GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS TO THE PUBLIC.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

With reference to the Notification published in the *Government Gazette* of the 9th May 1867, page 1603, the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to notify that, from inquiries made by a Commission appointed by Government to ascertain the wishes of the Inhabitants of the Town of WYRAG, Talooka Barsee, in the Sholapoor Collectorate, relative to the introduction of Act No. XXVI. of 1850, it would appear that the Townspeople are desirous that Taxes should be imposed for Municipal purposes.

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council is therefore pleased to declare Act No. XXVI. of 1850 in force in the said Town from the 1st January 1870.

“LEAVE AND ALLOWANCES.

The 10th November 1869.

No. 2360.—Read—

Endorsement from the Home Department, No. 1548, dated the 14th ultimo, forwarding for consideration and orders a copy of a letter from the Government of the North-Western Provinces, inquiring if “Civilian Judges of High Courts can elect to abide by the old Civil Leave Rules in force before the promulgation of the new rules.”

RESOLUTION.—Premising that the question of the Government of the North-Western Provinces appears to refer to leave on medical certificate, the Governor General in Council observes that from the rules and minute referred to in the margin, it is clear that Covenanted Civil Servants who were Judges of High Courts on the 7th August 1869, may take leave on medical certificate under the old rules for Covenanted Civil Servants generally.

Rule 7 of the rules published in the Notification of the Home Department, No. 2119, dated the 30th March 1863.

Paragraph 4 of the minute by the Honourable John Strachey, dated 3rd August 1868, and Rule XXIII. of the rules published with Notification of this Department, No. 2526 of the 7th August 1869.

ORDERED, that the foregoing Resolution be published in the *Gazette of India*, and communicated to the Home Department; the Comptroller General of Accounts; the several Accountants General, and the Deputy Accountants General in independent charge.”

No. 757 of 1869.—The following Rules, prescribing the duties of Purveyors of Regimental Hospitals under this Presidency, are published :—

I.—The Hospital Purveyor shall supply clothing, bedding, articles of diet, wine, and whatever may be required to be furnished by the Commissariat Department for the use of the sick in Hospital, of which stores, with the exception of Bazaar medicines and necessaries, he will be the custodian, taking the place of the Stewards hitherto employed in Hospitals, in this respect.

II.—Indents for clothing, bedding and other articles of dead stock of which the Purveyor is to have charge, will be made out under the orders of and signed by the Medical Officer, who will also receipt them on the articles being supplied, as well as the Purveyor. The Medical Officer will be held responsible for all such as are in use with the sick, as well as those kept in the Hospital to meet emergencies. On each occasion of these articles being issued by the Purveyor, or returned to him, a receipt in one of the following forms will be granted.

The Purveyor will keep an account of receipts, issues and balance in the same manner as was heretofore done by Stewards, under the supervision of the Medical Officer, to enable the latter to frame his indents for these supplies in accordance with the forms and regulations in force.

III. The Purveyor of an Hospital will attend at the Hospital at such hours as may be fixed by the Medical Officer to receive his instructions regarding the diet of the sick; the daily requisitions for articles of diet and liquors being furnished by the Medical Officer, which will be the Purveyor's vouchers in support of his monthly account, the Commissariat Officer checking the entries with the Diet Roll, which he receives direct from the Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, before passing the charges.

Articles provided by contract will be supplied by the Contractor in the presence of the Purveyor; those from Commissariat Stock, such as Wines, Tea, &c. will be issued by the Purveyor from the stores in his charge, and any other articles required will be obtained by purchase.

IV. Whenever any articles are ordered which may appear to him unauthorized by Regulations, it will be his duty to point this out in a respectful manner to the Medical Officer, who will be responsible for any over-charge, should he still direct the issue of the doubtful supply.

V. He will accompany the Corps on the march, performing the same duties as in Cantonment.

VI. He will be responsible that the washing of the Hospital bedding, clothing, &c., is properly done, and that a sufficient supply of such articles is always kept ready for issue.

VII. The Hospital Dhobeas and Tailors are to perform their work under the orders of the Commissariat Department, their pay, however, being drawn as heretofore.

VIII. The Purveyor will prepare the following Returns for the signature of the Medical Officer, viz. :—

IX. The Hospital writer, under the orders of the Medical Officer, is to assist in the preparation of the Purveyor's Returns and Indents.

X. The Purveyor will be held directly responsible for all Stores in his charge. Any loss or damage to public property should be reported by him, in writing, to the Medical Officer in charge, who will personally inquire into it, and take proceedings for adjusting the same under the ordinary rules of the service. If a Purveyor omits or neglects to make this report immediately, he will be liable to make good the loss, or damage, as ascertained by a Court of Inquiry.

XI. The Steward's (now Purveyor's) servants will be under the Purveyor's orders to assist him in the discharge of his duties.

XII. At the end of each month the Purveyor will render his accounts of all Hospital supplies to the Commissariat Officer to whom he is subordinate, with whom he must close his accounts monthly.

XIII. Quarters will be provided for him within the precincts of or in close proximity to the Hospital; also a suitable godown in the Hospital compound, with means for securing it efficiently.

“Whenever a Medical Subordinate, whether Hospital Apprentice, or of any other grade, is appointed to act in a higher grade, he is entitled to the pay of such grade.

“But such promotion should only be made by competent Authority, and on a direct recommendation from the Head of the Branch of the Department (British or Indian) under which the Subordinate is serving, and be confirmed by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in General Orders before any extra allowances are admitted.”

No. 768 of 1869.—The following rules with regard to Scripture Reading Rooms in Military Cantonments; which have been approved by the Government of India, are published for general information :—

I.—The rooms shall be available to Soldiers of all denominations of the Christian religion, wholly apart from any sectarian bias or character.

II.—They shall be placed under the immediate charge of the Commanding Officer of the Regiment, in whose lines the rooms are situated, subject to the control of the Officer Commanding the Station, more especially in cases where more Corps than one attend the rooms in question.

III.—The Chaplain of the Station and the other ministers of religion in religious charge of, or associated with, the Troops, shall be freely consulted by Officers in all matters connected with the good order, opening, attendance, &c. &c., in these rooms.

IV.—The rooms shall be made available, according to the desire of the Soldiers for the delivery of lectures and addresses by persons of the various denominations of the Christian religion, and for special meetings, the hours being fixed by the Commanding Officer.

V.—Facilities shall be afforded to the Soldiers of the different persuasions to meet specially for the purposes of prayer, and during such meetings arrangements shall be made to ensure to them the exclusive possession of the rooms.

VI.—Excepting when the rooms are thus appropriated to any special class, it is desirable that they shall be available to all well disposed Soldiers for the purposes of reading and of prayer. At such times it will probably be found expedient to prescribe, that a strict silence shall be maintained; but in this and other minor matters, it will be proper to consult the wishes of the men themselves.

VII.—If it is found that unanimity and good-will do not prevail consequent on opening the rooms to all, without distinction of denomination, separate hours must be apportioned to the different persuasions.

Changes of Address.—All communications on the subject should be made to the **POST MASTER** of Bombay, or other **POST MASTERS**, and not to the **POST MASTER GENERAL**. The name of the **Post Town** to which letters will be found addressed should be stated in the application.

Re-direction of Overland Letters.—Hitherto the Bombay Post Office has, as a favour, attended to instructions from the Public for the interception and re-direction of Overland Letters addressed to stations beyond Bombay.

2. The introduction of Sorting the Overland Mails on board Steamers between Suez and Bombay has necessitated the abandonment of this system, as time does not allow of the necessary intimation to Sea Sorters, who are also otherwise fully employed, and letters reach Bombay ready packeted for the interior.

3. Requests to intercept or redirect Overland Letters are therefore not attended to by the Bombay Post Office. Those expecting a change of residence are recommended to have their letters consigned to some Agent in Bombay.

Complaints from Residents of Bombay requiring redress as to surcharge of postage, mis-sending, or delay in the delivery of letters, &c., should be made to the Post Master, accompanied by the envelopes of the letters referred to.

Similar complaints in the Mofussil should be made to the Inspecting Post Master of the Division, also accompanied by the envelope.

An appeal against the decision of the Post Master of Bombay, or of the Inspecting Post Master, can always be made to the Post Master General.

Complaints against the Post Office.—Complaints against the Post Office, certified as such under the full signature and address of the sender, and addressed to any officer of the Postal Department, will not be chargeable with any postage.
