned officers, and men who take their discharge on pension or gratuity under these orders.

15. In the cavalry regiments about to be reduced, where the chunda (remount) fund of a regiment after the disposal of all its horses (under subsidiary orders to be now issued) is unable to meet the entire cost of defraying the horse price of men discharged and transferred, the sums necessary for this purpose will be granted by the Government of India, under orders which will be issued hereafter.

16. In order to complete the horse price of men who are transferred to other corps, and who have not as yet paid up their full horse price in their present corps, loans will be granted, to Commanding Officers of regiments receiving men transferred, of the amount of such horse price still due, to be repaid without interest at Rs. 2 per man per mensem.

17. Such assistance will be granted to the equipment funds of cavalry regiments reduced as will permit of their paying up in the ordinary way, to men discharged, the proper value of their equipments, the sale proceeds of which will be carried to the credit of the State.

18. The certified actual cost involved in change of uniform and equipment will be allowed to soldiers transferred to other regiments. The necessary changes in the uniforms of the infantry troops transferred will be made at the public expense.

19. The following regiments of the Madras and Bombay armies have been selected by the Governments of those Presidencies respectively for reduction:—

20. The reductions will be carried out under the foregoing rules, as far as possible, by the transfer of soldiers from regiments to be reduced to those which are to be retained; those, however, who wish to take their discharge from the regiments reduced being allowed to do so with pensions and gratuities as above laid down.

21. Consequent upon the increase in the strength of Native regiments, the establishment of European officers will now be fixed at eight officers per regiment, or one more than the present establishment; the additional officer to be appointed in the rank of wing or squadron officer. This augmentation will at once absorb a part of the junior officers of the reduced regiments, while the total establishment of European officers serving on regimental duty with the Indian Army will remain almost unaltered. With respect to the senior officers of these regiments, the following terms are offered, under the orders of the Secretary of State for India, to such of them as may retire from the service within three months from the date of their regiments being broken up:—

I.—To officers of over 32 years' service, the pension to which they may be entitled, not in excess of 45*l.* 5*s.* a year, with the value of their Colonel's allowances on the scale allowed by G. G. O. No. 1 of 1881, together with a bonus of 18 months' staff salary of their regimental appointments and free passages to England for themselves and their families.

II.—To officers of from 20 to 32 years' service, a bonus equal to 18 months' staff salary of their regimental appointments, in addition to any pension to which they may be entitled, with free passages as above.

22. The new organisation of Cavalry and Infantry will have effect from 1st July 1882.

23. The reduction of the regiments hereby ordered will be completed during the month of June 1882, and the transfers of men who elect to serve in other corps will be made on the 30th June 1882, under orders which will be issued by the Commander-in-Chief in India and the Governments respectively concerned.

24. Officers of the regiments to be reduced who desire to avail themselves of the offer contained in paragraph 21 should notify their intention to the Adjutant General on or before the 30th September 1882.

25. The Governor General in Council takes this opportunity to announce, with the sanction of the Secretary of State for India, the grant of good-conduct pay to non-commissioned officers as follows:—

Para. 3. * * * I have thought it necessary to obtain an authoritative decision on the general question, that is to say, whether a Lieutenant-Colonel should reckon as qualifying service any period that may elapse between the actual date borne by his appointment and the date of his taking up the duties of his appointment.

4. Having caused an inquiry to be addressed to the Horse Guards on the subject, I have been informed that the practice in the British Army is to reckon service as qualifying for the rank of Colonel from the day after the date of the *London Gazette* notifying the appointment, or from the date specified in the *Gazette*.

5. I request that a similar practice may be adopted in calculating the service of officers of the Indian Army, the actual date borne by an appointment being taken as the commencement of the service qualifying an officer of the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel for the Brevet rank of Colonel.

6. I have also been informed that no change has been made in respect of the mode of reckoning leave as part of the period qualifying for the rank of Colonel.

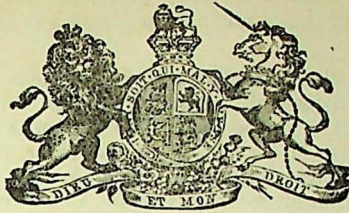

Bombay Municipal Corporation.

A Special General Meeting of the Municipal Corporation of Bombay will be held here at 3 o'clock P.M. on Monday the 15th May 1882, for the consideration of the following business:—

1. Sanction to be asked to the writing off of Rs. 1,132-2-0 from the Live Stock Return of the Health Department, being losses by mortality among bullocks of that Department during the Quarter ending 28th February 1882.

2. Sanction to be asked, as recommended by the Town Council, to the payment of Rs. 180, from Surplus Cash Balance, as Munshi allowance to Mr. H. Holmes of the Bombay Police Force, for having passed an examination in the Hindustani language according to the Higher Standard.

3. Town Council's Resolution No. 1084, dated 28th April last, recommending the Corporation to sanction a grant of Rs. 15,000, from Surplus Cash Balance, for the purpose of acquiring certain land in Grant Road for Municipal purposes (over 3,000 square yards) and to make an advance for the immediate purchase of the land, debitable to the Budget provision of Rs. 30,000, for special road improvements.

4. Town Council's Resolution No. 1113, dated 5th instant, recommending the Corporation to renew the lapsed portion, namely, Rs. 65,347, of the original grant of Rs. 90,000, for the construction of the new Police Quarters and Office of the Commissioner of Police at Byculla.

5. Town Council's Resolution No. 1114, dated 5th instant, recommending the Corporation to sanction the payment of Rs. 1,12,695-9-2, being the amounts of the lapsed grants for 1881, for works already sanctioned.

6. Town Council's Resolution No. 814, dated 17th March 1882, adopting the report of the Works Committee, dated 3rd March 1882, on the proposed improvements of the Water supply and means for extinguishing fires.

7. The Annual Report of the working of the Gokuldas Tejpal Hospital for the year 1881.

8. Letter dated 4th instant, from the Clerk to Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, stating that at their meeting held on the 3rd instant, Her Majesty's Justices elected Mr. John Macfarlane a Member of the Municipal Corporation in the place of Mr. F. Mathew, resigned.

9. Government Notification in the General Department dated 4th instant, stating :
That under the provisions of Section 21 of the Municipal Acts, Sir Frank H. Souter, Knight, C.S.I., is appointed Chairman of the Town Council, vice Dr. H. Cook, resigned ; that Major G. L. C. Merewether, R.E., is appointed a Member of the Town Council and Surgeon-Major J. Arnott, M.D., C.M., a Member of the Municipal Corporation of Bombay, vice Dr. Cook, resigned.

An adjourned Quarterly Meeting of the Municipal Corporation of Bombay will be held here at 4 o'clock P.M. on Monday the 15th instant, for the consideration of the business left undisposed of at the meeting held on the 1st instant, viz. :—

1. Letter No. 948, dated 31st March 1882, from the Secretary, Town Council, reporting the Budget transfers, amounting to Rs. 29,845-12-10, made by the Council from 4th January to 31st March 1882.

2. Letter, dated 14th March 1882, from Mr. Amceroodin Ibrahim Kagdi, forwarding correspondence between himself, the Municipal Commissioner and the Assessor and Collector, relating to two bills for March and April 1881 preferred against him for water supplied through meter to his house No. 32, Bandora. The applicant complains that the quantity of water charged for is incorrect, as compared with the slips of meter reading handed to him by the Turncock, Water Works, for water consumed. Applicant requests that the subject may be inquired into, and that he may be allowed justice in the matter. (Since the date of this letter, applicant has applied to the Town Council to deal with his complaint, and his letter has been referred by the Council to the Municipal Commissioner for disposal.)

3. Town Council's Resolution No. 986, dated 3rd instant, adopting the Report by the Works Committee, dated 31st ultimo, on the revised plans and estimates for building new Police Quarters and temporary Head-quarters of the Commissioner of Police at Byculla, and recommending the Corporation to sanction an additional grant of Rs. 29,255. Sanction to be asked to an additional grant, from Surplus Cash Balance, as above, of Rs. 29,255, for the following extra charges in connection with the building :— (1) addition of verandahs to the chawls, Rs. 14,073 ; (2) plastering internal walls, Rs. 5,632 ; (3) building of stables on approved design, Rs. 9,550, to include removal of work already done.

Note.—This item is included (under a fresh Resolution of the Town Council) in the list of business for the Special General Meeting of the Corporation to be held on the 15th instant.
