NOTIFICATIONS.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 15th July 1882.

No. 2659.—The following revised order by the Government of India in the Home Department is published for general information in modification of the order of the same number and date published in Government Notification No. 4041, dated 29th November 1881, at page 758 of Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 8th December 1881:—

“No. 163.

Extract from the Proceeding of the Government of India in the Home Department (Municipalities), under date Simla, the 18th November 1881.

Read—

Section 24 of Act III of 1880 (The Cantonments Act, 1880).

ORDER.

In exercise of the power conferred by Section 24 of Act III. of 1880 (The Cantonments Act,

1880), the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that, in any cantonment situated in British India which may have been, or may in future be, brought under the operation of a Municipal Act, the following classes of persons shall, when on duty in such cantonment, be exempted from the operation of taxes of the following kinds:—

Persons exempted.

All persons exclusively in military employ or belonging to any department directly attached to the Army or to the Public Works Department, Military Branch, being persons subject to the Army Discipline and Regulation Act, 1879, or the Indian Articles of War.

Taxes from the operation of which exemption is granted.

- (1) Municipal taxes on salaries.
- (2) Municipal taxes on professions, trades, callings, offices, or appointments.
- (3) Municipal taxes on horses, mules, or ponies kept for military duty.

(4) Municipal tolls leviable on any ferry or road in respect of animals or vehicles kept or used for military duty.

2. In further exercise of the power conferred by the same section, the Governor General in Council is pleased to prohibit the levy, in any cantonment in British India, of any municipal tax whatsoever on public property, such as animals or vehicles.

3. In this Order the expressions 'municipal tax,' 'municipal taxes,' and 'municipal tolls' include any tax or toll imposed by virtue of the provisions of a Municipal Act under the operation of which any cantonment may have been, or may in future be, brought.

1. The Natural History of Commercial Fishes of Great Britain, with especial reference to such parts of their Natural History as bear upon their production and commercial use.
2. Relations of the State with Fishermen and Fisheries, including all matters dealing with their protection, regulation, &c.
3. On the possible increase of the supply of Fish, and on improved facilities for their economic transmission and distribution.

CONFERENCES ARE PROPOSED TO BE HELD FOR THE PURPOSE OF READING AND DISCUSSING PAPERS ON SUBJECTS CONNECTED WITH THE EXHIBITION.

REGULATIONS.

THE GREAT INTERNATIONAL FISHERIES EXHIBITION.

LONDON, 1883.

- Royal Patronage. 1.—A Great International Fisheries Exhibition, under the patronage of Her Majesty the Queen and the Presidency of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, will be held in London in 1883.
- Date. 2.—The Exhibition will be opened on the 1st of May, and continue open for a period of not less than six months.
- Objects. 3.—The principal objects to be admitted are comprised in the annexed Classification, which is intended to include all kinds of specimens of fish life, and to illustrate all the modes by which the MARINE and FRESH WATER animals of economic value are captured and utilised, together with the commercial, scientific, social, historic and legislative aspects of such fisheries.
- Rewards. 4.—Medals in Gold, Silver, and Bronze, and diplomas of Honour, will be awarded by a Jury, the composition of which will be settled later.
- All expenses to be borne by Exhibitors. 5.—No charge will be made for space, but Exhibitors will have to pay every expense of transit, delivery, fixing, and removing their exhibits, and they must, either personally or by their Agents, superintend the reception and installation, and at the close of the Exhibition, the removal of their goods; in default thereof, the Committee reserves to itself the right of doing whatever may be considered necessary, and at the expense of the Exhibitor.
- Applications. 6.—Applications for admission must be made on printed forms, which will be supplied on application; these are to be sent to the General Secretary in London on or before the 1st July, 1882, except under special arrangements or concessions.
- Allotment. 7.—The General Secretary will, before the 1st October, 1882, or as soon after as practicable, notify to applicants the decision of the Committee, and will indicate the space, if any, which has been accorded to them, and give to each a number.
- Loan Department. 8.—Contributors to the Loan Department are requested to communicate with the Secretary, who will supply forms to be filled up by them.
- Foreign Countries. 9.—The Foreign Correspondents that may be appointed are invited to enter as soon as possible into communication with the General Secretary. The Correspondent will be charged with the consideration of all questions relative to the distribution of the space allotted to his country. The Committee will therefore not correspond directly with foreign Exhibitors, except in those countries where no Correspondent is appointed.
- Foreign Countries. 10.—The Committee will place at the disposal of Foreign Correspondents all information and plans that may be useful for their arrangements.
- Foreign Countries. 11.—The applicants for space from countries in which no Correspondent has been appointed will correspond directly with the General Secretary of the Committee.
- Railway Rates. 12.—The Committee will endeavour to obtain, from the various English Railway Companies, special terms for the conveyance of exhibits to and from the Exhibition, and should they succeed in doing so, such arrangements will be communicated to intending Exhibitors.

N.B.—With reference to Rule "6" an Extension of Time till September 1st, 1882, will be granted to distant Colonies and Countries.

- Railways, etc. 13. The Committee will not interfere in any way between the Railway Companies, the Carriers and the Exhibitors, with reference to the despatch, transmission, reception, management or return of goods exhibited.
- Marks on Packages. 14. All packages containing goods intended for exhibition must have painted on them the distinctive mark (I.F.E.), in red paint, and they must also have painted on them the name and number of the Exhibitor.
- Waybills. 15. The waybill accompanying all packages must contain the name of the Exhibitor, his number and address.
- Exhibitors or Agents to Receive own Goods, etc. 16. Each Exhibitor must provide, either personally or through an Agent, for the despatch, transmission, reception, unpacking, and arrangement of his goods, and for the verification of their contents when unpacked. If neither the Exhibitor nor his Agent be present to receive the packages on arrival at the Exhibition the Carrier will be directed to take them away; but should any goods be deposited in the Exhibition premises during the absence of the Exhibitor or his Agent, the Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage from whatsoever cause arising.
- Foreign Packages. 17. Packages from Foreign Countries must likewise have painted on them in distinctive marks the letters (I.F.E.), in red paint. They must be addressed to the Exhibitor himself or his Agent. They must all be marked in such a way as to show distinctly from whence they come, the name of the country and the number of the Exhibitor being painted legibly thereon.
- Passages. 18. EXHIBITION SPACES.—The space granted to an Exhibitor within the Building is available for floor space exclusive of the passages for the public.
- Show Cases. 19. SHOW CASES.—No particular form or design is prescribed for cases, counters, platforms, &c., but they must not exceed the following heights without the special written permission of the Committee :—

- Railings. 20.—Exhibitors may place Railings of a uniform height of 2 feet 6 inches above the floor level. In every instance the railings must be within the area of the "stand," i.e., the space allotted.
- Floors. 21.—The flooring must not be altered, removed or strengthened for the convenience of arrangement, except by sanction of the Committee, and at the expense of the Exhibitor.
- No Obstructions. 22.—No Exhibitor will be permitted to display exhibits in such a manner as to obstruct the light or vistas through the avenues, or to occasion inconvenience, injury, or otherwise disadvantageously affect the display of other Exhibitors.
- Decorations. 23.—DECORATIONS.—In order to ensure uniformity of decoration and general good effect, no Exhibitor will be allowed to put up any flags, banners or other kind of decoration without permission.
- Signs. 24.—SIGNS.—No sign or name-board may be placed otherwise than parallel with the main passages, that is, parallel with the frontage of the respective stands, and should be as near to the back of the space as possible, so as not to interfere with the vista. The signs to be black and gold. All signs must be hung subject to the approval of the Director.
- Placards. 25.—No printed or written bills may be displayed unless they are neat in design.
- Exhibitors' Offices. 26.—OFFICES.—Any Exhibitor who may obtain permission to erect an office on his allotted space must conform to the following rules :—
- The office must not exceed 8 feet in height; must be placed at the back of the stand, unless otherwise sanctioned; and must be painted black and varnished, with gilt beadings.
- Empty Cases, immediate removal. 27.—The spaces outside the allotments for Exhibitors being required for the necessities of circulation, packages and empty cases will not be allowed to remain there. Cases must be unpacked as fast as received, and the empty cases taken away by the Exhibitors or their Agents. The Committee decline to accept any responsibility with reference to empty cases, which must be at once removed from the building at the expense of Exhibitors.
- Empty Cases. 28.—The Committee will have nothing whatever to do with warehousing or the preservation of empty cases, or reserve any space for the purpose.
- Exhibitors to keep Stands clean. 29.—Exhibitors will be required to provide all necessary attendance and to keep their stands and exhibits properly cleaned and in good order, during the whole period of the Exhibition.
- Non-transfer. 30.—No Exhibitor will be allowed to transfer any allotment, or to allow any other than his own duly admitted exhibits to be placed thereon, except by permission of the Committee.

- Exhibitor's Name. 31.—All goods exhibited must be in the name of the person who signed the application form.
- Selling Price. 32.—Exhibitors, being traders, are requested to mark the selling price of the articles exhibited complete, so as to facilitate the judgment of the Jury, as well as for the information of visitors.
- Non-removal and Perishable Articles. 33.—Objects sold cannot be taken away before the close of the Exhibition, without the special permission of the Committee. Special arrangements will be made with regard to perishable exhibits.
- Water, Gas, or Steam Machinery in motion. 34.—Exhibitors of apparatus requiring the use of water, gas or steam, must state on applying for admission the quantity of water, gas or steam which they may consider necessary. Those who wish to show machinery in motion must state the rate of speed at which the machine is to be driven. The furnishing of all counter shafting, pulleys, gas, water, steam, &c., must be at the entire expense of the Exhibitor, but under the direct control of the Committee or their appointed officer.
- Dangerous Substances. 35.—All fulminating and explosive substances and all dangerous substances are absolutely forbidden to be sent.
- Receipts. 36.—Spirits, alcohol, oils, essences, corrosive substances, and generally all substances which might spoil other articles or inconvenience the public, can only be received in solid and suitable vessels of small size.
- Catalogue. 37.—The Committee reserve the sole right of compiling a catalogue of the exhibits under regulations which will be duly notified. Each nation will, however, have the right to produce at its own expense, but in its own language only, a catalogue of all the objects in its own Section.
- Hand-bills. 38.—All hand-bills, printed matter, &c., for gratuitous distribution, connected with exhibits, will be under special regulations, and must first receive the approval and permission of the Committee, or the Director, which may be withdrawn at any time.
- No Photographs, etc. 39.—No article exhibited may be photographed, drawn, copied or reproduced, in any manner whatsoever, without the special sanction of the Committee.
- Non-liability for Loss or Damage. 40.—The Committee will not hold itself responsible for any loss or damage occurring to any exhibit from any cause whatsoever, but while declining any responsibility it is the intention of the Committee to take such precautions as they deem necessary.
- Future Arrangement as to Date of Reception and Jury. 41.—Future regulations will settle in due time the arrangements for the date of reception, location of goods, tickets of admission for Exhibitors and assistants, and the formation and working of the Jury.
- Right to alter Rules. 42.—The right to add to, alter, amend or expunge, any of these Rules is reserved by the Committee.
- All Rules binding. 43.—Both Englishmen and Foreigners in becoming Exhibitors declare by so doing their compliance with the whole of these Regulations, together with such other Regulations as the Committee may issue from time to time.
- 44.—The Committee reserve the right to remove the objects belonging to any Exhibitor who shall not conform to the Regulations.
- Non-liability for Accidents. 45.—If any damage or injury shall be caused or occasioned during the Exhibition by any exhibited machine, implement, or article to any visitor or other person, or to any officer, servant, or others then and there employed by the Committee of the Great International Fisheries Exhibition, 1883, then the Exhibitor to whom such machinery, implement, or article may belong shall indemnify and hold harmless the said Committee from and against all actions, suits, expenses, and claims on account or in respect of any such damage or injury which may be so caused or occasioned.

No. 2670.—In accordance with Rule VIII. of the Notification by the Government of India in the Department of Finance and Commerce, No. 3745, dated the 8th November 1879, republished in the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 13th idem under No. 3972, dated the 12th idem, Financial Department, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following application from the Municipality of Ahmedabad in the Collectorate of Ahmedabad for permission to raise a loan of Rs. 1,20,000 in the market under the provisions of the Local Authorities Loan Act XI. of 1879 :—

SIR,—At the Quarterly General Meeting of the Ahmedabad City Municipality held on the 5th October last, the construction of an arterial road through the City to the Ahmedabad Railway Station was sanctioned; and at the next Quarterly General Meeting held on the 11th instant, the Municipality passed a Resolution that a loan of Rs. 1,20,000 be raised for the completion of this road.

2. When the work was projected there was a balance of about two lakhs in hand, of which about a lakh and three quarters has been disbursed in payment of compensation for several houses which stood on the line and which have already been purchased.

3. Government have sanctioned the purchase of the remaining houses, &c., and this, together with the cost of construction, will require about a lakh and seventy-five thousand more. Twenty-five thousand we have in hand at present, thirty thousand we hope to realize by the sale of surplus land beyond the road line and of the materials of the buildings bought up, and the remaining lakh and twenty thousand we propose to make up by the loan aforesaid.

Government Resolution No. 7040,

4. We have now the honour to request that you will be so good as to obtain the sanction of Government to our going into the market to raise this sum at a rate of interest not exceeding Rs. 5 per cent. on the security of our revenue.

5. The Fund on the security of which we propose to borrow is that raised by us under the Bombay District Municipal Act VI. of 1873.

6. The loan is required at once as we desire to complete the work without delay and get return for expenditure incurred. We have already received offers for portions of the loan, and we apprehend no difficulty whatever in obtaining the whole of the amount needed within a month of the date of Government sanction.

7. We propose repaying the loan in 20 equal half-yearly instalments amounting at 5 per cent. per annum to Rs. 7,697-10-0 half-yearly, on 10th January and 10th July of each year, commencing on 10th January 1883.

8. The yearly proceeds of the Fund averaged for the last three years as under—

An increase in rents from markets of some Rs. 2,000 is estimated on the completion of a grain market from 1st July next.

9. In addition to the above we realize Rs. 42,000 from the Conservancy Cess. This we manage as a separate branch of the Municipality, and in the improvements we have now under contemplation in this Department, we propose raising a small loan on the security thereof, the repayment of which would be provided for by increase of cess and decrease of expenditure in Conservancy Department.

10. We beg to append a statement showing the entire expenditure of the Ahmedabad City Municipality in each of the three last preceding years.

11. We have no lien on our Fund of any kind, but in the adjustment of the accounts connected with the City Survey Department we have become liable to Government to the extent of Rs. 81,470-14-3, which we have offered to liquidate at the rate of Rs. 10,000 per annum. This, however, need not upset the calculation as there is a saving to the extent of that amount nearly in the Establishment charges consequent on the abolition of the offices lately presided over by Mr. Waite and the two enquiry officers, and this will enable us to meet the liability.

12. We propose issuing debentures for sums not less than one thousand rupees if the loan is sanctioned.

No. 2339.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 49 of the Native Passenger Ships Act, VIII. of 1876, the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that every ship to which the Act applies performing a voyage either between a port on the west coast of India and a port in the Red Sea, or between Aden and any port on the east coast of Africa, south of 10° north, whether the ship touches at any intermediate port or not, shall, in the event of the ship being propelled by sails, contain in the between decks not less than 12 superficial feet and 72 cubic feet of space for every passenger, and shall, in the event of the ship being propelled by steam, or partly by steam and partly by sails, contain in the between decks not less than 9 superficial feet and 54 cubic feet of space for every passenger.

No. 2288.—*ORDER*—By the Government of India, Department of Finance and Commerce.

Read the following :—

No. 470, dated 20th April 1882.

Resolution—By the Government of India, Department of Finance and Commerce.

The Governor General in Council has resolved to publish with the annual Finance and Revenue Accounts of the Government of India a statement showing the receipts and expenditure of all Municipalities, as well as of all Excluded Local Funds which are on the books of the Accountants General, in order that a complete account of the whole income and expenditure connected with the administration of the country may be readily available from one source.

2. This statement will not form an integral part of the combined accounts of the Empire under the three heads of ‘Imperial,’ ‘Provincial,’ and ‘Local,’ as they have been hitherto prepared, but will only be in the nature of an appendix intended to supplement the information contained in the Accounts; and the responsibility for the correctness of the Statement will lie with the local authorities entrusted with the management of the Municipal and other Funds in question.

3. The accounts of Municipalities will be in the form given in the appendix to this Resolution, and there will be no difficulty in preparing them, as, under instructions from Her Majesty’s Secretary of State, the Municipalities have already to furnish to the Local Governments almost the same information for submission to the Government of India in the Home Department. All these Accounts are now made up for the official year, except only those for Municipalities of Calcutta and Bombay, and the Corporations of these cities have been requested to conform to the general practice.

4. The Local Governments will consolidate these accounts into one statement for each province, and transmit it direct to the Comptroller General, so as to reach him not later than the 30th November of the year succeeding that to which they relate, for inclusion in the Finance and Revenue Accounts of the year.

5. The Comptroller General will issue further appropriate instructions to the several Accountants General for the submission of statements of the Excluded Local Funds, which should contain sufficient details of the sources of income of each Fund and of the character of the expenditure incurred therefrom.

6. The accounts of Municipalities and of the Excluded Local Funds will be collected together in one statement, to be called 2 (b), which will be inserted in its proper place in the Finance and Revenue Accounts.

7. The Comptroller General will also prepare a statement, to be called 2 (c), showing in detail for each Province the distribution of the revenue and expenditure at present included in the General Accounts under the three heads ‘Imperial,’ ‘Provincial,’ and ‘Local’ on the lines of No. III of the statements published with the Financial Statement of the Government of India.

8. The Governor General in Council desires that Local Governments will take immediate measures for the submission of the statements for the year 1881-82, in order that they may appear in the Finance and Revenue Accounts of that year.

9. The Municipal Budget Estimates, which are at present submitted to the Government of India in the Department of Finance, will be no longer required.

Ordered, that this Resolution be communicated to the Home Department for information, and to the several Local Governments and Administrations, and to the Comptroller General for information and for the issue of further necessary orders.

ORDERED, that the foregoing be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

“No. 2301.—The following Addenda and Corrigenda to the Codes of the Financial Department are published for general information:—

CIVIL PENSION CODE.

Page 3.

Section 7.

Substitute the following for the first sentence of the Section:—

‘The Rules in Sections 8 and 9 apply to Officers transferred on or after the 14th October 1871 from qualifying service to Foreign service, and, as regards the rates of contribution, have effect from the 10th June 1882.’†

Section 8 (a).

Substitute the following for the Section:—

8. (a) From every Officer transferred in the manner specified in Section 7, who does not wholly resign the service of the British Government, or who is not, for recorded special and public reasons, exempted from the operation of the Rules in this Chapter, a contribution is levied as follows:—

- (A) In the case of a Covenanted Civil Servant;—at the rate of $16\frac{2}{3}$ per cent. (one-sixth) on the gross salary which he receives from his Foreign employers:
- (B) In the case of any other Officer;—at the rate of $14\frac{2}{7}$ per cent. (one-seventh) on the gross salary which he receives from his Foreign employers: provided always that the contribution from an Uncovenanted Officer shall in no case exceed Rs. $16\frac{2}{3}$ a month,

that is to say, the Officer receives from his Foreign employers salary fixed in accordance with the Rules of the Public Service for the appointment which he holds or in which he officiates, and, retaining five-sixths or six-sevenths accordingly as he is an Officer of Class (A) or (B), pays one-sixth or one-seventh, as the case may be, to the Government of India.

13. The deduction made under this Section from the salary of a Covenanted Civil Servant includes the deduction made on account of his annuity. His gross salary when transferred to Foreign service should therefore be one-fifth greater than the net salary which it is intended that he should retain for himself after paying the ordinary contribution of 4 per cent. towards the cost of his annuity.

Example.—The salary of A. B., a Covenanted Civil Servant, is Rs. 1,000; from this he pays Rs. 40 towards cost of his annuity and retains Rs. 960 for himself. If transferred to Foreign service his gross salary will be Rs. 1,152. The contribution payable to the British Government is Rs. 192.

attend between those hours with their bills previously made out and properly signed. The bills will not be made out in the Accountant General's Office.

2. When any of the above dates falls on a Sunday or Gazetted Holiday, the pensions will be payable on the next day.

In future no transfer adjustment may be made by a Treasury Officer in the accounts of any treasury which involves either a debit or a credit to an account current head.

2. Supplies to another department, such as forest supplies to the Public Works Department, &c., will be adjusted in accordance with Chapter 5, Rule 21 of the Civil Account Code. The copy of the invoice which is returned, under that rule, to the supplying officer should be forwarded to this office for adjustment, and the supplying department should look to this office, and not to the Treasury Officer for intimation of the credit of revenue thus realized.

3. In the case of supplies to the Public Works Department, that department will be debited by this office with the amount of the invoice and the supplying department will be monthly advised of the credits to revenue. Invoices reaching this office by the 15th of the month following that of supply, will be adjusted in the accounts of the month of supply; if received later, they will be adjusted in a later account.

4. For example, invoices for supplies in March and preceding months which reach this office by the 15th April, will be adjusted in the accounts of March, while if they reach this office after that date, they will be too late for the preliminary accounts for March, and will be adjusted in April or in the accounts of the following official year.

5. In the case of supplies to the Military and other departments, adjustment is made on receipt of the accounts of the department supplied, and this office will register the invoices received from the supplying department and keep a watch over the recoveries.

6. When a service is rendered by the Public Works Department, Jail, Forest or other department to an officer whose expenditure is audited by this office, care should be taken to note on all three copies of the invoice the purpose for which the service was rendered and the contingent bill (naming department and month) to which a copy has been attached.

SIR,

Under instructions from the Government of India a supply of Stock Notes will be furnished,

in a few days, to every Treasury in this Presidency for sale at the Treasuries and Sub-Treasuries in each district: but the sale of the notes will not commence until the receipt of orders from the Government of India, which I will communicate at once on receiving them.

2. The supply which will now be forwarded to each District, will be about one-half (in each denomination of notes) of the amount indented for by Commissioners in the estimates with which they furnished me last month. The second half of the indent will be supplied, if necessary, about a fortnight later than the first half, but in supplying it I shall be guided by the information received from Commissioners and Collectors as to the readiness or difficulty of sale of the first half.

3. Revised rules and forms for the sale of Stock Notes are about to be issued by the Comptroller General, and till the receipt of these, no rules or forms will be issued from this office. If the orders to commence the sale of Stock Notes should arrive before the receipt of the revised rules and forms, the sale should not be postponed; but the sales should be recorded temporarily in a simple form showing the number of the note, the date of issue, and the person to whom sold. These entries can be afterwards copied into the authorized forms as soon as the latter are received. The previous rules prescribed and circulated by the Comptroller General should be followed till the new rules are received.

BY HER MAJESTY'S HIGH COURT OF
JUDICATURE.

APPELLATE SIDE.

The Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature have been pleased to frame the following rule to be pasted at page 154 as para. 25A of the Circulars, and to direct its publication in the *Bombay Government Gazette*:—

"25A.—Several cases have come before the High Court, in which a party to a suit, being unable to appeal against a decree, because it was in his favour, has been prejudiced by adverse findings in the judgment, against which the law allows no appeal. For example, A sues to eject B, as his tenant; B denies the tenancy, and pleads that, even if he be A's tenant, he has received no legal notice to quit. The Subordinate Judge finds on the issues that B is A's tenant, but that legal notice has not been given: and on the latter ground alone he dismisses A's suit. The decree only states that A's suit is dismissed with costs; and this decree being in B's favour, he cannot of course appeal against it. Nor does the law allow him to appeal against the finding that he is A's tenant, because this finding is contained, not in the decree, but in the judgment: and the consequence is, that, when A brings another suit after due notice, the question whether B is A's tenant is *res judicata*, and the Subordinate Judge's previous finding operates as a

final decision against *B*, although he has had no opportunity of bringing the matter before the Appellate Court. In *Niamut Khan vs. Phadu Buldia* (I. L. R. 6 Cal. 319) a Full Bench of the Calcutta High Court has held that the material findings in each case should be embodied in the decree, and if they are not, that it is incumbent on the parties, to avoid their being bound by decisions against which they have no right of appeal, to apply to amend the decree in accordance with the judgment. In this opinion the High Court concurs; and it is accordingly ordered that the Subordinate Courts, both of first instance and of appeal, do incorporate in their decrees all the material findings on issues which are contained in their judgments."
