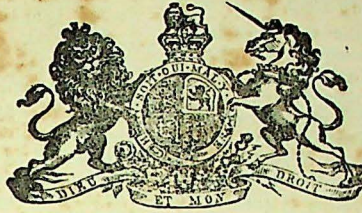

No. 3052.—His Excellency the Governor in Council considering that, in consequence of the conduct of the inhabitants of the village of Wahal in the Panvel Táluka of the Thána District, in connection with an affray that took place between them and the Police, it is expedient to direct the employment in the said village of Wahal of a Police Force in excess of the ordinary Force quartered in that part of the District, is pleased hereby to direct, in exercise of the powers conferred by Section 16 of the Bombay District Police Act, 1867, that an additional Police Force of the strength mentioned below be employed in the said village of Wahal for a period of one year, and that the cost thereof be defrayed by a local rate charged on the said village:—

## GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 20th May 1882.*

No. 1882.—Whereas a Notification was published at page 726 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I, dated 24th November 1881, and in the vernacular newspapers of the District, and in the Town of Bhusával and the village of Sátára in the Khándesh Collectorate, to the effect that His Excellency the Governor in Council believes it to be expedient to constitute the said town and village as a Municipal District under Bombay Act VI. of 1873; and whereas the objections that were sent by some of the inhabitants of the said town and that of the adjoining village of Sátára to the formation of the said town of Bhusával and said village of Sátára into a Municipal District are, in the opinion of His Excellency in Council, insufficient; it is hereby notified that the said town and said village shall be a Municipal District under clause 3 section 4 of the said Act, and shall be known as the Town Municipality of Bhusával, and all persons residing within the limits of the said Municipality shall be the inhabitants thereof within the meaning of the said Act.

2. The limits of the said Town Municipality of Bhusával shall be as follows:—

*North.*—The outer boundaries of Survey Nos. 69, 1, 3, 213, 214, 215, 216, 14, 110, 109, 15, 16, 19, 20, 22 and 23 of the village of Sátára.

*East.*—The outer boundaries of the villages of Kandari and Bhusával.

*South.*—The outer boundaries of Survey Nos. 8, 13, 16, 18, 22, 23, 26, 27, 25, 133, 132, 137, 185, 184, 182 and 192 of the village of Bhusával.

*West.*—The outer boundaries of Survey Nos. 203 and 202 of the village of Bhusával and Nos. 71 and 70 and 69 of the village of Sátára.

*Note.*—All land within these limits (with the exception of that now in the occupation of the G. I. P. Railway Company) is to be included within Municipal limits.

It is also notified that all the provisions of Chapter V. of Act VI. of 1873 with the exception of Sections Nos. 49 and 65 shall apply to the above Town Municipality of Bhusával.

## REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 18th May 1882.*

No. 3257.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 5 of the Indian Ports Act, 1875, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the sanction of the Governor General in Council, to extend the said Act to the undermentioned port:—

Name of Port.	Táluka and District.	Limits of the Port.
Waravra.	Táluka Ratnágiri, Zilla Ratnágiri.	<i>North.</i> —A post placed on the shore north of Tewri Point and opposite the village of Ril. <i>South.</i> —A post placed on the shore south of Tewri Point and on the boundary of villages of Malgund and Waravra. The port to comprise the whole coast line (including the Waravra creek as far as navigable and Tewri Point) between these two posts up to a distance of 50 yards above high water mark—east, and a mile out to sea beyond low water mark—west.

No. 3257A.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 45 of the Indian Ports Act, 1875, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to declare that the maximum amount of dues to be levied on vessels entering the port of Waravra shall be three annas per ton, and that dues shall be levied on vessels entering the said port in the cases and subject to the conditions, in and on which such dues would be leviable if the said port were one of the ports included in the southern group of ports in the Bombay Presidency enumerated in Part IV. of the First Schedule to the said Act.

No. 3257B.—Under Section 46 of the Indian Ports Act, 1875, the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the port-due to be levied on vessels entering the said port of Waravra shall be that at present levied at the ports comprised in the southern group, viz., two annas per ton for all sea-going vessels of ten tons burthen and upwards except fishing boats.

No. 3257C.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 46 of the Indian Ports Act, 1875, the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that no coasting vessel or coasting steamer, having paid port-dues at Waravra, shall be chargeable with

port-dues again within thirty days at any port included in the southern group of ports enumerated in Part IV., Schedule I., of the Indian Ports Act.

Resolution, Public Works Department, No. 410—42T., dated 14th November 1881.

RESOLUTION.—In the Resolution of the 14th of November 1881 it was stated that 'the Government of India is willing and anxious to forward any scheme for developing and facilitating communication by telegraph, so far as this can be done without risk to the interests of the general tax-paying community; but, in the interests of that community, it is essential that the telegraph service should be self-supporting.'

2. In accordance with this Resolution, the attention of the Government of India has been drawn—

I.—to the relation which the railway telegraphs should bear to the Imperial Telegraph System, in so far as they may be permitted to be the carriers of public messages; and

II.—to the economy that must result in the combination of the maintenance of the Government and railway telegraphs whenever practicable.

3. The State Railway Telegraph Rules of 1874 were designed—

Primarily.—To make the railway telegraph lines subsidiary and auxiliary to the Government Trunk System; and, as such, they were allowed to retain certain shares of the receipts, varying in proportion to the distances messages were carried.

Secondarily.—To provide for the construction and maintenance, by the Government Telegraph Department, of all telegraph lines and apparatus which might be required by the State Railways.

4. The experience of working these rules for over 7 years has shown that, however justly they were designed, on the principle of the division

of receipts varying in proportion to work, such differential division has, in practice, caused an amount of account-keeping not justified by the sums involved.

5. The Director General of Telegraphs has represented, that the shares of receipts in favour of railways under the above rules are out of all proportion to the work done, and has urged, therefore, that, in future, all telegrams should be regarded as appertaining to the Telegraph Department, on the principle in force in England, by which railway telegraphs act only as agents for the Government system, and receive merely a fixed commission for carrying each message.

6. The Governor General in Council, however, whilst admitting the force of the Director General's arguments and the equity of his proposals, is nevertheless desirous, in the interests of the senders of telegrams, that railways should be encouraged to carry public telegraphic messages to as great an extent as is compatible with the proper use of their telegraphs for the primary purpose of railway traffic; and has, therefore, decided, after duly considering the present revenue of the Government Telegraph Department, to waive the claims of the latter to a share of the receipts; in the anticipation that any loss thereof will be more than compensated for, by the effect of the additional facilities thus given to the public.

7. With this object, and also to simplify account-keeping, to ensure uniformity of procedure, and to develop telegraphic communication, it is resolved—

I—to extend to canal telegraphs also the privilege of carrying telegraphic messages for the general public;

II—that, in future, every railway or canal, or other duly licensed telegraph office, at which a message may be tendered for despatch, shall retain the value of the message it sends, excepting such amounts as have to be again disbursed under the rules, for instance, for reply paid, post registered messages, &c.;

III—that there shall be but one public telegraph message system throughout India, applicable to railway, canal or any other telegraphic system licensed to carry messages for the public; and

IV—to provide for economical maintenance, the principle enunciated in Resolution, Public Works Department, Nos. 125—28<sup>t</sup>. of the 4th March 1871, that the maintenance of Government and railway telegraphs should be combined and vested in the Telegraph Department whenever practicable, is re-affirmed, and is now extended to canal telegraphs.

8. The accompanying sets of rules, *viz.*,—

I—General Rules relating to the conduct of all Electric Telegraphs licensed under the Telegraph Act to transmit 'Paid messages' for the public,

II—Rules relating to the provision and maintenance of Electric Telegraphs for the use of railways and canals,

are therefore published, and are to come into force on the 1st of June 1882.

## I.

### *General Rules for the conduct of all Electric Telegraphs\* licensed under the Telegraph Act to transmit 'Paid messages' for the public.*

The Governor General in Council is pleased, under the provisions of Act I. of 1876, entitled an Act to amend the law relating to Telegraphs in India, to prescribe the following Rules for the conduct of all Electric Telegraphs, other than those appertaining to the Government Telegraph Department, established or maintained within British India by any Company or person licensed under the above Act to transmit 'Paid messages' for the public:—

1. The licensed telegraph authorities shall allow all officers, inspectors, artificers, workmen and others employed by the Government Telegraph Department in the construction or repair of the lines of telegraph within their boundaries to enter on their premises, and shall give such persons all reasonable facilities for travelling and for transporting material along the lines.
2. The instruments in the licensed offices shall be of a pattern approved of by the Government Telegraph Department.
3. The Government Telegraph Department may, at its own expense, connect any of its own offices by wire with any licensed Telegraph Office, and the licensed authorities shall afford every necessary facility for establishing and maintaining the connection, and for the interchange of messages thereby.
4. The signalling staff of each licensed Telegraph Office shall be wholly and exclusively controlled and paid by the licensed authorities, but shall be amenable to the penal clauses of the Telegraph Act, No. I. of 1876, in the same manner as if they were employes of the Government Telegraph Department.
5. The system adopted in the Government Telegraph Department in respect of instruments, forms connected with public messages, receipt, transmission and check of messages, alphabet and code signals, shall be adopted and strictly followed by every licensed Telegraph Office, so far as the Government Telegraph Department may require.
6. Inland messages, not relating to the business of the licensed authorities, shall, with due regard, in the case of Railways, to the necessities of their traffic, be received at any licensed Telegraph Office when open, under the following conditions:—
 

Government Telegraph officers allowed on railway premises.

Licensed offices to be connected with Government offices when desired.

Signalling staff of licensed Telegraph Offices to be controlled by Railway authorities, &c.

\* *N.B.*—For the purposes of these rules, telephones and their apparatus, are at present not included in the term 'Electric Telegraphs.'



(a).—They shall be transmitted to their destination by the quickest route, whether that be by Government or licensed Telegraph wires; and shall be received, charged for, despatched and delivered without undue delay, under the general rules and rates for inland telegrams, sanctioned by the Governor General in Council from time to time.

(b).—The fees paid for all inland messages shall be retained by the Administration receiving them, except in the cases of deposits for 'Prepaid Replies,' 'Postage,' 'Registration,' and 'Express charges,' the amounts of which will be credited in account by the Government Telegraph Check Office to the Paying Office, and debited to the Receiving Office.

(c).—The Telegraph Offices of any intermediate or terminal Railway, Canal or other Administration will be bound to forward or deliver messages passing on to its wires free of charge, except what may be due to it under (b).

7. Foreign messages may be accepted by licensed Telegraph Offices specially authorized to receive them, and must be received, charged for and despatched, under the Rules and Rates for Foreign Telegrams, sanctioned by the International Telegraph Convention and in force for the time being. For the transmission of foreign messages, except in the case of those for Ceylon and Upper Burmah, licensed Telegraph Offices will be credited in account by the Government Telegraph Check Office with the sum of two annas a word, and debited with the full charge of the message. In the case of messages for Ceylon and Upper Burmah, the licensed Telegraph Office share will be half an anna per word.

8. Inland or foreign messages tendered for transmission at a licensed Telegraph Office, may be paid for either in cash or by affixing Government telegraph stamps, at the option of the sender:—

(a).—Messages received at a licensed Telegraph Office by post from a place where there is no Telegraph Office may be paid for by postage stamps.

(b).—Whenever telegraph or postage stamps may be used for the payment of messages, the Office receiving them will be credited in account by the Government Telegraph Check Office.

9. Drafts and copies of any messages, not on the business of the licensed authorities, received at, or transmitted from, any of their Offices, shall be forwarded post-paid to the Government Telegraph Check Office if demanded, under instructions which shall be issued by the Director General of Telegraphs in India.

10. Complaints respecting messages and applications for refunds should be addressed to the Government Telegraph Check Office, Calcutta.

11. To admit of the investigation of complaints, the licensed authorities are to provide for the preservation of all message drafts for a period of six months, at the expiration of which term, unless previously demanded under Rule 9, they must be transmitted, post-paid, to the Government Telegraph Check Office, Calcutta. They may, however, be sent to the Check Office immediately after audit of the accounts of the Telegraph Office concerned.

12. Messages on the service of the Government Telegraph Department shall be transmitted without charge, to or from all licensed Telegraph Offices.

13. Private and State messages shall, as a rule, be sent as directed in the Rules and Rates for Inland Telegrams; but a State message marked 'clear the line' or 'precedence' shall take precedence of all other messages: Provided that if sent by any Railway Telegraph Office, its transmission shall be consistent with the safe working of the railway traffic.

14. The Director General of Telegraphs in India, or any officer deputed by him, may at any time inspect any licensed Telegraph Office, or messages sent from, or received at, any of them; and the licensed authorities shall give all facilities for such inspections; and shall submit for inspection any books or accounts connected with the working of their telegraphs, or any originals or copies of messages sent or received, which the Director General or such officer may require.

## II.

### *Rules relating to the provision and maintenance of Electric Telegraphs for the use of Railways and Canals.*

1. These rules are applicable to all railways and canals which are the property of the Government of India, and to such other railway, canal or telegraphic systems as the Governor General in Council may order to be governed by them.

2. The construction, maintenance and repair of the lines shall be vested in the Government Telegraph Department, the officers of which shall be permitted to erect and maintain posts and wires, and other appurtenances of a telegraph, within the railway or canal, fences or other boundaries, to such an extent as, under the orders of the Director General of Telegraphs, may be required.

### PART I.

#### Notification.

##### GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 29th May 1882.*

No. 1975.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council; they will take effect from the 29th May 1882 in the Ports of Bombay, Aden and Karáchi as a temporary measure :—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Sumatra shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the port shall go alongside the vessel and, if communication with the shore is desired, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage, duly appointed and notified in that behalf, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour. If communication with the shore is not required the vessel shall not enter the inner harbour, and no communication in any way shall be allowed with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any vessel or boat in the harbour.

- IV.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.
- V.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the local officers as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VI.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles, as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- VIII.—All vessels arriving at Bombay, Aden and Karáchi which may have communicated with vessels coming from Sumatra shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Bombay, Aden and Karáchi from Sumatra.
- IX.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed, should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
