REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Whereas by an Indenture dated the 20th day of August 1855, and made between THE HONORABLE EAST INDIA COMPANY of the one part, and HOLLIS MOORE of the other part, All that piece or parcel of Land within the Fort of Bombay containing by admeasurement one thousand and sixty square yards (little more or less) bounded as follows, that is to say—on or towards the East by a wall with railing abutting on the Apollo street, on or towards the West partly by a passage reserved between the ground thereby leased, and partly by the premises the property of Sir Jamssetjee Jeejeebhoy, then in the occupation of Messieurs Leckie and Company, on or towards the North partly by a passage appertaining to the Court House, and partly by a passage reserved between the ground thereby leased and the stables attached to the Court House, and on or towards the South by the Scotch (St. Andrew) Church, and which said piece of ground was more particularly described in the plan thereunto annexed, and denoted therein by a green color, and on part of which Ground stood an Ice-house, which was then in the occupation of the said Hollis Moore, and the possession of which he acquired from a former Ice Committee,—was demised to the said Hollis Moore, his Executors, Administrators, and Assigns for a term of 21 years, renewable and determinable as thereafter mentioned; and in the said Indenture it is covenanted and provided that in the event of the said Hollis Moore, his Executors, Administrators, or Assigns failing to keep up the supply of Ice to the Public of Bombay, it should be lawful for the said Company, by a notice in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, to put an end to the lease or any renewal thereof, and on the premises thereby demised, or any part thereof, in the name of the whole to re-enter for the sole use of the said Company, and in such case the building to be erected and built as before mentioned in the said lease, should be forfeited and belong to Government, and no compensation should be payable to the said Hollis Moore, his Executors, Administrators, or Assigns for the same, and whereas there has been a failure to supply Ice according to the covenant contained in the said lease for four months last past and upwards; Now, therefore, notice is hereby given on behalf of the Secretary of State in Council of India, that the said Indenture of lease is hereby put an end to, and that possession of the land comprised in the said lease, and of all building standing thereon will be taken by or on behalf of the Secretary of State in Council of India, at the expiration of one month from this day. Dated this twenty-seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty five.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

The following letter from the President of the Sanitary Commission is published for general information:—

"SIR,—I have the honour to represent to His Excellency the Governor in Council, that in para. 21 of my Report on the General Sanitary condition of the Bombay Army, I stated that at Deesa, among other stations which I there named, "the wells are in gravel or earth, and are in unsafe proximity to barracks or hospitals, and although not as yet known to be unwholesome, are sure, after long continued occupation of the neighbouring buildings, to have organic matter accumulated in their surrounding soil."

2. Now a detailed analysis of the water of each of the wells used by the European Troops at Deesa has been obtained, and the results corroborate the opinion I had as above recorded.

3. It is not known how long the several wells have been in use, and how much of their differences in impurity is attributable to the length of time they have been subjected to the injurious influence of the neighbouring habitations, but it is seen that their degrees of impurity bear some proportion to their nearness to the buildings.

4. Thus the waters of the two wells of the Infantry, at distances from barracks and hospitals respectively of fifty-one and eighty-eight feet, contained in a gallon of the former, grains 36.65 of total solids, of which 1.75 grain was of organic matter and 3.26 grains were of nitrates; and in a gallon of

the water of the latter well, grains 36.29 of solids, of which 2.34 grains were of organic matter, and 2.8 grains of nitrates. The presence of nitrates indicates that the fouling of the soil in the neighbourhood of the well has been of long duration.

5. The waters of the Artillery wells, at the distances of 183 feet from the hospital and 350 feet from the barracks, are not yet so impure as those of the Infantry. The Hospital well water contained grains 25.33 of solids, of which grain 1.44 was of organic matter; the water of the Barrack well had grains 24.86 of solid matter, of which grain 1.44 was of organic matter. In neither of the Artillery waters was any nitric acid detected.

6. The results of the analyses have been transmitted for the information and guidance of the Medical Officers in charge of the European Troops at Deesa.

7. It appears most desirable that in future no well for drinking water should be sunk so near as these are to a barrack or an hospital, or to any other habitation. And although it has been ascertained that there are not at present any wells for the supply of water to Troops in progress in either the Northern or the Southern Public Works Division, yet it is advisable that for future guidance a limit of distance should be fixed within which no well shall be allowed to be approximated to barrack buildings.

8. The proper distance for a well could be best judged of in each particular instance, because the nature of the soil or rock, the inclination of the strata or beds of the rock, the degree and the direction of the fall of the surface of the ground, and the depth of the well, should all be taken into account, as on these various points would depend the extent of the surrounding ground that the well would drain.

9. No well should be made near a habitation, or other source of impurity from which there is an uninterrupted fall towards it, of either the surface of the ground or the subjacent strata of rock.

10. Even under the most favorable circumstances as to soil, subjacent rock, and fall of surface, there should be an interval between the well and the house of not less than 220 yards, and the question as to what greater interval should intervene might be determined according to the circumstances that have been mentioned.

11. I beg leave to suggest to his Excellency the Governor in Council that these recommendations should be acted on not only in Military cantonments, but also that the Public Works Department should follow them at Civil stations, and whenever it is practicable to do so in towns and villages.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

Government are pleased to republish Circular No. 80, dated 23rd August 1865, from the Government of India, and to direct the rules therein laid down be introduced into this Presidency from the 1st October next.

Proceedings of the Governor General of India in Council.

Establishment.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

Simla, the 23rd August 1865.

Revision of Salaries and Classes in the superior branches of the Public Works Department; introduction of maximum rates of salary for Military Officers; and re-adjustment of the proportion of grades of Executive Engineers.

Read again Resolution in the Financial Department, No. 3877, dated 19th December 1864, passing under review the different proposals made in the Public Works Department for re-organization of the Engineer Establishment, and conveying approval to their adoption, subject to the sanction of the Secretary of State for India.

Public Works Circular No. 15 of 18th February 1865 (Standing order No. 13 of 1865), notifying so much of the changes sanctioned in the above Resolution as refers to the Assistant Engineers, and the extra allowances to be drawn by certain classes of Officers at the Presidency.

Public Works Letters Nos. 333 E, and 334 E, of the 18th February 1865, authorising the extension, to the Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, of the new organization for Assistant Engineers, and grant of extra allowances at the Presidency, laid down in the above Circular.

Resolution in the Financial Department, No. 3364, dated 26th November 1864, reviewing the proposals of the Public Works Department, for re-organizing the Establishment of Upper Subordinates, and conveying sanction to those proposals.

Public Works Circular No. 90, dated the 19th December 1864 (Standing Order No. 85, of 1864) notifying the revised organization in the Upper Subordinate Establishment sanctioned in the above Resolution, and extending it to the Presidencies of Madras and Bombay.

Despatch No. 23, of the 3rd March 1865, in the Public Works Department, to Her Majesty's Secretary of State, reporting for approval the changes of organization already ordered to be carried out in the Upper Subordinate Establishment, and in the Assistant Engineer Class of the Engineer Establishment, and requesting permission to carry out the further changes proposed in the organization of the Engineer Establishment.

Public Works Despatch No. 6, of the 8th June 1865, from Her Majesty's Secretary of State for India, replying to the above, and sanctioning the proposals made in it.

Resolution in the Financial Department, No. 1174, dated the 27th March 1865, reviewing the proposals of the Public Works Department for determining a fixed Establishment of Public Works Controllers of Account, and for extending to Civil Controllers, First Class, the benefit of an increase of salary corresponding to that proposed for Civil Superintending Engineers, and conveying sanction to those proposals, subject to approval by the Secretary of State.

Public Works Circular No. 54 of 1865 (Standing Order No. 36 of 1865), notifying so much of the above proposals as constitute a fixed Establishment of Public Works Controllers.

RESOLUTION—His Excellency the Governor General in Council is now pleased to notify the changes remaining to be carried out in order to give effect to the proposals which have been under consideration for the last two years, for completing the organization of the Upper Subordinate and Engineer Establishments of the Public Works Department, which proposals have received the sanction of Her Majesty's Secretary of State. These changes will have effect throughout India.

2. *Executive and Assistant Engineers.*—The rates of Civil consolidated and Military staff salary for the four grades of Executive Engineers will remain unaltered; but the following rates of maximum salary to be drawn by Military Officers holding these appointments (including their Military allowances drawn in the Public Works Department), are now established:—

Executive Engineer, Fourth Grade, maximum salary.....	Rs. 600

3. At the same time the distribution of the Executive Engineers between the four grades will be altered. Under present arrangements, two-fourteenths of the total strength belong to the first grade, three-fourteenths to the second and third grades each, and six-fourteenths to the fourth grade. The new distribution will be as follows:—

I.—The sanctioned number of Executive Engineers attached to a Province, or attached to all the Local Administrations taken together, will be divided by sixteen; three-sixteenths will belong to the first grade, four-sixteenths to the second and third grades each, and five-sixteenths to the fourth grade.

II.—Of any remainder after dividing the strength as above by sixteen, one-fourth will belong to each grade, and odd numbers will be distributed,—if one, to the first grade only; if two, one each to the first and second; if three, one each to the first, second, and third grades.

4. The following rates of maximum salary for Assistant Engineers, to be drawn by Military Officers in that class (including their Military allowances drawn in the Public Works Department) are established:—

5. *Superintending Engineers.*—The Officers of this rank will be divided into two classes, each class being divided into two grades, with staff salaries, maximum salaries to be drawn by Military Officers in this Department, and civil consolidated salaries, as below:—

6. The distinction of grades will affect the Military Officers only in respect of the maximum total salary to be drawn; the distinction of classes will affect their staff salary also.

7. Of the Superintending Engineers, one-half, adding one for any fraction, will belong to the first class; of those in each class, one-half, adding one for any fraction, will belong to the first grade.

8. *Superintendents of Works.*—The salaries of Superintendents of Works will be regulated on the same principle, with regard to the maximum to be drawn, as those of Executive and Superintending Engineers. For appointments of which the Staff salary is Rs. 700 and Rs. 800, the corresponding maximum and Civil salaries will be those of a Superintending Engineer, second class, second grade, and first class, second grade, respectively.

9. *Chief Engineers.*—The Chief Engineers will be divided into three classes, with staff, maximum, and consolidated salaries, as below:—

10. The Chief Engineers in Madras and Bombay, and those in Bengal, the North-Western Provinces and Punjab, will be of the first class. Of the remainder serving under the Government of India, one-half, adding one for any fraction, will belong to the second class; and the rest to the third class. The salaries attached to the two latter classes will be personal, without reference to the province or appointment in which the Chief Engineers may be serving.

11. The Chief Engineers in Hyderabad and the Straits Settlements will henceforward be classified and styled as Superintending Engineers.

12. The salary of the Chief Engineer in Sind will form the subject of a separate reference to be made to the Government of Bombay.

13. *Accounts Department.*—The military, staff, and consolidated civil salaries of Controllers and Deputy Controllers will continue to be as at present up to the rank of Controller, second class; but the total pay and allowances to be drawn by Military Officers, will be limited by the same maximums as have been fixed for the corresponding grades and classes of the Executive Branch.

14. A Controller, first class, if a Military Officer, will be limited to a maximum salary of Rs. 1,800; if a Civilian, he will commence on a salary of Rs. 1,200, rising to Rs. 1,600, by annual increments of Rs. 75 per annum.

15. The salary of the Accountant General will continue at Rs. 2,000 consolidated.

16. *General Conditions.*—The foregoing changes will take effect from the 1st October next, but no reduction will be made in the salaries of those Officers who are at present in receipt of higher allowances than those now prescribed as the maximum of their grades. In the case of such Officers the change will be prospective only, and they will continue to draw their present salaries until they become entitled to an increase, by promotion to a class or grade the maximum salary of which exceeds their present allowance drawn in this Department in each case.

17. The scale of consolidated and maximum salaries now fixed, is exclusive of the net Military pay drawn in the Military Department by Officers not belonging to the Staff Corps, which will be drawn in addition to the consolidated and maximum salaries herein laid down as admissible in this Department.

18. The accompanying table brings into one view the new scale of salaries for all classes of the Engineer, Upper Subordinate, and Accounts Department, as now fixed by the above orders, including the changes previously made by Standing Orders Nos. 85 of 1864, and 13 and 36 of 1865.

ORDERED that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to all Local Governments and Administrations, for information and guidance.

Also, that a copy, together with a copy of the Despatch from the Secretary of State cited above, be forwarded to the Financial Department for information.

Also, that a Standing Order, embodying the above changes, be issued, and that the accompanying Table of Salaries be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

- The Chief Engineer in Sind will, after two years tenure of that office, receive the pay of the Chief Engineer 2nd class.
- On the occurrence of the next vacancy two of the four Superintending Engineers will be of the 2nd class.
- The new distribution of Executive Engineers into grades will be as follows :—
Out of the sanctioned scale for this Presidency, viz. 35, $\frac{1}{16}$ or 7 will belong to 1st grade, $\frac{1}{16}$ or 9 to 2nd grade, $\frac{1}{16}$ or 9 to the 3rd grade, and $\frac{1}{16}$ or 10 to 4th grade.
- No reduction to salary of existing incumbents will be required, but where any excess exists one promotion only will be made for every two vacancies, until the supernumeraries are absorbed.

- The following rules will have effect in all branches of the Public Works Department throughout India, from 1st March 1865. They do not affect upper Subordinates, or the Corresponding branch of the Accounts Establishments.
- The allowances of Acting Officers in the Public Works Department will henceforth be regulated on the principles laid down in the Civil Rules for deputation allowance, adapted to the circumstances of the Public Works Department, as follows :—
- The application of the designations "Class" and "Grade" will henceforth be made on the principles adapted in the Civil Department.
All special appointments will be treated as being of a special "Class."
Chief Engineers of the First and Second Class will be regarded as constituting separate Classes.
Superintending Engineers First Class and Chief Engineers Third Class, will form one Class; and Superintending Engineers Second Class another Class.
Executive Engineers will form a Class, divided into four Grades.
Assistant Engineers will form a Class divided into three Grades.

The designations of the officers of the Accounts Department will be altered as follows:—

Controllers and Examiners First Class will become Controllers First Class.

Controllers and Examiners Second Class will become Controllers Second Class.—

Controllers and Examiners Third Class will become Controllers Third Class, First Grade.

Deputy Controllers and Examiners First Class will become Controllers Third Class, Second Grade.

Deputy Controllers and Examiners Second Class will become Controllers Third Class, Third Grade.

Deputy Controllers and Examiners Third Class will become Deputy Controllers.

4. The expression "Consolidated Salary" in these Orders is, in all cases, to be understood as the salary fixed for a Civil Officer holding an appointment, even though the officer affected in the calculation of deputation allowance be a Military Officer.

5. An Officer officiating in the Public Works Department who does not hold any substantive appointment, shall receive 50 per cent on the consolidated salary of the situation in which he may officiate. In giving deputation allowance under this rule to a Military Officer not holding any substantive appointment, who may officiate in the Public Works Department, the allowance granted will be in addition to his Military pay and allowances, up to an amount not exceeding what the officer could draw were he to be confirmed in the lowest Grade of the Class in which he may be appointed to officiate.

6. Officiating appointments are not made in the Public Works Department within a Class. In the same Class an officer of one Grade is not allowed to officiate in another Grade, and deputation is only given where an officer of one Class acts in another Class.

7. The holder of a substantive appointment, if officiating in another situation, shall draw his substantive emoluments, and in addition thereto a deputation allowance computed as follows:—

Twenty per cent on average monthly consolidated salaries, Rs. 2,000 and under.

On average monthly consolidated salaries exceeding Rs. 2,000, 20 per cent. on Rs. 2,000, and 10 per cent. on the amount by which the average salary may exceed Rs. 2,000.

But only such portion of the deputation allowance can be drawn as may bring up the salary of the officiating officer, whether he perform his own substantive duties in addition or not, to the amount which he would draw if confirmed in the lowest Grade of the higher Class in which he officiates.

8. The deputation allowance in the two foregoing cases is computed, as regards appointments which are in *6 27th September* on the average consolidated pay of all the Grades in the Class in which he acts.

9. These rules are to be applied to all officers, Military or Civil, officiating in the superior appointments of the several branches of the Public Works Department in all cases, whether in an absolute vacancy, or during the absence of a permanent incumbent on general or privilege leave, special duty, or field service.

10. The deputation allowance to the substitute of an officer on privilege leave will be paid by the State, subject to the general proviso contained in the following clause, which, under the ordinary Civil Rules, applies to all deputation allowances.

11. An officer officiating in any appointment at the same station at which he is permanently posted, will not receive deputation allowances for the first month during which he may officiate, unless he has already officiated in the same appointment, without receiving deputation allowance for the first month, within eleven months preceding his second deputation.

12. An Executive Engineer holding charge of two Divisions, will receive a deputation allowance of Rs. 100 monthly. This, however is only to be allowed under special circumstances, and as a temporary arrangement, and must be reported for confirmation."

Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

DELIVERY OF MAILS.

In compliance with instructions from the Director General of the Post Office, the hours of Delivery will be changed to the following:—

First Delivery at 7 A.M.—By this delivery all Mails received during the night will be issued.

Second Delivery at 11 A.M.—Will comprise Local Letters.

Third Delivery at 2 P.M.—Will consist of Mails received by Train; at present these will be N. E. Line Mails.

Persian Gulf Mails.—The British India Steam Navigation Company's Mail Packet Boats will in future leave Bombay on fixed days, viz., the 3rd of each month, for Bussora, and will make the voyage direct *via* Muscat instead of *via* Kurrachee, at which latter port they will not touch on either the up or down voyage.

2. The Mail bags for Muscat, Bunder Abbas, Linga, Bushire, and Bussora, also Bagdad and Turkish Arabia, will be closed in future at 12 (noon) on the 3rd of each month.

Mauritius and Cape of Good Hope Mails.—An intimation has been received from Her Majesty's Post Master General of England of the establishment of a monthly communication between Port Louis (Mauritius) and Table Bay (Cape of Good Hope), calling at Natal.

The Branch Packet will leave Port Louis immediately after the arrival of the Packet from Suez and Aden, that is about the 25th of the month, and will return to Port Louis in time for the Packet appointed to leave for Aden and Suez on the 6th of each month.

Letters for Natal and the Cape of Good Hope, St. Helena, and Ascension, if marked *via* Aden and Mauritius, will be sent by the route abovementioned.

The Postage on prepaid letters sent by this route will be 8 annas for $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. Prepayment is optional.
