Bombay Castle, 14th February 1882.

No. 1035.—His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to prescribe the following rules for the guidance of Judging Committees of District Horse Shows in the Bombay Presidency:—

- I. Only *bona fide* horse-breeders will be allowed to compete for prizes. The Judging Committee will decide as to the eligibility of competitors.
- II. A mare of 4 years of age in foal or with foal at foot, the result of having been covered before 4 years of age, will not be eligible to compete.
- III. No mares or stock will be allowed to compete as "served by Government Stallions," or "got by Government Stallions," unless a certificate to that effect is produced by the exhibitor. These certificates are obtainable from officers in charge of Stallions.
- IV. Intending exhibitors should, on arrival at the Show, apply to the Secretary of the Judging Committee for a ticket or tickets as the case may be, stating the class in which they propose to compete.
- V. Each ticket will be worn by the animal as a token of the right to compete.
- VI. When the tickets are given, the Secretary will name the date, hour and place at the Show, when and where horses should be brought for examination. A shamiana (or large tent) or shed, to afford shade to the Committee, within a temporary railed enclosure, should be erected to allow of the members to carefully examine the stock. The public should not be permitted to enter the enclosure during the Committee's proceedings.
- VII. Prizes will be awarded on the day appointed by the President for the Judging Committee.
- VIII. A certificate (*parvána*) will be given to each winner whether he takes his prizes in money, khillat, or medal, as he may think best.
- IX. Discretion is to be used by the Judging Committee in awarding only a portion of prizes to any class, if the stock of that class

be not considered worthy of all prizes noted, and the money not awarded may be devoted to the giving of extra prizes in other classes deemed by the Judging Committee as worthy of them, as it is the desire of Government to award the total sum granted, provided *any* of the classes of stock competing are in *any way* worthy of it.

X. The system of marks will be adopted as follows:—

Marks for action have not been accorded to mares, as some competing may be too heavy in foal to allow of their action being shown. The Judging Committees are requested to be good enough to attach a return to their reports showing the number of the several marks allotted to winners of prizes.

NOTE 1.—On future occasions, prizes for geldings will be increased in number and value, and those for colts not castrated will be proportionately decreased. To enable a horse to become eligible to compete in the gelding class, *both testicles must have been excised.*

2. The prizes allotted to the class geldings are to be invariably awarded to the best competing, irrespective of their worth in other respects. Prizes in this class to be awarded only to stock that have been castrated when in possession of their present owners, *bona fide* horse-breeders, and provided the Judging Committee are satisfied the animals have been castrated with a view of competing for the prizes.

2. The above rules will be applicable to all District Horse Shows except to the "fancy classes" of the Poona Horse Show.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General observes that black writing ink of Indian manufacture, and of good quality as regards colour and durability, is procurable at a price much cheaper than that paid for the imported article.

2. In pursuance of the policy of the Government of India to substitute articles of Indian manufacture for European stores, His Excellency in Council directs that the use of Morrell's black registration ink shall be discontinued, and that Stephen's blue-black and black ink shall be issued in small quantities, sufficient only for the use of the few high functionaries who may prefer it to Indian-made ink.

3. Red registration ink apparently must still be imported, as a permanent and useful red ink has not yet been prepared in the country.

ORDERED, that the foregoing Resolution be communicated to all Local Governments and Administrations, as well as to the Superintendent of Stationery, Calcutta, and the several Departments of the Government of India for information and guidance.

And also, that the Resolution and the letter from the Superintendent of Stationery, No. 4806 of 16th January 1882, be published in the *Gazette of India*.

With reference to your letters Nos. 3134 and 3201, dated the 20th and 26th September last I have the honour to report as follows.

2. On receipt of your letters I collected all the samples of ink in issue from this store, and also obtained others from Dr. Waldie and Mr. John Thomson, another well-known local manufacturer of writing ink, and placed myself in communication with the Government Chemical Examiner, Dr. Warden, whose report on the subject I beg to forward in original, with the accompanying abstract compiled from it.

3. Ten samples of inks, distinguished on the margin, were sent to the Chemical Examiner for report as to their durability and relative merits. Of these descriptions of ink, Nos. 1, 3, and 4 (black ink) and Nos. 2 and 9 (red ink) are of European make, and the rest are locally manufactured.
- Black Ink (Fluid).
 - No. 1. Morrell's black registration.
 - 3. Stephen's black ink.
 - 4. " blue-black ink.
 - 5. Dr. Waldie's black. (Powder.)
 - 8. Amritolal Roy's black.
 - Red Ink.
 - 2. Morrell's red registration.
 - 6. Dr. Waldie's brilliant red.
 - 7. " crimson.
 - 9. Fuchsine anilino crystals.
 - 10. Thomson's roseate.

4. From the result of the experiments made by the Chemical Examiner, there does not appear to

exist any appreciable difference between Morrell's black registration ink (No. 1), Stephen's ink Nos. 3 and 4, and Dr. Waldie's No. 5, so as to make it advisable to use ink No. 1 for registration purposes. In comparing the relative cost of these inks it will be found that Dr. Waldie's ink No. 5 is the cheapest, and is lower in price than Morrell's No. 1 by Rs. 8-4-0 per dozen quarts, while at the same time it is reported to have most resisted the action of the re-agents used. An objection to it is that the quality is not always uniform, but this may be overcome.

The relative cost of the three inks is as follows, being largely in favour of Dr. Waldie's:—

5. I am therefore of opinion that Morrell's black registration ink No. 1 and Stephen's black No. 3 may be replaced by Dr. Waldie's black ink No. 5. It must, however, be left to Government to decide whether the use of Stephen's inks Nos. 3 and 4 should altogether be discontinued, as certain officers demur to the use of Dr. Waldie's ink, and the consumption of Stephen's ink is about 500 bottles a year, which is issued only to the special officers noted on the margin.

6. The bulk of the ink supply to offices in the interior is in the shape of powder, and this is a necessity not only to avoid the risks of breakage, but on account of the compactness and comparative cheapness of transit, and these considerations must largely affect the question both as to black and red inks. The quantity of each issued in a fluid and in a dry state in one year is as follows:

7. English ink powder was formerly used, but during the last eight years the article manufactured in this country has been substituted. The sample No. 8 by Amritolal Roy is being tried for the first time during the current official year. It is cheap, and appears to me to be good enough for general purposes. During the last nine months that it has been issued, I have received only three complaints as to its quality; but most objections made to the ink arise from want of care and cleanliness in the preparation of the ink.

8. The Chemical Examiner reports that the ink produced from No. 8 was 'the only one that

showed marked signs of fading on exposure to the action of light,' but the signs were on the whole very faint, and the test was a severe one, such as in ordinary use writing ink is never subjected to. In other respects it is said not to differ materially from the other samples. 'All flow well and produce a good colour on paper.' Sample No. 8 is also decidedly the cheapest, the price per bottle of 18 ounces, the product of two packets of powder according to the results given by the Chemical Examiner, being 1 anna 3 pie against 1 anna 11 pie for the same volume of Dr. Waldie's No. 5, which is the next cheapest. Dr. Warden has made a mistake in reckoning the cost at Re. 1 per dozen instead of 8 annas per dozen packets of the powder. I consider, therefore, that it is not necessary to disturb the present mode of supplying Mofussil offices with ink in powder. Any existing defect in quality will probably be removed in time by competition, the contract being made yearly.

9. With respect to red ink, the use of No. 9 (Fuchsine aniline crystals), which has the advantage of all the others in point of cheapness, was approved in your letter No. 3649, dated 12th November 1880. All the samples are said to be aniline inks, with the exception of No. 2 Morrell's, which is composed of vegetable colouring materials. The Chemical Examiner reports: 'The only red ink which resisted the action of sun-light was Morrell's No. 2, but, on the other hand, its colour was discharged more or less completely by three of the re-agents used,' and that 'the certainty of aniline inks fading after a comparatively short period renders them unfit for work in which any thing like permanency is requisite.'

10. It would therefore appear that Morrell's ink is best suited for the registration work, for which it is required, being the most durable as respects sun-light and washing out in boiling water, but for all other general purposes the ink from Fuchsine crystals seems to me sufficiently well adapted, if carefully prepared. As regards liability to fade in common with the other aniline samples, I beg to submit a specimen sheet written upon in 1877 with Fuchsine ink, which exhibits no apparent sign of decay, and greater permanency is scarcely requisite for ordinary records. Its extreme cheapness and portability are greatly in its favour, and I would therefore recommend its continued adoption for the general stock.

11. I beg to submit herewith as further directed a memorandum of the cost of despatching a dozen quart bottles of ink to the stations named, but I would mention that ink in powder being generally supplied to those stations, the heavy cost of transit in bottles here given is not incurred.

12. The ten samples of ink examined by the Chemical Examiner are herewith forwarded.

Whenever such Indian-made belting is obtainable of quality suited to the work required and at a price not higher than that of imported belting, it should be purchased, and no indents for this article on the India Office should be allowed.
