No. 1882.—Under the provisions of section 17 of the Indian Arms Act, 1878, and with reference

to paragraph IV (b) of Home Department Notification No. 518, dated the 6th March 1879, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following rule regarding the grant of licenses for the importation or transport of lead in all districts on the external land frontier of British India and in the sea-board districts of British Burma, when such lead is required for manufacturing or industrial purposes:—

Rule.

Licenses may be granted to persons without payment of any fee in all districts on the external land frontier of British India and in the sea-board districts of British Burma, enabling the holder to import or transport and in any quantity, when the same is required for manufacturing or industrial purposes, an officer granting licenses to be empowered to file for manufacture

No. 7656.—The following Notification by the District Magistrate of the District of the Bench of Magistrates placed at the town of Pandharpur,

are published as "Draft Rules under the consideration of Government" for the information of those whom they may concern:—

1. Every prosecution for any offence committed within the limits of the Town Municipality of Pandharpur in contravention of the provisions of the District Municipal Act (Bombay Act VI. of 1873) or of the bye-laws of the said Municipality made in accordance with the provisions of that Act, may be instituted before the Bench of Magistrates.

II.—The sittings of the Bench of Magistrates shall continue during each of the three principal Pandharpur Jatrás, namely, those held in Chaitri, Ashádi and Kártiki, ordinarily commencing seven days before the beginning and ending seven days after the termination of each Jatra, for the purpose of disposing of the cases referred to in the last preceding Rule.

III.—The sittings of the Bench of Magistrates shall be held every day of the week except Sunday at the Municipal Office, ordinarily between the hours of 10 A.M. and 5 P.M.

IV.—The Bench shall ordinarily consist of three Magistrates for the purpose of conducting trials; but if any Magistrate is, from any sufficient cause, prevented from attending any sitting of the Bench, the trials may proceed before the other two Magistrates sitting as a Bench.

V.—In the event of a difference of opinion arising between the Magistrates in session, the difference shall be settled by the majority, and in case there be no majority, by the Divisional Magistrate, or, if there be no Divisional Magistrate, by the District Magistrate.

RESOLUTION.—From the returns forwarded by the Public Works Department, a list has been prepared and is appended to this Resolution, showing articles which, on the information before the Governor General in Council, it is possible to obtain of Indian manufacture. His Excellency in Council accordingly directs that in future these articles shall be procured of Indian manufacture whenever it is possible to obtain them of quality good enough for the purposes for which they are required and at prices not higher than the cost of articles of similar quality imported from England. In no case should articles of these classes or of others which the country is capable of supplying be indented for until careful and extended enquiry has shown that the locally manufactured articles are substantially inferior in quality to, or dearer than, similar articles supplied under indent from the Secretary of State.

2. When the price at which particular articles can be obtained through the agency of the India Office is not known, reference may be made to the Director General of Railways.

3. Officers should take particular care to avoid purchasing, as articles nominally of Indian manufacture, tools and other similar articles evidently imported from Europe or America.

ORDERED, that the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the Public Works Department and to all Local Governments and Administrations for information and guidance, and that it be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.
