No. 1674.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following rule should be substituted for rule 8 of the rules framed under the provisions of Section 31 of Bombay Act IV. of 1879, “The Karáchi Vaccination Act,” and published in Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated 19th August 1880, pages 707 and 708:—

Rule 8.—Vaccination at public vaccine stations will be performed gratuitously.

Clause 2.—Vaccination at the request of the parent or guardian of a child will be performed elsewhere than at a public vaccine station, and fees will be charged for the same according to the following scale:—

Scale of fees to be charged for vaccination performed with human lymph elsewhere than at a public vaccine station:—

For one person	Re. 1 0 0
For every additional person vaccinated in the same house	Annas 0 8 0

Of all such fees one-half shall be paid to the parents or guardians of the vaccinifer, one-fourth to the vaccinator and one-fourth to the Engineer and Secretary to the credit of the Municipal fund. In the event of the parent or guardian of the vaccinifer declining to accept his moiety of the fee, it will be divided equally between the vaccinator and the Municipality.

Clause 3.—All applications for vaccinations to be performed elsewhere than at the public vaccine stations shall be made to the Superintendent of Vaccination, who shall give due notice to the applicant of the time at which the vaccinator will attend to perform the operation.

Clause 4.—If the vaccination be performed from a heifer the minimum charge shall be Rs. 3 for each family and Rs. 5 for a firm, with annas 8 for each additional person vaccinated, and all sums received for vaccination from a heifer shall be credited to the Municipal fund after payment of the vaccinator's fee.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE MOST HONOURABLE

MY LORD MARQUIS,—I herewith forward, for your information, copies of a Despatch and its enclosures, of 16th December last, from Her Majesty's Consul at Réunion, to the Secretary for Foreign Affairs, stating that, in consequence of the coffee plant disease having made its appearance in Mauritius, Ceylon, India, and the Indian Archipelago, the French Governor of Réunion had, for the time, prohibited the importation into that island, not only of coffee plants and berries, but of all plants from India and the islands of the Indian Ocean.

I HAVE the honour to transmit to Your Lordship, herewith enclosed, a slip taken from the 'Journal Officiel de la Réunion,' of the 14th

instant, containing an Arrêté, dated the 13th instant, issued by His Excellency the Governor of Réunion, which prohibits, until further orders, the introduction into the colony of all coffee plants and coffee berries, and even of all kinds of plants coming from Mauritius, India, Ceylon, Java, Sumatra, and the Fiji Islands.

This measure has been rendered necessary owing to the information received from the Mauritius Government of the appearance of a disease on the leaves of the coffee trees in that colony, and in the other countries named in the Arrêté; also upon the recommendation of the Commissioners who were specially named by the local authorities to report on the best measures to be adopted for the prevention of the introduction into this colony of the said coffee plant disease.

I beg to enclose a copy of the Report sent in by the Commissioners.

Slip taken from the 'Journal Officiel de la Réunion,' dated the 14th December 1881.

Coffee Plants and Coffee Berries coming from Mauritius, India, Ceylon, Java, Sumatra, and the Fiji Islands will not be allowed to be imported into Réunion.

Arrêté frappant d'interdiction absolue l'introduction des grains et plantes provenant de Maurice, de l'Inde, de Ceylon, de Java, de Sumatra, des Fidji.

Nous le Gouverneur de l'Île de la Réunion,
Vu l'article 9 du sénatus-consulte du 3 Mai 1854; ensemble l'article 27, sec 1^{er} de l'ordonnance organique du 21 Août 1825;

Vu la lettre de Son Excellence le Gouverneur de Maurice, en date du 12 Octobre dernier, informant l'administration locale de l'apparition d'une maladie des feuilles du caféier; ensemble l'arrêté du 13 du même mois chargeant une commission d'examiner d'urgence les mesures à prendre dans le but de préserver la Colonie de l'invasion de la dite maladie;

Vu le rapport de la dite commission, transmis à l'administration par lettre du 10 de ce mois, et dont les conclusions tendent à l'interdiction absolue non seulement des plantes ou grains de café provenant des pays où sévit la maladie signalée par Son Excellence le Gouverneur de Maurice, mais encore de toutes plantes de nature quelconque originaire des dits pays;

Sur la proposition du Directeur de l'Intérieur, avons arrêté et arrêtons:—

Art. 1^{er}. Est prohibée, jusqu'à nouvel ordre, l'introduction dans la Colonie de tous plantes et grains de café et même de plantes de toute nature provenant de Maurice, l'Inde, de Ceylon, de Java, de Sumatra, des Fidji.

2. Le Directeur de l'Intérieur est chargé de l'exécution du présent arrêté qui sera enregistré partout où besoin sera, publié, inséré au 'Bulletin officiel', et déposé aux archives.

Rapport à Monsieur le Gouverneur sur la Maladie des Cafés à l'Île Maurice.

Monsieur le Gouverneur,

Vous avez bien voulu nous charger d'étudier les mesures qu'il y aurait lieu de prendre pour

préservé la colonie de l'invasion d'une maladie qui sévit à l'île Maurice sur les feuilles du caféier.

Notre commission,* sur l'invitation de M. le Directeur de l'Intérieur, s'est immédiatement réunie, et elle a pensé, qu'en attendant de l'île voisine, les renseignements qui lui manquent quant aux origines et à la nature de la maladie signalée à votre administration, il convenait d'arrêter immédiatement et avant tout, l'introduction des plantes et graines de nature quelconque qui pourraient nous être expédiées de l'île voisine. Elle chargea en conséquence son Président de transmettre cette première résolution à M. le Directeur de l'Intérieur.

La Commission, complètement renseignée aujourd'hui, est en mesure de confirmer cette première indication des moyens à employer pour éviter autant que possible l'introduction de germes dangereux dans la colonie; elle peut en même temps fournir sur la nature de la maladie et son mode de propagation des renseignements qui pourront être utiles à tous ceux qui s'occupant

de la culture du café.†

Il résulte des informations recueillies par la Commission que la maladie dont il s'agit est due à un champignon d'une espèce particulière, se développant sur les feuilles du caféier, et qui a reçu le nom de '*Hemileia vastatrix*.'

Le genre *Hemileia* a été créé en 1879 par Berkeley et Broome sur des échantillons envoyés de Ceylon par le Docteur Ewaints, Directeur du Jardin Botanique de Colombo. Ce parasite, absolument inconnu jusqu'alors, nécessitait en effet la création d'un genre nouveau; il prit place dans les mucédinées coté du genre *Puccinia*, genre qui comprend le 'Noir des céréales' (*Uredo Frumentii*), et aussi un champignon spécial qui attaque les feuilles des oranges.

C'est dans le 'Gardener's Chronicle', année 1869, No. 6, que MM. Berkeley et Broome donnent la description et un dessin analytique de '*Hemileia vastatrix*.'

Voici à peu près leur diagnose.

'Genre *Hemileia*, Berkeley et Broome.—Sores quelquefois circinées, nues, situées sous la feuille, filaments distincts, inarticulés, flexueux, spores un peu reniformes, d'abord mous et ensuite granuleux, verruqueux sur un côté, attachés obliquement à la base par un petit point papilliforme.

'Espèce *H. vastatrix*, Berkeley et Broome.—Formant de petites taches orbiculaires à la surface inférieure des feuilles, consistant en petites houppes de filaments flexueux, surmontés par une seule spore subreniforme, attaché obliquement à la base; rugueux à l'extrémité avec des papilles ressemblant à des verrues tout à fait molles sur la face la plus rapprochée du filament.

'On observe dans le caféier atteint par la maladie que la portion supérieure de la feuille au-dessus des taches, semble avoir été brûlée.'

Le caféier est, jusqu'ici, le seul arbuste sur lequel le champignon ait été observé; il forme à la

surface des feuilles des taches jaunes, arrondies, desséchées au centre quand les taches sont avancées.

Le mycelium du champignon croît sous l'épiderme de la feuille, et se développe, probablement, d'après les observations de M. A. Daruty, aux dépens de l'amidon et des grains de chlorophylle renfermés dans la feuille. Ce mycelium une fois adulte, se gonfle dans le voisinage des stomates et émet par l'ouverture de ces organes, au dehors, des groupes de sporanges.

Les stomates, ainsi obstrués, ne peuvent plus remplir leurs fonctions respiratoires, et la plante meurt par asphyxie.

On comprendra d'après cette description que nos plantations de café courent un véritable danger; comment atteindre en effet un ennemi si bien retranché dans l'intérieur des feuilles?

Dans tous les pays où l'*Hemileia vastatrix* s'est répandue,—l'Inde, Ceylon, Java, Sumatra, Fidji, &c., &c.,—tous les moyens préconisés ont été inefficaces, et les cafés disparaissent peu à peu.

Le premier soin de l'Administration doit donc être, pour préserver le pays de l'invasion du nouveau fléau qui le menace, de s'opposer absolument à l'introduction de toute plante de café, de grains, et mêmes des plantes de toute nature provenant des pays cotaminés.

Est-ce à dire que ces moyens seront absolument efficaces? Les organes de la reproduction de l'*Hemileia* sont tellement tenus qu'il est à craindre que la maladie nous surprenne malgré toutes les précautions.

Si donc il devait en être ainsi, il faut dès à présent conseiller aux planteurs, dès qu'ils apercevront des taches, de brûler immédiatement tous les plants atteints.

Il conviendra même d'examiner s'il n'y aurait pas lieu de charger un agent administratif de parcourir de temps à autre les plantations, pour fournir aux habitants les renseignements qui leur permettront de reconnaître à coup sûr les atteintes de la maladie.

M. J. Potier, Directeur du Jardin Colonial, serait bien placé pour remplir cette mission; il a pu, en effet, dans un récent voyage à Maurice, se rendre un compte exact de la nature de la maladie dont nous occupons, et il s'est livré, avec M. A. Daruty, à des observations microscopiques qui lui permettront de fournir à nos planteurs des indications extrêmement utiles.

Tels sont, Monsieur le Gouverneur, les renseignements que la Commission a pu se procurer, et qu'elle s'empresse de vous faire parvenir; elle espère qu'ils suffiront à votre administration pour prendre sans retard les mesures de protection indispensables.

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 10th May 1882.

No. 1740.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the following additions and alterations be made in the revised Rules for the Bombay Government Savings Bank published under Government Notification No. 835, dated 7th March 1882, at pages 160—166 of Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 9th idem:—

Page 162.—After note 1 to Rule 7, add the following Rules:—

7A.—It is the duty of the Secretary to refuse to open, and to close if it has been opened, any account which is not of the kind permitted under Clause II. of Rule I.—See also Clause XII.

7B.—These principles are further explained in the following rules:—

I.—Private Accounts.

(1.) Any private person may open one account, either in his own name or in the name of some other named person dependent upon him, whose relationship to him should be stated, as son, wife, nephew, ward, &c. In these cases no questions should be asked.

(2.) A wife may open an account notwithstanding that her husband already has one, if the money deposited is her own property.

(3.) A person who already has an account may open another or others on behalf of any named persons who are minors. Withdrawals from these accounts can be made only by the father or other legal guardian of the minor.

II.—Public Accounts.

7C.—Except at Presidency Towns,

(1.) Accounts may be opened by officers of Government who have charge of money as Secretaries or Managers of Dispensary, Church, School, Orphanage, Asylum, or Library funds, or any funds contributed for purposes other than the private advantage or amusement of the contributors. Race, racquet, billiard, mess, and similar funds, whose objects are of a private or personal nature, are not within this definition, and such accounts may not be admitted. Band funds may be admitted if there is no private Bank in the place.

(2.) Secretaries and Managers of Dispensary and similar funds (as abovementioned), if they are not officers of Government and the institution is not subject to Government control, can be allowed Savings Bank Accounts only if there is no respectable private Bank of deposit in the place.

(3.) Secretaries and Managers of Benevolent Funds (that is, funds formed by mutual subscription as an insurance against domestic misfortune) may be allowed accounts.

(4.) Officers of Government who collect subscriptions, voluntary or departmental, from their subordinates for departmental purposes, may be allowed accounts.

7D.—Public accounts of the kind specified in Rule 7C must be designated by a name indicating the object to which the money is devoted, as "A-pore Dispensary Fund," "Workmen's Sick Fund," &c. They are exempted from the rules limiting the amount of deposit within one year to Rs. 500 (provided the deposit is the *bonâ fide* income of the fund), and interest will be paid upon their full balance, notwithstanding that it exceeds Rs. 9-6 a month. But a reduction of balance by more than Rs. 3,000 within twelve consecutive months will not be permitted, unless the Secretary or Manager gives six months' notice of his intention to make additional withdrawals, such notice to specify the precise amount to be withdrawn.

7E.—No account may be allowed for money which—

- (1) is the property of Government, or
- (2) has been received for credit of Government, or
- (3) has been drawn from the Treasury for expenditure on account of Government, or
- (4) which is collected or received or held in trust, by any public officer or Court in accordance with any Law.

7F.—No account may be allowed for money which is raised by taxation, either Local or Municipal.

Officers of Local Funds constituted under Acts of Imperial or Local Councils may deposit in Savings Banks the Securities lodged with them by contractors or otherwise.

No transfer can be allowed of the balance of the account of a deceased depositor: it must be disposed of in the manner prescribed in Rule 31.
