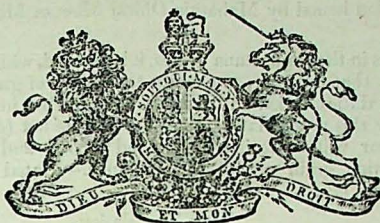

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following translation of a Proclamation issued by His Highness the Rao of Kutch, for general information:—

Translation of a Proclamation issued by Maharaja Dhiraj Meerza Maha Rao Shree Pragmuljee Bahadur of Kutch:—

“Whereas famine still prevails in the Rajpootana States, it is decided, with the view of diminishing the burden of duties on grain imported into that territory, to exempt the export of grain from this country in that direction from the payment of transit duties levied on behalf of this Durbar in Kutch and Wagur for the current year. Be it known, therefore, by this proclamation, that no Radaree tax (or transit duties) on account of this Durbar will be levied up to Asad* Sood 2nd Sumwunt 1927, from any person exporting grain out of this province.—Dated Wednesday the first day of Aso Sood Sumwunt 1926, of the Vikram era.

RESOLUTION.—The horse allowance of Police officers is, under the terms of Rule 2 of Financial Resolution No. 1888, dated 24th March 1869, not taxable under Act IX. of 1869, unless it be granted irrespective of a horse being kept.

“MINT AND CURRENCY.

No. 4284.—The Governor General in Council directs that it be notified for general information that the payment of any sum of money which any one has to make to Government in any Department, can be made in Government Notes of any issue, irrespective of Presidency or Circle, and that all Officers of Revenue, Customs, Tax Office, Railway, &c., are hereby authorized to receive payment in Notes of any issue, irrespective of Presidency or Circle.

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following Treasury Warrant for the information of those concerned:—

“TREASURY WARRANT.”

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, power is given to the Postmaster-General to remit any of the rates of British postage for the time being payable by law on the transmission of post letters, newspapers, or other printed papers, to such extent as the Lords of the Treasury shall from time to time direct; and power is also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof; and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have at various times, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers so reserved and given to them as aforesaid, by divers Warrants under their hands, made and given certain regulations, orders, and directions, whereby the several persons in such Warrants respectively mentioned and described, being commissioned and other officers employed in the Military and Naval Services under Her Majesty, respectively mentioned in the said several Warrants, were authorized to send and receive letters transmitted by the post between the several places therein respectively mentioned, by the means and routes therein respectively mentioned and set forth at certain reduced rates of postage therein specified.

And whereas it is expedient that such Warrants and such regulations, orders, directions, and rates of postage therein contained should be altered, repealed, and revoked, and that letters sent or received by such persons respectively should be made subject to the several rates of postage and regulations to which ordinary letters of the public are liable in respect of their transmission by the post.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said two before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided,) order and direct as follows:

1. That the several Warrants, dated respectively the 16th day of May 1857, the 3rd day of October 1864, and the 27th day of September 1867, and so much of the Warrant, dated the 1st day of May 1868 as relates to or affects letters sent to or by Superintending or First Class Schoolmasters in Her Majesty's Army, and also so much of every Treasury Warrant now in force as saves or exempts from the operation thereof letters sent to or by the several persons mentioned in the said Warrants of the 16th day of May 1857, the 3rd day of October 1864, and the 27th day of September 1867, and Superintending or First Class Schoolmasters in Her Majesty's Army, shall be and the same are and is hereby respectively repealed, revoked and annulled, and that from henceforth letters sent to or by such several persons respectively shall be liable, in respect of the transmission thereof by the post, to the same rates of postage, and to the same regulations, orders, directions, conditions, and restrictions respectively as are now or may at any time hereafter be in force, and applicable to ordinary letters sent and received by the post by the general public.

2. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to repeal, revoke, annul, or in anywise affect the exemptions and privileges as to re-directed letters granted by or under a certain Warrant, dated the 22nd day of October 1860, which said Warrant and everything therein contained shall remain in full force and effect.

3. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said firstly hereinbefore recited Act.

4. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders or directions hereby made, and may make and establish other orders or directions in lieu thereof.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy.

Promotion of the Civil Engineers under five years' agreements.

RESOLUTION.—Inquiries having been made from several quarters regarding the exact position of the Civil Engineers lately appointed to the Department by the Secretary of State under a five years' covenant, with reference to promotion, the Governor General in Council desires to place on record the views of the Government of India on the subject.

2. These Engineers are bound to serve Government for five years, if the Government decides to keep them. At the end of the 3rd year, either their services are dispensed with, or they are put on the ordinary footing of Civil Engineers in the Department. One question that has been asked is whether they are entitled to promotion during the first three years of their service, or only during the last two, or not at all during the five years. The Governor General in Council observes that these gentlemen can *claim* no promotion whatever during the term of their covenant. It may also be presumed that the grades and salaries assigned to them on their appointment are fairly commensurate with their claims at that time.

3. If, however, on grounds of merit it is considered that they should be selected for promotion, viewing their general claims with those of other officers in like positions, Local Governments are quite at liberty to promote them in ordinary course, at any period after the commencement of their service, to fill vacancies, and Local Administrations may bring forward their names in the half-yearly recommendation rolls. In any special case, which seems to justify such a course, their promotion may be recommended to the Government of India as supernumeraries when there are no vacancies,

4. From the questions asked by two Engineers in Mysore, it would appear that there is an impression with some officers that mere length of service is sufficient ground on which to base an unanswerable claim for promotion. This is a view which should be entirely abandoned. The rule laid down for guidance on the formation of the Public Works Department, which received the distinct and marked approval of Her Majesty's Government, was that promotions should be made by merit and merit only. This should be impressed on the Department generally, on the one hand to suppress unfounded hopes based only on length of service, and on the other hand to exclude the idea that any injustice has been done when an officer with shorter length of service may be promoted before one having a greater length of service. *Ceteris paribus* seniority may properly be allowed to have weight, but not to the extent of preventing the advancement of younger men whose superior abilities and usefulness are acknowledged. The contrary practice would inevitably lead to inefficiency and embarrassment.

5. The Governor General in Council has also had brought before him the question of requiring these Civil Engineers to pass in the languages before they are promoted. It seems to His Excellency in Council that the ordinary rules on this subject must be relaxed in the case of gentlemen entering the service in mature life, whether Civil or Military. Those who commence their professional career in the Department, or enter young as Assistant Engineers, or as 4th grade executives, may not unreasonably be required to conform to these rules; but if a person is of such standing in his profession as to justify his appointment to the Department in the superior grades, the rules are certainly inapplicable. Such Engineers should, however be encouraged to pass the colloquial examination, or other higher tests, and those who do pass should be regarded as having a superior claim to promotion. There are no doubt certain posts for which a more intimate acquaintance with the language is essential; such as those connected with canal management. For such posts as these, Engineers who had not passed the usual language test would be incapacitated; but for the ordinary executive duties of the Department, a more moderate amount of knowledge will suffice, and obstacles should not be placed in the way of the advancement of experienced Engineers otherwise deserving and capable merely on technical grounds of this description.

6. The service of the Civil Engineers before referred to, within the period of their agreement, will be allowed to count towards leave and pension under the Uncovenanted Service Rules, if they are retained in the service of Government after the expiry of three years.

7. To remove some uncertainty that has been expressed, the Governor General in Council desires it to be made known that the 4th and 5th years' service is compulsory on the Engineer under the terms of his agreement, but the Government has the option of dispensing with his services at the end of the third year, without assigning any reason.

POST OFFICE NOTIFICATIONS.

Changes of Address.—All communications on the subject should be made to the **POST MASTER** of Bombay, or other **POST MASTERS**, and not to the **POST MASTER GENERAL**. The name of the Post Town to which letters will be found addressed should be stated in the application.

Re-direction of Overland Letters.—Hitherto the Bombay Post Office has, as a favour, attended to instructions from the Public for the interception and re-direction of Overland Letters addressed to stations beyond Bombay.

2. The introduction of Sorting the Overland Mails on board Steamers between Suez and Bombay has necessitated the abandonment of this system, as time does not allow of the necessary intimation to Sea Sorters, who are also otherwise fully employed, and letters reach Bombay ready packeted for the interior.

3. Requests to intercept or redirect Overland Letters are therefore not attended to by the Bombay Post Office. Those expecting a change of residence, are recommended to have their letters consigned to some Agent in Bombay.

Complaints from Residents of Bombay requiring redress as to surcharge of postage, mis-sending, or delay in the delivery of letters, &c., should be made to the Post Master, accompanied by the envelopes of the letters referred to.

Similar complaints in the Mofussil should be made to the Inspecting Post Master of the Division, also accompanied by the envelope.

An appeal against the decision of the Post Master of Bombay, or of the Inspecting Post Master, can always be made to the Post Master General.

Complaints against the Post Office.—Complaints against the Post Office, certified as such under the full signature and address of the sender, and addressed to any officer of the Postal Department, will not be chargeable with any postage.

Overland Mails.—The Overland Mails per P. and O. Company's Steam Packets will leave Bombay every Saturday at 5 P.M. during the remaining months of the present year.

The Mails close at the General Post Office at 2 P.M.

The After Packet at 3 P.M.

After-Packet Letters are not forwarded unless an 8-anna stamp is affixed to the letter in addition to the postage.

Registered Letters are received until 1 P.M.

The latest hour for posting Overland Covers at the several Branch Post Offices is 1 P.M.

Late Letters for the Overland Mails.—Independently of the After-Packet which is kept open at the General Post Office till 3 P.M., late letters for the English Mail will be taken at the Pier Post Office from 2 P.M., and as late as 4-30 P.M. The full postage, including the usual fee of 8 annas, must be prepaid on each cover.

Rules for the treatment of Official Correspondence.—The introduction of the new Rules for the treatment of Official Correspondence has been postponed till the 1st April 1870.

Weight and Rates of Letter Postage on Indian Letters.—Under the provisions of Section 20 of the "Indian Post Office Act, 1866," the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that the limits of weight, prescribed by Section 8 of the said Act for the several rates of letter postage, shall be doubled in respect of letters posted on or after the 1st April 1869.

2. The scale prescribed in Section 8 of the Post Office Act, and the scale to be substituted for it under this order, are given below, *viz.* :—

Postage chargeable on Banghy Parcels.—Under the provisions of Sections 15 and 20 of 'The Indian Post Office Act, 1866,' the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that the rates of postage chargeable on Banghy Parcels under Sections 14 and 18 of the said Act shall be superseded, in respect of all parcels posted on or after the 1st September 1869, by the following scale, *viz.* :—

2. The postage chargeable on Banghy Parcels conveyed by Her Majesty's Indian Post between any two Indian Post Offices, whether by sea or land, or partly by sea and partly by land, shall be chargeable by weight and distance according to the following scale :—

3. The distance covered by the single rate shall be 900 miles, the double rate being charged for all distances exceeding 900 miles. The distance shall be calculated geographically, allowance being made for the average deviation of the lines of actual transit from the direct lines, and the distance from or to any subordinate Post Office shall be reckoned to be the same as the distance from or to the disbursing Post Office to which it is subordinate.

4. To enable the public to ascertain in any case whether the chargeable distance is single or double, the Director General of the Post Office shall cause figures to be entered in the list of Post Offices (to be included in the next edition of the Indian Postal Guide, and in all future editions) opposite each Post Office, and shall describe in the Postal Guide the mode in which the chargeable distance between any two Post Offices may be deduced from those figures.

Pattern and Book Postage.—Under the provisions of Section 20 of 'The Indian Post Office Act, 1866,' the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that the postage chargeable under Section 13 of the said Act on inland packets containing patterns of merchandize, or articles other than books (as hereinafter defined), shall be doubled in respect of all such packets posted on or after the 1st September 1869.

2. Under this order, the rates of charge will be according to the following scale, viz.:—

3. The Governor General in Council is further pleased to prescribe the following revised rules and conditions for the transmission of packets, with effect from the date mentioned above, viz., 1st September 1869:—

BOOK PACKETS.

Insufficiently paid Book Packets.

Any book packet which may be posted insufficiently prepaid, but bearing nevertheless a stamp or stamps of the value of a single rate (one anna), shall be forwarded to its destination charged with double the deficient postage.

Unpaid Book Packets.

Any book packet which may be posted without pre-payment to the extent above-noted or wholly unpaid, shall be treated as a banghy parcel, and forwarded to its destination charged with banghy postage.

Book Packets how to be packed.

A book packet must be sent either without a cover or in a cover open at the ends or sides so as to admit of the enclosures being removed for examination. For the greater security of the contents the packet may be fastened by string; but in such case the Postmaster is authorized to cut the string, although, if he do so, he must again tie up the packet. If this rule be infringed the packet shall be charged as a letter or banghy parcel as the case may be.

Contents of Book Packets.

A book packet may contain any number of separate books or other publications (including newspapers and printed or lithographed letters), photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), prints or maps, and any quantity of paper, parchment, or vellum : and the books or other publications, prints, maps, &c. may be either printed, written, engraved, lithographed or plain, or any mixture of these. No other material is allowed than *paper*, *parchment*, or *vellum*, except in the case of printed books or publications, artistic prints and maps, architectural drawings, plans and tracings, which may be printed or written upon *canvas* or *cloth*. Further, all legitimate binding, mounting or covering of a book, &c., or of a portion thereof, is allowed, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached; as also rollers in the case of prints or maps, markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books, and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of such articles or usually appertains thereto: but the binding, &c., must not be sent as a separate packet nor can patterns or books of patterns (unless these consist merely of *paper*) be permitted.

No book packet may contain anything which is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor must there be any letter nor any communication of the nature of a letter, whether separate or otherwise, unless the whole of such letter or communication be printed. Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, &c., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter. As respects the name and address of the sender, not only is the writing permitted, but it is recommended in order that, if the cover come off, or for any other reason the packet cannot be forwarded, it may be returned to the sender.

Any book packet which, in contravention of this rule, may have any letter or any communication of the nature of a letter written in it, or upon its cover, shall be charged with letter postage: and if any book packet be found to contain any letter not wholly printed, whether closed or open, or any enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other unauthorized enclosure, the letter or enclosure shall be taken out and charged with the full postage as an unpaid letter, together with an additional rate.

Limit of weight and size of Book Packets.

No book packet may exceed 200 tolas in weight, or one foot and a half in length, or one foot in width or depth: and if any such packet be posted, it shall be treated as a banghy parcel and charged accordingly.

Book Packets not exceeding 10 tolas to be specially superscribed.

Book packets not exceeding 10 tolas in weight shall be conveyed by letter post, and charged with letter postage, unless specially directed to be sent by "book post."

Certificate required where Book Packets conveyed by Letter Mail.

Where there is no separate banghy or packet post established on any line of road, book packets shall be transmitted by the letter post at book post rates, if it be certified in writing on the packet under the full signature and address of the sender that it does not contain any letter or other written communication on which a higher rate of postage is chargeable.

PATTERN PACKETS.

Insufficiently paid Pattern Packets.

Any pattern packet which may be posted insufficiently prepaid, but bearing, nevertheless, a stamp or stamps of the value of a single rate (two annas), shall be forwarded to its destination charged with double the deficient postage.

Unpaid Pattern Packets.

Any pattern packet which may be posted without pre-payment to the extent above-noted, or wholly unpaid, shall be treated as a banghy parcel and forwarded to its destination charged with banghy postage.

Pattern Packets how to be Packed.

A pattern packet must be sent either without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends or sides so as to admit of the enclosures being removed for examination. For the greater security of the contents, the packet may be fastened by string, but in such case the Postmaster is authorized to cut the string, although, if he do so, he must again tie up the packet.

As an exception to the above rule, seeds and other articles likely to be injured by damp, &c., may be enclosed in boxes or in bags fastened in such a manner that they can be readily opened, or in bags entirely closed, provided that they are transparent, so that the officers of the department may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

Any pattern packet not packed in accordance with this rule shall be charged as a letter or a banghy parcel, as the case may be.

Contents of Pattern Packets.

A pattern packet may contain any article or number of articles, except manuscript letters, or manuscript communications of the nature of a letter, or explosive or dangerous material or substance (the transmission of which by post in any form is prohibited), or coin, bullion, precious stones, or jewels (which Postmasters are prohibited from knowingly receiving for despatch by post in any form). The prohibition against the transmission of dangerous articles does not interfere with the transmission of scissors, knives, forks, steel-pens, nails, keys,

watch machinery, metal-tubing, pieces of metal or ore, &c. : provided that they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the mail bags, and to the officers of the Post Office, while at the same time they may be easily examined. If any packet containing such articles as these be posted, which is found not to be sufficiently guarded, it shall be stopped, and a notice of its detention shall be sent to the person to whom it is addressed, or to the sender, who may then obtain it by personal application, but the packet shall be charged with a fine equal in amount to the postage to which it was liable.

Pattern Packets not exceeding 10 Tolas to be specially superscribed.

Pattern packets not exceeding 10 tolas in weight shall be conveyed by letter post, and charged with letter postage, unless specially directed to be sent by "pattern post."

Certificate required where Pattern Packets conveyed by Letter Mail.

Where there is no separate banghy or packet post established on any line of road, pattern packets shall be transmitted by the letter post at pattern post rates, if it be certified in writing on the packet, under the full signature and address of the sender, that it does not contain any letter or other written communication on which a higher rate of postage is chargeable.
