No. 3245.—A doubt having arisen as to whether, with reference to Section 30 of Act X. of 1862, Judicial Officers may furnish copies of their decisions to Officers of Government for official purposes on plain paper, the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that, wherever, in the public interests, Judicial Officers furnish public Departments with copies of their decisions or of any other documents, such documents need not be stamped. A copy exempted under this order from stamp duty to which it would otherwise be liable, will not be admissible in any legal proceedings before a Court of Justice.

No. 3076.—The following Resolution is published for general information:—

Read the undermentioned papers:-

Extract from an order of the Government of India in the Home Department, No. 4373, dated the 9th September 1867, to the effect that Junior Civil Servants attending examinations for prizes for the study of the Oriental languages, are not entitled to travelling allowances for the journeys to and from the places where the examinations are held.

Resolution No. 2749, passed in this Department on the 24th September 1867, ruling that the Junior Civil Servants referred to above 'may be allowed leave on full pay for one month, and that on their passing a successful examination, they may be allowed an extension of leave on full pay for another month, and be permitted to count the period of the original leave and of the extension as service and residence, provided that the period of leave on this account, which carries pay and counts as service and residence, shall in no case exceed two months on one occasion, or twelve months in the

Resolution No. 1480, passed in this Department on the 12th March 1869, deciding 'that no public officer can be permitted to draw travelling allowance, whether daily or annual, during absence on leave of any description,' but that a Covenanted Civil Servant in Bombay may draw house-rent or tentage during absence or privilege leave, provided he places his house or tent at the disposal of his locum tenens, and that the locum tenens does not receive house-rent or tentage at the same time.

Endorsement from the Chief Secretary to the Government of Bombay, No. 691, dated the 28th May 1869, and enclosures, raising objections to the ruling of the 12th March 1869.

Letter to ditto, No. 2275, dated the 30th ultimo, in reply to the above.

Endorsement from ditto, No. 3045, dated the 27th ultimo, submitting, in continuation of the endorsement No. 691 of the 28th May 1869, a claim from Mr. H. J. Stokes, a Covenanted Civil Servant in Bombay, to the fixed travelling allowance and tentage of a First Assistant Collector during absence on leave to attend an examination for a prize in Canarese.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is unable to sanction any modification of the resolution of the 12th March 1869; but, observing that if Junior Civil Servants who obtain prizes for the study of the Oriental languages are obliged to pay their own expenses to and from the places where the examinations are held, the value of their prizes will be considerably diminished. His Excellency in Council is pleased to rule, in supersession of the order No. 4373, passed in the Home Department on the 9th September 1867, that a Junior Civilian, who obtains a reward for proficiency in an Oriental language, shall be permitted, in addition to the reward, to draw travelling allowance at the usual rates for journeys exceeding five miles to and from the place of examination."

"No. 3338.—The introduction of the revised rules for the treatment of official correspondence, published under date the I4th June, No. 1112, with effect from the 1st October, is postponed till the 1st April 1870, the existing rules remaining in force up to the last-mentioned date.

*" Complaints against the Post Office, certified as such under the full signature and address of the sender, and addressed to any officer of the Postal Department, are not chargeable with any postage."

But the rules quoted on the margin embodied in the revised code, will have effect from the 1st October next.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

With reference to Government Resolution No. 1914, in the General Department, dated 11th August 1869, extending the Rules and Regulations for inspecting and controlling houses of ill-fame, and for preventing the spread of venereal disease, framed under Clause 7 of Section XI. of the Bombay Cantonment Act III. of 1867, to a radius of three miles round the limits of the Cantonment of Ahmedabad, His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to prescribe, under Section XVIII. of the above Act, that breaches of such Rules and Regulations committed within the District of Ahmedabad and within the limits aforesaid shall be inquired into and be cognizable by the Assistant or Deputy Collector invested with the full powers of a Magistrate or of a Subordinate Magistrate of the 1st Class, who, for the time being shall be in charge of the Town of Ahmedabad.

No. 3349.—The following letter to the address of the Accountant General, Madras, No. 3349, dated September 1869, is published for general information:—

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 3040, dated the 9th ultimo, and in reply to state that the rule contained in the order of this Department, No. 3429, dated the 8th December 1868, that when an officer holding an acting appointment is transferred to another appointment of not inferior emoluments, he shall continue to draw his acting allowances during the time spent in joining the new appointment, is applicable to every case of transfer to another appointment, whether substantive or acting, of not inferior emolument.

2. I am desired, however, to take this opportunity of observing, with reference to the order of December 1868, mentioned above, and to the subsequent order of this Department, No. 743, dated the 25th May 1869, that no officer should draw acting allowances for any office after the substantive incumbent of that office has resumed charge."

RESOURCE DEPARTMENT.

The subjoined Memorandum of Instructions, issued by the Controller of Military Accounts, regarding Family Allotment Money of troops on Field and Foreign Service, is published for the information and guidance of Officers in charge of Civil Treasuries, to be introduced from the 1st proximo:—

- "In supersession of existing rules regarding family allotment money of Troops, on Field and Foreign Service, the following rules are to be observed:—
- 2. When Troops are ordered to proceed on Field or Foreign Service, Commanding Officers of Regiments will prepare and furnish to Officers Commanding the Regimental Depóts, Nominal Rolls of Family Certificates granted by the Officers and men of their respective Corps; the certificates will be prepared and disposed of in the same manner as under the present system.
- 3. Each Commanding officer will remit by Transfer Receipt to the Officer Commanding his Regimental Depôt the amount of monthly deductions from the Regimental Pay Lists on account of family allotment money, corresponding with the amount to be paid.
- The payment of family money is to be made one month in arrears after the close of each month; the amount required by the Officer Commanding each Regimental Depôt will be obtained from the Circle Pay Master in whose range the Depôt is stationed.
- 5. The Depôt Commanding Officer will furnish monthly to the Circle Pay Master a requisition for Cash and Transfer Receipts, to the extent required to be paid, but will draw only the amount required to be disbursed by himself, and will obtain Transfer Receipts for the sums to be paid at other places. The Transfer Receipts will be forwarded to the Officers in charge of the Treasuries on which they are drawn. Vide Article 79, page 13, New Rules for Bills of Exchange.
- 6. Holders of Family Certificates will be paid their moneys monthly at the places where they are payable, on presentation of their Certificates to the Officers authorized to disburse the amounts.
- 7. The date and particulars of each payment are to be recorded by the Paying Officer on the Family Certificate in the possession of the Payee.
- 8. All changes in the family payments of each Corps must be communicated in Alteration Rolls by the first opportunity to the Depôt Commanding Officer, who will be guided by them in making subsequent payments.
- 9. Any over-payment will be held to the debit of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment concerned to be recovered by him from the grant, or of the Family Certificate, or, in the event of his death, from the proceeds of his estate.
- 10. The amounts paid by Circle Paymasters to Depôt Commanding Officers, will be debited to the respective Regimental Commanding Officers, to be adjusted by Depôt Commanding Officers with the Remittance Transfer Receipt obtained from Commanding Officers as provided for in paragraph 3 above."

Changes of Address.—All communications on the subject should be made to the Post Master of Bombay, or other Post Masters, and not to the Post Master General. The name of the Post Town to which letters will be found addressed should be stated in the application.

Re-direction of Overland Letters.—Hitherto the Bombay Post Office has, as a favour, attended to instructions from the Public for the interception and re-direction of Overland Letters addressed to stations beyond Bombay.

- 2. The introduction of Sorting the Overland Mails on board Steamers between Suez and Bombay has necessitated the abandonment of this system, as time does not allow of the necessary intimation to Sea Sorters, who are also otherwise fully employed, and letters reach Bombay ready packeted for the interior.
- 3. Requests to intercept or redirect Overland Letters are therefore not attended to by the Bombay Post Office. Those expecting a change of residence, are recommended to have their letters consigned to some Agent in Bombay.

Complaints from Residents of Bombay requiring redress as to surcharge of postage, mis-sending, or delay in the delivery of letters, &c., should be made to the Post Master, accompanied by the envelopes of the letters referred to.

Similar complaints in the Mofussil should be made to the Inspecting Post Master of the Division, also accompanied by the envelope.

An appeal against the decision of the Post Master of Bombay, or of the Inspecting Post Master, can always be made to the Post Master General.

Rates of Postage to Guatemala.—Under the orders of Her Majesty's Post Master General the British Rates of postage on letters to Guatemala has been reduced and a similar reduction has been made in the rate of postage charged on letters forwarded to that Republic from India via the United Kingdom.
