## GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 20th November 1865.*

No. 583 of 1865.—Lieutenant R. H. Ward, Royal Bengal Sappers and Miners, is allowed a furlough to Europe for eighteen months on medical certificate.

*Bombay Castle, 21st November 1865.*

No. 584 of 1865.—With reference to G. G. O. No. 166, dated 23rd March 1863, the name of the undermentioned Officer, who retired from the Service under the Annuity Scheme of 1861, is removed from the List of Regimental Lieutenant Colonels of Infantry :—

No. 585 of 1865.—Her Majesty's 26th Regiment of Foot is brought on the Establishment of this Presidency from 26th October, the date of arrival at Bombay of the Head Quarters of the Regiment.

Her Majesty's 49th Regiment of Foot is brought on the Establishment of this Presidency from 18th October 1865, the date of arrival at Bombay of the Head Quarters of the Regiment.

No. 586 of 1865.—G Battery 14th Brigade Royal Artillery, which arrived from China on the 28th July 1865, is brought on the Establishment of this Presidency from that date.

*Bombay Castle, 22nd November 1865.*

No. 587 of 1865.—The appointment of Pension Paymaster at Surat is abolished, and the Stations comprised in the Surat Circle are transferred to the Poona Circle.

The Staff Pay of the Paymaster of Pensioners at Poona is raised to Rs. 250 per mensem, subject to confirmation by the Government of India.

All accounts, &c., hitherto furnished to the Paymaster of Pensioners at Surat should be rendered in future to the Paymaster of Pensioners at Poona.

These arrangements will have effect from the 16th instant, and the Controller of Military Accounts will give any needful subsidiary orders.

No. 588 of 1865.—The following rules for dealing with offences by Soldiers on the Unattached List should be observed in future :—

1. On occasion of grave misconduct by a Soldier on the Unattached List, the Head of the Department, Civil or Military, in which the Soldier is employed, may apply through the proper channel for his trial by Court Martial or for his remand to his regiment.

2. In order that the Departmental Officer, upon whom falls the duty of investigating offences, may know the character and conduct of those under him, a Departmental Defaulters' Book and a Character Book, in the annexed forms, will be kept. In the former will be recorded all offences of a character which would tend to the offender being remanded to Regimental duty, such as drunkenness, insubordination, or crimes of a serious character. In the Character Book trivial offences for which a minor punishment, such as reprimand, or fines of Departmental pay, &c., have been inflicted, will be recorded.

3. For first offences, not of an aggravated character, mild reproof and admonition are to be tried, and punishment is not to be resorted to until a repetition of the offence shall have shown that the milder treatment has not been productive of the desired effect.

4. Offences not merely affecting Departmental efficiency but of an independently grave character should be disposed of, when possible, by Court Martial rather than by simple remand of the offender to his corps.

5. When a Non-Commissioned Officer is remanded to his corps without trial by Court Martial, the report on which the order for remand was passed will be communicated by Government to the Head Quarters of the Army, in order that the Commander in Chief may, if he deem fit, exercise the power conferred on him by the 139th Article of War.

6. Punishment should not be awarded until the day following that on which the offence was committed.

7. Every case should, if practicable, be investigated and disposed of within 48 hours of the offence being committed, unless it be preparatory to a Court Martial, or the case be submitted to higher authority.

8. Care should be taken when an offender has been drunk that his case be not investigated until he is perfectly sober.

9. When several of a Department are serving in the same place or station, the chain of responsibility and discipline should be preserved according to Departmental rank, and an offender should always, when practicable, be brought up for the investigation of his case in charge of a Departmental senior.

10. Every Officer with power to award punishment shall be in possession of the Defaulters' Sheets of the men under his immediate command; all entries in these sheets are to be in his hand-writing.

11. When a Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier is transferred from one station or branch to another, his Defaulter's Sheet shall be forwarded by post to the Officer under whose command he is to serve.

12. No entry in a Departmental Defaulters' Book in any way affects a Soldier's claim to Good Conduct Pay.

13. Every Officer should be in possession of a copy of the Mutiny Act and Articles of War for his guidance in cases of an aggravated character cognizable by Courts Martial, and with a view to the paragraphs noted in the 193rd Article being read once a quarter.

14. Trivial neglect and carelessness should not be made the subject of fines, and entered in the Defaulters' Book; they more properly belong to the Character Book.

Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

**BOMBAY TO WIT.**—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby Proclaim and give Notice, that the **FOURTH SESSIONS** of 1865 of Oyer and **TERMINER**, and **GENERAL GAOL DELIVERY**, will be holden before the High Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on **MONDAY**, the 4th day of December next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes, Misdemeanors, and Offences, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto; and also to inquire, hear, and determine in the like manner all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Offences, Wrongs, and Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependent upon, the Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Government.

And also that, at the same time and place, will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Felonies, Misdemeanors, Offences, and other Maritime Crimes whatsoever done or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give Notice to all persons bound to prosecute and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place abovementioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give Notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other remembrances, to do those things which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done.—Dated the 11th day of November 1865, and in the twenty-ninth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.
