NOTIFICATIONS.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 2nd October 1882.

No. 6840.—The following Rules for admission to the higher appointments in the Revenue Branch of the Public Service in Sind are published for general information:—

1. In future all vacant appointments in the grade of Head Munshi, Mukhtyárkar, and Deputy Collector will be filled up from the following classes only—

(1) Graduates of any University who become qualified under these rules.

(2) Government servants in the Revenue or kindred Departments who pass the Departmental Examinations required by these Rules before the 31st December 1887.

(3) Experienced servants of Government of proved merit and ability, whose age and ignorance of English may prevent their passing the prescribed examinations.

2. Any graduate can become qualified for a Head Munshiship by serving for not less than one year under a Mukhtyárkar as 2nd Munshi and by passing the ordinary Lower Departmental Examination.

Graduates qualified or eligible for Head Munshiship.

3. Such graduate can further be qualified for a Mukhtyárkarship, (1st) by serving for six months as a Head Munshi, (2nd) by then passing the Higher Departmental Examination, provided that he produces proof of competency and good moral character.

4. All vacancies in the grade of 2nd Munshi in Mukhtyárkar's offices shall first be offered to graduates who have formally intimated to the Commissioner their willingness to serve under these rules. Lists will be kept of all graduates who apply for appointments in the Revenue Branch under these rules.

Lists should be kept of all graduates who apply for appointments in the Revenue Branch under these rules.

Name of graduate twice refusing an appointment will be struck off the list of applicants, &c.

5. Lists shall be kept as provided in Rule 6 of all Revenue subordinates and of all duly qualified graduates who pass the Departmental Examinations, the names being arranged in order of merit; e.g., where a Revenue subordinate before 1887 and a graduate who has served for a year as 2nd Munshi pass the Lower Departmental Examination at the same time, their names shall be entered on the lists in the order of merit, and they shall be entitled to promotion to Head Munshiships as they fall vacant in that order. Similarly if a qualified graduate and Revenue subordinate both pass the Higher Standard at the same time, they shall be promoted to the office of Mukhtyárkar in the order in which they pass the examination.

6. The lists of persons qualified to hold the office of Head Munshi shall be kept by the Collectors, and the lists of all persons qualified for promotion to Mukhtyárkarship will be similarly kept by the Commissioner in Sind.

Detailed lists of officers qualified to be Head Munshis and Mukhtyárkar.

7. No Graduate or Revenue Officer can go up for the Higher Standard Examination except as provided in Rule 13 or 14 without first passing the Lower Standard, and no candidate will be permitted to present himself more than twice for the same examination.

8. Promotion from one grade to another in the appointment of Mukhtyárkar will be regulated by seniority or exceptional merit.

9. An officer who has served satisfactorily as Mukhtyárkar or who has qualified himself under Rule 14 will be considered eligible for appointment as Deputy Collector.

10. No subordinate officer will be permitted to present himself for the Departmental Examination without the approval of the Collector and a certificate from the Divisional Officer declaratory of the thorough fitness of the candidate.

11. Any graduate holding the office of 2nd Munshi who fails to pass the Lower Standard Departmental Examination within two years from the date of his appointment as a probationer will be removed from his probationary appointment.

12. Service as Head Munshi to Commissioner, to Collector or Assistant Collectors, as Head Clerk to Commissioner or Collector, as Deputy Accountant, as Huzúr

Special appointments qualifying in the same way as Head Munshiship for promotion to Mukhtyárkarate.

Accountant, as Kotvál, will be held to qualify for promotion to a Mukhtyárkarate in the same way as service as a Head Munshi to a Mukhtyárkar; i.e., a qualified officer upon passing the Lower Standard Examination becomes eligible for any of those appointments, and after six months' service in them can go up for the Higher Standard and thus qualify himself for promotion to a Mukhtyárkarate in the same way as if he had held a Head Munshiship. Existing incumbents of such offices are required to pass both Departmental Examinations if they wish to be promoted to grade of Mukhtyárkar.

13. Head Accountants at present in the service wishing to qualify themselves for Mukhtyárkarates must pass the Departmental Examination, Higher Standard, but need not serve for six months as Head Munshis.

14. Mukhtyárkar at present in the service wishing to qualify themselves for promotion to the rank of Deputy Collector must pass the Departmental Higher Standard, and appointments to Deputy Collectors will ordinarily be made from Mukhtyárkar qualified under this Rule or under (3) of Rule 1.

15. Until properly qualified candidates become available vacancies will be filled up as usual by seniority and selection.

16. Any candidate who passes the Lower Standard Departmental Examination becomes qualified to be appointed a Magistrate of the 3rd Class, and any candidate who passes the Higher Standard becomes eligible, if otherwise duly qualified, to be appointed a Magistrate of the 2nd or 1st Class as may be recommended by the District Magistrate: Provided that no 3rd Class Magistrate can be appointed a Magistrate, 2nd Class, until he has exercised the powers of a 2nd Class Magistrate for six months, and no 2nd Class Magistrate can be appointed a Magistrate of the 1st Class until he has exercised 2nd class powers for not less than six months.

FOUR PER CENT. LOAN.

His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor General in Council has resolved to borrow Two Hundred and Fifty Lakhs of Rupees for the public service in the following manner.

2. Promissory Notes will be issued for the said amount in Form A annexed to this Notification, being the form of the notes of *The Four Per Cent. Loan of 1842-43*, of which Loan the notes to be now issued will form a part. All the conditions which apply to notes of *The Four Per Cent. Loan of 1842-43* will apply to the notes to be now issued.

3. Tenders for the whole or any part of the said amount of Two Hundred and Fifty Lakhs of Rupees will be received by the Comptroller General from this date to noon of Wednesday, the 1st November 1882. Tenders must be in even hundreds of rupees not less than 500 Rs.

4. Each tender must be addressed, in the form annexed to this Notification, to the Comptroller General, Calcutta, and enclosed in a sealed cover, superscribed, “*Tender for the Four Per Cent. Loan, 1882.*” If the tenderer is not resident in India, he must name an agent resident in India to whom a letter of allotment may be issued if any part of the loan is allotted to such tenderer.

5. Each tender must be accompanied by a receipt from one of the Banks of Bengal, Madras, or Bombay, or one of their Branches, or from an Officer in charge of some public Treasury, or by a cheque drawn in favour of the Comptroller General on a Bank in Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, or by Government Promissory Notes, standing in the name of or endorsed to the tenderer or the person making the deposit, for not less than one-hundredth, or, if the tender be for less than Five Lakhs of Rupees, then for not less than one-fiftieth part of the tender. If the allotment is not fully taken up, this deposit of one or two per centum will be forfeited; and if one or more Government Promissory Notes have been deposited, such note or notes will be appropriated by the Government and cancelled; otherwise, if the deposit is in cash, it will be treated as in part

10. Tenders at the recorded minimum rate, and at rates above the recorded minimum rate, will be accepted in the order of the rates tendered, beginning with the highest rate; the amount allotted at the lowest rate at which tenders are accepted, will be divided amongst those who have tendered at this rate, in proportion, as nearly as may be found convenient, to the amounts of their tenders.

11. No. 47.—The following letter from the Secretary to the Government of India, No. 463 T., dated 22nd September 1882, together with the Resolution of the Government of Bombay thereon, No. 38 T.—766, dated 2nd October 1882, are published for information and guidance generally:—

Letter from the Secretary to the Government of India, No. 463 T., dated 22nd September 1882:—

“With reference to your letter No. 35 T.—1588, dated 13th August 1882, and subsequent correspondence, on the subject of overhead wires for electric lighting purposes, I am directed to state, for the information of His Excellency the Governor in Council, that the orders contained in paragraph 5 of Public Works Department letter No. 347—60 T. refer to all overhead wires, whether bare or insulated.

“2. The contention that when wires are insulated no injury can occur is only correct so long as the insulation remains efficient and the cable unbroken; if the cable should part, the exposed ends of the wire would be a source of danger, while a failure of the insulating material would be equally dangerous. It is known that neither gutta percha nor India rubber retain their insulating properties when exposed to the weather, and it is found by experience that tarred

tape not only perishes in a few months, but it injuriously affects gutta percha and India rubber as insulating materials. The properties of nigrite have not yet apparently been tested by experience, and it is open to doubt whether it will prove to be a perfectly efficient substitute for gutta percha, while, even if the insulation should prove perfect, the chance of the wires being blown down and broken must always be considered, especially in a country liable to severe storms or cyclones.

“3. In the case of the city of Broach, I am to state that the system of overhead wires or cables which has been erected may be permitted to remain, should the local Municipal authorities desire to retain them and to be worked during the period of the present contract on the sole responsibility of the Municipality of that town, but that on the expiration of the contract, and in all future contracts, the underground system of cables should be rigidly enforced.

“4. With reference to this point I am to explain, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, that the following facts bearing on the subject have recently been ascertained. In America electric lighting has been adopted in the large cities for about two years; all the wires were at first ‘overhead’, but owing to the risk incidental to this system in respect both of danger to the public and of failure of the lights in case of damage to the lines by storms, the Municipal authorities of New York and Chicago (and possibly of other cities) have ordered the overhead wires to be taken down and placed underground within a certain period. Further, out of eight tenders recently submitted for lighting by electricity four large districts of the city of London, no less than seven propose to lay the wires underground, while the eighth, which provides for overhead wires, is by no means the lowest tender. Also that underground electric lighting wires are practicable in India is proved by the fact that this system has been adopted by the Indian Electric Lighting Company for the Eden Gardens at Calcutta, and that the same Company’s tender for lighting the town of Rangoon also provides for underground cables.

“5. From the above it will be evident that, while the danger of the overhead system is widely recognised, it is possible to adhere to the underground system without undue strain on the Companies and without undue enhancement of the cost of lighting.”

RESOLUTION.—Copies of this letter should be circulated for information and guidance generally; it should be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, and a copy should be laid on the Editors’ Table.

2. Under these instructions, the previous order must be repeated that in no case in future will overhead wires be permitted.

3. But overhead wires already erected in the Cities of Bombay, Surat, and Broach may be permitted to remain, should the local Municipal authorities desire to retain them, and they may be worked during the period of the existing contracts, on the sole responsibility of the Municipality concerned, but, on the expiration of the existing contracts, the underground system of cables must be rigidly enforced.

CIRCULAR No. 71.

GAZETTED AUDIT DEPARTMENT.

From—The ACCOUNTANT GENERAL, BOMBAY;

To—All COMMISSIONERS, HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS,
COLLECTORS, and TREASURY OFFICERS.*Dated Bombay, 23rd September 1882.*

The Comptroller General having approved of my proposal that the salary and fixed allowances of an officer, whether Gazetted or Ministerial, even if chargeable to two or more major heads of account, should be drawn on a single bill, it is requested that all officers who have hitherto drawn their allowances on more than one bill will, from the beginning of October 1882 (for pay and allowances due for September 1882), discontinue the former practice and will include all their allowances paid from a *Government Treasury* and not received *direct* from a foreign body in one bill, but will enter each item separately.

2. In cases of plural appointments in which an officer combines Gazetted and non-Gazetted appointments, all the salaries of the officer should be drawn on a Gazetted officer's salary bill form under the officer's own signature.

3. Heads of offices are requested to see that establishment bills conform to the above rule. If any Ministerial officer holds appointments on different establishments, the whole of his salary should be drawn (in separate items) on the bill of the establishment in which his principal appointment is included, and a reference to this bill should be given in the bills of the other establishments in which the subsidiary appointments are included, in order to account for the short drawal on those bills.

CIRCULAR No. 72.

TREASURY ACCOUNT DEPARTMENT.

From—The ACCOUNTANT GENERAL, BOMBAY;

To—The COMMISSIONER and COLLECTOR OF SALT
REVENUE and all COMMISSIONERS, COL-
LECTORS and TREASURY OFFICERS.*Dated Bombay, 25th September 1882.*

In cancellation of all previous circulars on the subject, the following instructions are issued with a view to simplify the procedure in dealing with the Revenue and Expenditure of the Department of Salt Revenue at Treasuries other than those at Bombay and in Sind, and to remove the objections which have so often been raised since the introduction of the new system from 1st April 1881, by which fictitious remittances were abolished.

I.—Revenue.

2. The officers responsible for the collection of salt revenue are the officers in charge (Sar-karkuns) of the Salt Sub-Divisions. These officers will keep their accounts as from time to time ordered by the Collector of Salt Revenue, and will remit to the nearest Head-quarters or Sub-Treasury their available surplus. They should retain in hand as little cash as possible and should always endeavour to close the accounts of a month without a cash balance.

3. Each remittance will (in accordance with Chapter I., Rule 2 of the Civil Account Code) be accompanied by a statement (*chálán*) in duplicate which will give the amount tendered without any details beyond the usual particulars of the class of currency (notes, coin, &c.) in which the remittance is made. The money received will be dealt with in accordance with Chapter XII., Rule 6 of the Code, one copy of the statement being returned to the remitter in the manner directed in note 3 of that rule. Both statements should shew exactly on what day the money was received, and should also (for the information of the Collector of Salt Revenue) clearly specify the *month* in which the revenue will appear in the District Accounts.

II.—Expenditure.

4. Bills of the Salt Department should not be paid by City Treasuries but by officers of the Salt Department, and when the receipts do not enable them to meet the demands, money may be drawn from the nearest Civil Treasury on the written authority of the Commissioner or Collector of Salt Revenue. This authority should specify (1) the amount within which payment may be made, (2) the officer on whose receipt the money may be paid, and (3) the period (not to exceed a month) within which payment may be made. Treasury Officers should understand distinctly that they are prohibited from making any payment on account of the Salt Department except on the authority of the Commissioner or Collector of Salt Revenue (as provided above) or the Assistant Collector at Head Quarters in charge Account Branch.

III.—Record at Treasuries.

5. The Treasury Officer will record all sums received from, or paid to, Salt Officers under paragraphs 2 and 4 of this circular in a register (or ledger as it is locally called) in Form 15 of the Civil Account Code and will carry the daily total into the Civil Revenue and Expenditure Columns (Code 12—21-A. j) of the Cash Book as "Revenue (or Expenditure) of Salt Department" and show the monthly total under the major head VIII. Salt (or 10 Salt if the entry be for expenditure) in their accounts rendered to this office, leaving details to be filled in hereafter by this office as provided further on.

6. At the end of the month (*i. e.*, before the office closes on the last working day) a copy of the Treasury registers should be punctually sent to the Collector of Salt Revenue, and a memorandum should be inserted at the foot of the register giving the latest date up to which the daily sheets of the several Sub-Treasuries have been incorporated at the Head Quarter's Treasury.

IV.—Returns from Collector of Salt Revenue.

7. The Collector of Salt Revenue will, on or before the 7th of the month following that to which the accounts relate, furnish this office with a district classified abstract of the Revenue and Expenditure of his Department. This return should be prepared separately for each revenue treasury on the basis of the treasury figures, so that it may be substituted in this office for the entries made by the Treasury Officer under paragraph 5. For example, if the Treasury Officer, Thána, has received from the several Sub-Salt Officers in his District in April a gross sum of

Rs. 90,000, the salt abstract must be so arranged as to leave a net credit of Rs. 90,000, thus:—

8. On receiving this account my office will enter the receipts as Rs. 1,18,000 under the proper heads and expenditure as Rs. 28,000, and the District account will be complete.

9. The abstract sent by the Collector of Salt Revenue should be accompanied by complete vouchers and "Deposit" registers, and any objection that may be raised on these will be communicated to him and not to the District Treasury Officer.

V.—Salt Department Deposits.

10. The deposits will, in this office, be kept quite distinct as "Salt Department Deposits," subordinate to "Revenue" or "Personal" deposits (as the case may be) and the Collector of Salt Revenue will furnish all the prescribed annual returns and deal with lapses, &c. The District Treasury Officer will have no knowledge of these deposits, and can take no action regarding them.

11. This circular will apply to the repayment of deposits received under the system in force from 1st April 1881 up to 31st October 1882. The balances in the books of each Treasury at the end of October 1882 should be written off the Revenue and Personal Deposit Registers of the Treasury and should be credited to the new minor head "Salt Department Deposits", details of the credit being sent in the form of a Deposit Register of Receipts to this office and also to the Collector of Salt Revenue.

12. This circular is issued with the concurrence of the Commissioner of Salt Revenue and should be brought into force in preparing the accounts for November 1882.

Several instances having recently occurred of discrepancies between the Stamp Accounts furnished to this Office, and the corresponding

returns sent to the Superintendent of Stamps, the attention of all Account Officers is drawn to the necessity of having an exact agreement between the Treasury Accounts, and Revenue and other returns purporting to represent the same transaction.

2. A not unfrequent occasion for discrepancy is the practice of purchasers making payment into Branches of the Bank of Bombay in one month, and taking delivery of the Stamps at the Stamp Depot in the next month.

3. This practice is irregular; Stamps should be sold at the Collector's Office for cash, as is done at the Presidency Town, and the cash so received should be sent daily to the Bank, before it is closed for business; any sales which may be made after this daily remittance should be treated as sales of the following day, so as to secure an agreement between the departmental returns and Treasury Credits.
