No. 6700.—Under Section 6 of Bombay Act Voof 1878 (The Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878), all Municipal Executive officers appointed for the time being as such under the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878 and the Bombay District Municipal Act of 1873, in receipt of a salary not less than Rs. 10 per mensem and being on the permanent establishment, are hereby invested with powers under Section 37 of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, in addition to the powers and duties incident to their respective principal offices.

No. 6701.—With reference to Notification No. 5924, published at page 659 of Part I. of the Bombay Government Gazette of 31st August 1882, and in exercise of the power conferred by Section 4 of Bombay Act VII. of 1873 (The Bombay Salt Act, 1873), as amended by Section 2 of Bombay Act V. of 1882, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased to direct that the Commissioner of Customs, Salt, Opium and A'bkári, and Reporter General of External Commerce, shall, during the continuance of the office of Commissioner of Salt Revenue, exercise exclusively the power conferred on the Collector of Salt Revenue and his Assistants under Section 5 of Bombay Act VII. of 1873, of appointing persons to the offices of Sirkárkán, Superintendent and Inspector of Salt Revenue, and to all other offices in the Salt Department, the pay of which amounts to Rs. 100 and upwards; and also exercise exclusively the power conferred on the Collector of Salt Revenue under Section 20 of Bombay Act VII. of 1873, to grant licenses for the manufacture of salt.

NOTIFICATION.

Under the provisions of Section 17 of the Indian Arms Act, 1878, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rule, in substitution of the rule contained in Home Department Notification No. 1555, dated the 30th September 1881, regarding the grant of licenses for the possession and transport of gunpowder and fuses required for blasting purposes in connection with agricultural works or works of public utility:—

Rule.

Licenses may be granted to cultivators and other persons, without payment of any fee, entitling the holder to possess and transport gunpowder and fuses in reasonable quantities, when the same are proved to the satisfaction of the officer granting the license to be required bona fide for blasting purposes in connection with agricultural works or works of public utility.

Such licenses shall be given in the form appended to Notification No. 1555, dated 30th September 1881.

No. 486.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 21 of the Cantonments Act, 1880, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to impose from the first of October next the following taxes in the Cantonment of Deesa:—

I .- Property-Rates.

(1) A consolidated rate of four per centum per annum of the annual value of houses, buildings and lands for the following purposes, namely:—

(a) Two per centum for general purposes and for the protection from fire of those parts of the Cantonment which are not so protected by regimental or other special arrangements;

(b) One per centum towards defraying the cost of maintenance of the Police Force of the Cantonment;

(c) One per centum for the purpose of lighting:

Provided that the minimum annual amount of the said consolidated rate leviable in respect of a hut, or other building with a thatched roof, shall be eight annas, and in respect of a house, or other building with a tiled roof, or of a holding of land, one runee.

(2) A conservancy rate of the following monthly amounts, namely:—

No. 487.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 22 of the Cantonments Act, 1880, and with reference to the last preceding Notification imposing certain taxes in the Cantonment of Deesa, the Governor in Council is pleased to apply to the said Cantonment the provisions of the said enactments and rules specified in the first column of the Schedule hereto annexed, for the assessment and recovery of the said taxes, in the adapted form set forth in the second column of the said Schedule.

The said provisions as so adapted, may be cited as "The Deesa Cantonment Taxation Regulations."

The Deesa Cantonment Taxation Regulations.

Adapted form. Enactment or Rule. I.—PROPERTY RATES Valuation and Assessment. 1. The estimated gross annual rent at which the houses, The Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878, section 70. buildings, and lands liable to Annual value how to be ascerproperty-rates might reasonably be expected to let from year to year shall, for the purposes of the said rates, be held and deemed to be the annual value of such houses, buildings, and lands. The value of a house or building so estimated shall not include the value of any machinery contained therein. The Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 The said rates shall be leviable from the actual occupier and 1878, section "OA. of the house, building or land Property-rates from whom leviupon which they are assessed if the said occupier be himself the landlord of such house, building or land, or if he hold the same immediately from Government. In any other case the said rates shall be leviable from the immediate landlord of the actual occupier, or, when the property is unoccupied, from the person who would be the immediate landlord of the occupier if it were occupied: Provided that if any person hereby made liable to the said rates himself pays rent to another person other than Government in respect of his interest in the house, building or land for which he is assessed to such rates, he Person liable to payment of pro-perty-rates entitled to credit or proportionate amount of such rates, if he himself pays rent to another person. shall be entitled to credit in account with such other person for such sum as would be leviable on account of the said rates if the amount of the rent payable by him were the full annual value of the property taxed. And any person other than Government possessing any interest in or over any such property superior to that of the person assessed to the said rates in respect of which he receives Credit to be allowed by all superior holders for proportionate amount of property-rates on the rents receivable by them. rent from any other person, shall be bound to give credit in accourt to such other person for such sum as would be leviable on account of the said rates if the rent which he receives were the full annual value of the property assessed. But nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect any

have entered, or may hereafter enter, concerning their respective liability on account of the aforesaid rates, and when any person other than the person hereby made liable for the said rates has by any such agreement rendered himself responsible for the same, or for any portion thereof, the person hereby made liable shall be entitled to recover the amount of the said

rates or such portion thereof from the said person.

If any person refuse to pay the said octroi duties, the collector may detain a portion of his taxable articles or goods sufficient to cover the amount, provided that application for recovery of the said dues be made without delay to the Cantonment Magistrate; otherwise the detention of the goods will be at the risk of the collector.

36. Articles of the class of piece-goods and metals, and articles made thereof, which have been imported from Foreign ports, and paid customs duty, are only liable to octroi rates not exceeding $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. ad valorem; all other articles so imported and which have paid customs duty, shall be exempt from octroi taxation.

37. When the duty is leviable by the load, any person importing goods liable to octroi duty not exceeding one and a half per centum ad valorem, who may consider the octroi demand to be in excess of such limit, may claim to have his goods examined and valued with a view to the rate payable being fixed at a proper amount.

38. All octroi duties not paid on demand, and all expenses reasonably incurred in giving effect to the provisions of sections 34 and 37, may be recovered by a summary proceeding before the Cantonment Magistrate, in the manner provided in the Code of Criminal Procedure.

of any defect or want of form in the summons, conviction, warrant of distress or other proceeding relating thereto, nor shall such party be deemed a trespasser ab initio on account of any irregularity afterwards committed by him; but all persons aggrieved by such irregularity may recover full satisfaction for the special damage in any court of competent jurisdiction.

BY THE COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS, SALT, OPIUM AND A'BKA'RI.

It is hereby notified for the information of all importers of and dealers in Opium and of all others concerned, that on and after the 15th of October next the whole of the Rules under the Opium Act, 1878, published at pages 237 to 249 of Part I. of the Bombay Government Gazette Extraordinary, dated 30th March 1878, will be strictly enforced throughout the Town and Island of Bombay.

- 2. Attention is drawn to the fact that the possession of more than 10 tolas of Opium by any person not being a Licensed Retailer of Opium, or a Medical Practitioner, or not holding a special Permit granted under Rule 5 (b), is illegal, unless the quantity of Opium and the place where it is deposited are registered in the Office of the Collector of Customs and Opium and noted on the Pass-port which covers it.
- 3. Persons who may be in possession of Opium contrary to these provisions should furnish the necessary particulars and produce their pass-ports for endorsation at the Opium Department of the Custom House on or before the 15th of October next, after which date all Opium found unregistered in the Town and Island of Bombay will be held liable to seizure and the persons concerned to punishment according to law.
- 4. Particular attention is drawn to the fact that these provisions refer not only to wholesale

stocks of Opium, but to all stocks of Opium, however small, if in excess of 10 tolas.

- 5. Attention is further drawn to the provisions of the Rules forbi-lding the transport of Opium except under a Permit, and providing that no such Permit shall be given for Opium brought to Bombay for wholesale trade or exportation, except for whole or half chests. These provisions, which have hitherto been allowed to remain in abeyance, will be strictly enforced after the 15th of October next.
- 6. Importers will save themselves and others much possible trouble and inconvenience by arranging for the immediate deposit of all the Opium they may import in places which afford all necessary facilities for sampling and testing and storage up to final exportation.
