## JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

Under the provisions of Section 34 of Bombay Act VI. of 1863, entitled, “An Act for the regulation of Public Conveyances in the Town, Suburbs and Harbour of Bombay,” the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to extend the provisions of the said Act from the 1st day of January 1870 to the Town of Tanna.

The Act shall be in force within the Municipal limits of Tanna, and all Magistrates having jurisdiction within those limits are vested with the powers conferred by the Act on the Magistrates of Police in Bombay, and the District Superintendent of Police at Tanna is authorized and appointed to perform the duties assigned by the Act to the Commissioner of Police in Bombay.

The balance of the Fees and Fines levied under the operation of the Act shall be paid to the Municipal Commissioners of Tanna, to be applied to the purposes of Act XXVI. of 1850 and Act II. of 1862 (Bombay).

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 1161 of the 7th ultimo, and in reply to state that Section XXX. of the rules of the 16th June 1868, for the grant of leave of absence to Covenanted Civil Servants must be held to have been cancelled under the Notification of the Government of India, No. 2527, dated the 7th August last.

2. Rule XXX. was intended to give such officers as should voluntarily elect the lower minimum of £300 furlough allowance, the advantage of the higher maximum of £1,200 in future furlough. No. 785 of 1869.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 10th November 1869, No. 1109, is republished :—

“No. 1109 of 1869.—All Officers serving in the Bengal and Madras, as well as Bombay, Presidencies, who may be entitled to a free passage, or Officers ordered to England on duty, or on medical certificate, during the Troop-ship Season, *viz.*, between the 1st October and 1st March, and who may be entitled to a passage at the expense of the State, are to proceed to Bombay for transport in one of Her Majesty's Troop-ships.

The only circumstances under which such Officers will hereafter, between these dates, be permitted to proceed to England otherwise than by Her Majesty's Troop Ships are—

1st.—When ordered to accompany Troops round the Cape.

2ndly.—When a medical certificate may declare a passage overland to be positively dangerous to health and a long sea voyage essentially necessary.

3rdly.—When a Presidency Medical Board Certificate may, in like manner, declare that an immediate change to England is urgently necessary, and that the case will not admit of delay until a passage in one of the Troop-ships can be provided.

4thly.—When suffering or recovering from a disease of a contagious nature which a Presidency Medical Board Certificate may declare as not admissible on board a Troop-ship.

5thly.—When the Officer Commanding at Bombay certifies that a passage cannot be provided in any of Her Majesty's Troop-ships during the current season, and that the Officer's services are not required or are not available for duty on other vessels taken up for the conveyance of Troops to England.

Officers thus proceeding to Bombay, in view of being provided with a passage in one of Her Majesty's Troop-ships, will be allowed a free passage by rail for themselves and for their families.

This order cancels G. G. O. No. 925, dated 26th September 1867, and in future, Officers who may be allowed

## POST OFFICE NOTIFICATIONS.

**Changes of Address.**—All communications on the subject should be made to the **POST MASTER** of Bombay, or other **POST MASTERS**, and not to the **POST MASTER GENERAL**. The name of the Post Town to which letters will be found addressed should be stated in the application.

**Re-direction of Overland Letters.**—Hitherto the Bombay Post Office has, as a favour, attended to instructions from the Public for the interception and re-direction of Overland Letters addressed to stations beyond Bombay.

2. The introduction of Sorting the Overland Mails on board Steamers between Suez and Bombay has necessitated the abandonment of this system, as time does not allow of the necessary intimation to Sea Sorters, who are also otherwise fully employed, and letters reach Bombay ready packeted for the interior.

3. Requests to intercept or redirect Overland Letters are therefore not attended to by the Bombay Post Office. Those expecting a change of residence are recommended to have their letters consigned to some Agent in Bombay.

**Complaints** from Residents of Bombay requiring redress as to surcharge of postage, mis-sending, of delay in the delivery of letters, &c., should be made to the Post Master, accompanied by the envelopes of the letters referred to.

Similar complaints in the Mofussil should be made to the Inspecting Post Master of the Division, also accompanied by the envelope.

An appeal against the decision of the Post Master of Bombay, or of the Inspecting Post Master, can always be made to the Post Master General.

**Complaints against the Post Office.**—Complaints against the Post Office, certified as such under the full signature and address of the sender, and addressed to any officer of the Postal Department, will not be chargeable with any postage.

**Overland Mails.**—The Overland Mails per P. and O. Company's Steam Packets will leave Bombay every Saturday at 5 P.M. during the remaining months of the present year.

The Mails close at the General Post Office at 2 P.M.

The After Packet at 3 P.M.

After-Packet Letters are not forwarded unless an 8-anna stamp is affixed to the letter in addition to the postage.

Registered Letters are received until 1 P.M.

The latest hour for posting Overland Covers at the several Branch Post Offices is 1 P.M.

**Late Letters for the Overland Mails.**—Independently of the After-Packet, which is kept open at the General Post Office till 3 P.M., late letters for the English Mail will be taken at the Pier Post Office from 2 P.M., and as late as 4-30 P.M. The full postage, including the usual fee of 8 annas, must be prepaid on each cover.

### **Experimental Transmission of Mails from India to the United Kingdom, via Brindisi.**

Registered Letters and Banghy Parcels for despatch by all Mails will be received, except on Sundays, from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M.

**Mail between Calcutta, the Straits, and Hongkong.**—It is hereby notified for general information that under arrangements made with the owners of the Opium Steamers, which will ply monthly between Calcutta, the Straits, and Hongkong, these Steamers will in future be closed as Indian Mail Packets, and that Letters, Newspapers, and Packets of Newspapers, Books, or Patterns will be forwarded by them from Calcutta for the Straits and Hongkong under the same conditions, and at the same rates, as similar articles forwarded by British Mail Packets [Peninsular and Oriental Company]. This arrangement will commence with the first Opium Steamer which leaves Calcutta in April.

2. These Steamers leave Calcutta about 12 days more or less after each Government Opium Sale; the advertised dates of the Opium Sales for the current year (1869) being as follows:—

April 8th.	September 9th.
May 6th.	October 4th.
June 7th.	November 5th.
July 7th.	December 6th.
August 9th.	

3. Mails for the United States of America, via Hongkong, can be forwarded by these Steamers at the same rates and under the same conditions as by British Packets.

4. The Opium Steamers proceed from Calcutta direct to the Straits and thence to Hongkong, and the time of transit from Calcutta to Hongkong is only about 15 days, that is about 7 days less than the time taken by the British Packets [Peninsular and Oriental Company], which proceed by the more circuitous route of Madras and Galle.

**Postage Stamps cut from Envelopes or Notepaper not to be recognized in payment of Postage.**—The Governor General in Council is pleased, under Section 36 of Act XLV. of 1866, to order that Postage Stamps, impressed on Envelopes or Notepaper, shall not be recognized in payment of postage when cut or otherwise detached from the envelopes or paper on which they were impressed.

**Mails for Mauritius, Reunion, &c.**—In consequence of the alteration of the dates of departure of the French Mail Packets from Aden to Mauritius, the Mails for Mauritius, Reunion, &c., will be forwarded on the following date from Bombay to Aden, to be thence conveyed by the above-named Packets to destination:—  
4th December 1869.

**Post Office at Surat Railway Station.**—An Experimental Post Office has been opened at the Surat Railway Station; and such letters as are addressed "Surat Railway Station" will be forwarded for delivery at the Station instead of "first passing through the Post Office at Surat." All persons desirous of having their letters so delivered are recommended to adopt the above superscription.



**Closing of Tanga Dawks.**—The Tanga Dawks between Khamgaum and Sheogaum and Khamgaum and Nandoora have been closed.
