## GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATION TO THE PUBLIC.

### JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

In supersession of the Rules XI., XV., and XIX., and Forms J, N, and P. printed for the guidance of the Registration Department in the Supplement to the Bombay Government Gazette dated 17th December 1864, the following Amended Rules and Forms framed by the Registrar General of Assurances under Sections LVIII. and LXI. of Act XVI. of 1864, and approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published for general information:—

#### Rules.


XI. All Registrars shall keep a Day Book (in Form I) showing the daily number of each deed or instrument presented for registration, the nature of the Deed, and the hour of presentation; the first three columns to be filled in directly any instrument is presented and a receipt in (Form J) granted to the party presenting the deed after inquiry by the Registrar; the fourth Column shall be filled in, showing whether the Registrar has ordered the instrument to be registered or refused registration. If the former, then the amount of Fees shall be at once credited in the Cash Book. If the latter, half the fees only are

to be so credited, the remaining half being returned to the person paying them when the Registration shall have been completed and the Deed or Instrument returned to the party presenting it, the date of return shall be noted in Column 5 and the signature of the party in receipt taken in Column 6.

XV. Daily or when the fee collections amount to Rs. 50 or more the District and Deputy Registrars shall remit such fees to the Chief Revenue Treasury at the Station, taking a receipt from the officer in charge. Where there is no Treasury the Deputy Registrar shall, in like manner, remit weekly to the nearest Treasury unless his cash balance exceeds Rs. 100, when he shall at once remit as aforesaid. In the Town and Island of Bombay the Deputy Registrars shall daily remit to the Bombay Bank such collections as shall have been made up to 2-30 P.M.

XIX. The office hours shall be from 11 A.M. to 5 P.M. on all week days except on those general holidays allowed by Government.

### Notification.

1. An Examination of Candidates for the Office of Pleader will be held in Bombay, commencing on Monday the 29th January 1866.
2. The Committee for conducting the Examination will be appointed by the Honorable the Judges of the High Court of Judicature.
3. No person will be admitted to the Examination unless he produce before the Committee a certificate, according to the following form, from the Judge of the Zillah within which he may have been employed or residing:—  

“ I hereby certify that I have personally examined the bearer A. B. inhabitant of———, and find that he is —— years of age (not less than 21); is of respectable character, reads Balbodh well, and is otherwise properly educated. He has hitherto been employed as ——, and I consider him fit to appear before the Committee appointed for the Examination of Candidates for the office of Pleader.”
4. When the character of the applicant is not known to the Zillah Judge personally, that officer will assure himself on this point by inquiry, or by requiring the production of testimonials from others, in whose judgment and testimony he may have confidence. The acquirements of the applicant will in all cases be determined by the Zillah Judge by personal examination.
5. The Examination will be conducted by requiring each Candidate to answer in writing questions on Law and Practice, and to give oral answers to similar questions put orally.
6. At the conclusion of the examination, the Committee shall report the result to the Judges of the High Court, who, on application, will grant to each passed Candidate the usual Sumud.
7. When a Candidate may have failed to pass any examination, the Examiners shall state in what respect he is most defective, and how soon he may again present himself for examination.
8. Each passed Candidate shall satisfy the Registrar of the High Court that he is *bonâ fide* owner of a complete set of the Civil and Criminal Enactments in force in the Bombay Presidency.
9. No person will henceforward be admitted to practise as a Pleader on the Appellate side of the High Court unless he possess a competent knowledge of English to enable him to plead fluently in that language.
10. Nothing in these Rules is intended to interfere with the conditions under which the Judges have already expressed their willingness to grant Sumuds, as Pleaders, to University Law Students who may have successfully completed a five years' course of study, and further qualified themselves by attending an additional course of special instructions in the existing laws of this country, as notified in the *Government Gazette* of the 12th December 1861.
11. The above Rules will apply only to the examination of which notice is given in paragraph 1.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 6th December 1865.

No. 615 of 1865.—The following Extract from a Military Despatch, from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, is published:—

*Despatch dated 31st May 1865, No. 67.*

- "1. I observe from your last Official Army List, that the names of the Officers on the General List, who were appointed under the new conditions, and have been transferred to the new Line Regiments, have been removed from the List of your Presidency."
- "2. No authority has been given by me for this course, nor is it in accordance with the instructions contained in my Despatch to the Government of India, dated 17th June last, No. 194, paragraph 55, which directed the removal of the names of certain Officers from the Cadres of Regiments, but did not authorize a similar course with respect to the names of Officers on the General List."
- "3. The removal of these Officers' names would give an undue advantage to the Officers of the General List in regard to promotion, and cannot therefore be sanctioned."
- "4. The names of these Officers must be re-inserted in italics in their proper places on the List, on which their names have been hitherto borne."

II. In accordance with the foregoing instructions of Her Majesty's Government, the following Lists, showing the position and dates of rank of the Officers concerned, as they should stand in the General Lists of the Bombay Army, are published:—

Such men will be held to have been rejected on account of their conduct, and will receive five shillings only; but, as the issue of 5s. or 20s. will depend solely upon the cause assigned in the discharge for rejection, His Royal Highness enjoins commanding officers to exercise especial care in dealing with such cases.

With this view the Regimental Board will in deserving cases state in both the discharge documents that the cause of discharge is "in consequence of being prevented by disability from re-engaging." But in cases of rejection on account of conduct the cause of rejection will appear in the "proceedings" only, the parchment certificate stating his limited service having expired."

Notification No. 1381, issued from this Department on the 15th July 1865, publishing a compilation of the Furlough and Absentee Rules for Chaplains on the Establishments of the three Presidencies.

Letter to the Accountant General, North-Western Provinces, No. 1772, dated the 11th August 1865, deciding that, by the revised Civil Absentee Rules of the 16th December 1864, a Covenanted Civil Servant is not required to render a service of three months from the date of his return to duty from privilege leave before he can take furlough or retire.

Endorsement from the Home Department, No. 3186, dated 25th October 1865, forwarding for disposal a letter from the Government of Madras, enclosing a communication from the Venerable the Archdeacon in that Presidency, in which he represents that, as the interval between privilege leave and furlough or retirement, which was prescribed by the old Absentee Rules, has been abolished in the case of Covenanted Civil Servants, it should be dispensed with in the case of Chaplains.

**RESOLUTION.**—The Governor General in Council concurs with the Venerable the Archdeacon, and is accordingly pleased to decide that Section XII. of the Furlough and Absentee Rules for Chaplains, which were published by this Department on the 15th July 1865, shall in future be read thus :—

Application for furlough on private affairs must be supported by proof of residence for the period prescribed in paragraph XIV.

No. 635 of 1865.—The following Extract from General Orders by His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, dated 24th October 1865, is republished :—

"*Re-engagement.*—With the sanction of Government, the following Horse Guards Circular (341 of the 26th May 1865) is published for the guidance of Regimental Boards in the preparation of Soldiers' discharge documents and in modification of the provisions of G. G. O. No. 567 of the 7th June last.

With reference to the Royal Warrant, dated 17th August 1854, Circular No. 872, His Royal Highness the Field Marshal Commanding in Chief desires it to be notified that the Secretary of State for War has consented that all time-expired men who are willing to re-engage, but are not permitted to do so on account of their physical unfitness, shall receive the allowance of twenty shillings, but that those men who are ineligible for re-engagement on account of their past conduct shall receive five shillings only.

The grant of the higher allowance cannot, however, be extended to the cases of men who are unfit both physically and on account of their bad character, especially when the physical unfitness is the result of their own misconduct.

Such men will be held to have been rejected on account of their conduct, and will receive five shillings only; but, as the issue of 5s. or 20s. will depend solely upon the cause assigned in the discharge for rejection, His Royal Highness enjoins commanding officers to exercise especial care in dealing with such cases.

With this view the Regimental Board will in deserving cases state in both the discharge documents that the cause of discharge is "in consequence of being prevented by disability from re-engaging." But in cases of rejection on account of conduct the cause of rejection will appear in the "proceedings" only, the parchment certificate stating his limited service having expired."

No. 636 of 1865.—The following Extract from General Orders by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India, dated 30th October 1865, is republished :—

*Travelling Expenses.*—The Commander in Chief is pleased to direct the publication, for general information and guidance, of the following letter, No. 245, dated 11th October 1865, from the Military Department to the Adjutant General :—

"In reply to your letter No. 406 E, of the 22nd June last, I am directed to state for the information of His Excellency the Commander in Chief that Government sanctions the payment, at the usual rate, of the travelling expenses incurred by an Officer directed to proceed to another station for the purpose of passing the examination for promotion, if he proceed by the most expeditious mode of conveyance."

Tenders will be received by William Jameson, Esquire, Superintendent Botanical Gardens, North Western Provinces, Saharunpore, until 1st March 1866, if the Factories, &c., be not previously sold by private sale, and the highest offer above the upset price will be accepted.

All tenders must be made in writing.

Every tender should be superscribed "Tender for Tea plantation," and will be registered by the Superintendent of the Botanical Gardens on the date of receipt in a book, which he will keep together with the tenders in his own custody under lock and key.

The highest registered tender at the time being, for any lot, will be communicated by the Superintendent to any enquirers up to the time of sale, but the names of the parties who have tendered shall in no case be disclosed.

The register of tenders will be examined at noon, on the 1st March 1866, by a Committee consisting of the Superintendent Botanical Gardens, the Judge, and the Collector of Saharunpore, at the Office of the Superintendent, and in the presence of all parties who may attend; and the amount of the highest tender for each lot, or, if there be more than one tender of equal amount, the number and amount of such tenders, but not the names of the parties tendering, will be publicly declared, and the highest tender, in writing, above the upset price, at 4 p. m., will be accepted on the part of Government by the Committee.

On the tender being accepted by the Committee, the purchaser must deposit five per cent. of the purchase money, which will be forfeited if the amount of the purchase money be not paid in full on the date specified.

Agents must be supplied by their principals with sufficient powers of attorney.

### VEHAR WATER WORKS BY-LAWS.

Under Section 262 of the Bombay Municipal Act for 1865, the Municipal Commissioner gives notice that he intends, on or about the 15th January, to apply to the Bench of Justices for confirmation of the following amended By-Laws for the regulation of Vehar Water supply.

### DRAFT BY-LAWS FOR REGULATING THE SUPPLY OF WATER IN BOMBAY. Public Service.

1. No dirty pot, chatty, or other vessel shall be used by any person or persons for drawing water from any of the Public Wells or Tanks.
2. No pot, chatty, or other vessel shall be rinsed out, washed, or cleansed in any of the said Wells or Tanks, and no water shall be thrown back into any such Wells or Tanks.
3. No horses, cattle, sheep, or other animals shall be washed in any of the said Wells or Tanks.
4. No person shall bathe in any Vehar Water Well or Tank.
5. No carts, horses, or cattle, with the exception of "water bullocks," shall be taken or allowed to go upon the pavement surrounding any Well or Tank.

### Private Service.

6. The Superintendents of Wards, or any other officer appointed by the Municipal Commissioner, are to be at liberty, on giving six hours' notice, to enter, between sunrise and sunset, into any house or building to which water is laid on from the main, for the purpose of inspecting the water pipes, cisterns, meters, and other things connected with the supply of water to such house or building.
7. No pipes must be attached to the works or to any pipe or apparatus connected therewith, nor must any alterations of pipes or extensions of the supplies of water be made without the consent of the Municipal Commissioner or officer authorised by him being first obtained; and all works thus sanctioned must be executed by "authorised Plumbers," as hereinafter described.
8. Meters, which will be supplied by the Municipal Commissioner at the cost of the house owners, must be fixed wherever water is used for ornamental or irrigational purposes.



9. The drawing cocks must be of brass, and of the kind called "Screw Down," and no cocks will be allowed, except such as open and close slowly.

10. Inasmuch as it is essential to the protection of the interests of the consumers that the works to be done by Plumbers should be well executed, no Plumber will be allowed to perform any work connected with the supply of water until he shall have been admitted and enrolled by authority of the Municipal Commissioner as an "authorised Plumber," and shall have entered into written agreement to conform to the Rules and Regulations of the Commissioner, and if at any time afterwards any such Plumber shall be found guilty of breaking or evading the said rules and regulations, or shall refuse to communicate any information required of him in regard to any work done by him or under his superintendence, his name will be struck off the list of "authorised Plumbers," and he will not afterwards be allowed to perform any work connected with the water supply.

11. Water, when delivered through meters, will be charged for at the rate of one rupee per thousand gallons, the measurement to be taken from the dial plate of the meter by the Ward Superintendent or other authorised officer.

12. The rate for water not supplied through meter will be—

5 per cent. on the 1st hundred.

2½ do. on the 2nd hundred

1¼ do. on the 3rd and each successive hundred of the assessed monthly rental of the house.

13. No house will be supplied with water at a less charge than one rupee per mensem; and whenever the rate under the foregoing rules would amount to less than that sum the charge made will be one rupee.

14. Persons occupying a portion of the house or building, who have obtained a supply of water expressly for themselves, will be charged only upon the assessed valuation of the part or portion of the house or building occupied by them.

15. The occupation of a house for 15 days and upwards shall render the occupier liable to pay a whole month's water rate, and the occupation of a house for less than 15 days shall render the occupier liable to water rate of half a month.

16. No remission of rate will under any circumstances be allowed, except in cases where the supply of water is cut off for more than 3 days consecutively through defects in the main, and such remissions will only be granted to persons applying for the same within one week from the date of such stoppage, the amount of the remission being deducted from the bill for the following quarter.

17. Occupiers becoming subject to water rate should, before changing residence, give notice in writing to the Superintendent of Wards to the place and number of the house they have removed to, and in the event of their removal without such notice they will be liable to water rate on their former habitation until such notice is received, in addition to a penalty for breach of By-laws.

#### *Power of Commissioner to cut off Water supply.*

18. Without prejudice, and in addition to the rights and remedies of the Commissioner in respect to any breach of the By-Laws, it shall be lawful for the Commissioner or officers authorised by him at any time to cut off the connection between the private pipes and the public main in any of the following events:—

1st.—In default of payment of water rate within five days after same shall have been demanded.

2nd.—If any house owner or occupier whose house is supplied with water otherwise than through meters shall permit any person or persons not living in the house to take water from their pipes, or shall give any water to them from their pipes.

3rd.—If the owner or occupier of any house shall wilfully or negligently damage his meter or private service pipe.

4th.—In case of the leakage of pipes or other defects in the private service arrangements.

5th.—If water shall be allowed to run to waste after the owner or occupier of the house has been twice warned not to allow it to do so.

19. The Municipal Commissioner is hereby and by Section 260 of Act II. of 1865 empowered to impose such reasonable penalties as he may think fit, not exceeding Rs. 20 per each breach of these By-laws, and in case of a continued breach, penalties not exceeding Rs. 10 for each day such breach is continued after notice from the Commissioner to abstain from such breach.



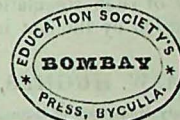

The following reduction has been made in the selling price of the undermentioned description of Postage Stamps:—

- A Packet of 16 One-Anna Envelopes, from 1 Rupee 2 Annas to 1 Rupee 1 Anna.
- A Packet of 16 Half-Anna Note Paper, from 12 Annas to 10 Annas.

**Postage, Ship Letters.**—As letters received or despatched by private ship or steamer are charged with extra or ship postage of one anna each letter in addition to all other postages due, and which is levied on delivery of the letter, it is required that letters intended for despatch by private vessels should be always so marked on the cover, otherwise they will in the absence of such direction be forwarded by land, where land communication exists.

**Changes in Mail Trains**—In consequence of the alteration in the Departure and Arrival of the Mail Trains on the Lines of the G. I. P. Railway, the following changes will take place on and after the 15th October 1865, in the hours of Closing and Issue of Mails at the General Post Office:—

The Three Deliveries will be made at the undermentioned hours, and will include the Mails below mentioned:—

*First Delivery at 7 A.M.*—To comprise the Mails from the Stations on S. E. and N. E. Railway Lines from Poona and Kussara, and the Mails brought by the B. B. and C. I. Railway Train.

*Second Delivery at 11 A.M.*—To consist of Inland Mails received by the S. E. and N. E. Railway Trains.

*Third Delivery at 2 P.M.*—To consist of Local Letters, and any Sea or other Mails received after the Second Delivery.

The Mails that arrive after the issue of the 3rd or 2 P.M. delivery will not be issued the same evening, but Letters and Papers may be had on application at the Post Office until 7 P.M.

**Persian Gulf Mails.**—The British India Steam Navigation Company's Mail Packet Boats will in future leave Bombay on fixed days, *viz.*, the 3rd of each month, for Bussora, and will make the voyage direct *via* Muscat instead of *via* Kurrachee, at which latter port they will not touch on either the up or down voyage.

**Mauritius and Cape of Good Hope Mails.**—An intimation has been received from Her Majesty's Post Master General of England of the establishment of a monthly communication between Port Louis (Mauritius) and Table Bay (Cape of Good Hope), calling at Natal.

The Branch Packet will leave Port Louis immediately after the arrival of the Packet from Suez and Aden, that is, about the 25th of the month, and will return to Port Louis in time for the Packet appointed to leave for Aden and Suez on the 6th of each month.

Letters for Natal and the Cape of Good Hope, St. Helena, and Ascension, if marked *viá* Aden and Mauritius, will be sent by the route above mentioned, by the P. & O. Company's Packets on the 29th of each month in the fair season.

The Postage on prepaid letters sent by this route will be 8 annas for  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce. Prepayment is optional.
