

The following regulations are laid down for the guidance of all concerned :—

- Native Regiments will go on the present established strength of 550 of all ranks for Cavalry, and 832 for Infantry, so far as they may be complete, and *minus* the men who are unfit.
- Commanding Officers will be held responsible that none but officers, men and followers in every way fit for field service accompany the regiment: all sickly men are to be left at the dépôt, and no others.
- Each Native regiment will be completed to its full establishment of eight British officers, including those who may be recalled from furlough, and who may be expected to join in Egypt.
- Followers, servants, and baggage will be according to the Kabul scale, but without grass-cutters, except as hereinafter laid down for the cavalry. All regiments will be completed with all establishments (including commissariat), according to the orders laid down, in their respective presidencies.
- Depôts for regiments will be formed under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, and of the Governments of Madras and Bombay respectively.
- A British officer will be detailed for the charge of each of these depôts, and will draw the allowance specified in Articles 307 and 378, Pay Code for India, Vol. I. A pay havildar, on a staff salary of Rs. 5 per mensem, will be allowed to each dépôt of native troops.
- Commanding Officers will be held responsible that all orders and circulars connected with family remittances and arrangements for the comfort of the men and families are made known to, and are in possession of, officers appointed to the charge of depôts; and that provision is made for the care of spare arms, accoutrements, books, heavy baggage, &c., which may be left behind.
- Quartermaster's establishments for the depôts will be supplied under clause 15, India Army Circulars of 1880.
- The families of British troops left behind in India will remain at their present stations, and will receive, in addition to subsistence allowance, three-quarter rations for the wives and half-rations for the children.
- Followers, servants, baggage, camp equipage, and kit, for staff and departmental officers, will be on the Kabul scale, but grass-cutters will not be taken.
- The British troops, including officers of the Army Medical Department, will remain on Indian pay and allowances until they land in Egypt, when they will come under the orders of the General Commanding in Egypt, and will then be on the same scale of pay and allowances as the rest of the British troops with the expeditionary force.
- Native infantry and sappers and miners will draw extra batta; and free rations will be allowed to all ranks of cavalry, infantry, and sappers, while on foreign service.
- Each native commissioned officer of the cavalry will be required to keep up one pony and one attendant as syce and grass-cutter, whether he takes one or two horses; and the non-commissioned officers and privates to maintain one pony and one grass-cutter for every two horses.
- Compensation at the rate of Rs. 5 per mensem will be allowed to the native officers for each bargheer sanctioned by existing regulations, if maintained by them, out of which sum they will pay the

share of the grass-cutter's wages and provide the stable gear. A similar amount will be deducted from the pay of the bargheer sowars.

15. As during a sea voyage the officers, non-commissioned officers and sowars of the cavalry would be unable to make the requisite provision for the forage of their horses, whilst difficulty might be experienced in this respect during a portion of their service on land, the forage of the horses, and of the mules or ponies accompanying, will be undertaken by the Commissariat, with such assistance as the regiments and followers may be enabled to render after landing.

16. All ranks will be required, as at present, to maintain one efficient horse; but the native commissioned officers will be allowed forage for two horses each, if they desire to take a second charger.

17. The grass-cutters will be paid by the troops, as usual; but the ponies will receive grain, and, when necessary, hay, free of cost. Both grass-cutters and animals will be employed to procure forage when obtainable, and must be held disposable for all purposes.

18. The native commissioned and non-commissioned officers of cavalry will continue to subscribe to the regimental funds to such extent as commanding officers may deem necessary within the limits prescribed by regulations.

19. They will continue to supply themselves with the ordinary clothing, equipment, saddlery, and stable gear for their horses; but articles of extra clothing necessitated by any speciality of climate or service will be issued free of cost.

20. All casualties of horses or ponies arising from neglect or from causes evidently unconnected with the particular nature of the service must, as usual, be replaced by the regiments concerned. Each troop will be allowed to embark and maintain two chunda horses, to meet casualties, which will be rationed free of cost.

21. All casualties among horses or ponies fairly attributable to, or connected with, the service, including those from accident on boardship or during embarkation or disembarkation, will, if there has been no proved neglect, be replaced by Government, or compensation will be allowed, under the rules in the Pay Code for India, Vol. II.

22. During the continuance of the arrangement under which the supply of grain and forage to the cavalry is undertaken by the State, the pay of the several grades will be as follows:—

23. Public followers, except those engaged on salaries specifically laid down for the occasion, will receive an addition of 50 per cent. on pay and batta, in addition to free rations, while on foreign service.

24. The sanctioned followers paid by the troops will receive from Government free rations, and such extra pay as may be necessary to put them on a par with the public followers of a similar class.

25. The scale of rations for native troops on shore will be that laid down in Article 641, Indian Commissariat Code, extracted in the margin.

26. On land the forage allowance for each horse will be 8 lbs. of such grain as may be procurable, with 14 lbs. of hay when green forage is not procurable, or otherwise as may be ordered. The allowance for ponies will be one-half of the forage ration of a horse.

When meat, even on special occasions, is issued, the ration of atta or rice is to be reduced one-half.

No claim for pecuniary compensation can be admitted, if through accident any part of the above authorised scale of rations is not forthcoming.

The issue of tea and sugar should be confined to the cases of sick and wounded, for whom medical officers may authorise it, and for the rest of the troops on special occasions of fatigue, exposure, or bad climate when recommended by the principal medical officer. On such occasions 2 oz. of sugar and ½ oz. of tea per man may be issued.

Tobacco can only be issued on payment at the rate of one ounce per man per diem, the price charged being the first cost to Government, without any addition on account of carriage or losses.

433. Officers on field service are required to credit in their pay bills the value of all rations, &c., and the hire of all carriage supplied to them under the following certificate:—

28. Transport will be charged for at the rates laid down for the Afghan war, viz., 8 annas and 7 annas per diem for camels and mules respectively.

29. The officers of the Military Account Department will act as Field Paymasters, and also have charge of the treasure chest.

30. Pay lists of British troops for the period of the voyage will be rendered to the Pay Examiner of the Presidency to which they belong; from date of landing in Egypt, they will be rendered to the Staff Paymaster with the force proceeding from England.

31. Pay lists of native troops will be forwarded, as soon after the first of each month as may be possible, through the Field Paymaster, to the Pay Examiner of the Presidency to which the troops belong. Officers commanding regiments will draw monthly from the field pay office such sums as may be required for the pay of themselves and their men, after making provision to meet family allotments and remittances, fund subscriptions, &c., the amount of which allotments, &c., they will debit themselves with in their general states.

32. The pay bills of all staff and departmental officers will be adjusted by the Field Paymaster.

33. All payments to native troops will if practicable be made in rupees; but should it be necessary to issue the coinage of the country or British money, their pay and allowances will be converted into that coinage, under the orders of the General Commanding, at the rates of exchange current in Egypt.

34. Officers commanding native regiments and detachments detailed for service are directed to at once draw and distribute three months' pay in advance to their respective corps.

35. Staff and departmental establishments may receive similar advances, not including command, contract, office, and staff allowances.

36. The family remittances to India of the British troops will be made at the official rate of exchange through the Field Paymaster. Remittances to England will be made under the War Office regulations. The family remittances of native troops will be arranged for, as usual, by officers commanding regiments and detachments.

37. Officers, warrant officers and non-commissioned officers, with the exception of those belonging to the British portion of the division, requiring remittances to India, may remit the whole or any part of their pay to India at par on paying the amount to the Field Paymaster, who is authorised to grant transfer remittance receipts on any treasury in India. As an alternative arrangement, officers may leave with the Presidency Paymaster, Bombay, an allotment roll stating the amount they wish to be paid monthly, and the person to whom it should be remitted. That officer will then make the necessary remittance monthly, and he will furnish the Field Paymaster with a list of the sums thus allotted, to enable the latter to make the necessary deduction from officers' pay bills. Remittances to England for the benefit of their families may be made through the Field Paymaster at the official rate of exchange, to the extent of one-half of an officer's clear receipts, exclusive of office and contingent allowances.

38. Officers of the expeditionary force should recover from the pay of followers serving under them the amount that each man may desire to be paid to his family in India, and send to the Controller of Military Accounts, Accounts Branch, Bombay, in time to reach him not later than the 20th of each month, a statement\* of such recoveries, according to which the families will be paid under instructions to be issued by that officer. The amount thus recovered should be paid to the Field Paymaster, whose receipt should be entered on, or attached to, the statement.

39. Every care should be taken to fill in the statements correctly from the tickets given to the men on engagement and the records in the field. Where the information is not available, owing to the loss of the tickets or any other cause, immediate application should be made to the depôt commanding or departmental officers concerned.

To—All COLLECTORS, TREASURY OFFICERS, and OFFICERS IN RECEIPT OF PERMANENT TRAVELLING ALLOWANCE and TENTAGE.

Dated Bombay, 3rd August 1882.

1. Government having, in their Resolution, Financial Department, No. 2677, dated 22nd July 1882, sanctioned my proposal to include permanent monthly travelling allowance and tentage

in salary bills, and to dispense with separate bills on account of these allowances, the following instructions are issued in continuation of my Circular No. 10, dated 29th March 1882, and will take effect from the 1st September next.

2. No salary bill of a Gazetted Officer will be cashed on or after the 1st September 1882, unless it is drawn up on the printed form, recently prescribed, supplies of which should be obtained from the Government Central Press, Bombay.

3. Officers entitled to fixed monthly travelling allowance or tentage should draw it along with their salaries, the actual amount claimable during the month to which the bill refers being entered in the place set apart for the purpose in the printed form referred to above.

4. If on account of absence on leave or transfer to some other appointment, any of these allowances be not claimable for the whole month, or be admissible at different rates for different parts of the month, the broken periods for, and the rates at, which it is drawn should be stated against the entry concerned.

5. When a higher rate of these allowances becomes due with a higher rate of salary, it should not be drawn before the usual “salary slip” has been received from this office authorising the drawal of the higher rate of salary. The rates of fixed travelling allowance and tentage, which go with particular rates of salary, will henceforward be entered in the “salary slip.”

6. Officers who have hitherto drawn fixed travelling allowances only after their bills had been countersigned by Controlling officers, will continue to send diaries of their movements to their respective controlling officers.

7. A Treasury Officer should refuse to cash a salary bill, on which any fixed travelling allowance is drawn, unless it contains a manuscript certificate in the following form:—

*"I certify that the diary of my movements*

*\* Month for which salary and allowances are claimed, for the month of (\*), has been submitted to the Controlling officer concerned. to the (+)."*

8. If an officer be entitled, under the rules, to exchange his fixed travelling allowance for any other form of travelling allowance, no change should be made in the amount drawn on the salary bill, but a separate bill should be prepared in the prescribed form for travelling allowance with the necessary certificates, and from the amount, otherwise admissible in this bill, the amount of the fixed travelling allowance for the day or days, for which other travelling allowance has been drawn, should be deducted. Such a bill can, however, be paid only after countersignature, unless there be no Controlling officer whose duty it is to sign it.

9. Fixed monthly conveyance allowance or horse allowance, which never required countersignature, should also be drawn on the salary bill, the entry being added to the printed form in manuscript.

I draw the earliest attention to the fact that some extremely well-forged twenty-rupee notes are in circulation. Two presented to-day at the Currency Office bear the numbers  $\frac{0}{27}$  80722 and  $\frac{0}{27}$  80681, and are both quite clean and crisp. The watermark on the paper is exactly imitated.

The only distinctions from true notes to which I can draw attention are—

- (1) That the printing is not so clear as on real notes, and is in some parts "smudgy". The word "July" especially, in the date (19th July 1878), is very unevenly printed.
- (2) There is a dot directly below the initial A of the signature R. A. Sterndale, whereas in the genuine signature the dot very distinctly follows the A.
