- (1) soldiers, sailors, or non-commissioned or petty officers;
- (2) or persons in needy circumstances, in whose favour Chaplains may exercise the discretionary power vested in them by Rule IX of the Ecclesiastical Fee Rules published on the 29th September 1869, and may grant exemption from the payment of fees under Rule IV. of those rules.

No. 331.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 21 of the Cantonments Act, 1880, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to impose from the first of October next the following taxes in the Cantonment of Ahmednagar:—

#### I.—Property-Rates.

(1) A consolidated rate of 3½ per centum of the annual rent of houses, buildings and lands for the following purposes (namely):—

(a) 1½ per centum for general purposes and for the protection from fire of those parts of the Cantonment which are not so protected by regimental or other special arrangements.

(b) One per centum towards defraying the cost of maintenance of the police force of the Cantonment; and



(c) One per centum for the purpose of lighting.

(8) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for storing or selling firewood in logs or billets, hay, grass, straw, coal, coke, ashes or other combustible material, a fee of

Not less than Rs. 5 nor more than Rs. 15 as the Cantonment Magistrate shall in his discretion determine for each place licensed.

(9) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for the sale of firewood in sticks or bundles, a fee of

One rupee.

(10) For every license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for hawking within the Cantonment for a year, or any portion of a year, a fee of

One rupee.

(11) For every license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for blasting within the Cantonment, a fee of

(12) For every license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the playing of a band or for going in procession along the public road in the Cantonment, a fee of

(13) For every license or permission given by the Cantonment Magistrate for the setting up of any booth or platform or for placing benches on a public road, lane or street in the Cantonment for the purposes of marriage, or other ceremonies, a fee of

8 annas per yard of frontage per diem.

(14) For every license or permission given by the Cantonment Magistrate for the depositing of building materials or the erection of scaffolding upon or in any public road, lane, or street in the Cantonment, a fee of

4 annas per yard of frontage per diem.



No. 332.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 22 of the Cantonments Act, 1880, and with reference to the last preceding Notification imposing certain taxes in the Cantonment of Ahmednagar the Governor in Council is pleased to apply to the said Cantonment the provisions of the enactments and rules specified in the first column of the Schedule hereto annexed, for the assessment and recovery of the said taxes, in the adapted form set forth in the second column of the said Schedule.

The said provisions, as so adapted, may be cited as "The Ahmednagar Cantonment Taxation Regulations."

The estimated gross annual rent at which the houses, buildings, and lands liable to property-rates might reasonably be expected to let from year to year shall, for the purposes of the said rates, be held and deemed to be the annual value of such houses, buildings, and lands. The value of a house or building so estimated shall not include the value of any machinery contained therein.</p> <p>2. The said rates shall be leviable from the actual occupier of the house, building or land upon which they are assessed if the said occupier be himself the landlord of such house, building or land, or if he hold the same immediately from Government. In any other case the said rates shall be leviable from the immediate landlord of the actual occupier, or, when the property is unoccupied, from the person who would be the immediate landlord of the occupier if it were occupied:</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Provided that if any person hereby made liable to the said rates himself pays rent to another person other than Government in respect of his interest in the house, building or land for which he is assessed to such rates, he shall be entitled to credit in account with such other person for such sum as would be leviable on account of the said rates if the amount of the rent payable by him were the full annual value of the property taxed.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Person liable to payment of property-rates entitled to credit or proportionate amount of such rates, if he himself pays rent to another person.</p> <p style="padding-left: 40px;">Credit to be allowed by all superior holders for proportionate amount of property-rates on the rents receivable by them.</p> <p>And any person other than Government possessing any interest in or over any such property superior to that of the person assessed to the said rates in respect of which he receives rent from any other person, shall be bound to give credit in account to such other person for such sum as would be leviable on account of the said rates if the rent which he receives were the full annual value of the property assessed.</p> <p>But nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect any agreement into which persons interested in any such property have entered, or may hereafter enter, concerning their respective liability on account of the aforesaid rates, and when any person other than the person hereby made liable for the said rates has by any such agreement rendered himself responsible for the same, or for any portion thereof, the person hereby made liable shall be entitled to recover the amount of the said rates or such portion thereof from the said person.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><i>Saving of express contracts.</i></p>

3. For the purpose of assessing the rates aforesaid the Cantonment Magistrate shall from year to year make a valuation of all houses, buildings and lands liable to the said rates, and cause the amount thereof to be entered in a book to be kept in the office of the Cantonment Magistrate, and to be called "The Assessment Book," wherein shall also be written in such form as the Cantonment Magistrate shall direct,—

- (1) the name of the person liable to payment of the rates aforesaid,
- (2) a designation of the property, either by name or number, sufficient to identify the same,
- (3) the name of the street or district in which such property is situate, and
- (4) the amount of the rates assessed thereon.

For the year 1882-83 the valuation made by a Special Committee in the year 1880 under the orders of the Military Department shall be deemed to have been made by the Cantonment Magistrate under this section.

4. When the name of the person liable to payment of the rates aforesaid cannot be ascertained, it shall be sufficient to designate him in the Assessment Book, and also in any notice or other proceeding under these Regulations, as "the landlord" or "the occupier" of the property on which the rates are assessed without further description.

When in any such case any person in occupation of any house, building or land shall refuse to give such information as may be necessary for determining who is liable to payment of the said rates, such person shall himself be liable, until such information is obtained, for all the said rates leviable on such house, building, or land.

5. In order to enable the Cantonment Magistrate to arrive at a fair valuation of any houses, buildings, or lands liable to the said rates, it shall be lawful for the Cantonment Magistrate to require the owner or occupier of such houses, buildings, or lands, to furnish him with returns of the measurements and of the rent or annual value thereof, and for the like purpose it shall be lawful for the Cantonment Magistrate, or any person or persons, appointed by him for that purpose, at any time between 5 A.M. and 7 P.M., to enter and inspect and measure such houses, buildings, or lands after having given forty-eight hours' previous notice in writing of his intention to the occupier thereof.

Whoever refuses or fails to furnish any of the returns specified in the preceding clause for the space of one week from the day on which he shall have been required so to do, shall be liable on conviction before a Magistrate to the penalty provided in section 176 of the Indian Penal Code for omitting to furnish information required by law; and whoever knowingly makes a false or incorrect return

Whereas it is provided by Act No. XV. of 1882, s. 23, that the portions of the Code of Civil Procedure specified in the second schedule thereto annexed shall extend, and shall, so far as the same may, in the judgment of the Court, be applicable, be applied to the Small Cause Court; and the procedure prescribed thereby shall be the procedure followed in the Court in all suits cognizable by it, except where such procedure is inconsistent with the procedure prescribed by any specific provisions of that Act; Provided that the Court may, subject to the control of the Local Government, from time to time, by notification in the official Gazette, declare that any of the said portions of the said Code shall not extend and be applied to the Small Cause Court, or that any of such portions shall so extend and be applied with such modifications as the Court, subject to the control aforesaid, may think fit. And whereas the Government of Bombay did by a Resolution in the Judicial Department, No. 2581 of 1882, dated 24th April 1882, approve the proposal to them theretofore made by the Judges of the Court of Small Causes of Bombay that those portions of the said Code specified in the second schedule to the said Act should be applied to suits for sums not exceeding Rs. 1,000 with the omissions and modifications hereinafter specified; now we, the Judges of the Court of Small Causes of Bombay, under and by virtue of the power by the said 23rd section of the said Act XV. of 1882 so reserved to us under such control as aforesaid, and with such approval of the said Government as aforesaid, do hereby notify that from and after the coming into operation of the said Act XV. of 1882 on the 1st day of July 1882, in all suits in the Court of Small Causes of Bombay for the recovery of any sum not exceeding Rs. 1,000, the portions of the Civil Procedure Code specified in the second schedule to the said Act XV. of 1882 shall be applied with the omissions and modifications following, that is to say:—

### PART I.

#### Notification.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 16th June 1882.*

No. 2240.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council; they will take effect from the 16th June 1882 in the Ports of Bombay, Aden and Karachi as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Batavia shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the port shall go alongside the vessel and, if communication with the shore is desired, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage, duly appointed and notified in that behalf, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour. If communication with the shore is not required the vessel shall not enter the inner harbour, and no communication in any way shall be allowed with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any vessel or boat in the harbour.



- IV.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.
- V.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the local officers as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.
- VI.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- VIII.—All vessels arriving at Bombay, Aden and Karachi which may have communicated with vessels coming from Batavia shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Bombay, Aden and Karachi from Batavia.
- IX.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
