GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

M I L I T A R Y D E P A R T M E N T.

Bombay Castle, 27th July 1865.

No. 411 of 1865.—The following is substituted for paragraph 87, page 60, Section XXXII. 1st Appendix Jameson's Code:—

"The transit between the Deccan and Malwa by Asseerghur shall be closed from the 1st September to 1st November each year."

No. 412 of 1865.—Major C. W. Walker, Staff Corps, has been appointed to act as Inspector in Chief of the Cotton Frauds Department.

No. 413 of 1865.—The services of Major W. Rice, Staff Corps, have been placed at the disposal of His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

Bombay Castle, 1st August 1865.

No. 414 of 1865.—The following General Order by the Government of India, No. 690, dated 13th July, is published for general information, and its provisions with any necessary modifications are made applicable to this Presidency:—

"No. 690 of 1865.—In continuation of G. G. O. No. 734 of the 9th September 1864, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to announce that examinations for the *First Standard* in Hindustani will in future be conducted by Station Committees, assembled under the orders of Officers Commanding, on the first Monday in every alternate month, at the Head Quarters of all Divisions and Districts, or at all Brigade Stations. Such examinations will not take place before the Board of Examiners at Fort William.

II. The Committees will consist of a President and two Members, the former being, if possible, an Officer who has passed the Interpreter's examination, or by the Second Standard, under the new Rules; and the latter Officers who have passed the Interpreter's examination, or by the Second Standard, or in Hindustani.

III. For the examination of Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons Committees will be composed of two Officers who have passed examinations as above, and a Medical Officer of standing in the Service.

IV. To ensure uniformity in conducting these examinations, and for the guidance of these Committees, the accompanying extracts from G.O.G. G. of the 9th September 1864, are republished, together with the following Rules, and strict attention to them is enjoined on all Officers who may be employed on this duty, as the object of Government in appointing this examination will be altogether defeated unless they have some sound guarantee that the proficiency of those who pass them is in accordance with the prescribed standard:—

OBJECTS OF THE FIRST STANDARD.

1. The object of the First Standard is to ensure that Officers passing it shall have acquired such a knowledge of the Hindustani language as shall enable them efficiently to discharge their military or professional duties when serving with Native troops.

2. To this end candidates will be tested as to their ability to read and translate passages from easy Hindustani books written in the Persian and *Deva Nagari* characters, and to speak on and interpret common or professional subjects, so as to understand, and to be understood by, any ordinary uneducated native of India.

TESTS.

First.—Reading fairly, and construing with accuracy, not less than half of an octavo page of the undermentioned works:—

1.—"Hindustani Selections"* in the Persian character.

2.—"Hindustani Selections"* in the Deva Nagari character.

Second.—Conversing with the Examiners, or with natives of India, on subjects likely to occur in the performance of regimental or professional duty, in the transaction of ordinary business, or in the course of everyday life.

V. If this test be applied through the medium of a native of India, he should speak the plain Hindustani of the Presidency or Province in which the examination is held, free from peculiarities of idiom and dialect, and not a *patois*; and though, as regards the performance of professional duties, it must to a certain extent be technical in its nature, if, in other respects, the candidate prove his ability to comprehend readily all that is said to him, and to make himself fairly intelligible, more should not be required.

VI. The President of the Committee will be held responsible that the examination is conducted with propriety, and it will be his special duty to take proper precautions that none of the candidates, before examination, become

acquainted with either the passages set in the books, or during examination hold communication with any one except the Committee, either candidates or others.

VII. With a view to facilitate the attainment of this object, the place selected for holding the meetings of these Committees should be the most spacious room in the station which may be available for the purpose, and the Committee should meet there about one hour before the time appointed in orders for the examination, to prepare the exercises.

VIII.—The colloquial examination of each candidate will be carefully recorded in writing by the Committee, and a copy of this record will be forwarded with the Committee's report to the Adjutant General of the Army. It is in this portion of the examination that discretion and judgment on the part of the Examiners is most required; and in conducting it, Committees should strictly follow the instruction laid down in the extract from the orders of the 9th September 1864 above quoted. Questions intended simply to puzzle a candidate should be particularly avoided. The questions need not exceed 15, but should not be less than 10 in number.

IX.—The remarks of the Committee in the Report should be expressed definitely and concisely, thus—"excellent," "very good," "good," "tolerable," "indifferent," "very indifferent," "bad," "very bad."

X.—The Reports of the Committee will be in the following form, and will be forwarded by the President of the Committee direct to the Adjutant General of the Army the day after the examination.

2. It is to be understood that the allowance of ammunition for exercise granted as above is for *Regimental Instructions*, and is not to be made use of on occasions when Artillery are required to act with other troops.

3. Additional gun ammunition for exercise will be issued at the discretion of General Officers Commanding on occasions on which they may order the Artillery to act with other Troops at Reviews, Field-days, &c., &c.; this ammunition to be obtained on requisitions of Commanding Officers of Artillery from the Ordnance Department.

4. At stations where the guns of Heavy Batteries are available for practice for Garrison Batteries, they are to be made use of, and the ammunition to be indented for will be the same as for Heavy Batteries. At other stations the indents will include the necessary ordnance, as well as the ammunition.

3. This regulation will accordingly be abolished from the 15th June 1864, the date of the receipt in India of my Despatch No. 152 of 16th May 1864, and Assistant Surgeons of the Indian Forces of six years' service and above will no longer be entitled to passage allowance on quitting India on sick certificate.

4. This decision will be communicated by your Government to those of Madras and Bombay, by the former of whom the question has been raised, whether the passage money issued to Assistant Surgeon Eveyard, of that Establishment, on his proceeding to Europe on medical certificate in October 1864, should be recovered from him.

5. In regard to this inquiry I am of opinion that in the few cases in which passage money has been granted refund from the Officers need not be required.

NOTIFICATION.—The following compilation of Furlough and Absentee Rules for Chaplains on the Establishments of the three Presidencies of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay, is published for general information:—

FURLOUGH AND ABSENTEE RULES FOR CHAPLAINS.

I. Chaplains may be allowed leave of the following kinds:—

- Leave on Medical Certificate.
- Furlough on Private Affairs.
- Short Leave on Private Affairs.
- Privilege Leave.
- Preparatory Leave.

Leave on Medical Certificate.

II. Leave on medical certificate is given by the Government under which the applicant may be serving, on application through the Archdeacon, through whom the medical certificate is forwarded to Government.

- I. A statement of the applicant's case from his medical adviser, distinctly specifying, from personal observation, the nature of the disease, its symptoms, causes, and duration, and the necessity for temporary removal, or in cases where extension of leave is applied for, the reasons for such extension.
- II. A certificate, in the form given in Appendix A, from the Official Surgeon of the district or town in which the applicant is employed or temporarily residing, or, if there be no Official Surgeon, by a medical practitioner.

III. Applications for leave, or extension of leave, on medical certificate, must be supported by the two certificates noted in the margin, the second of which must be countersigned as follows:—

- a.—When the applicant is not at a Presidency town, and is applying for leave or extension of leave in India,—by the Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals of the Division in which he is employed, or temporarily residing.
- b.—When the applicant is at a Presidency town, or is applying for leave or extension of leave out of India,—by the Principal Inspector General of the Medical Department. To this end a Chaplain who may have come on preparatory leave to the Presidency will, prior to appearing before the Medical Board at the Presidency, submit the statement and medical certificate, on which he obtained preparatory leave to a Presidency Surgeon, in view to his receiving a certificate from him recommending his case to the Board.
- c.—When the applicant is in England and residing within 20 miles of London,—by the Medical Board attached to the India Office.
- d.—When the applicant is in England but residing at a distance of more than 20 miles from London,—by a second Medical Practitioner.
- e.—When the applicant is elsewhere than in England or India,—by the chief medical authority of the colony or country whither he may have proceeded.

The certificate and countersignature must, like the first statement, be given after a careful personal investigation; and any omission, either of the countersignature or of the personal investigation, must be satisfactorily explained.

IV. Leave on medical certificate in or beyond India to one not permanently unfit for further service will be given without question as often as the necessity for it may be established by submission of the prescribed certificates.

V. The period for which leave on medical certificate is given is as follows:—

- a.—In India—a continuous period not exceeding one year.
- b.—Beyond India—eighteen months, subject to extension, with allowances, up to a period not exceeding altogether three years, on a renewal of the medical certificate.

VI. The pay or allowances during such leave are as follows :—

- a.—In India—full salary of rank, subject to a deduction of one-third for the whole term of regulated absence, provided that the deduction shall not reduce the allowance below Rupees 500 a month.
- b.—Beyond India—for first six months £600 per annum, and (if the absentee be an Archdeacon, but not otherwise,) such portion of the salary of his office, not exceeding one-half, as may not be required for the payment of a *locum tenens*, and as may be granted to the absentee without extra expense to Government. For the remaining period £191-12-6 or £127-15-0 per annum, according as the absentee has or has not completed seven years' residence in India.

VII. Leave on medical certificate will be reckoned as follows :—

- a.—In India—from the date of the absentee's departure from his station, or from any earlier date of his successor's taking charge, to the date of return to station.
- b.—Beyond India—from the date of departure from India of the vessel on which the absentee embarks to the date of his arrival at the principal port of his own Presidency, from which latter date he will be regarded as on duty.

VIII. A Chaplain proceeding on leave beyond India on medical certificate will be allowed an advance of three months' absentee pay, and no recovery will be made on account of this advance should the absentee die before it is liquidated.

IX. A Chaplain proceeding to England on leave should be furnished by the Accountant General with a certificate, in the form given in Appendix B, for submission to the India Office on his arrival in London.

Furlough on Private Affairs.

X. Furlough on private affairs is granted by the Government of India in the Home Department (on application, as before, through the Archdeacon, and through the Local Government or Administration in the Bengal Presidency under whom the Chaplain may be serving), and by the Governments of Madras and Bombay.

XI. A Chaplain wishing for an extension of one of the authorized portions of furlough while in England must send his application to the Government of India, Home Department.

XII. Application for furlough on private affairs must be supported by proof of residence for the period prescribed in para. XIV., and of presence on duty for a continuous period of three months from the date of return from the last absence on privilege leave.

XIII. Grants of furlough on private affairs are subject to the exigencies of the public service. If a Chaplain prefers taking his furlough in India, he may do so.

XIV. The periods for which furlough is granted are as follow :—

a.—Undivided—a continuous term of three years, but not before completion of ten years' residence in India ; or

b.—Divided into two periods, whether of eighteen months each, or of two years and one year respectively. The first instalment of such divided furlough may be taken after a residence of seven years, and the second instalment after a residence of $\left(\frac{\text{eight}}{\text{ten}}\right)$ years, from date of return from last instalment, by Chaplains appointed $\left(\begin{smallmatrix} \text{before} \\ \text{on or after} \end{smallmatrix}\right)$ the 11th January 1854. One year is the shortest term of furlough that can be taken by a Chaplain.

XV. The pay during furlough is £191-12-6 per annum.

XVI. Leave on furlough will be reckoned as in para. VII.

XVII. A Chaplain on furlough may be allowed an advance of six months' furlough pay on the same terms as in para. VIII.

XVIII. A Chaplain proceeding to England on furlough should get the form mentioned in para. IX

Short Leave on Private Affairs.

XIX. Short leave on private affairs is granted by the Government under whom the applicant may be serving, the application being made, as before, through the Archdeacon.

XX. On application for temporary leave timely notice must be given to the chief civil and military authorities at the station, in order that if there be any cogent reasons against the absence of the Chaplain they may be submitted to the Government.

XXI. Short leave on private affairs will be granted on sufficient cause being shown, provided that the applicant's services can be spared, and that six years have elapsed since his last return from such leave.

XXII. Short leave on private affairs in India only is granted for a period not to exceed six months on each occasion.

XXIII. During such leave the pay is £191-12-6 per annum or £127-15-0 per annum according as the absentee has or has not completed seven years' residence in India, also half of the difference between such annual sum and the full pay of rank.

XXIV. Leave in India on private affairs will be reckoned as in para. VII., clause a.

Privilege Leave.

XXV. Privilege leave is granted by the Bishop, or in his absence by the Commissary of the Diocese, the grant being reported to the Local or Supreme Government under whom the applicant is employed, for publication in the official *Gazette*.

XXVI. Applications for privilege leave must be accompanied by proof of continuance on duty till application, for the period prescribed in the next paragraph.

XXVII. The periods for which privilege leave may be granted are one, two, and three months after Chaplains have been on actual duty for continuous periods of five, ten, and fifteen months respectively from date of first arrival in India, or since return from last leave of any description. The period is admissible in addition to, but after, the time allowed for visiting an out-station (*i. e.* after the duties of that station have been duly performed), and also in addition to time allowed for proceeding from one station to another on change of station.

XXVIII. The pay during privilege leave is the full salary, that is, without forfeiture of allowances, unless the Chaplain should exceed the term of his privilege leave, in which case the circumstances under which he overstayed it should be fully reported, when, if the Government be satisfied that the original leave was not exceeded through carelessness or wilful negligence, or from any circumstances involving culpability, leave for the period in excess will be granted in orders, and the Chaplain will not under these circumstances be subjected to any forfeiture of allowances for the term of the original leave but for the period in excess he will be restricted to the same pay as during short leave on private affairs. When, however, grounds are wanting why the original leave should not be invalidated, general leave will either be granted for *the entire period* of the Chaplain's absence (so as to reduce him for such period to the pay for short leave on private affairs), or will be refused altogether, in which latter case the Chaplain will be looked upon as *absent without leave* from the date of his *quitting* to that of his *return* to his post.

XXIX. Privilege leave is reckoned as in para. VII., clause a.

XXX. Pay for the period of privilege leave will not be issued before return to duty.

Preparatory Leave.

XXXI. Preparatory leave is preparatory to leave beyond India on medical certificate, furlough to Europe on private affairs, or retirement from the service. It is granted by the Government under which the applicant may be serving, on application through the Archdeacon.

XXXII. The period for which preparatory leave is granted is as follows:—

a.—If the Chaplain be stationed at the port of embarkation, seven days.

b.—If he be not stationed at the port of embarkation, seven days, and, in addition thereto one day (exclusive of Sundays) for every ten miles of the distance between his station and the port of embarkation, except when railways or steamboats are available, when one day for every one hundred miles of the distance traversed by railway or steamboat will be allowed, or the time actually occupied in the voyage when its duration exceeds the time calculated at the rate of one hundred miles a day.

XXXIII. The pay during preparatory leave is as follows:—Half salary of rank, and when the preparatory leave is granted in connection with leave on medical certificate, but not otherwise, any further sum which may be required to make up the half salary to £500 per annum.

XXXIV. Preparatory leave will be reckoned from the date of the absentee's departure from his station (or from any earlier date of his successor's taking over charge), to the date of his subsequent departure from the principal port of his Presidency, or from any port not more distant from his station.

XXXV. Pay for the period of preparatory leave will be issued on the Chaplain's arrival at the port where the preparatory leave terminates.

Joining Time.

XXXVI. The period of joining time will be governed by the rule laid down for the calculation of preparatory leave in clause b of Section XXXII. When an officer is transferred from one station to another during absence on leave he will, unless there be special orders to the contrary, be allowed joining time in addition to the period of his leave, and the time will be calculated according to the distance either from his old to his new station, or from the place where he receives the orders transferring him to his new station, whichever may be nearest to his new station.

Miscellaneous.

XXXVII. The period of three years to which the grant of pay to a Chaplain absent on furlough is confined is an absolute limit. Should he exceed that term and obtain one or more extensions of furlough up to the maximum of five years, pay will not be given for any period in excess of the three years.

XXXVIII. The foregoing rules confer no right on a Chaplain to return from leave to the particular station which he may have quitted, every Officer being liable to be moved from one station to another whenever the Government think it expedient.

XXXIX. Periods of absence on privilege leave, preparatory leave, and leave to the Presidency, not exceeding six months, for the purpose of undergoing examination in the Oriental languages by the test prescribed for Military Officers, will be counted as service and residence, the last-mentioned absence being regarded as on duty.

XI. Absence on leave of other denominations to the extent of three years, and absence in India on leave taken before the 25th August 1864, will be counted as service only.

XLI. Absence without leave, or for a period in excess of authorized leave, will entail forfeiture of allowances for the term of unauthorized absence.

XLII. Chaplains are to report to the local Accountant General the date of their joining a station and of their leaving it, and in the Bengal Presidency to the Secretary to the Government of India, Home Department, or in the other Presidencies to the Secretaries to Governments of Madras and Bombay the date the pilot leaves the vessel on which they may be quitting their Presidency by sea.

XLIII. With the exceptions noted in paras. VIII., XVII., XXX., and XXXV., a Chaplain on leave may be allowed pay month by month, as it falls due.

XLIV. Absentee pay issued in India at a rate which is expressed in sterling money will be converted into Indian currency at two shillings to the Government rupee.

XLV. No Officer is allowed to visit Cashmere without the sanction of the Punjab Government; and all applications to visit that territory are invariably to contain a report that the applicant has received and perused the rules for the guidance of Officers travelling in the territories of the Maharaja, and that he pledges himself to abide strictly by them, and will on no account whatever, or under any circumstances, interfere with the natives except through the legitimate authorities of the district.

XLVI. A Chaplain will report the dates of his proceeding on and returning from leave to the Local Government under which he may be serving, except when he is a Chaplain on the Bengal Establishment proceeding on or returning from furlough, in which case the report will be made to the Government of India in the Home Department. Failing such report the leave will be calculated from the date of the Government order granting it.

POLICE OFFICE, BYCULLA, BOMBAY.

The Architectural Improvement Committee of Bombay have received instructions from Her Majesty's Government of Bombay to call for Competition Designs for a new Police Office at Byculla. The cost of the Building not to exceed, at present prices, three lacs of Rupees.

The extent of accommodation to be provided and other particulars as to site, &c, can be ascertained on application at the office of the Architectural Improvement Committee, Esplanade.

Each Design to be sent, in the first instance, as a pen and ink Architectural sketch, uncoloured and without shading, except such as can be done with the pen. Each Design should bear a motto, and should be accompanied by the Architect's address in a sealed envelope, and should be sent in on or before the First day of October 1865, addressed to the Architectural Improvement Committee of Bombay.

A premium of Rupees one thousand (1,000) will be awarded to the author of the Design approved, to be increased on the completion of the Contract Drawings of the selected Design, with specifications and table of quantities, to (2½) two and a half per cent. on the cost of the work when estimated at the current rates of the Public Works Department.

The style is left an open question, but the construction of the building, and its Architectural treatment must be thoroughly adapted to a tropical climate, where a high temperature and monsoon

rains have to be provided against. Due regard must be had to the contemplated outlay; yet the Designs, whilst not too ornate, must be effective, and possess sufficient Artistic merit to entitle them to compete for the premium.

If the Designs are wanting in Artistic merit, or fail to comply with the conditions, the Judges will have power to reduce or withhold the prize. No prize will be given to a Design because it merely fulfills the conditions as to cost, &c., if it is conspicuously deficient in Artistic merit.

The Design will be selected, and the award made, by the Architectural Improvement Committee of Bombay.

Unsuccessful Designs will be returned to the authors if claimed by them or their authorized agents, within three months from the date of adjudication.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons at out-stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.
