## GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 24th August 1865.*

No. 453 of 1865.—The services of Assistant Surgeon A. N. E. Riddell have been placed at the disposal of the Commander of the Forces.

*Bombay Castle, 29th August 1865.*

No. 454 of 1865.—The Government of India has ruled, subject to the approval of Her Majesty's Government, that in case of the Wing of a Regiment being detached for a probably long period, and to a great distance, the Assistant Instructor of Musketry shall be attached to one of the Wings, and receive the allowances of an Assistant Instructor for so long as the Wings are so separated.

No. 455 of 1865.—The following Order, published by His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, is made applicable to this Presidency:—

*Head Quarters, Simla, 29th May 1865.*

With the sanction of Government, His Excellency the Commander in Chief is pleased to announce that from the 1st May 1865, the system of repairs of interchangeable Rifles of the pattern 1853, promulgated in War Office Circular, No. 697, dated 15th July 1861, published in Government General Orders, No. 1088, of 28th November 1861,\* shall be introduced into all Regiments of Her Majesty's British Forces serving in India armed with trade-made arms. To meet the special requirements of service in this country and repair of these Rifles, the following additional regulations are laid down:—

1. The pay of trained Armourer Sergeants with Regiments and in the Ordnance Department is fixed at 5s. or Rupees 2-8 per diem for the seven days in the week.
2. Reduced Armourer Sergeants will receive 2s. 6d. or Rupees 1-4 daily for seven days in the week, being the same as is paid to the Private Armourer on enlistment under Her Majesty's Warrant of June 1858. They will be employed in the Arsenals and Magazines, and will be eligible for promotion to their former rank and re-employment with Regiments, should their conduct prove deserving of recommendation to His Excellency the Commander in Chief.
3. All trained Armourers will receive Rations or compensation in lieu, the Clothing and Quarters of their rank, with subsistence allowance for their wives and children.
4. No deductions will be made from their pay and allowances on account of authorized leave of absence, provided Government be put thereby to no additional expense.
5. Armourer Sergeants requiring change to the Hills on account of health will be attached to Convalescent Depôts. They will be selected by Medical Boards, and sent to the Hills under exactly the same regulations, and at the same time, as other soldiers.
6. Should it be impracticable to make proper arrangements regimentally for the repair of arms during the absence at a Depôt of the Armourer Sergeant, application should be made through the Officer commanding the Division for the temporary services of an Armourer Sergeant attached to the nearest Magazine or Arsenal, if one be available.
7. In order to compensate the Armourer Sergeant for his additional labour in making the component parts of trade arms fit, an increased charge to that laid down in the War Office Circular, as detailed in column D of the Statement following, is sanctioned for certain repairs, and is to be paid to the Armourer Sergeant, who is required, in consideration of such extra remuneration, to provide any additional labour for repairing the arms that he may find needful.
8. All repairs to arms injured, either intentionally or by carelessness, are to be paid for by the men at the regulated rates specified in columns A and B of the annexed Statement. The Captains of Companies will be responsible for recovering the charges for these damages, and for crediting the amount to the public less the amounts in columns B and D, which are to be paid to the Armourer Sergeants, as provided for in the following para.
9. To meet the case of repairs which have to be charged to the soldiers, the Statement shows in column A the cost of the materials, column B shows the sum to be paid by the soldier to the Sergeant Armourer for his extra labour in replacing the several parts enumerated in that column as most likely to be thus damaged. This payment to the Sergeant Armourer with the cost of the material will be the total charge against the soldier; but, as the materials will have been originally supplied without charge, their value when thus used, to make good loss and damage, must be credited to the public less the further amounts in column D which are to be paid to the Armourer Sergeant.
10. The sum of eight annas a year per arm shall be deducted from each Captain's contingent allowance, and credited to the public, in aid of the expense incurred in maintaining the arms in repair.
11. To enable the Armourer Sergeant to perform the duty of browning the arms as part of his regular duty, he may be allowed the assistance necessary for the purpose from the Regiment, the men employed under his direction being allowed the usual working pay, provided the amount does not exceed Rupees 9 per 100 Rifles. Fuel will also be supplied at the public expense as follows:—Charcoal 4 maunds, Firewood 10 seers, monthly, throughout the

year, for repairs, and 4½ maunds of Firewood weekly for twenty weeks while the arms are being browned. The fuel will be supplied by the Commissariat in the usual manner, the allowance of Firewood for browning being furnished only upon the certificate of the Officer commanding the Regiment that two years have elapsed since the arms were last browned. Coal, coke, or other fuel, at the option of the Armourer Sergeant, may be supplied, provided the expense be not increased.

12. The annexed Statement contains a list of component parts which will be furnished at the public expense to the Armourer Sergeant for the repair of Rifles on the system now introduced; they will be obtained annually on indent by the Officer commanding the Regiment when Ammunition is indented for: at the same time an account is to be rendered of the receipts and expenditure of the material, and of the number of the several articles remaining in possession of the Quarter Master, showing the amounts recovered from soldiers per column A, and the payments (column D) made to the Armourer Sergeant, the balance, if due to the Regiment, will be adjusted by a Contingent Bill at foot of the account, or, if due to Government, the Pay Master's receipt for the amount should be attached.

13. Indents must show the description of arm for which the component parts are required, viz:—

*Short Rifles.*

- 1st. Steel mountings, all of one pattern and fittings. } Trade Arms.
- 2nd. Brass " " " } Interchangeable.
- 3rd. Brass or Steel " " " }

*Long Enfield Rifled Musket, pattern 1853.*

- 1st. Spring Band with swell rod, without jag. } Trade Arms.
- 2nd. " " " with jag. }
- 3rd. " " with straight rod and jag ... }
- 4th. Screw Bands " " }
- 5th. Interchangeable or Machine—made at Enfield Royal Factory.

*Carbines.*

- 1st. Royal Artillery Carbine Enfield bore, all one pattern and fittings. } Trade Arms.
- 2nd. Victoria Rifled Cavalry Carbine " " }
- 3rd. Sharp's breech-loading " " Interchangeable.

The indent should include spare muzzle stoppers and snap caps at the rate of 15 per cent., and spare corks and leathers at 20 per cent., the charge for which will be the same as laid down in the War Office Circulars. Rangoon is the only Oil to be used for cleaning and oiling Rifles, and must be obtained from Arsenal and Magazines on the same indent, on payment.

Statement showing the Articles required for the repair of the Interchangeable Rifle Musket, pattern 1853, and the prices to be paid for each repair on the Interchangeable principle, and showing also the additional allowance for repairing Trade Arms, not Machine made, the material, or parts of other arms, being furnished by the public, and made to fit by the Armourer.

ARMOURER'S SHOPS.  
FORGES AND TOOLS.

With the sanction of Government, the Commander in Chief is pleased to announce, that a standard plan of Armourer's Shop with Fittings, as per margin, has been approved by Government, and ordered to be provided for British Troops at all stations, as soon as can conveniently be done.

List of Fittings.

- 1 Arm Racks for 80, or 100 stand of Arms.
- 2\* A Trough or Boiler for Browning Arms.
- 3\* Forge anvil to weigh 1 cwt. 2 qrs. 12 lbs.
- 4\* Bellows, 21 inch.
- 5 A Bench 32 inches high, 3 feet wide, with Fittings for 2 vices and a lath.
- 6 A Rack for Files and Tools above the Bench.
- 7 A Shelf for Tools above the Rack.
- 8 An Almshouse let into the wall, with Padlock, for spare Tools and Chemicals.
- 9\* A Grinding Stone.

Note 1.—On a march being ordered from any station, the above will be transferred to Barrack Master and made over by him to relieving Regiment. The Armourer Sergeant will be assessed damages for any injury to the above Buildings or Fittings, not caused by fair wear and tear.

Note 2.—Whenever an Armourer becomes Non-Effective, or is transferred, or is proceeding on leave, the state of the Forge Tools, Shop and Fittings is to be ascertained by a Board, and any found deficient, unserviceable, or repairable are to be charged to him.

Note 3.—The articles marked with a \* will be supplied by Ordnance on the Indent of Barrack Masters. The other Fittings by the Department Public Works when building the Shop.

2. Field Forges complete with tools will, in the first instance, be supplied to each Regiment and permanent Convalescent Depot, at the public expense, but the Armourer Sergeant will keep up the tools in the Field Forge issued to Regiments without extra cost to the public. The tools required to keep up the Forge will be supplied, on the requisition of Commanding Officers, at English cost prices.

3. Indents for Field Forges and Tools required to complete and to replace such as are wanting or unserviceable, are to be furnished to the Inspector General of Ordnance by Corps at once. Condemnations on account of pattern will not be sanctioned, and the period the Forge or Tools have been in use must be distinctly stated. Field Forges and Tools will be required to continue in service for 20 years, except Plates, Screw, Armourer's, small, which will be renewed every three years.

NEW PATTERN ARMOURER'S FIELD FORGE.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR USE.

To unpack the Forge.

- 1st. Take out the drawer and the door.
- 2nd. Take out the firepan and tewel, and fix them in the three holes on the side of the bench, pressing them home.
- 3rd. The wood horses and mallet are contained inside the block.
- 4th. Fix the vice, the bolts of which, as also for the horses, are in the drawer. Place the spindle and rockstaff through the two holes filled with cork on the top of the bench.
- 5th. The false bottom contains the heavy tools.

To repack the Forge.

- 1st. Take down the vice and put it away, then the block, next the anvil, and last the firepan. Put in the drawer and side door.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.
