NOTIFICATIONS.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 18th September 1882.

No. 6451.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to extend till December 31st, 1883, the period allowed by Government Notification No. 826, dated 9th February 1881, to non-graduates who entered the Revenue Branch of the Public Service before January 1st, 1879, within which to pass the prescribed Departmental Examinations qualifying for appointments to Mámlats and other higher posts in that branch of the service.

2. His Excellency the Governor in Council is also pleased to direct the substitution of the following amended Rules

5. Native Huzár Accountants.
6. Shirastedárs to Assistant and Deputy Collectors.
7. Deputy Chitnáises or First Kárkúns to Collectors.
8. Clerks and Kárkúns in the Commissioner's Offices on Rs. 60 pay and upwards.
9. Shirastedár to the Survey and Settlement Commissioner.
10. Shirastedár to the Superintendent, Poona and Násik Survey.
11. Shirastedár to the Superintendent, Ratná-giri Survey.

12. Inspectors of Police and Chief Constables of the First Grade."

"VIII.—Officers who were in the service prior to the 1st January 1879, and who have at any time held, or at the time of presenting themselves for examination are holding, any of the posts named in Rule VI., and who pass the Higher Standard Examination before the 31st December 1883, will be held eligible for Mámrats and their names shall be entered according to the date and order of passing in the list of Passed Candidates qualified to hold the appointments of Mámratdárs and Deputy Collectors."

3. The following classes of persons shall be permitted to appear at the Higher Standard Departmental Examinations:—

(a) Graduates serving in the Land Revenue Department.

(b) The Officers mentioned in Rule VIII.

(c) Officers holding Land Revenue appointments carrying a salary of not less than Rs. 40 per mensem.

No. 6700.—Under Section 6 of Bombay Act V. of 1878 (The Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878), all Municipal Executive officers appointed for the time being as such under the provisions of the Bombay Municipal Acts of 1872 and 1878 and the Bombay District Municipal Act of 1873, in receipt of a salary not less than Rs. 10 per mensem and being on the permanent establishment, are hereby invested with powers under Section 37 of the Bombay A'bkári Act, 1878, in addition to the powers and duties incident to their respective principal offices.

No. 6701.—With reference to Notification No. 5924, published at page 659 of Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of 31st August 1882, and in exercise of the power conferred by Section 4 of Bombay Act VII. of 1873 (The Bombay Salt Act, 1873), as amended by Section 2 of Bombay Act V. of 1882, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased to direct that the Commissioner of Customs, Salt, Opium and A'bkári, and Reporter General of External Commerce, shall, during the continuance of the office of Commissioner of Salt Revenue, exercise exclusively the power conferred on the Collector of Salt Revenue and his Assistants under Section 5 of Bombay Act VII. of 1873, of appointing persons to the offices of Sirkárkún, Superintendent and Inspector of Salt Revenue, and to all other offices in the Salt Department, the pay of which amounts to Rs. 100 and upwards; and also exercise exclusively the power conferred on the Collector of Salt Revenue under Section 20 of Bombay Act VII. of 1873, to grant licenses for the manufacture of salt.

No. 6702.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 216 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, the Governor in Council is pleased to authorize the extension of the provisions of Chapters VIII. and IX. of the said Code to the villages of Chandori and Dhágar in the Niphád and Dindori Tálukás respectively of the Násik District.

No. 6702A.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 216 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, the Governor in Council is pleased to authorize the extension of the provisions of Chapters VIII. and IX. of the said Code to the villages of Talaude in the Haveli Táluka, and the villages of Askhed, Kalumbre and Shelu in the Khed Táluka of the Poona District.

NOTIFICATION.

Under the provisions of Section 17 of the Indian Arms Act, 1878, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rule,

in substitution of the rule contained in Home Department Notification No. 1555, dated the 30th September 1881, regarding the grant of licenses for the possession and transport of gunpowder and fuses required for blasting purposes in connection with agricultural works or works of public utility:—

Rule.

Licenses may be granted to cultivators and other persons, without payment of any fee, entitling the holder to possess and transport gunpowder and fuses in reasonable quantities, when the same are proved to the satisfaction of the officer granting the license to be required *bonâ fide* for blasting purposes in connection with agricultural works or works of public utility.

Such licenses shall be given in the form appended to Notification No. 1555, dated 30th September 1881.

No. 486.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 21 of the Cantonments Act, 1880, the Governor in Council is pleased, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council, to impose from the first of October next the following taxes in the Cantonment of Deesa:—

I.—Property-Rates.

- (1) A consolidated rate of four per centum per annum of the annual value of houses, buildings and lands for the following purposes, namely:—
 - (a) Two per centum for general purposes and for the protection from fire of those parts of the Cantonment which are not so protected by regimental or other special arrangements;
 - (b) One per centum towards defraying the cost of maintenance of the Police Force of the Cantonment;
 - (c) One per centum for the purpose of lighting;

Provided that the minimum annual amount of the said consolidated rate leviable in respect of a hut, or other building with a thatched roof, shall be eight annas, and in respect of a house, or other building with a tiled roof, or of a holding of land, one rupee.

- (2) A conservancy rate of the following monthly amounts, namely:—

In the limits of the Bázars.

- (a) For each privy belonging to a hut, or other building with a thatched roof ... Four annas.
- (b) For each privy belonging to a house, or other building with a tiled roof, if the annual value of such house, or building, does not exceed Rs. 480 ... Eight annas.
- (c) For each privy belonging to a house, or building with a tiled roof, if the annual value of such house, or building, exceeds Rs. 480 ... One rupee.

In the limits of the Lines.

- (d) For each bungalow, or other building with one or more privies attached, of which the annual value does not exceed Rs. 480 ... One rupee.
- (e) For each bungalow, or other building with one or more privies attached, of which the annual value exceeds Rs. 480, but does not exceed Rs. 720 ... 1½ rupee.
- (f) For each bungalow, or other building with one or more privies, of which the annual value exceeds Rs. 720 ... Two rupees.

In the Cantonment generally.

- (g) For each house, building or holding of land to which no privy is attached, } an amount not exceeding four annas.
- (h) For every hotel, club, mess-house, or other large building, or premises, which the Cantonment Magistrate shall deem fit to exclude from the foregoing classification, } such amount as the Cantonment Magistrate, with the approval of the Cantonment Committee, shall from time to time fix in consideration of the conservancy duties to be performed for each hotel, &c.

Provided that in the limits of Bázárs the Cantonment Conservancy Establishment shall from the time when the said conservancy rate is first levied perform for all houses, buildings and lands all the duties usually performed by halálkhors.

Octroi Duties.

- (3) Octroi duties at such rates as may from time to time be sanctioned by the local Government.

III.—License Fees.

- (4) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for the purpose of any offensive or dangerous trade, a fee of } five rupees for each place licensed.
- (5) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment, if the license is for retail sale only, a fee of } one rupee for each place licensed.

- (6) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for horses, buffalos, or other animals which are let out on hire, or sold, or the produce of which is made an article of trade, a fee of
- (7) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for storing or selling timber, planks, bamboos, rafters, poles, or other similar building materials, a fee of
- (8) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for storing or selling firewood in logs or billets, hay, grass, straw, coal, coke, ashes, or other combustible material, a fee of
- (9) For every annual license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the use of any place in the Cantonment for the sale of firewood in sticks or bundles, a fee of
- (10) For every license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for hawking within the Cantonment for a year, or any portion of a year, a fee of
- (11) For every license granted by the Cantonment Magistrate for the playing of a band, or for going in procession along the public road in the Cantonment, a fee of
- (12) For every license or permission given by the Cantonment Magistrate for the setting up of any booth or platform, or for placing benches on a public road, lane or street in the Cantonment for the purpose of marriage or other ceremonies, a fee of
- (13) For every license or permission given by the Cantonment Magistrate for the depositing of building materials, or the erection of scaffolding upon or in any public road, lane or street in the Cantonment, a fee not exceeding

No. 487.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 22 of the Cantonments Act, 1880, and with reference to the last preceding Notification imposing certain taxes in the Cantonment of Deesa, the Governor in Council is pleased to apply to the said Cantonment the provisions of the said enactments and rules specified in the first column of the Schedule hereto annexed, for the assessment and recovery of the said taxes, in the adapted form set forth in the second column of the said Schedule.

The said provisions as adapted, may be cited as "The Deesa Cantonment Taxation Regulations."

For the purpose of assessing the rates aforesaid the Cantonment Magistrate shall from year to year make a valuation of all houses, buildings and lands liable to the said rates, and cause the amount thereof to be entered in a book to be kept in the office of the Cantonment Magistrate, and to be called "The Assessment Book," wherein shall also be written in such form as the Cantonment Magistrate shall direct,—

- (2) a designation of the property, either by name or number, sufficient to identify the same,
- (3) the name of the street or district in which such property is situate, and
- (4) the amount of the rates assessed thereon.

For the year 1882-83 the valuation made by a Special Committee in the year 1880 under the orders of the Military Department shall be deemed to have been made by the Cantonment Magistrate under this section.

4. When the name of the person liable to payment of the rates aforesaid cannot be ascertained, it shall be sufficient to designate him in the Assessment Book, and also in any notice or other proceeding under these Regulations, as "the landlord" or "the occupier" of the property on which the rates are assessed without further description.

When in any such case any person in occupation of any house, building or land shall refuse to give such information as may be necessary for determining who is liable to payment of the said rates, such person shall himself be liable, until such information is obtained, for all the said rates leviable on such house, building, or land.

Whoever refuses or fails to furnish any of the returns specified in the preceding clause for the space of one week from the day on which he shall have been required so to do, shall be liable on conviction before a Magistrate to the penalty provided in section 176 of the Indian Penal Code for omitting to furnish information required by law; and whoever knowingly makes a false or incorrect return

BY THE COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS,
SALT, OPIUM AND A'BKARI.

It is hereby notified for the information of all importers of and dealers in Opium and of all others concerned, that on and after the 15th of October next the whole of the Rules under the Opium Act, 1878, published at pages 237 to 249 of Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* Extraordinary, dated 30th March 1878, will be strictly enforced throughout the Town and Island of Bombay.

2. Attention is drawn to the fact that the possession of more than 10 tolas of Opium by any person not being a Licensed Retailer of Opium, or a Medical Practitioner, or not holding a special Permit granted under Rule 5 (b), is illegal, unless the quantity of Opium and the place where it is deposited are registered in the Office of the Collector of Customs and Opium and noted on the Pass-port which covers it.

3. Persons who may be in possession of Opium contrary to these provisions should furnish the necessary particulars and produce their pass-ports for endorsement at the Opium Department of the Custom House on or before the 15th of October next, after which date all Opium found unregistered in the Town and Island of Bombay will be held liable to seizure and the persons concerned to punishment according to law.

4. Particular attention is drawn to the fact that these provisions refer not only to wholesale

stocks of Opium, but to all stocks of Opium, however small, if in excess of 10 tolas.

5. Attention is further drawn to the provisions of the Rules forbidding the transport of Opium except under a Permit, and providing that no such Permit shall be given for Opium brought to Bombay for wholesale trade or exportation, except for whole or half chests. These provisions, which have hitherto been allowed to remain in abeyance, will be strictly enforced after the 15th of October next.

6. Importers will save themselves and others much possible trouble and inconvenience by arranging for the immediate deposit of all the Opium they may import in places which afford all necessary facilities for sampling and testing and storage up to final exportation.
