FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Notifications by the Government of India are republished for general information:—

“The 16th December 1869.

No. 3233.—With reference to the Notification dated 19th November 1866, No. 11, the Governor General in Council is pleased to grant to holders of the 30 lakhs of Debentures payable on 4th January 1870, the option of having the currency of those Debentures extended on the following terms:—

1st.—The interest on and after 4th January 1870 shall be at the rate of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum.

2nd.—The Debentures may at any time during the period of their extended currency be paid, with accrued interest to date of payment, to any Government Treasury in India in satisfaction of Public Revenue, Dues, or Taxes.

The Debentures may be presented for payment in cash on 4th July 1870, 4th January 1871, or 4th July 1871, on and from which last named date no further interest shall be payable.

Provided that if the Debentures shall be presented for payment on 4th July 1870, or 4th January 1871, a clear week's notice of the intention to present them shall be given in writing to the Comptroller General of Accounts in the case of those Debentures payable in Calcutta, and to the Accountant General, Madras or Bombay, in the case of Debentures payable at those Presidency towns.”

“LEAVE AND ALLOWANCES.

The 11th December 1869.

No. 3103.

From G. H. M. BATTEN, Esq., Under Secretary to the Government of India, Financial Department, to the Accountant General, Bengal.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your official memorandum No. 5263T of the 25th ultimo, and in reply to state that the proviso in the first of the rules published in the Notification of this Department, No. 534 of the 16th June 1868, that two-thirds of the difference between the salaries of the substantive and acting appointments of an acting officer shall be the minimum of his acting allowance, is still in force.

2. The only effect of the orders of this Department, No. 2269, dated the 30th October 1869, on the orders, No. 534, dated the 16th June 1868, is to cancel the following words in Rule I. of the rules for acting allowances therein prescribed—‘30 per cent. on the first Rs. 2,000 and 20 per cent. on the remainder,’ and to substitute in their place the words ‘20 per cent.’ The rest of the rules will remain in force until further orders.

Ordered, that the foregoing letter be published in the *Gazette of India*, and that copies thereof be forwarded to the other Departments of the Government of India; the several local Governments; the Comptroller General of Accounts; the Director General of the Post Office of India; the Mint Master, Calcutta; the Head Commissioner of Paper Currency; the Accountant General, Madras, in reply to his letter No. 5234, dated the 18th ultimo; the other Accountants General, and the Deputy Accountants General in independent charge.”

From G. H. M. BATTEN, Esq., Under Secretary to the Government of India, Financial Department, to the Officiating Accountant General, Bombay.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 2737 A, dated October 1869, inquiring, *first*, if an Uncovenanted Servant should draw acting allowance while on privilege leave; *secondly* whether this indulgence may be allowed to all Uncovenanted Servants on salaries of Rs. 10 per mensem, or confined to gazetted officers; and, *thirdly*, if acting allowance should be granted for the same period to both an absentee on privilege leave and to his substitute.

2. The first and third questions I am desired to answer in the affirmative. With reference to the second question, I am directed to observe that only those Uncovenanted Servants whose salaries are not less than Rs. 100 per mensem are *entitled* to acting allowance during privilege leave, because only such Uncovenanted Servants obtain privilege or any other leave *under rule*; but that as the spirit of the leave rules is applicable to Uncovenanted Officers on salaries of less than Rs. 100 per mensem, the claims of such officers to acting allowance during absence on privilege leave should be decided upon in each case by the authority granting the leave, subject to any orders which may be issued by the local Government to prevent any abuse of the privilege.

ORDERED, that the foregoing letter be published in the *Gazette of India*, and that copies thereof be forwarded to the other Departments of the Government of India; the local Governments; the Comptroller General of Accounts; the Director General of the Post Office of India; the Mint Master, Calcutta; the Head Commissioner of Paper Currency; the other Accountants General, and the Deputy Accountants General in independent charge.”

No. 3163.—The Secretary of State for India has approved of the Resolution No. 3535, passed in this Department on the 20th September 1869, published at page 336 of Part I. of the *Gazette of India*, dated 25th September 1869, regarding the grant of leave to Military Officers on the invalid establishment holding civil appointments.

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 2904A of the 15th ultimo, and its enclosure, and in returning the latter to state, in continuation of the order of this Department, No. 2315, dated the 16th ultimo, that the minimum of furlough allowance should be £500 per annum for all Covenanted Civil Servants who were granted furlough on or before the 7th August 1869, the date of the Notification of this Department, No. 2527, reducing the maximum of furlough allowance to £1,000 per annum.

2. During any extension of furlough, if such extension commence after the 7th August 1869, the lower minimum and maximum will in all cases be applicable.

ORDERED, that the foregoing letter be published in the *Gazette of India*, and that copies thereof be forwarded to the other Departments of the Government of India; the Local Governments; the Comptroller General of Accounts; the Director General of the Post Office of India; the other Accountants General, and the Deputy Accountants General in independent charge."

No. 3292.—In continuation of the Notification of this Department, No. 2527, dated the 7th August 1869, and in amendment of Rule V. of the Military Leave Rules of 1868, the Governor General in Council is pleased to declare that the furlough allowance of any Military Officer in Civil employ, who may after this date be granted furlough, shall not exceed Rs. 833-5-4 per mensem, or £1,000 per annum."

"SEPARATE REVENUE.—ASSESSED TAXES.

The 13th December 1869.

No. 3179.—With reference to paragraphs 2 and 3 of the Resolution of this Department, No. 2785 of the 26th November 1869, prescribing rules for carrying out the provisions of Act XXIII. of 1869 (to enhance the duties leviable under the Indian Income Tax Act), the Governor General in Council is pleased to rule that whenever an assessment is made under Section 2 of that Act, and it is known that the person, in respect of whom such assessment is made, was not chargeable under Part II. of the Indian Income Tax Act, during the months of October and November 1869, it will be unnecessary to deduct more than two per centum from his pay, annuity, or pension chargeable during the four months commencing on the 1st December 1869, and thus the necessity for any adjustment will be avoided.

ORDERED, that the above Resolution be published for general information in the *Gazette of India*, and communicated to the several Departments, Governments, and Administrations; the Comptroller General of Accounts, and the several Accountants General and Deputy Accountants General in independent charge, for information and guidance.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

The Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for general information, copy of the 99th Section of the Mutiny Act of 1869:—

“99. In all places in India where any body of Her Majesty's forces may be serving situate beyond the jurisdiction of any court of small causes established by or under the authority of the Governor General of India in Council, actions of debt, and all personal actions against officers or against persons licensed to act as sutlers, or other persons amenable to the provisions of this Act not being soldiers, shall be cognizable before a court of requests composed of military officers, and not elsewhere, provided the value in question shall not exceed four hundred rupees, and that the defendant was a person of the above description when the cause of action arose, which court the commanding officer of any camp, garrison, cantonment, or military post is hereby authorized and empowered to convene.—WHENEVER owing to paucity of officers, or to any other cause, a court of requests cannot conveniently be held at the station where the defendant or defendants may be, it shall be lawful for the officer commanding the division or district to authorize the assembly of a court by the officer commanding at the nearest place where such court can be formed.—COURTS of requests shall in all practicable cases consist of five commissioned officers, and in no instance of less than three, and the president thereof shall in all practicable cases be a field officer, and in no case be under the rank of a captain, and every member shall have served five years as a commissioned officer;—and the president and members assisting at any such court, before any proceedings be had before it, shall take the following oath, which oath shall be administered by the president of the court to the other members thereof, and to the president by any members having first taken the oath (that is to say),

‘I swear, That I will duly administer justice according to the evidence in the matters that shall be brought before me. ‘So help me GOD.’

And all witnesses before any such court shall be examined in the same manner as in the case of a trial by courts-martial.—All actions of debt and personal actions against persons amenable to this Act within the jurisdiction of any court of small causes shall be cognizable by such court to the extent of its powers; and all such actions where the amount sued for exceeds four hundred rupees shall be cognizable by a civil court or court of small causes only; and it shall be competent for any civil court or court of small causes, or for any military court of requests held in lieu thereof under the authority of this section, upon finding or awarding any debt or damage either to award execution thereof generally, or to direct specially that the whole or any part thereof shall be stopped and paid over to the plaintiff out of any part not exceeding one-half of any pay or allowance, or out of any other public money which may respectively be coming to the defendant in the current or any future month or months, or to direct the same to be so paid by instalments.—In regard to awards of execution general civil courts and courts of small causes shall proceed in accordance with the rules of procedure for such courts in India;—and in all cases where execution shall be awarded generally by a military court of requests, the debt, if not paid forthwith, shall be levied by seizure and public sale of such of the defendant's goods and property as may be found within the camp, garrison, cantonment, or military post, under a written order of the commanding officer, grounded on the judgment of the court;—and all orders of such commanding officer as to the manner of such sale, or the person by whom the same shall be made, or otherwise respecting the same, shall be valid and binding;—and any goods and property of the defendant found within the limits of the camp, garrison, cantonment, or military post to which the defendant shall belong at any subsequent time shall be liable to be seized and sold in like manner in satisfaction of any remainder of such debt or damages;—and if any question shall arise whether any such effects or property are liable to be taken in execution as aforesaid, the decision and order of the said commanding officer shall be final and conclusive with respect to the same, and if sufficient goods shall not be found within the limits of the camp, garrison, cantonment, or military post, then any public money or any part not exceeding one-half of the pay or allowances accruing to the defendant shall be stopped in liquidation of such debt or damages;—and if such defendant shall not receive pay as an officer or from any public department, but be a sutler, servant, or follower, he may be arrested by like order of the commanding officer, and imprisoned in some convenient place within the military boundaries for any period not exceeding two months, unless the debt be sooner paid;—and the said commanding officer shall not, nor shall any person acting on his orders in respect of the matters aforesaid, incur any liability to any person or persons whomsoever for any act done by him in pursuance of the provisions aforesaid;—and in cases where the said court shall direct specially that the whole or any part of the debt or damages shall be stopped and paid out of part of any pay and allowances, or out of any public money, the same shall be stopped and paid accordingly in conformity with direction:—PROVIDED always, that nothing hereinbefore contained shall enable any such action as aforesaid to be brought in a military court of requests by any officer or soldier against any officer:—PROVIDED also, that the articles of military equipment of any defendant shall not be deemed ‘goods and property’ under this section.”

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Prospectus for the Poona Civil Engineering College is published for general information :—
CIVIL ENGINEERING COLLEGE, POONA.

PROSPECTUS.

The Poona Civil Engineering College is divided into three Departments, viz :—

- I. First or University Department.
- II. Second Department.
- III. Vernacular Department.

First Department.

Matriculated students of the University of Bombay or of some other recognized University are alone admissible to this Department. The course of instruction extends over a period of three years, at the end of which time students who may have complied with the University and College Regulations are permitted to present themselves at the University Examination for the Degree of Licentiate in Civil Engineering. (For particulars as to keeping of terms, &c., see the "Bombay University Calendar.")

2. The first Department consists of three classes :—

1. Junior class.
2. Middle class
3. Senior class.

To rise from the Junior class to the Middle a student must have kept two terms in the College, and must also have passed an Examination in the subjects studied by his class during the Junior year.

To rise from the Middle to the Senior class a student must have passed the First Examination in Civil Engineering, which is held annually by the University on the 4th Monday in November.

N.B.—In order that a student may obtain permission from the Principal of the College to present himself at either of the University Examinations (F.C.E. or L.C.E.) it is necessary for him to have obtained credit for the number of terms required by the University Regulations, and also to have answered satisfactorily at the several Terminal and Weekly Examinations held at the College during the preceding year.

FELLOWSHIPS.

Two Fellowships, each of the value of Rupees 50 per mensem, and tenable for two years, are attached to the College. The Fellows are appointed by the Director of Public Instruction, and assist in teaching the lower classes while prosecuting their own studies for the higher Examinations.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The following scholarships, tenable for one year only, are annually open to competition in the First or University Department :—

A.—*Junior Class Scholarships.*

The Examination for the Middle class scholarships will be held at the College on the First Monday in December in each year.

The subjects appointed for Examination are as follows :—

I.—*Mathematics.*

- (a) Arithmetic. The whole course (Colenso).
- (b) Algebra. To end of quadratic equations.
- (c) Euclid. The first 4 and the 6th books, and first 21 propositions of 11th book, with deductions.
- (d) Trigonometry. Solution of plane triangles (Todhunter, to page 200).
- (e) Conic sections. The parabola (Goodwin's course).
- (f) Analytical Geometry. The Point, Straight Line, and Circle (Todhunter, Chap. I. II. III. V. and VI).

II.—*Experimental and Natural Science.*

- (a) Elementary Chemistry.
- (b) Heat, Dilatation, Construction of Thermometers and Pyrometers, Latent Heat.

III.—*Engineering.*

- (a) Roads.
- (b) Properties and strength of materials.
- (c) Surveying with compass and chain.
- (d) Drawing.

Marks will be given for the Drawings executed at the College during the year preceding the Examination.

C.—*Senior Class Scholarships.*

- 1. Frere Scholarship, value Rs. 25 per mensem.
- 2. 1 Scholarship of Rupees 15 per mensem.
- 3. 1 Scholarship of Rupees 10 per mensem.

The above mentioned scholarships will be annually awarded immediately after the First Examination in Civil Engineering according to the marks obtained by students at that Examination.

FEES.

Students of this Department will be required to pay a College Fee of Rupees 5 per mensem.

INDUCEMENT OFFERED BY GOVERNMENT.

Government has annually guaranteed one appointment in the Engineering Branch of the Public Works Department to that student who shall obtain most marks in passing the University Examination for Licence in Civil Engineering.

Second Department.

Students desirous of joining this Department will apply to the Principal before the 1st of September in each year. Application should be made in the accompanying Form, and should be signed by the Head Master of the School in which the candidate has last studied:—

The entrance Examination will be held once a year, commencing on the second Monday in September at 11 o'clock A.M.

Candidates will be examined in the following subjects:—

I.—*Mathematics.*

- (a) Arithmetic (Colenso's course).
- (b) Algebra (to the end of simple equations).
- (c) Euclid (First 4 books).

II.—*Elementary Natural Science.*

Laws of Chemical Combination, Atomic theory, General effects of Heat on matter.

III.—*English.*

- (a) English Grammar and Parsing.
- (b) Writing from dictation.

Matriculated students of the University of Bombay will be admitted without examination.

2. This Department consists of a Junior and a Senior class:—

To rise from the Junior to the Senior class a student must have obtained credit for attendance at the several Lectures prescribed for his class, and must have answered satisfactorily at the weekly and terminal examinations held during the first year of the course of this Department.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

Scholarships of the following values are annually open by competition to the students of this Department:

A.—*Junior Class Scholarships.*

- 2 of 6 Rupees per mensem.
- 5 of 5 Rupees per mensem.

These scholarships will be awarded according to the marks obtained at the Entrance Examination.

B.—*Senior Class Scholarships.*

- 1 of Rupees 9 per mensem.
- 1 of Rupees 8 per mensem.
- 1 of Rupees 7 per mensem.
- 1 of Rupees 6 per mensem.
- 2 of Rupees 5 per mensem.

The Examination for these scholarships will be held annually on the first Monday in December.

Candidates will be examined in the following subjects:—

I.—*Mathematics.*

- (a) Arithmetic. The whole course (Colenso).
- (b) Algebra. To the end of quadratic equations.
- (c) Euclid. The first 4 and the 6th books.
- (d) Trigonometry. Solution of Plane Triangles (Hann).
- (e) Conic Sections. The Parabola (Goodwin's course).

II.—*Experimental and Natural Science.*

- (a) Elementary Chemistry.
- (b) Heat, Dilatations, Construction of Thermometers and Pyrometers, Latent Heat.

III.—*Engineering.*

- (a) Roads.
- (b) Properties and strength of materials.
- (c) Surveying with compass and chain.
- (d) Drawing.

Marks will be given for the Drawings executed at the College during the year preceding the Examination. The course of study in this Department extends over a period of two years, at the end of which period students who shall pass the Final Examination will obtain College certificates. These certificates, according to Government Resolution No. 191, dated 12th April 1869, will qualify for admission to the Upper Subordinate Establishment of the Public Works Department for a period of three years, from the date of certificate. Candidates for College certificates will be examined in the following subjects:—

I.—*Mathematics.*

- (a) Arithmetic from first principles (Colenso's course).
- (b) Algebra. To the end of quadratic equations, with Proportion and Progression, Permutation and Combinations (Colenso's course, Part I).
- (c) Euclid. The first 4 and the 6th Books, with the definitions of the 5th, and with simple deductions.
- (d) Plane Trigonometry. Solution of plane triangles, with expressions for the area and measurements of heights and distances (Hann's course).
- (e) Nature and use of Logarithms.
- (f) Mensuration. Measurements of surfaces and solids (Chambers's Practical Mathematics).

II.—*Applied Mathematics.*

Composition and Resolution of forces, the Mechanical powers, Friction, and application of the same to framing in carpentry, determining the thickness of Piers and Abutments and Retaining Walls.

III.—*Geodesy.*

Adjustment and use of Surveying Instruments, viz. Prismatic Compass, Theodolite, Dumpy and Y Levels. N.B.—Knowledge of Surveying and Levelling to be tested by performance in the Field.

IV.—*Experimental Science.*

- (a) Elementary Chemistry.
- (b) Heat.
- (c) Electricity and Magnetism (Ferguson's Treatise.)

V.—*Engineering.*

- (a) Roadmaking (Roorkee Treatise, Fowd's Notes, Chapter VII.).
- (b) Strength of materials, with properties of the same (Roorkee Treatise, Nos. I. and II.)
- (c) Principles of construction of buildings and bridges (Roorkee Treatise, No. VI.)
- (d) Neatness and accuracy in drawing.
- (e) Estimating of simple buildings.

VI.—*Carpentry.*

Each candidate will be required to execute in the Workshops a simple piece of work, such as squaring a piece of timber accurately, cutting a mortise and tenon, &c., &c.

FEEs.

Students of the Second Department will be required to pay monthly a College Fee of Rupees 3.

INDUCEMENT OFFERED BY GOVERNMENT.

Government has annually guaranteed three appointments in the Upper Subordinate Establishment of the Public Works Department to the first three successful students of the Second Department in order of merit.

Third or Vernacular Department.

In this Department instruction is conveyed to students through the medium of the Marathi language. The Entrance Examination annually takes place on the third Monday in March, and the result of the Examination is declared on the second Monday in April. Candidates desiring admission should apply to the Principal before the 1st of March in the following form:—

Candidates for Entrance into this class will be required to produce a 2nd Class Certificate for Entrance into the Lower grades of the public service. Those who can speak and write English with decent facility will *ceteris paribus*, be preferred.*

The candidates will also be examined practically in the Workshops, in order to test their proficiency in some trade.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

Scholarships will be awarded to the students according to the marks obtained at the entrance examination. The following scholarships are open annually to competition:—

- 1 of Rupees 6 per mensem.
- 1 of Rupees 5 per mensem.
- 2 of Rupees 4 per mensem.
- 2 of Rupees 3 per mensem.

The course of study in this Department is for one year only, at the end of which time students who may be qualified will receive Certificates from the Principal. The subjects for the Final Examination are as follows:—

I.—*Mathematics.*

- (a) Arithmetic. Elementary rules, Rule of Three, Fractions, Vulgar and Decimal.
- (b) Mensuration.
- (c) Practical Geometry.

II.—*Engineering.*

- (a) Building materials.
- (b) Construction of building.
- (c) Simple designing and estimating.
- (d) Carpentry.
- (e) Surveying and Levelling.
- (f) Drawing.

Marks will be given for the Drawings executed at the College during the year preceding the Examination.

FOR COMMISSIONED OFFICERS.

* *Coat*—tunic, scarlet, single-breasted, with black velvet collar and cuffs; pointed with $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch lace and tracing braid for different ranks. For Assistant Surgeons, laced with one bar of lace, half an inch wide, up to a point seven and a half inches in height, traced outside with gold Russia braid, finishing with an Austrian knot at top, making it nine and a half inches high, and showing a light of $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch of scarlet cloth between the lace and braid, also traced inside with gold Russia braid, finishing down the cuff with crow's foot and eye, showing a light of $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch of the facing cloth between the lace and braid. Assistant Surgeons after six years' service to have two bars of lace, showing $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch light of the facing cloth between each, the top bar coming to a point 8 inches high, traced and finished at top and bottom of the lace bars as the Assistant Surgeon's under 6 years' service, the top tracing and knot extending 10 inches high. Surgeons with the round eyes on the top of lace, showing $\frac{1}{8}$ of scarlet cloth between the lace and eyes. Surgeon Majors have eyes also below the lower bar of lace, showing $\frac{1}{8}$ of the facing cloth between the braid and lace; the skirt 10 inches deep, for an officer five feet nine inches in height, with a variation of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch longer or shorter for every inch difference in the height of the wearer; two plaits on skirts behind, edged white with two buttons at waist; the skirt closed behind quite plain; the collar and front of coat edged with white $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide; the skirts lined with white; on the shoulders a plain double gold square cord to button at top of shoulder with a small button at bottom sewn on to the shoulder seam; the collar laced round top with lace and gold braid on the collar seam. (Gold-braided eyes inside the lace for officers ranking with Field Officers only.) Relative collar badges; thus for Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, after 5 years' service, a crown and star, for Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals under 5 years' service and Surgeon Major a crown, Surgeon a star (other ranks omitting the braided eyes), Assistant Surgeon, with 6 years' service, a crown and star, Assistant Surgeon under 6 years' service a crown; size of eyes— $\frac{1}{2}$ inch exterior measurement— $\frac{1}{8}$ inch apart.

Lace—gold, two vellum-pattern, half inch width.

Buttons—gilt, with the crown and letters V. R., with the words 'Bengal Medical Service,' 'Madras Medical Service,' or 'Bombay Medical Service,' within a star raised thereon.

* The coat for Inspector General of Hospitals is of the same pattern as that prescribed for General Officers of corresponding rank; the lace to be of 'Staff Pattern.'

† *Hat*—cocked, plain; the fan or back part seven inches, the front five inches and half, each corner five inches.

† *Loop*—scale, with regulation button, and black silk cockade.

† *Tassels*—gold bullion.

† *Feather*—black cock's tail, drooping from a feathered stem three inches in length.

Stock—black silk.

Trousers, Dress—blue cloth, with gold lace two and a half inches wide for Inspector General, and an inch and three quarters wide for Officers below that rank, down outward seam.

Boots—Wellington.

Spurs—screw, yellow metal, as for Staff Officers, for those Medical Officers who are allowed forage for a horse.

† *Sword*—the same as for Officers of Infantry.

† *Scabbard*—brass, for those having the rank of Field Officer; steel, for Officers under that rank.

† *Sword-knot*—crimson and gold, with acorn tassel.

Sword-belt—black morocco, with three rows of gold embroidery $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide on the waist belt and three rows $\frac{3}{8}$ inch on the slings gilt, chased clasp with silver lion and crown for Medical Officers ranking with Brigadiers and Major Generals; black morocco, with two rows of gold embroidery for Deputy Inspectors General; black leather with slings and gilt hook for all other ranks. Medical Officers below the rank of Deputy Inspector General are permitted to wear at Levées, Balls, &c., a dress sword-belt similar to that prescribed for Deputy Inspectors General. To be worn over the coat.

Plate—a round gilt clasp, with V. R., surmounted by a crown, in silver, upon the centrepiece, and 'Bengal Medical Service,' 'Madras Medical Service,' or 'Bombay Medical Service,' with a laurel branch, also in silver, on the outer circle.

Shoulder-belt—For Medical Officers ranking with Brigadiers and Major Generals:—black morocco with four rows of gold embroidery $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide, gilt chased buckle and slide (no breast ornament), pouch of black morocco leather, flap $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide, $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep, and pointed, with three rows of $\frac{1}{4}$ inch gold embroidery,—gilt chased, V. R., and crown ornament. For Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals:—three rows of gold embroidery on the pouch belt, and two on the pouch. For other ranks:—black patent leather, with a small case of surgical instruments, according to pattern.

Medical Officers below the rank of Deputy Inspector General are permitted to wear at Balls, Levées, &c., a dress pouch belt and pouch similar to that prescribed for Deputy Inspectors General.

‡ *Patrol Jacket*—as prescribed for Officers of Infantry.

Trousers, Undress.—Blue cloth, with a scarlet stripe two and a half inches wide down the outward seam for Inspector General, one and three-quarter inches for Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, and scarlet welt for all other ranks.

Boots—Wellington.

Forage Cap—Inspector General and Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, as for Major General, except that the band is to be of lace of the staff pattern; gold button and trimming on the top. For all other ranks, blue cloth, with black leather peak and chin strap, black silk oak leaf band, with V. R., surmounted by a crown, embroidered in gold on the front, and with black button and trimming.

Shell-jacket—As prescribed for Officers of Infantry, collar and cuffs of black velvet.

Waistcoat.—Scarlet cloth, with gilt studs down the front to hook and eye, edged with plain gold braid, with crow's feet at each end of pockets.

Great Coat—Of Infantry pattern, blue cloth, lined with scarlet, with uniform buttons.

Horse furniture—Bridle, as Officers of Infantry, with brown leather front, and rosettes. Bit, without bosses. Saddle cloth for Officers who are allowed forage for a horse, blue cloth, same dimensions as for Infantry Officers with the lace of black silk, oak leaf pattern one inch wide; two rows of lace for Inspector and Deputy Inspector General. Badges in black silk. Holsters, covered with black leather. Girths, blue. Saddle, hunting. Assistant Surgeon no badges.

POST OFFICE NOTIFICATIONS.

Changes of Address.—All communications on the subject should be made to the Post Master of Bombay, or other Post Masters, and not to the Post Master General. The name of the Post Town to which letters will be found addressed should be stated in the application.

Re-direction of Overland Letters.—Hitherto the Bombay Post Office has, as a favour, attended to instructions from the Public for the interception and re-direction of Overland Letters addressed to stations beyond Bombay.

2. The introduction of Sorting the Overland Mails on board Steamers between Suez and Bombay has necessitated the abandonment of this system, as time does not allow of the necessary intimation to Sea Sorters, who are also otherwise fully employed, and letters reach Bombay ready packeted for the interior.

3. Requests to intercept or redirect Overland Letters are therefore not attended to by the Bombay Post Office. Those expecting a change of residence are recommended to have their letters consigned to some Agent in Bombay.

Complaints from Residents of Bombay requiring redress as to surcharge of postage, mis-sending, or delay in the delivery of letters, &c., should be made to the Post Master, accompanied by the envelopes of the letters referred to.

Similar complaints in the Mofussil should be made to the Inspecting Post Master of the Division, also accompanied by the envelope.

An appeal against the decision of the Post Master of Bombay, or of the Inspecting Post Master, can always be made to the Post Master General.

Complaints against the Post Office.—Complaints against the Post Office, certified as such under the full signature and address of the sender, and addressed to any officer of the Postal Department, will not be chargeable with any postage.

Overland Mails.—The Overland Mails per P. and O. Company's Steam Packets will leave Bombay every Saturday at 5 P.M. during the remaining month of the present year.

The Mails close at the General Post Office at 2 P.M.

The After Packet at 3 P.M.

After-Packet Letters are not forwarded unless an 8-anna stamp is affixed to the letter in addition to the postage.

Registered Letters are received until 1 P.M.

The latest hour for posting Overland Covers at the several Branch Post Offices is 1 P.M.

Late Letters for the Overland Mails.—Independently of the After-Packet, which is kept open at the General Post Office till 3 P.M., late letters for the English Mail will be taken at the Pier Post Office from 2 P.M., and as late as 4-30 P.M. The full postage, including the usual fee of 8 annas, must be prepaid on each cover.

Experimental Transmission of Mails from India to the United Kingdom, via

Brindisi.—Arrangements having been made for the experimental transmission of mails from India to the United Kingdom *via* Brindisi, it is hereby notified for general information that Letters and Newspapers, (not packets of Books or Patterns,) superscribed by the senders with the words "*via* Brindisi" and fully prepaid at the enhanced rates noted on the margin,* will be forwarded by the route mentioned.

2. Letters and Newspapers for countries the route* to which lies through the United Kingdom superscribed with the words "*via* Brindisi," and fully prepaid at the rate shown in the Foreign Post Schedule of the Indian Postal Guide for the Marseilles route, together with 2 annas per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. each additional for Letters, and 8 pies per 4 ozs. each additional for Newspapers, will also be forwarded by the route mentioned.

Privilege of reduced rates of Postage withdrawn.—It is hereby notified for the information of Officers serving on Board Her Majesty's Ships, and of Commissioned and Warrant Officers and superintending or first class School Masters of the Army employed in Her Majesty's Service in India, that the privilege heretofore enjoyed by them of sending and receiving letters to and from the United Kingdom at a reduced rate of postage has been withdrawn, with effect from the 1st January 1870, by a Treasury Warrant dated the 17th August last.
