FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 4817.-The following Notification by the Government of India is republished :-

" DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE AND COMMERCE. No. 3091.

Fort William, the 8th December 1882.

Read again the undermentioned papers regarding the supply of stores required for the Public Service in India:

Financial Resolution No. 3574, dated 3rd November 1880. Office Memo. to the Public Works Department, No. 137, dated 22nd April 1881.

Read also-

Communications from the Public Works Department, No. 80A.G., dated 2nd February 1882, and No. 109 A.G., dated 21st February 1882, forwarding returns showing European stores purchased locally and procured from England through agents in India, during the years 1879-80 and 1880-81, by the Department in the Bombay Presidency, the Punjab, and Biluchistan.

RESOLUTION.—From the returns forwarded by the Public Works Department, a list has been

prepared and is appended to this Resolution, showing articles which, on the information before the Government of India, it is possible to obtain of Indian manufacture, and His Excellency the Governor General in Council directs that in future these articles shall be procured of Indian manufacture, whenever it is possible to obtain them of quality good enough for the purposes for which they are required and at prices not higher than the cost of articles of similar quality imported from England. In no case should articles of these classes or of others which the country is capable of supplying, be indented for until careful and extended enquiry has shown that the locally manufac-tured articles are substantially inferior in quality to, or dearer than, similar articles supplied under indent from the Secretary of State.

Officers should take particular care to avoid purchasing, as articles nominally of Indian manu-facture, tools and other similar articles evidently

imported from Europe or America.

3. When the price at which particular articles can be obtained through the agency of the India Office is not known, reference may be made to the Director General of Railways.

ORDERED, that the foregoing Resolution be communicated to the Public Works Department and to all Local Governments and Administrations for information and guidance, and that it be published in the Gazette of India for general information.

V. Staff Officers and Special Service Officers will forward their applications through the General Officers under whom they served. General Officers who served as such will forward rolls in favour of themselves and their respective Staffs.

VI. Officers who served as Heads of Departments will furnish returns of Officers and others who served under their command.

VII. Officers commanding Batteries of Royal Artillery, Companies of Royal Engineers, Regiments of Cavalry, and Battalions of Infantry and Companies of Commissariat and Transport Corps, will forward nominal rolls of Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-commis-sioned Officers and men who served under their command.

VIII. The rolls are to be prepared in duplicate, in conformity with the form given in the Appendix. They should be made out on foolscap, the writing to be lengthwise, from bottom to top of each page, with a margin of an inch on each side of the fold of the

IN THE HIGH COURT OF JUDICATURE AT BOMBAY.

IN APPEALS FROM THE ORDINARY ORIGINAL CIVIL JURISDICTION.

The following Rules shall come into force on the 1st January 1883 in supersession of the Rules in Chapter IV., page 45, High Court Rules:—

1. A Memorandum of Appeal shall be in the Form A hereto annexed and shall be accompanied by a copy of the Decree or Order appealed against, but a copy of the Judgment shall not be required.

2. The Memorandum shall be presented to the Prothonotary (except in Insolvency matters, when it may be presented to the Judge in Chamber or to any division Court).

the Memorandum of Appeal the Appellant shall, unless allowed to appeal as a pauper or a wife in a Divorce case, deposit in Court the sum of Rupees 500 as security for the costs of the Respondent, or if more than one, for the costs of each Respondent having different interests and appearing by different Attorneys, and shall obtain from the Prothonotary a Certificate of such deposit having been made.

If the Memorandum of Appeal fulfils the condition of Rule I, is accompanied by the Certificate in Rule 3 mentioned, and is presented within the time allowed by the Limitation Act, the Prothonotary shall file the same.

5. The time requisite for obtaining a copy of a Decree or Order within the meaning of the Limitation Act, Section 12, shall be deemed to be the time actually occupied in drawing up the original and issuing a copy thereof, which shall not exceed ten days.

6. The Prothonotary shall reject the Memorandum of Appeal-

If the Memorandum is not in accordance with Rule 1 or unaccompanied by the Certificate under Rule 3.

If the Appellant has not applied to the (b) If the Appellant has not applied that Prothonotary or other officer whose duty it is to prepare the same, for a copy of the Decree or Order (and if necessary to have the original drawn up) within 20 days after the date of the Judgment being pronounced.

(c) If the Memorandum is not presented within 20 days and such further time as is

allowed by the preceding Rule.

(d) And in the case of Appeals under the Indian Companies Act, 1882, unless the notice required by Section 169 of the said Act has been given.

When a Memorandum of Appeal is filed the Appellant or his Attorney shall apply forthwith to the Clerk of the Judge by whom the case was tried for a copy of the Judge's notes of the trial, which copy must be certified by such Judge's Clerk and must be filed with the Prothonotary at least two days before the day fixed for the hearing of the Appeal, a copy of the Paper-book must also be forwarded by the Appellant or his Attorney to the Clerk of each of the Judges sitting in Appeal

8. The Paper-book shall contain a copy of the Memorandum of Appeal, Decree or Order, Judgment (if any), Plaint, Written Statement, and Exhibits, and shall be properly paged and indexed.

9. When an Appeal or Application for review of Judgment is presented in any Court after the period of limitation prescribed therefor, such Appeal or Application shall be accompanied by an Affidavit setting forth the cause of the delay.

TESTAMENTARY AND INTESTATE JURISDICTION.

The following Rules shall come into force on the 1st January 1883: -

- 1. The practice and procedure in all cases which shall be brought before the Court in the exercise of its Original Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction (other than those already provided for by Act V. of 1881), shall be regulated as far as the circumstances of each case will admit by the Rules of Procedure laid down in the Indian Succession Act, subject, however, in all such cases, as well as in cases under Act V. of 1881, to the rules of this Court so far as they are not inconsistent with either of such Acts or of the Civil Procedure Code.
- 2. In cases not provided for by the Indian Succession Act or by Act V. of 1881 or by the Civil Procedure Code or by the said rules, the Rules of practice and procedure of the High Court of Probate in England will be followed in this Court so far as applicable and not inconsistent with the Acts in the last rule mentioned.
- The Registrar shall have full power to administer oaths or solemn affirmations and to take affidavits in all matters relating to the business of the Court in its Testamentary and Intestate Jurisdiction and to issue subpoenas to bring in and lodge testamentary papers and generally to exercise such of the powers in non-contentious matters conferred by the Indian Succession Act on the District Judges as he now exercises.
