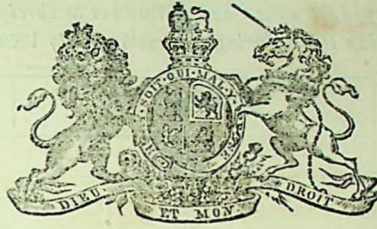

PART I.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS TO THE PUBLIC.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

With reference to Government Resolution No. 1565 in the General Department, dated 1st July 1869, extending the Rules and Regulations for inspecting and controlling houses of ill-fame, and for preventing the spread of venereal disease, framed under Clause 7 of Section XI. of the Bombay Cantonments Act III. of 1867, to a radius of three miles round the Limits of the Cantonment of Belgaum, His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to prescribe under Section XVIII. of the above Act, that breaches of such Rules and Regulations committed within the District of Belgaum and within the limits aforesaid, shall be inquired into and be cognizable by the Magistrate invested with full powers, who for the time being shall be in charge of the town of Belgaum.

The following Notifications by the Government of India are republished for general information:—

“EXPENDITURE.

Simla, the 26th August 1869.

No. 2994.

Extract from a Despatch from the Government of India in the Financial Department, addressed to the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India, No. 212, dated Simla, the 26th August 1869.

‘The employment of English artisans in the plains of India is for the present, indeed, a necessity which, however much we may regret it, cannot be avoided. The only remedy is the substitution of skilled Native labour to the uttermost, and we are well persuaded that there is no handicraft, however intricate and difficult, which the Natives of India are not capable of learning. Our most earnest attention will be given to this subject, with the distinct object, among others, of dispensing, so far as may be possible, with European labour of a mechanical nature.

But we respectfully suggest to your Grace that it be made a rule, to be departed from only under the most exceptional circumstances, that no man with a large family shall be engaged in England to proceed to India for minor civil employment under the Government there.’

Read the undermentioned papers:—

Resolution No. 57, passed in this department on the 2nd January 1868, deciding ‘that when an officer is placed in charge of the current duties of a judicial office, and the charge, in the opinion of the Local Government, entails a substantial increase of responsibility besides some additional work, he shall be permitted to draw one-half of the deputation allowance which he would have received if he had been appointed to officiate in the office concerned.’

Endorsement from the Accountant General, Bengal, No. 1206, dated the 3rd instant, submitting a copy of an order of the Local Government to the effect that, in the case of a subordinate Judge in charge of the office of Civil and Sessions Judge, the proviso in the notification of this department, No. 534, dated the 16th June 1868, that the minimum of acting allowance must be two-thirds of the difference between the salaries of the substantive and acting appointments of the officer concerned, cannot apply, because a subordinate Judge cannot officiate as a Civil and Sessions Judge, and no comparison can therefore be established between the salaries of the appointments.

RESOLUTION.—The Governor General in Council is pleased to confirm the order of the Government of Bengal, and to prescribe generally that, when an officer placed in charge of the current duties of a judicial office is granted half acting allowances under the resolution No. 57, dated the 2nd January 1868, the proviso above-quoted shall be disregarded in calculating the amount of such allowances.

ORDER.—Ordered, that the foregoing resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*, and communicated to the Foreign and Home Departments, and the Governments of Bengal, Madras, Bombay, North-Western Provinces, and the Punjab; the Comptroller General of Accounts; the Accountants General in Bengal, Madras, Bombay, the North-Western Provinces, the Punjab, and British Burmah; and the Deputy Accountants General in the Central Provinces, Hyderabad, and Mysore.”

“MINT AND CURRENCY.

The 24th August 1869.

No. 2903.—It has been represented to the Government of India that inconvenience is felt in many parts of the country from the scarcity of small silver coins in circulation, which is attributed to obstacles thrown in the way of applicants for such coins by Native Treasurers, District and Treasury Officers are hereby enjoined to take such measures as they can devise to prevent abuses of this nature. Small silver should be freely given in exchange for rupees, currency notes, or copper coin of the realm to all applicants for not less five Rupees worth.”

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

The following conditions of the Gilchrist Scholarship, and also the programme of Examination, are republished, together with extracts from a Despatch from Her Majesty's Secretary of State, dated the 16th December 1867, admitting to competition all persons born in India except those of pure European descent:—

Conditions for Scholarships to be instituted by the Gilchrist Educational Trust for the benefit of Natives of India.

Two Scholarships, each of the value of £100 per annum, and tenable for Five years, will be annually awarded to Candidates born in India who shall become eligible by Competitive Examination, under the following conditions:—

1. Of the Parents of each Candidate, one at least shall belong to one of the Native Races.
2. Every Candidate must furnish proof satisfactory to the Local Authorities that he has completed his sixteenth year, and that his age does not exceed twenty-two years.
3. Every Candidate must furnish proof satisfactory to the Local Authorities that in regard to personal character and social position he is qualified to be admitted to competition for a Scholarship.
4. The subjects of Examination shall be (1) Latin, (2) English Language and History, (3) Arithmetic and Algebra, (4) Geometry, (5) Natural Philosophy, and (6) Chemistry. The Examination Papers will be analogous, in character and difficulty, to those prepared in these subjects respectively for the Matriculation Examination of the University of London: and the number of hours assigned to each of the Papers will be the same as those assigned to the like Paper by the University of London. These Papers will be sent out in sealed covers, through the India Office, to the charge of Sub-Examiners appointed by Her Majesty's Government.
5. The Examination shall be held, under the charge of a Government Sub-Examiner, at each of the Presidential Capitals simultaneously, and shall commence in the second week of January in each year. The Place, and the Days and Hours of Examination (which shall be the same at all the Capitals), shall be appointed by the Local Authorities.
6. The Sub-Examiner shall open the sealed covers containing the Examination Papers in the Place of Examination, at the hour prescribed for the Candidates to assemble. He shall be present throughout the

whole of each Examination, and shall, at the end of each, collect the Answers written by every Candidate during the time allowed. He shall transmit these Answers, in sealed covers, through the India Office, to the Secretary of the Gilchrist Trust, who will cause them to be carefully considered and compared by Examiners of established reputation, named by the Trustees, in each of the respective subjects. The Trustees will name, whenever practicable, the Examiners or Sub-Examiners acting in those subjects respectively for the University of London. The Examiners shall consider the Papers with as little delay as possible, and shall make their award thereupon, assigning to each Paper a number of marks suitable to its merits. Such award shall be transmitted forthwith by the Secretary, through the India Office, to the Local Authorities in the Presidential Capitals, to be by them announced to the Candidates.

7. The first Scholarship shall be awarded to the Candidate whose aggregate of marks stands highest, provided that he passes in each of the six subjects above mentioned, and that his aggregate of marks amounts to not less than one-half of the total. Such Candidate shall have his choice whether he will pursue his curriculum of study in the University of Edinburgh, or in the University College, London.

8. The second Scholarship shall be awarded to the Candidate whose aggregate of marks stands second, provided that he passes in each of the six subjects, and that his aggregate of marks amounts to not less than one-half of the total. Such Candidate shall pursue his curriculum of study in that one of the two Institutions above named which shall not have been chosen by the other Candidate.

9. If the two highest Candidates are equal in aggregate number of marks, the privilege of choosing between these two Institutions shall be determined between them by lot.

10. The successful Candidates shall be expected to arrive in London, and to present themselves to the Secretary of the Gilchrist Trust, not later than the first week in the October following their appointment.

11. The Scholarships shall be considered as commencing from the first of July following the award of the Examiners, and shall be paid in quarterly instalments on the first days of October, January, April, and July.

12. Each Scholar shall attend in every Session at least Three Courses of Lectures at the Institution in which he studies (unless specially excused by the Trustees from doing so during the first year), and shall transmit to the Secretary of the Gilchrist Trust, at the conclusion of each Session, a Certificate from each of the Professors whose Lectures he has attended, stating that his diligence and conduct have been satisfactory. Should he not be able to produce such a certificate, or should he be proved guilty of discreditable conduct elsewhere, he shall be considered to have forfeited all claim to the remaining instalments of his Scholarship.

13. Each Scholar shall be expected to present himself both at the Matriculation Examination of the University of London, and at the First Examination in one of its Four Faculties,—Arts, Science, Law, or Medicine,—before the termination of the Third (Academical) Year* from the commencement of his Scholarship, unless excused from doing so by the Trustees; and if he do not so present himself (unless by permission of the Trustees), or if he fail to pass, he shall be considered as forfeiting his claim to the remaining Two Years' instalments of his Scholarship.

14. The foregoing scheme shall be subject to revision from time to time, the Trustees reserving to themselves the power of altering the conditions of the Scholarships, or of altogether withdrawing them, if they deem it expedient to do either. But no change will be made in such a manner as to affect the interests of Candidates already appointed to Scholarships, or in any case without Twelve Months' Notice.

CANDIDATES WILL BE EXAMINED IN THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:—

LATIN.

One Latin subject, to be announced a year and a half previously.† The Paper will contain passages to be translated into English, with questions in History and Geography. A separate Paper will be set, containing questions in Latin Grammar, with simple and easy sentences of English to be translated into Latin.

* Thus a Candidate whose Scholarship commences on the 1st of July 1868 would be considered as having fulfilled this condition if he passed the First LL.B. Examination in January 1871, or the First B. A., the First B. Sc., or the Preliminary Scientific M.B. Examination in the following July.

† The Latin subject of the examination of 1870 will be the first book of Livy.

To His Excellency the Right Honourable the GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL, Bombay.

I have had before me in Council the despatch from your Excellency in Council, dated the 24th of June last, No. 6, and the telegram from your Government, dated the 22nd ultimo, on the subject of the proposed establishment by the Trustees of the Gilchrist Educational Trust of annual scholarships to be held by natives of India.

I communicated the abovementioned despatch and telegram to the Trustees * * * and I forward herewith a copy of the reply addressed by their desire, on the 5th instant, to this Office.

You will observe that the Trustees * * * decline to accept the modifications proposed, with the following exception, namely, as regards the question of race, in which matter they are disposed to modify their scheme "so far as to admit to the competition all persons born in India, except those of pure European descent."

I have to inform your Excellency in Council that, in accordance with a request received from the Trustees I have decided to grant the sum of £100 for passage to each of the Scholars proceeding to this country, and have further determined to allow the same amount for a return passage to such of them as may forfeit their Scholarship.

NOTIFICATION.

With reference to the conditions published above, it is hereby notified that the Principal of the Elphinstone College has been appointed Sub-Examiner for the Gilchrist Scholarship, and that applications for admission to the Scholarship must be sent to the Director of Public Instruction (with certificates of parentage, age, character, social position, and University standing, if any) on or before the 1st October next.

The date of the Examination of 1870 will be published hereafter.

The Honourable the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature are pleased, in supersession of all former orders on the subject, to lay down the following Rules for the Examination of Candidates for the office of Pleader in the District and Subordinate Courts. Any Candidate who shall pass this examination will be held duly qualified within the meaning of Section 48 of Regulation II. of 1827.

1. An examination of candidates for the office of Pleader in the District and Subordinate Courts will be held in Bombay in the month of February or thereabouts, on a date of which due notice will be given in the *Government Gazette*.

2. The examination will be conducted by a Committee appointed by the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay. All applications to the Committee are to be addressed to the Registrar of the High Court, Appellate Side.

3. Each candidate will be required, on admission to the examination, to pay a fee of Rupees 7, and on applying for a Sunud a further fee of Rupees 7.

4. No candidate will be admitted unless he produces before the Committee a certificate according to the following form from the Judge of the District within which he may have been employed or residing, or from the Registrar or Deputy Registrar:—

"I hereby certify that I have examined the bearer, A. B., inhabitant of _____ and find from personal knowledge (or satisfactory testimonials produced before me) that he is _____ years of age (not less than 21), is of respectable character and is properly educated. He has hitherto been employed as _____, and I consider him fit to appear before the Committee appointed for the examination of candidates for the Office of Pleader."

5. The Registrar or Deputy Registrar of the High Court may grant the Certificate to Candidates resident in Bombay for more than one year, after making such inquiries as may be necessary. Testimonials of character and education must be signed by the Head of the Department in which the candidate has served, if he is a Government servant, or by the Principal of some College or other Institution recognised by the University of Bombay, or by the Head Master of a Government High School or of a First Grade Anglo-Vernacular School. It shall be in the power of the Registrar in special cases to grant such certificate upon such residence and testimonials as he may think proper under the circumstances.

6. The examination will be conducted in the English, Marathi, Gujarati, and, if necessary, in the Canarese languages in the following subjects, and the merit of each candidate will be estimated by marks, the number set opposite to each subject in the following list denoting the greatest number of marks attainable in respect of such subjects:—

	Marks.
1. The Hindu Law of Inheritance, Succession and Adoption, and Mahomedan Law ..	100
2. The Law of Civil Procedure, Limitation, Registration, and Stamps	100
3. The Law of Contracts, Torts, and Evidence	100
4. The Indian Penal Code, and the Code of Criminal Procedure	100

One paper of questions will be set in each of the four subjects above specified.

7. The Candidates may be examined *viva voce* in the subjects specified in rule 6.

8. Each candidate who has obtained at least one-third of the total number of marks attainable in respect of each subject of written and oral Examination, and 60 per cent. of the total number of marks attainable in respect of all the subjects, will be held to be duly qualified for the office of Pleader in the District and Subordinate Courts.

9. At the conclusion of the examination, the Committee will report the result to the Chief Justice and Judges of Her Majesty's High Court, who, on application will, unless they shall see cause to the contrary, grant to any candidate thus qualified a Sunud authorizing him to practise in the Courts of any one District of the Bombay Presidency as the Chief Justice and Judges may think fit.

10. If the Committee are of opinion that any candidate has come up for Examination without due preparation, they may prohibit his appearing at the next Examination.

11. Nothing in these Rules shall interfere with any Rule which has been or may be made for the admission of graduates of the University to the office of Pleader.

Bombay Castle, 27th August 1869.

His Excellency LIEUTENANT GENERAL THE LORD NAPIER OF MAGDALA, G.C.B., and G.C.S.I., resigns this day the Command of the Bombay Army.

His Excellency in Council feels assured that it is not necessary to rehearse Lord Napier's Services. The Capture of Magdala drew the attention of all to his distinguished career.

His Command of the Army, both before and after the brilliant interval of the Abyssinian Campaign, has been marked by thoughtful and active furtherance of every means to better the state of the Soldier, in health, enjoyment, and usefulness; and His Excellency the Governor in Council has no doubt that this has made itself felt throughout the Army; and that it leaves a sense of Lord Napier's care and sympathy, which will be abidingly associated with the memory of his tenure of this Command.

LIEUTENANT GENERAL THE HONOURABLE SIR AUGUSTUS ALMERIC SPENCER, K.C.B., assumes Command of the Army.

The Troops in Garrison at Bombay will appear under arms at the time of LORD NAPIER'S Embarkation; till when, the customary honours due to the Commander-in-Chief, will be paid to His Lordship.”

POST OFFICE NOTIFICATIONS.

Changes of Address.—All communications on the subject should be made to the **POST MASTER** of Bombay, or other **POST MASTERS**, and not to the **POST MASTER GENERAL**. The name of the **Post Town** to which letters will be found addressed should be stated in the application.

Re-direction of Overland Letters.—Hitherto the Bombay Post Office has, as a favour, attended to instructions from the Public for the interception and re-direction of Overland Letters addressed to stations beyond Bombay.

2. The introduction of Sorting the Overland Mails on board Steamers between Suez and Bombay has necessitated the abandonment of this system, as time does not allow of the necessary intimation to Sea Sorters, who are also otherwise fully employed, and letters reach Bombay ready packeted for the interior.

3. Requests to intercept or redirect Overland Letters are therefore not attended to by the Bombay Post Office. Those expecting a change of residence, are recommended to have their letters consigned to some Agent in Bombay.

Complaints from Residents of Bombay requiring redress as to surcharge of postage, mis-sending, or delay in the delivery of letters, &c., should be made to the Post Master, accompanied by the envelopes of the letters referred to.

Similar complaints in the Mofussil should be made to the Inspecting Post Master of the Division, also accompanied by the envelope.

An appeal against the decision of the Post Master of Bombay, or of the Inspecting Post Master, can always be made to the Post Master General.

Overland Mails.—The Overland Mails per P. and O. Company's Steam Packets leave Bombay every Tuesday at 5 P.M. during the monsoon months, *i. e.*, commencing on the 25th May and ending on the 14th September, after which Saturday will be the day of departure at the same hour.

The Mails close at the General Post Office at 2 P.M.

The After Packet at 3 P.M.

After-Packet Letters are not forwarded unless an 8-anna stamp is affixed to the letter in addition to the postage.

Registered Letters are received until 1 P.M.

The latest hour for posting Overland Covers at the several Branch Post Offices is 1 P.M.

Late Letters for the Overland Mails.—Independently of the After-Packet which is kept open at the General Post Office till 3 P.M., late letters for the English Mail will be taken at the Pier Post Office from 2 P.M., and as late as 4-30 P.M. The full postage, including the usual fee of 8 annas, must be prepaid on each cover.

Rules for the treatment of Official Correspondence.—The rules for the treatment of Official Correspondence sent by Post, published in Notification No. 1891 A., dated the 24th March 1869, with effect from the 1st July, have been cancelled, and no alteration will be made in the existing Rules until the 1st October 1869, when the following Regulations will come into operation.

All official covers transmitted through the General Post will be subject to the new Rules, the exemption of the official correspondence of local officers within the limits of their respective districts being withdrawn, so far as concerns transmission through the General Post, from the date on which the new Rules come into operation:—

Rules for the Treatment of Official Correspondence.

A.—PRIVILEGED OFFICES.

I. The Public Offices enumerated in the annexed list, will be privileged to send and receive by inland Post (without actual payment of postage) all covers * *bond fide* and exclusively on Her Majesty's Service, an account of the postage due thereon being kept by the Post Office against every such privileged office.

* For limits of weight and size, see Rule XXV.

II. For Rules relating to supplementary postage accounts in respect of privileged officers proceeding on tour and in certain other cases, see head D.

Official covers despatched from a privileged Office.

III. Official covers despatched from a privileged office must be properly tied up, faced, and enclosed in a bag sealed with the seal of the office.

IV. Each cover must be endorsed and addressed according to the specimen form given in the margin, under the full signature (autograph or stamp) of the head clerk, or some other principal officer of the establishment. Such covers will be charged in the account of the despatching Office by weight in bulk at the rate of 1½ anna per tola.

V. Official covers, which it may be inconvenient for a privileged Office to send to the Post Office in the official bag, should be prepaid by stamps,* unless addressed to a privileged Office, in which case they may be posted under Rule (VIII.)

At the Presidency towns and other places where there is a separately-organized local Post for the receipt and delivery of letters at frequent intervals during the day, it may often be convenient for privileged Offices to post local letters in a neighbouring pillar-box, instead of sending them to the Post Office in an official bag, and in such cases this rule ought to be availed of.

VI. Official covers will be delivered to a privileged Office enclosed in the official bag, and sealed and sent out with the ordinary delivery, or given to the messenger of the Office, should one be in attendance.

VII. Offices not privileged consist of those Government Offices which are not included in the list and do not therefore enjoy the privilege referred to in Rule (I.)

Official covers despatched from Offices not privileged to the address of privileged Offices.

VIII. Official covers despatched from an Office not privileged to the address of a privileged Office must be endorsed and addressed according to the specimen form given in the margin, under the full signature and official designation of the person by whom they are despatched. The address must include the full official designation of the office to which the cover is directed. Such covers will be charged in the account of the receiving Office by weight in bulk at the rate of 1½ anna per tola.

Covers so addressed will be regarded by the Post Office as private letters, but will be charged on delivery with bearing postage at "forward" (*i. e.*, prepaid) rates, and not at double rates. Under this head come replies sent to communications of the kind noted in the margin, as well as any other communications of a like kind which Government Officers may make to individuals (whether private persons or Government Officers) relating to the private interest of the addressees.

XI. Communications sent by private persons to Government officials relating to the affairs of Government may be endorsed according to the specimen form given in the margin, under the full signature of the sender. The address must include the full official designation of the public office to which the cover is sent. Such covers will be charged on delivery at the rate to which they would have been liable if prepaid by stamps. This rule is intended to provide for cases of zemindars reporting the occurrence of crime to a Police Officer; of employers of labourers sending returns required by the Protector; of aided schools forwarding returns required by a Government Inspector; and of any similar reports or returns required by Government for its own purposes from private individuals, societies, associations, or institutions.

XII. In cases where it is not thought advisable to entrust postage stamps to a subordinate official who has to correspond with, or send returns to, a superior (not being a privileged officer), he may be allowed by his superior to address official covers to him under the above Rule: and the same course may be adopted in other cases where it is found convenient or proper to make the postage charge fall on the receiving Office.

D.—SUPPLEMENTARY POSTAGE ACCOUNT BOOKS FOR PRIVILEGED OFFICERS WHEN ON TOUR,
AND FOR CERTAIN OTHER CASES.

XIII. Privileged officers proceeding on tour will be supplied by the Post Office at their head quarters, with supplementary postage account books, on which will be printed instructions for their use.

XIV. If a privileged officer goes on tour without a supplementary postage account book, or, if having one, he does not present it at the Post Office, he cannot enjoy the privilege of sending and receiving covers without actual payment of postage, but he may in such case post covers under the rules prescribed for officers not privileged.

XV. For a Governor or Lieutenant Governor proceeding on tour, the same Rules apply, except when a Camp Post Office is organized. In that case the Camp Post Office will keep the postage account, forwarding monthly returns to the head quarter Post Office.

XVI. A district officer (see definition of the term in the list, entry No. 23) may obtain from the Post Office at his head quarters supplementary postage account books for the use of Assistants or Deputies stationed in the interior of the district and in charge of Sub-Divisions, the Post Master who supplies such books being informed of the designation and locality of the subordinate Office for which each is required. These books, when supplied to Sub-Divisional Officers, will be placed by them in the Post Office where they desire to enjoy the privilege, and will entitle them to send and receive official covers just as if they were privileged officers. Instructions for the use of such books will be printed thereon.

XVII. Similarly, District Superintendents of Police may obtain supplementary postage account books for the use of Assistant Superintendents stationed in the interior of the district.

E.—MISCELLANEOUS.

XVIII. Officers in charge of Telegraph Offices, when posting telegraph messages for onward transmission by Post, are entitled to get receipts for them. Such receipts must be presented ready written in the form ordinarily used by the Telegraph Offices when delivering telegraph messages to the addressees. The Post Master will compare the receipt so presented with the address of the cover accompanying it, and if correct will affix the Post Office Stamp in acknowledgment of receipt. All covers for which receipts are claimed under this Rule must be superscribed with the word "Telegram." Telegraph messages so sent are liable to the ordinary rates of postage, which must be prepaid in full by means of postage stamps.* If telegraph messages are sent registered, the usual registration fee must likewise be prepaid by postage stamps.*

* See Rule XXII.

XIX. Complaints against the Post Office, certified as such, under the full signature and address of the sender, and addressed to any officer of the Postal Department, are not chargeable with any postage.

XX. Official communications addressed to Government Offices "On Her Majesty's Service" under Rules (IV.), (VIII.), or (IX.), or "Service Bearing" under Rules (XI.), or (XII.), are not liable to additional postage on account of re-direction.

XXI. Government Officers are bound to receive and pay any postage which may be due on covers addressed to them under the superscription—"On Her Majesty's Service" or "Service Bearing." If the charge of postage results from any irregularity or omission on the part of the sender, his fault should be represented to the proper authority.

XXII. Postage stamps required for official correspondence should be purchased at the Government Treasury, or other local stamp depôt. The stamps issued to official applicants for official purposes, will be marked with the word "Service," and when used in payment of postage must be supported by the

superscription on the cover "On Her Majesty's Service only," under the full signature and official designation of the Government officer who sends the cover. The superscription and signature should be entered in the form marginally given. Service stamps affixed to a cover without the abovementioned superscription will not be recognized by the Post Office in payment of postage. Treasury officers are enjoined not to issue service stamps to any but Government officers.

XXIII. Covers posted by a privileged office under Rule (IV), but not enclosed in the official bag, will be treated as if posted by an unprivileged office, *i. e.*, charged in the account of the receiving office if it be privileged, and charged with postage at pre-paid rates if addressed otherwise than to a privileged office. Covers sent by an unprivileged office under Rule (IX.) but without stamps, will be charged with postage on delivery at prepaid rates, and if the stamps affixed be insufficient, the deficiency will be charged. Any other irregularity or incompleteness of the address or superscription, will render the cover liable to be treated as an ordinary unpaid cover.

XXIV. Government Officers when on leave, and those who have retired from the service of Government can correspond only as private individuals.

XXV. The limits of weight and size, in respect of official letters or packets, are the same as those* prescribed for ordinary packets. A cover exceeding those limits can only be forwarded as a banghy parcel, and must either be prepaid by postage stamps† by the sender, or paid for in cash by the addressee. Receipts for such banghy parcels when presented ready written will be returned stamped with the Post Office stamp. Service banghy parcels are exempted from the Rule requiring them to be packed in wax-cloth or tin, and sealed at intervals along the lines of sewing, but they must be securely packed.

XXVI. In order to afford to public offices the means of checking the postage accounts kept against them in the Post Office, reasonable opportunity will be given, under the orders of the Post Master General, for the inspection of the Post Office account by an officer deputed for the purpose from any public office.

XXVII. The Director General of the Post Office is authorized to make annual arrangements with the Money Order Department for the conveyance of its correspondence without actual payment at a contract rate. Similar arrangements may be made in other cases in which they may be practicable and convenient.

F.—OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE WITH PLACES ABROAD OR BETWEEN INDIAN POST OFFICES, WHEN CONVEYED BY BRITISH OR FRENCH MAIL PACKETS.

XXVIII. The Rules contained in the preceding sections relate exclusively to official inland correspondence, *i. e.*, correspondence conveyed between one Indian Post Office and another by Her Majesty's Indian Post.

XXIX. Official correspondence with places abroad or between Indian Post Offices when conveyed by British or French mail packets (*e. g.*, between Calcutta and Madras, or between Bombay and Aden), is governed by the same Rules as ordinary private correspondence, and must either be prepaid by stamps* or (where prepayment is optional) be forwarded as unpaid, subject to the levy of postage on delivery.

* See Rule XXII.

XXX. The only exception to the preceding Rule has reference to official correspondence sent by British packets to or from the public functionaries or departments in London which have special accounts for overland postage with the London Post Office. Official covers intended for such Offices need not be prepaid if superscribed as on Her Majesty's Service under the full signature and official designation of the sender. The public functionaries or departments in London, which have accounts with the London Post Office, are, Adjutant General's Office, Admiralty, Audit Office, Board of Trade, Chancellor (Lord), Charity Commissioners, Chelsea Hospital, Civil Service Commissioners, Coast Guard Office, Colonial Office, Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, Commander-in-Chief's Office, Council Office, Court of Probate, Custom House, East India House, Foreign Office, Home Office, Inland Revenue Office, Irish Office, Merchant Seamen's Office, Military Secretary Horse Guards, Ordnance Office, Pay-Master General's Office, Poor Law Commissioners, Post Office, Quarter Master General's Office, Science and Art Office, Stationery Office, Tithe Commissioners, The Queen, Treasury, Registrar General's Office, War Office, Woods and Forests' Office, Work, Buildings, &c., Office.

XXXI. Official covers addressed to private individuals or unprivileged Offices in the United Kingdom, may be sent paid by stamps*: if sent unpaid, but superscribed "on Her Majesty's Service," they will be forwarded subject to the levy of ordinary postage (without fine) on delivery.

Weight and Rates of Letter Postage on Indian Letters.—Under the provisions of Section 20 of the "Indian Post Office Act, 1866," the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that the limits of weight, prescribed by Section 8 of the said Act for the several rates of letter postage, shall be doubled in respect of letters posted on or after the 1st April 1869.

2. The scale prescribed in Section 8 of the Post Office Act, and the scale to be substituted for it under this order, are given below, *viz.* :—

Registered Letters and Banghy Parcels for despatch by all Mails will be received, except on Sundays, from 7 to 8 A.M. and from 12 (noon) to 5 P.M.

Mail between Calcutta, the Straits, and Hongkong.—It is hereby notified for general information that under arrangements made with the owners of the Opium Steamers, which will ply monthly between Calcutta, the Straits, and Hongkong, these Steamers will in future be closed as Indian Mail Packets, and that Letters, Newspapers, and Packets of Newspapers, Books, or Patterns will be forwarded by them from Calcutta for the Straits and Hongkong under the same conditions, and at the same rates, as similar articles forwarded by British Mail Packets [Peninsular and Oriental Company]. This arrangement will commence with the first Opium Steamer which leaves Calcutta in April.

2. These Steamers leave Calcutta about 12 days more or less after each Government Opium Sale; the advertised dates of the Opium Sales for the current year (1869) being as follows:—

3. Mails for the United States of America, via Hongkong, can be forwarded by these Steamers at the same rates and under the same conditions as by British Packets.

4. The Opium Steamers proceed from Calcutta direct to the Straits and thence to Hongkong, and the time of transit from Calcutta to Hongkong is only about 15 days, that is about 7 days less than the time taken by the British Packets [Peninsular and Oriental Company], which proceed by the more circuitous route of Madras and Galle.

Banghy Parcels.—As a precaution against damage by wet, the public are recommended to secure by outer wax-cloth coverings all parcels or book packets posted in the monsoon.

Postage Stamps cut from Envelopes or Notepaper not to be recognized in payment of Postage.—The Governor General in Council is pleased, under Section 36 of Act XIV. of 1866, to order that Postage Stamps, impressed on Envelopes or Notepaper, shall not be recognized in payment of postage when cut or otherwise detached from the envelopes or paper on which they were impressed.

Mails for Mauritius, Reunion, &c.—In consequence of the alteration of the dates of departure of the French Mail Packets from Aden to Mauritius, the Mails for Mauritius, Reunion, &c., will be forwarded on the following dates from Bombay to Aden, to be thence conveyed by the above-named Packets to destination:—

Rates of Postal to Guatemala.—Under the orders of Her Majesty's Post Master General the British Rates of postage on letters to Guatemala has been reduced and a similar reduction has been made in the rate of postage charged on letters forwarded to that Republic from India via the United Kingdom.
