No. 8157.—With reference to Government Notifications No. 2365 of 8th May 1878, No. 5214

of 2nd October 1880, and No. 6341 of 26th October 1881, published at pages 303, 850 and 656 of the *Bombay Government Gazettes* of 1878, 1880 and 1881 respectively, His Excellency the Governor in Council, under the provisions of Section 10 (c) of the Rules framed under the Opium Act, 1878, and notified in the *Bombay Government Gazette* Extraordinary of the 30th March 1878, is pleased to direct that the following condition shall, as soon as is consistent with existing engagements, come into force in lieu of the condition specified as (a) in each of the abovementioned Notifications namely:—

“(a) All opium so imported shall be subject to the rate of duty notified from time to time under Section 6 of the Opium Act, 1878, to be leviable on opium imported into the Presidency of Bombay for consumption therein, and payment of the duty leviable thereon shall be made in accordance with the provisions of the rules made under Section 5 of the Opium Act, 1878.”

His Excellency the Governor in Council is also pleased to direct that in paragraph 2 of the same Notifications the following words, namely—

“that the differential duty, if any, leviable on the opium under the proviso to rule 10 of the rules, made under Section 5 of the Opium Act, 1878, be paid,”

shall be inserted after the words “half-chests purchased” and before the words “and that the opium.”

No. 8182.—Under the provisions of Section 5 of the Opium Act I. of 1878 His Excellency the Governor in Council, with the previous sanction of the Governor General, is pleased to cancel the Government Notification No. 1367 of 16th March 1880, published at page 288 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I., of the 18th idem, directing the addition of the Udepur-Ahmedabad land route to the routes prescribed for the import of opium into the Presidency of Bombay in the eleventh of the Rules under the Opium Act published in the *Bombay Government Gazette* under date the 30th March 1878, except in so far as the said Notification cancels the previous Notification on the same subject, No. 4765, dated 6th September 1879.

His Excellency the Governor in Council is further pleased, with the sanction of the Government of India, to direct the substitution of the word "Chitor" for the word "Udepur" in Rule 14 of the aforesaid Rules.

## REGULATIONS.

1. The Exhibition will be opened on Thursday, February 15th, 1883. Live-stock will be exhibited till the evening of Saturday, February 17th. The remainder of the exhibits will continue on view on Monday and Tuesday, February 19th and 20th. The Exhibition will be closed during Sunday, February 18th.

2. The site of the Exhibition will be announced hereafter.

3. The admission charges will be as follows :—Payment of Re. 1 will entitle the ticket-holder to admission at any time. Entrance on the first day will be limited to the Re. 1 ticket-holders. Payment of Re.  $\frac{1}{2}$  will entitle the ticket-holder to admission from the morning of the second day. Up to 9 A.M. on the second day, entrance will be limited to the above two classes of ticket-holders. After which hour, and during the remainder of the Exhibition, admission will be FREE.

4. All care-takers of live-stock, and such other care-takers as may be admitted by the Show-yard Committee, shall be allowed free admission at any time.

5. All exhibits will be placed under cover.

6. Arrangements for trials of implements and machinery, and for a ploughing match will be made by the Show-yard Committee.

7. Competition is unrestricted, except where otherwise specified.

8. Decisions of Judges in the case of live-stock will be based on fixed scales of points. The Judges will be divided into sections of not less than three.

9. The Essays sent in for competition for prizes as notified in the prize list will be submitted to the decision of competent Judges.

10. Arrangements will be made by the Committee for the reception of dead-stock exhibits from Monday 12th, to Wednesday 14th February inclusive. All live-stock must be on the ground by 4 P.M. on the evening of Wednesday, February 14th.

11. Vegetable and dairy produce likely to deteriorate must be delivered on the ground before 6 o'clock on the morning of Thursday, February 15th.

12. The age of all live-stock (classified by age) will be calculated from the 1st January in the year of birth, unless the required notice states the exact age.

13. The stock, produce or article to be exhibited must be intimated to the Secretary by a separate notice for each class of exhibits in the printed forms which will be supplied by him. No stock, produce or article will be admitted without an admission order signed by the Secretary.

14. The notice will specify the name of the exhibit, the section, class and division in which it is to be entered, the name of the exhibitor, and the village, taluk and district in which he resides, &c. **This notice must be lodged with the Secretary on or before January 15th, 1883.**

15. The authorities in charge of the Exhibition cannot undertake the care and feeding of live-stock, but will only arrange that supplies of fodder may be purchased within the Exhibition grounds. It is therefore requested that no exhibits may be consigned to the Secretary when they are being forwarded to the Exhibition.

16. All stock and exhibits of all kinds must be removed within twenty-four hours after the close of the Exhibition. Exhibits remaining after that time will be disposed of as the Exhibition authorities see fit.

17. The prizes will be paid at the close of the Exhibition. In addition to the money prize, each winner of a prize will be entitled to a certificate.

18. No exhibit of any description will be allowed to leave the Exhibition grounds until the close of the Exhibition, excepting in very exceptional cases and only by permission of the Secretary.

19. Every reasonable care will be taken of the exhibits while in the Exhibition grounds, but no responsibility will be accepted by the Committee. The regulations laid down for ensuring the safety of exhibits will be strictly enforced.

20. The Essays must be lodged with the Secretary at the least ten days before the day on which the Exhibition is to be opened.

21. Government Institutions, or Institutions receiving aid from Government, will not compete, but will exhibit only.

22. The arrangements of the Exhibition will be conducted by the Committee; all persons entering the Exhibition grounds will be subject to their orders.

23. One servant or care-taker only, for each lot, will be admitted and he must continue in charge of his lot. Bulls must be secured by a ring, or screw in the nose with a chain or rope attached, or otherwise properly secured, or they cannot be admitted. Cows and heifers must have halters on their heads. The competing stock shall be distinguished by numbers only, and the owner's name shall not be made known until the prizes are awarded.

24. No marks which might indicate the ownership of stock, produce, or articles exhibited for prizes will be permitted.

25. No diseased animals can be admitted, and should any animal manifest symptoms of disease during the Exhibition, it will be immediately removed from the premises.

26. No application for space for exhibits can be received after January 15th, 1883.

27. Exhibitors will have to pay every expense of transit, delivery, fixing, and removing their exhibits, and they must either personally or by their agents superintend the reception and removal of their exhibits; in default whereof, the Committee reserves to itself the right of doing whatever may be considered necessary at the expense of the exhibitor.

28. The Committee are not responsible for warehousing packing-cases, which must be at once removed from the buildings at the expense of the exhibitors.

TREASURY ACCOUNT DEPARTMENT.

From—The ACCOUNTANT GENERAL, BOMBAY;

To—All COMMISSIONERS, COLLECTORS and TREASURY OFFICERS.

Bombay, 13th November 1882.

Considerable confusion exists regarding receipts and charges falling under the major head "Advances Recoverable" on the books of this Office and of the several District Treasuries, and I have therefore the honour to invite your attention to the following remarks on the subject.

2. The rules regarding "Advances" are contained in Chapter VII. of the Civil Account Code and should be carefully followed. Nothing must on any account be held under the head "Advances Recoverable" unless it is really recoverable. No Government charges awaiting adjustment may be held under "Advances."

3. The advances most common in this Presidency are—

I. Revenue Advances, viz. :—

Talukdári Settlement.

City Survey (Ahmedabad).

Cost of Boundary and Survey Marks and other charges really recoverable from land-holders.

Kolhápúr State Survey (Belgaum).

II. Excise Opium Advances.

III. Miscellaneous Advances.

3. "Accounts of Revenue Advances" should be maintained from the commencement of 1882-83 in strict accordance with Rule 8A. For the details of these advances the Treasury Officer is not responsible, and Commissioners are requested to state in what form they would wish to receive the return prescribed in clause 8 of the above rule.

4. "Excise Opium Advances" have already formed the subject of a separate Circular No. 64, dated 8th September 1882.

5. "Miscellaneous advances" are regulated by Rule 10, Treasury Officers should see that each advance is duly acknowledged by the responsible payee and is duly sanctioned. No detailed account or plus and minus memorandum of advances falling under this head is required by this Office, but a list of advances made or noted for recovery on the last-pay certificates of officers coming to the District should be maintained in each treasury with a column in which to enter repayments, so that the Treasury Officer may be able to say, when asked, how or when an advance has been adjusted either by recovery or by note on the last-pay certificate of an officer leaving the District on leave or transfer.

6. Refunds of "Miscellaneous Advances" must be clearly described in the manner directed in Rule 2, so that the repayment may be duly noted in this Office against the original advance. There is no objection to an advance made in one District being refunded in another District so long as a proper description is given against the credit.

7. Except for "Revenue Advances" no running account of advances may be maintained. Each advance will be separately recorded in the Objection Books of my Office and must be separately adjusted by the officer by whom or to whom it was made. Treasury Officers are responsible for seeing that miscellaneous advances are promptly recovered on due date in cash, or by deduction from Bills until the full amount is recovered or they pass on the responsibility to another Treasury Officer by noting it for recovery on a last-pay certificate.
