"TO THE UNDER-SECRETARY OF STATE FOR INDIA,

INDIA OFFICE.

Sir,—I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, to transmit to you the enclosed printed copy of a Notice to ship masters and owners, on the subject of Sea Scurvy. Several cases of outbreak of Scurvy on board ship have recently been reported, and have been inquired into by Inspectors specially appointed by this Department for the purpose. The results of the inquiries will shortly be made public in a Parliamentary Paper.

My Lords have reason to believe that attention to the several suggestions of the Seamen's Hospital Society embodied in the enclosed Notice would tend not only to diminish the number of cases of scurvy, but also insure the general health of the crews of ships, and they have taken steps for the publication and distribution of the Notice as widely as possible in this country.

As it is on long voyages, such as to or from India, that there is most risk of scurvy breaking out, my Lords think that advantage might attend the publication of the Notice at the Ports in India frequented by British ships. My Lords will cause copies (say 1,000) of the Notice to be printed for transmission to India, if they receive an intimation that Sir Charles Wood is willing to give the necessary directions for the purpose. directions for the purpose.

NOTICE TO SHIP OWNERS AND SHIP MASTERS.

Sea-Scurvy.

THE result of the inquiries recently instituted by the Board of Trade in several cases of outbreak of Scurvy in Merchant Ships, in some even where it is manifest that the Owners have had every desire to provide for the health of the crew, leads this Board to believe that the publication of the following means, suggested by the Seamen's Hospital Society, for the prevention and check of this malady, may be attended with advantage :-

The cause of the malady is generally believed to be privation for a considerable length of time of Fresh Vegetables.

MEANS FOR PREVENTION.

At Sea.

1. Every ship on a long voyage should be supplied with a proper quantity of Lime or Lemon Juice.

The Juice having been received in bulk from the Vendors, should be examined and analysed by a competent Medical Officer. All measures adopted for its preservation are worthless unless it be clearly ascertained that a pure article has been supplied.

10 per cent. of Brandy (S. G. 930) or of Rum (S. G. 890) should afterwards be added to it.

It should be packed in Jars or Bottles, each containing I Gallon or less, covered with a layer of Oil, and closely packed and sealed.

Each man should have at least two ounces (4 table spoonsful) twice a week, to be increased to an ounce daily if any symptoms of scurvy manifest themselves.

The giving out of Lime or Lemon Juice should not be delayed longer than a fortnight after the vessel has put to sea.

- 2. Preserved Vegetables; of these Potatoes and Onions are the best; next-Greens, Carrots, Turnips, &c.
- 2. A good supply of fresh water. That obtained from a condensing apparatus is much inferior to fresh water.
 - 4. Attention to cleanliness and ventilation, more particularly of the quarters of the cuew.
- 5. If the Line or Lemon Juice should fail or become bad, an excellent substitute is the Salts of 5. If the Lime or Lemon Juice should fail or become bad, an excellent substitute is the Salts of Potash. It is strongly recommended that every Ship's Medicine Chest should be supplied with some preparation of this salt; the bicarbonate is perhaps the cheapest and best. Sive grains twice a day may

In Port.

A full supply of such Vegetables as may be most easily procured, viz., Potatoes, Greens, Radishes, Watercresses; the latter vegetable is a powerful antiscorbutic, and easily procurable. Fruits, as Oranges,

It is always well to provide an extra supply of the above-mentioned important antiscorbutics in case of an unusually protracted voyage or other contingency.

This Notice is to be kept posted inside and outside the Mercantile Marine Offices, Shipping Offices, Custom Houses, and Receivers' Offices, and should be freely distributed amongst Owners, Shipping Agents, and Seamen, and other persons interested. Copies are to be to tained from time to time in the same manner of Mercantile Marine Forms.

SIR,—I beg to call your attention to the annexed list of Medals to be awarded at the International Exhibition of Fruit and Vegetables to be held in these Gardens from the 9th December to the 16th December next inclusive.

Several questions have been asked with regard to the manner in which fruits that will not bear a journey are to be exhibited; in answer I am desired to say that such fruits may be preserved in sugar, spirits, vinegar, or in such other manner as in the opinion of the exhibitor will be most convenient.

Wild Fruits and Vegetables will be admissible as representative collections of the country from which they come. All packages must be addressed to the care of the Garden Superintendent, Royal Horticultural Society, South Kensington, London.

I am desired especially to request that intending exhibitors will make known their intentions as early as possible to the Assistant Secretary, forwarding full particulars of the object they desire to exhibit.

INTERNATIONAL FRUIT SHOW.

FROM SATURDAY DEC. 9TH TO SATURDAY DEC. 16TH, INCLUSIVE.

- 1.—The Gold Medal of the Society will be awarded to the best collection of Fruit and Vegetables produced in the garden of a Sovereign.
- 2.—The Gold Medal of the Society for the best collection of Fruit and Vegetables grown by any Botanic or Horticultural Society in any part of the world.
- 3.—The Gold Medal of the Society for the best and most complete representative collection of Fruit and Vegetables from any of the Colonies.
- 4.—First Banksian Gold Medal for the best and complete representative collection from the Presidencies of India.
- 5.—Certificates will be awarded for separate exhibitions of all Fruits and Vegetables, either fresh or preserved, from all parts of the world.
- 6.—The first Gold Knightian Medal of the Society to the exhibitor who shall obtain the greatest number of second-class certificates.
- 7.—The second Gold Knightian Medal to the exhibitor who shall obtain the greatest number of second-class certificates.
- 8.—The second Gold Banksian Medal to the exhibitor who shall obtain the greatest number of third-class certificates.
- 9.—The first Gold Banksian Medal to the exhibitor who shall gain the greatest number of marks, counting first, second, and third certificates as three, two, and one, respectively."

COVERNMENT DEPARTMENTAL NOTICE.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following for general information:—
"Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Financial Department, No. 2580,
dated Simla, the 16th September 1865. ...

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council has had under consideration the necessity of defining clearly the mutual relations of the Civil and Public Works Department of Accounts, with regard to the estimates and accounts of the receipts and expenditure from Local Funds.

- 2. The receipts of Local Funds are for the most part realized in the Civil Department, and the account of these will be retained in the books of that Department. Accordingly, the disbursements from those funds, including the expenditure incurred by Public Works Agency, must also continue to be debited to those funds in those books, notwithstanding that the expenditure incurred by Public Works Agency, will be treated as a final charge in the Public Works Accounts.
- 3. The Annual Budget Estimates of Local Funds which the Financial Department receives from the Provincial Accountants General, should be those which the Local Governments have passed. In these estimates the Public Works expenditure to be incurred by Civil Officers and by Public Works Agency, should be shown capacitals. Agency, should be shown separately.
- 4. The Financial Department will communicate to the Public Works Department of the Government of India, in detail of Presidencies and Provinces, the Public Works expenditure from Local Funds estimated to be incurred respectively by Civil Officers and through Public Works Agency.
- 5. The portion allotted for expenditure by Public Works Officers will be added to the credit allowed to that Department for the Imperial Public Works grant, and funds against that amalgamated credit will be supplied to the Public Works Department, without distinction being made between the money which is required for Imperial and that for local purposes.
- 6. The local Civil Officers will be responsible for keeping their expenditure from Local Funds within the portion of the annual estimate allotted to them by the Local Government, without trenching on the portion allotted to the Public Works Department.
- 7. Formal Letters of Credit from the Provincial Accountants General, in favor of Civil Officers, for their expenditure from Local Funds, similar to the credit orders in favor of the Public Works Department, will not be required, but the Provincial Accountants General will keep a Grant Account for every Local Fund whose assets are divided, for expenditure, between the Civil Officers and the Public Works Department, in order to keep the expenditure of the former within their allotment.
- 8. In this account, the expenditure incurred by Civil Officers will be posted monthly, but that incurred by the Public Works Department will be adjusted only at the end of the year.
- 9. During the year, the local Controller of Public Works Accounts will furnish quarterly to the Provincial Accountant General, an extract from the balance sheet of that part of his Budget Register which relates to Local Funds; and the latter Officer will compare this with the aggregate amount standing in his Grant Account at credit of the Public Works Department, to see that it and the similar aggregate of credits in favor of Civil Officers, agree with the total allotment to them and to the Public Works Department.
- 10. At the end of the year, the Controller of Public Works Accounts will furnish to the Provincial Accountant General, an account in which the expenditure against the Public Works allotment from Local Funds, will be distributed in mere totals (i.e., without detail under the major heads of Public Works charges) to the several Local Funds concerned, in order that each fund may be debited with its share of the expenditure.
- 11. Subsidiary instructions regarding the accounts which should be opened in the books of the Provincial Accountant General, for giving effect to these orders, will be issued by the Auditor General of India.'
