No. 487 of 1865.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 8th September 1865, No. 847, is republished:—

“No. 847 of 1865.—In continuation of para. 1 of G. G. O. No. 531 of 1864, and with reference to para. 12 of the Secretary of State's despatch No. 44, of the 9th February 1864, published in G. G. O. No. 530 of 1864, the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the appointment of a Second Doing-duty Officer to each Regiment of Native Cavalry and Infantry in the Armies of the three Presidencies, and of the Punjab Irregular Force, so as to provide a reserve for the Staff Corps, and for the various Departments in which Military Officers are employed in India.

2. Officers will be nominated to this post on probation, and if belonging to Regiments of the British Army, must be candidates for the Staff Corps. They must have passed in the Native languages by the Second Standard or by the P. H. Examination, and must have fulfilled all the conditions required by paras. 18, 19, and 20, of Sir C. Wood's despatch No. 44 of 1864.

3. They will receive the scale of pay and staff salary laid down in G. G. O. No. 161A, of the 29th October 1863, for Doing-duty Officers of Cavalry and Infantry respectively, and will be required to pass the tests laid down in G. G. O. No. 531 of 1864 for the branch of the service to which they are attached, within one year from the date of appointment as Doing-duty Officers.

4. Upon so passing, Officers will be confirmed as Second Doing-duty Officers, and will continue to be borne as such until they receive advancement, or obtain employment in some other branch of the public service. They will be transferred to the Staff Corps if they belong to British Regiments, or if they belong to the Indian Army, and are candidates for the Staff Corps, with effect from date of appointment on probation.

5. An Officer who fails to pass the tests within the year allowed for probation, will cease to be borne as Second Doing-duty Officer, and if belonging to a British Regiment, will rejoin his corps. If an Officer of the Indian Army, he will be employed as His Excellency the Commander in Chief may be pleased to direct.

6. With two Doing-duty Officers per Regiment it is not considered necessary to appoint any other Officer to a corps consequent upon the employment of a Doing-duty Officer temporarily in another situation, or during his absence on leave.

NOTE.—The Second Doing-duty Officer in Cavalry will not be entitled to the allowance of Rs. 30 per mensem granted to the present Doing-duty Officer for Writer and Stationery, for performing the duties of Quarter Master.

2,200 Candies of BABOOL and BOREE Firewood will be sold by Public Auction at the Kheirgaum Station (32 miles east of Poona), on G. I. P. Railway, on the 16th October. Sale will commence at 9 A.M., to suit purchasers leaving Poona by 7 A.M. Train.

2. The wood will be sold by stacks, the approximate contents of which can be learnt by

application to the Mamltudar of Bhimthurry (Patus), who will conduct the sale.

3. A quantity of Babhool timber will be sold by auction at the same time, in lots.

4. A deposit of 25 per cent. of the purchase money must be made at time of sale, and the balance paid within seven days either to the Mamltudar of Bhimthurry or to the Hoozoor Deputy Collector, Poona.

5. On production of the receipt for payment in full, the wood may be removed, and must be cleared off the ground within one month.

6. If the payment is not completed within seven days, the deposit will be forfeited to Government, and the wood resold.

7. Government will not be responsible for the safe custody of the wood after the payment in full of the purchase money.

### THE MANOCKJEE LIMJEE GOLD MEDAL.

The Subject selected by the Syndicate for the Medal, which is to be adjudged in November 1866, is as follows:—

“THE ADVANTAGES AND THE MEANS OF DIFFUSING A SCIENTIFIC PRACTICE OF MEDICINE IN INDIA.”

The following Regulations are reprinted from the University Calendar, for the guidance of Competitors:—

1. The Manockjee Limjee Gold Medal shall be awarded annually for the best Essay by a University student, in accordance with the subjoined conditions.
2. Competitors shall be Bachelors of Arts in the University of Bombay, who shall not be of more than two years' standing from the date of their graduation, on the day prescribed for the sending in of the Essays.
3. Competitive Essays shall be written in the English language on the subject appointed for the current year, and shall be sent in to the University Registrar on or before the fourth Monday in September. Each Essay shall be designated by a motto instead of the writer's name, and shall be accompanied by a sealed cover, containing the name of the competitor, and a declaration that the Essay sent in by him is *bonâ fide* his own composition.
4. The subject of the Essay shall be in alternate years (a) some question of Indian History or Antiquities: (b) some question connected with the introduction into India of European Science and Art.
5. The subject for the competition is to be selected by the Syndicate, and notified not less than twelve months before the day for sending in the Essays.
6. The Judges shall be two in number, and shall be nominated annually by the Syndicate. Their decision shall be announced on the fourth Monday in November.
7. The Medal shall be presented to the successful candidate on the Convocation for conferring degrees next ensuing after the Judges' decision. The Medalist shall on the same occasion read aloud selected portions of his Essay.
8. The successful Essay shall be printed at the expense of the University.
9. The Medal shall not be awarded to any Essay which, in the opinion of the Judges, would not, when printed, be creditable to the University. But if only one Essay be sent in, nothing shall hinder the Judges from awarding to it the Medal, if it appears to them to come up to the proper standard.
10. Whenever a year passes without the Medal being awarded, the interest of the Endowment shall go towards the printing of Essays, and other expenses connected with the prize.
11. On all occasions of Academical costume, Medalists shall be entitled to wear their Medals.

Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons at out-stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.
