Read the following :—

No. 182, dated 10th May 1882.

From—J. G. FERRAND, Esq., Superintendent of Stationery, Madras,

To—The Chief Secretary to the Government of Madras.

In forwarding the enclosed report from the Committee for Examining Inks, I beg to add, first, that G. D. Iyah Pillai, whose tender for black ink is recommended for acceptance, is the well-known Madras Ink-maker referred to in the correspondence noted in the margin.

2. As regards price, his rate is 6 annas per dozen papers. The last invoice price of the ink-

powders received from England is 1s. 1d. per dozen. Amrita Lall Roy of Calcutta, whose ink forms the subject of the Proceedings of the Government of India, communicated in Madras Government Proceedings, 28th ultimo, No. 344, just received, is one of the tenderers to supply Madras with black ink, and he offers to do so at 8 annas 3 pies per dozen papers. Iyah Pillai's ink is preferred by the Committee to his. The Calcutta price of his ink in bottle, as stated in the Proceedings of Government of India above referred to, is Rs. 2 per dozen quarts. A dozen powders produce six quarts, and the cost of a dozen quarts of Iyah Pillai's ink, exclusive of bottles, will be 12 annas.

Report from (Major E. A. BRUCE, Deputy Assistant Commissary General; C. D. MACLEANE, Esq., Acting Sub-Secretary to the Board of Revenue; Surgeon T. K. ROGERS, M.B., F.R.C.S., Chemical Examiner; E. M. PALMER, Esq., Assistant Accountant General; and J. G. FERRAND, Esq., Superintendent of Stationery) the Committee for Examining Inks, to the Chief Secretary to the Government of Madras, —dated 10th May 1882.

With reference to G. O., 31st October 1881, No. 2100, we beg to report that the following tenders were opened, at the Stationery Office on 15th February last, for the supply of black and red inks of Indian manufacture:—

2. Narasimooloo Chetty and Theagaroya Moodelly, who alone tendered for red ink, made each a pint of his ink in our presence. The former acknowledged his powder to be fuchsine, and the latter his to be ponceau. There was thus really no tender for red ink of Indian manufacture.

3. The samples of black ink furnished with the above tenders were tried by us and tested by Dr. Rogers, Chemical Examiner, whose report on these and on the inks specified in the

margin is herewith forwarded. Dr. Rogers also laid before the Com-

mittee specimens of writing executed with the various inks, which had been submitted to a considerable number of tests, showing how they had borne them. We beg to recommend the acceptance of the tender of G. D. Iyah Pillai, whose we consider to be on the whole the best of the inks tendered; and we do not think that an ink inferior to this should be supplied to public offices.

As requested at the last meeting of the Committee, I have the honour to submit a brief abstract of the conclusions arrived at from the results of the various tests and trials which were for the most part shown to the Committee.

2. The two inks tendered in solution were both of excellent quality, but 'Waldie's Black Writing Ink' was superior to 'Morrell's Registration Ink.'

3. The seven samples of inks tendered in powder are decidedly inferior in quality to 'Morrell's' ink.

The results obtained with Iyah Pillai's ink were in every respect slightly superior to those obtained from the other six samples.

And Iyah Pillai's ink keeps much better than the other six samples, which grow mouldy after a very brief exposure.

Order thereon by the Government of Madras.

The Government sanction the acceptance of Iyah Pillai's tender for the supply of black ink. It is noted that there was no tender for red ink of Indian manufacture, the samples produced being merely fuchsine and ponceau powders.

## GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 16th June 1882.*

No. 2240.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council; they will take effect from the 16th June 1882 in the Ports of Bombay, Aden and Karáchi as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Batavia shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the port shall go alongside the vessel and, if communication with the shore is desired, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage, duly appointed and notified in that behalf, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour, and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour. If communication with the shore is not required the vessel shall not enter the inner harbour, and no communication in any way shall be allowed with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any vessel or boat in the harbour.
- IV.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.
- V.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the local officers as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

- VI.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.
- VII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.
- VIII.—All vessels arriving at Bombay, Aden and Karachi which may have communicated with vessels coming from Batavia shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Bombay, Aden and Karachi from Batavia.
- IX.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.

BOMBAY.

Whereas it is provided by Act No. XV. of 1882, s. 23, that the portions of the Code of Civil Procedure specified in the second schedule thereto annexed shall extend, and shall, so far as the same may, in the judgment of the Court, be applicable, be applied to the Small Cause Court; and the procedure prescribed thereby shall be the procedure followed in the Court in all suits cognizable by it, except where such procedure is inconsistent with the procedure prescribed by any specific provisions of that Act: Provided that the Court may, subject to the control of the Local Government, from time to time, by notification in the official Gazette, declare that any of the said portions of the said Code shall not extend and be applied to the Small Cause Court, or that any of such portions shall so extend and be applied with such modifications as the Court, subject to the control aforesaid, may think fit. And whereas the Government of Bombay did by a Resolution in the Judicial Department, No. 2581 of 1882, dated 24th April 1882, approve the proposal to them theretofore made by the Judges of the Court of Small Causes of Bombay that those portions of the said Code specified in the second schedule to the said Act should be applied to suits for sums not exceeding Rs. 1,000 with the omissions and modifications hereinafter specified; now we, the Judges of the Court of Small Causes of Bombay, under and by virtue of the power by the said 23rd section of the said Act XV. of 1882 so reserved to us under such control as aforesaid, and with such approval of the said Government as aforesaid, do hereby notify that from and after the coming into operation of the said Act XV. of 1882 on the 1st day of July 1882, in all suits in the Court of Small Causes of Bombay for the recovery of any sum not exceeding Rs. 1,000, the portions of the Civil Procedure Code specified in the second schedule to the said Act XV. of 1882 shall be applied with the omissions and modifications following, that is to say:—
