## FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Financial Department, dated the 16th August 1865, No. 1802, is published for general information :—

READ an endorsement from the Public Works Department, No. 1108E, dated 27th June 1865, referring for consideration the two following questions connected with leave of absence to Uncovenanted Servants :—

1st.—Whether six months' leave on private affairs can be granted to an Uncovenanted Officer who has not served six years from the date of first appointment.

2nd.—Whether the leave can be taken by instalments.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council observes that the first leave for six months is *not* due until the completion of six years' service; and that the six months' leave cannot be taken in two instalments ;—the Rule says explicitly "leave on private affairs for six months in one period."

Ordered, that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be sent to the Public Works Department, and that the original papers received therefrom be returned, copies being kept for record.

Sir,—I am directed to forward to you, for information and guidance, the accompanying copy of the

correspondence noted in the margin, from which it will be seen that the Governor General in Council has allowed certain of the prisoners at Port Blair the indulgence of sending for their relations from India; and I am to request that, if the persons named in the 13th column of the accompanying Return are within the degree of relationship recommended in my letter to the Chief Commissioner, British Burmah, No. 1156, dated 17th instant, and should be willing to proceed to that Settlement, the necessary arrangements may be made for sending them.

2. It will further be observed that the Chief Commissioner of British Burmah has been requested to instruct the convicts to write to their families on this subject, and to send the letters written by them to the several Local Governments and Administrations, for the purpose of being delivered through the District Authorities. On the receipt of these letters, it is requested that measures may be taken for their immediate delivery to the parties concerned, whose wishes as to going or not going to Port Blair can then be ascertained.

3. A similar communication has been made to the Governments of Bengal, Madras, North Western Provinces, and the Punjab, and to the Chief Commissioners of Oudh and the Central Provinces.

4. It is desirable that none of those sent should arrive at Port Blair before the month of November next, and that no unnecessary expense should be incurred in sending them.

From Lieutenant-Colonel A. P. PHAYRE, C.B., Chief Commissioner of British Burmah, and Agent to the Governor General, to E. C. BAYLEY, Esq., Secretary to the Government of India—(No. 140 P. B., dated Port Blair, the 7th April 1865).

With reference to your letter No. 4902, dated the 6th of October last, I have the honour to submit, in original, letter No 117, dated 25th of February 1865, from the Superintendent of Port Blair, relative to the wives or other near relatives of transported convicts being allowed to join their husbands at Port Blair. Major Ford has also enclosed three lists marked A, B, and C, of those convicts whose families he recommends should be allowed to join them.

2. As a general rule, Major Ford proposes that a convict shall serve three years at Port Blair before he shall be allowed to send for his family, and then only in case he shall have been well-behaved. I beg to support this proposition.

3. I understand from the letter under reply, that His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General in Council directs that none but a life-convict shall, as a general rule, be allowed to apply for his family to be to sent him; but that, in special cases, convicts under sentence for a term of years may be permitted to do so. Acting on this view Major Ford has included some term-of-years' convicts in his list; but these form a small proportion.

4. List marked A contains the names of convicts from the Bengal Presidency. There are 46 in all. Of these, all but five are under sentence of transportation for life. Of the five term-of-years' convicts two are under sentence for 20 years, two for 16, and one for 17 years. The two for 20 years may almost be viewed as being under sentence for life, and the three others are exceptional cases. The lists marked B and C contain names of life-prisoners only, from the Madras and Bombay Presidencies.

5. I trust that the information afforded regarding each prisoner in the lists sent, will be all that is required.

6. On the general question of allowing the families of convicts who have behaved well to have the option of coming to Port Blair, I think that on several grounds it is desirable to allow the indulgence. In the first place, I consider that the Settlement will not on the whole be thereby deprived of its essential penal character; whilst the great object of gradually establishing self-supporting convict cultivators, who shall raise produce for the supply of food to the great body of the convicts, and supply workmen and artificers generally, will be gradually attained. This, there can be no doubt, will eventually diminish the expense of the Settlement. Already the number of self-supporting convicts in the Settlement amounts to 313 males and 148 females, who are no expense whatever to Government. Indeed each pays a fee of one Rupee a month for the privilege. It may also be right to mention that the continued forced existence of so many males together must lead to depraved practices, which the proposed measure would materially check. On the whole, therefore, I beg to recommend that His Excellency the Governor General in Council may be pleased to allow the families of the convicts now entered in the lists to proceed to Port Blair, provided the relation to the convict applied for be that of wife, husband, or child. A set of Rules will be framed, showing the proposed manner of dealing with these convicts and their families, which will be submitted hereafter. As the South-West monsoon is now near at hand, it would of course be desirable that none of these families should reach Port Blair earlier than November 1865.

From Major B. FORD, Superintendent of Port Blair, to Major H. NELSON DAVIES, Secretary to the Chief Commissioner of British Burmah—(No. 117, dated the 25th February 1865).

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, No. 03967A, dated 1st November 1864, with which you forward me copy of Home Secretary's letter No. 4902, dated 6th October last, by whose directions you call for precise information regarding the prisoners whose families, it is recommended, should join their husbands at Port Blair. I have now the honor to forward enclosed lists\* of certain selected life and exceptional term-convicts, to whom the option has been given of sending for their families, and who accept the offer.

2. In preparing these lists I have carefully borne in mind the principles that His Excellency the Governor General in Council has desired that I should keep in view, and which are described in clauses B and C of para. 3 of the Home Secretary's letter, above quoted. I have been somewhat in doubt as to the difference of meaning (setting one expression against the other) intended to be conveyed by the words "convict sentenced for a term of years" and "an exceptional term-convict," not being quite certain as to what number of years sentence to transportation constitutes a "term-of-years' convict," and an "exceptional term-convict;" and having consulted such authorities as I have at my disposal, viz., Act XXIV. of 1865, and "Beaufort's Digest of Criminal Law," and not finding therein any definition of the terms, I have, in framing my lists, assumed that any convict sentenced to transportation up to 14 years is inadmissible thereto, and that all convicts whose sentences exceed the period of 14 years are qualified, if recommended, for this indulgence. Should I have been in error, the names of those to whom it is not the intention of Government to allow the privilege of sending for their families, can be easily struck out.

3. With regard to life-convicts, and those who I assume to be exceptional term-convicts, for whom it is directed that some period of servitude should be fixed, at the end of which they may be permitted to send for their families, I beg to report that I have fixed a period of three years' servitude. I have fixed this period as I find that convicts, who have been three years in this Settlement, have already been allowed by Government, when recommended, to send for their families thither: I find that there are some who have been allowed the same privilege within 18 months of their arrival at the Settlement; but I do not recommend so great a privilege after so brief a period of transportation.

4. It will be observed that I have only recommended those convicts for the indulgence of being permitted to send for their families who have been well-behaved here.

5. The full particulars required in Mr. Bayley's para. 4 are, it will be observed, afforded in the lists now submitted.

6. I take note that the scale of allowances proposed by me for the families of convicts on arrival at this Settlement has been approved of by the Government.

SIR,—I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 140 P. B., dated the 7th April, forwarding a letter from the Superintendent of Port Blair, with three lists of convicts whose families he recommends should be allowed to join them.

2. In reply I am to inform you that, excepting two of the prisoners named in the list marked A., the Governor General in Council grants the indulgence recommended by you in each case in which the relation applied for is wife, husband, or child. Instructions will be issued accordingly to the several Local Governments and Administrations within whose jurisdiction the persons who are required to proceed to Port Blair are living, and in these instructions your desire that none of those sent should reach the Settlement earlier than November next will be noted.

3. It is essential, however, that the convicts named in the lists should themselves write to their families, as a letter from them will be the best means of inducing their families to proceed to Port Blair. Such letters should be sent by yourself to each Local Government or Administration, for the purpose of being delivered through the District Authorities.

4. The two prisoners excepted above are those named on the margin, regarding whom further information is necessary. Their offences are said to be escaping from Jail (under Act V. of 1858); but under recent orders they ought to have been released, unless they are specially dangerous characters, which should have been stated in the report. Inquiry will also be made as to these men from the Local Governments.

5. The general rule proposed by Major Ford, that a convict shall serve at least three years at Port Blair before he shall be allowed to send for his family, is approved by the Governor General in Council.

## GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 4th September 1865.*

No. 460 of 1865.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 14th August 1865, No. 781, is republished:—

"No. 781 of 1865.—A question having arisen as to the amount of pay to be allowed to a soldier performing the duties of an armourer during the temporary absence, or long continued sickness of the Armourer Sergeant, or during a temporary vacancy in that appointment, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction in such cases a special working pay of eight annas per diem to the soldier whom it may be found actually necessary to appoint to this duty.

2. In the event of the appointment being vacant, this charge, as also any expenditure for components, fuel, and other material for repairing, browning, or cleaning arms, will be borne by the State, and charged for in Contingent Bills countersigned by the Commanding Officer and Quarter Master of the Regiment, all receipts on account of such expenses being brought to the credit of Government.

3. But if the acting appointment is necessitated by the sickness or temporary authorized absence of the Armourer Sergeant, the working pay of his substitute will be deducted from his allowance of two rupees eight annas per diem.

4. It is, however, to be understood that in the event of the protracted absence of the Armourer Sergeant, arrangements should be made, when practicable, to obtain the services of an acting trained armourer, as laid down in General Order by the Commander-in-Chief of 29th May 1865.

POLICE OFFICE, BYCULLA, BOMBAY.

The Architectural Improvement Committee of Bombay have received instructions from Her Majesty's Government of Bombay to call for Competition Designs for a new Police Office at Byculla. The cost of the Building not to exceed, at present prices, three lacs of Rupees.

The extent of accommodation to be provided and other particulars as to site, &c., can be ascertained on application at the office of the Architectural Improvement Committee, Esplanade.

Each Design to be sent, in the first instance, as a pen and ink Architectural sketch, uncoloured and without shading, except such as can be done with the pen. Each Design should bear a motto, and should be accompanied by the Architect's address in a sealed envelope, and should be sent in on or before the First day of October 1865, addressed to the Architectural Improvement Committee of Bombay.

A premium of Rupees one thousand (1,000) will be awarded to the author of the Design approved, to be increased on the completion of the Contract Drawings of the selected Design, with specifications and table of quantities, to (2½) two and a half per cent. on the cost of the work when estimated at the current rates of the Public Works Department.

The style is left an open question, but the construction of the building, and its Architectural treatment must be thoroughly adapted to a tropical climate, where a high temperature and monsoon rains have to be provided against. Due regard must be had to the contemplated outlay; yet the Designs, whilst not too ornate, must be effective, and possess sufficient Artistic merit to entitle them to compete for the premium.

If the Designs are wanting in Artistic merit, or fail to comply with the conditions, the Judges will have power to reduce or withhold the prize. No prize will be given to a Design because it merely fulfills the conditions as to cost, &c., if it is conspicuously deficient in Artistic merit.

The Design will be selected, and the award made, by the Architectural Improvement Committee of Bombay.

Unsuccessful Designs will be returned to the authors if claimed by them or their authorized agents, within three months from the date of adjudication.

**Mauritius and Cape of Good Hope Mails.**—An intimation has been received from Her Majesty's Post Master General of England of the establishment of a monthly communication between Port Louis (Mauritius) and Table Bay (Cape of Good Hope), calling at Natal.

The Branch Packet will leave Port Louis immediately after the arrival of the Packet from Suez and Aden, that is about the 25th of the month, and will return to Port Louis in time for the Packet appointed to leave for Aden and Suez on the 6th of each month.

Letters for Natal and the Cape of Good Hope, St. Helena, and Ascension, if marked *via* Aden and Mauritius, will be sent by the route abovementioned.
